
SEASONAL FLU

HOW HORSES ARE HELPING PEOPLE AT MAIDEN LAW

Anyone who has travelled from Maiden Law crossroads towards Burnhope recently will have noticed that just after Chapman's Well Fishing Pond, there are horses, ponies and donkeys happily wandering around the six acres of meadows and tracks that back on to Burnhope ponds and nature reserve. These very special horses spend some of their time helping people suffering from depression, young people with learning and behavioural difficulties, troubled families, those

disorders, bereavement, trauma, relationship issues and much more. So how on earth do they do it? First of all they are never ridden. They are a family herd who love to meet people who visit, but most of all being non verbal creatures they are fantastic at assessing the emotions, energy, intention and state of mind, not only of other horses but of people too! Secondly, they work with a human team of mental health professionals and equine specialists, skilled in helping people begin to understand how they can take ownership of their problems and

through interactions with the horses, can begin to turn their lives around.

We are always keen to meet up with the local community and to invite people to come to visit us and perhaps become one of our team of volunteers and supporters. After all, the most boring jobs around the centre become much more fun when done in the company of a couple of donkeys or even of Finlay and Brego, our two yearling ponies! The first cash register was invented in the 1880s and the typewriter appeared in 1860. The Enigma Machine may have helped to end the war early when it deciphered German codes. In the post war world, technology has made huge strides, especially in the production of smaller devices for the individual. Advances in health technology are very exciting, bringing benefits to so many people.





RECIPE OF THE MONTH

Beef Stifado

September is the month when everyone returns to work and school after the summer holiday. Many have enjoyed time in Greece, with memories of its beautiful scenery, culture and food. Beef stifado is the Greek version of the stew prepared all over the Mediterranean, with its distinctive taste coming from the herbs used in its preparation. I've made this stew many times, it's simple to make and it's really good!

After the first 2 steps, it can be transferred to a slow cooker and really benefits from this mode of cooking. Serves 4

1 tablespoon of olive oil 2lb stewing beef 8 oz onions, chopped 2 garlic cloves, crushed 8 oz can tomatoes 2 tablespoons tomato puree Juice of 1 lemon 1 tablespoon freeze-dried oregano Pinch of freeze-dried thyme 1 teaspoon sugar Seasoning Tarragon sprigs to garnish - optional METHOD 1) Preheat the oven to 150C/300F/Gas 2.Heat the oil in a flameproof casserole into which the beef can fit comfortably. Cut the meat into 1 inch cubes and fry until lightly

browned. Add the onions and garlic and fry until golden brown.

2) Add the tomatoes, tomato purée, lemon juice, oregano, thyme and sugar with a little seasoning (you can adjust the seasoning after cooking) and enough water to come halfway up the beef.


3) Turn thoroughly to mix all the ingredients, cover the casserole dish and cook in the oven for about 3 hours. Stir at least once during the cooking time. The sauce will reduce to almost jam-like an consistency and the beef will be completely tender. Serve with rice or mashed potatoes and seasonal vegetables.
