Almost immediately some low-life stole a potted plant and has had the nerve to come back a second time to remove not only another potted plant but to start stripping the plants from the garden.







KITSWELL ROAD RECREATION AREA Possible Up-Grade

A special meeting of the Lanchester Partnership's Youth Group was held on Thursday the 12th of June in the Community Centre to work on plans and put together a grant application for a bike track and teen play equipment.

As reported in a previous edition of the Village Voice, some young people had visited bike tracks around the region and had started to draw plans of the most desirable lay-out.

The Parish Council had already indicated that its land at the Kitswell Road recreation area could be used, and would consider helping to pay for it.

Lanchester's District Councillors had also expressed support and said that they would consider financial help, and the group had been encouraged to put in a grant application for the Youth Capital Fund. The meeting went very well and the grant

application has now been made.

Meanwhile, the Parish Council is making all of the necessary arrangements to consult the local residents and the cricket and rugby clubs.



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

Live performances of music are usually anticipated with high hopes if not a frisson of excitement. The programme of traditional music. composed mainly in the 18th century, had a strong Scottish slant reflecting the turbulent history of the region. It is to be remembered that the Northumberland Scottish border was in a state of flux for centuries, Berwick for example, being finally attached to Northumberland only in 1885. Renditions of tunes such as Jimmy Allen, Whittingham Fair, Sleep Well My Darling, Swindon, The Flowers of the Forest, Blow the Wind Southerly and many more were much appreciated by those present. They not only had the opportunity to

hear this music played on traditional instruments but also to see such rare tools of the trade at close hand.

As is usual with Ian Brunt's "productions" he interspersed the music thoroughly with researched, apposite readings from the contemporary writings of Thomas Bewick and Walter White. The show stopper however was a recitation about the time when Nosey met Boney at the Battle of Waterloo delivered in impeccable dialect!

The night's entertainment was brought to a finale with a sing-along to the tunes of Geordie Hinny, Bobby Shaftoe, Billy Boy and the Keel Row. Amazingly most of the audience knew the words!
