Lanchester Parish Council has been working on proposals for improvements to the village green for a period of time and work has included the involvement of the community on suggestions for the improvements.

Proposals include the introduction of recreational path along the side of the burn on the underused stretch of the village green. This rather sinuous path approximately 130m long would link the existing unused seats on the green and would connect to

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LAUNCH OF LOCALITY MAP

A ewe and her two lambs. three very well turned out ponies and riders, as well as a tractor, all under the trees on the Green, added a very rural air to the village on Saturday, 29th May. Passers-by and shoppers swelled the crowd, to about 70 people, attending the launch of the Locality Map, which commenced at 11 am in bright, sunny weather. The Launch began with a speech by Parish Council Chair, Ossie Johnson, who welcomed special guests and all those who had come along to witness this important occasion. The Locality Map, which in reality is a large booklet, is the third document produced by the Parish Council in conjunction with consultants and the Partnership and which deals with the rural community of the Parish. Cllr Johnson thanked those involved, in particular Cllr Keith Harrison and his family who had supported him during the three years of hard work putting the Map together. He also thanked Cllr Mike Wardle who had worked tirelessly to produce funding of £73,000 to pay for a Development Worker to work in the Parish during

the next18 months. Originally it was hoped that Matt Baker, Presenter After presenting Mrs savouries and beverages of BBC's Country File, would attend the Launch. However, due to work commitments he was unable to do so but his mother, Mrs Janice Baker, who farms just outside the Parish and is County Organiser for the Young Farmers, came in his stead. She, too, thanked those who had helped produce the Map for their dedication and hard work and stressed importance to the agriculture, conservation and wildlife of the Community and the need to safeguard these for future generations Matt Baker had sent a letter wishing the Project well and expressing the same sentiments as his mother. then John Gall, a local landowner and President of the History Society, spoke about the history of the local area, mentioning its recovery from coal mining, the former large estates and how the needs of the area have changed since the Romans and will continue to change. He also thanked Steve Scotton for his advice with regard to grants, planning and other aspects of the Map, finishing by saying that the Project would enable people to live happier,

better and fuller lives.



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

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

The basic fare is 60p, but usual concessions apply.

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




