# COUNCIL SAYS NO TO STORY HOMES

The meeting regarding the Story Homes Development at Newbiggen Lane, Lanchester, was held in the Council Chamber at County Hall on Tuesday 2nd June.

Approximately 20 Lanchester residents, including members of The Campaign for the Protection of Rural Lanchester, met outside the building where they displayed a banner in opposition to Story Homes.

Mr Henry Jones, Planning Officer in charge of the project at the council, presented a PowerPoint presentation outlining all the reasons why the project should not be passed. He followed this by reading a letter from Pat Glass MP presenting

#### **SECRET SATLEY** Visited by Lanchester Wildlife Group

A group of adventurous Lanchestrians headed off in search of a wild time on Tuesday evening 9th June. Spurred on by one of the warmest sunny evenings to date, the spy mission to discover 'secret Satley' was a success.

We had inside help; resident and botanical expert David Shimwell introduced us to five fabulous 'Heritage Habitats'. Our first discovery lay through the churchyard, some magnificent 'veteran' Beech trees shading a carpet of Wood Sorrel. These were not the only 'veterans' as on our return route was a copse of very mature Bird Cherry trees. We also encountered an ancient hedgerow probably dating to 1400s. The highlight of discovery was а traditionally managed wild flower meadow - a carpet of buttercups and red clover. with named colloquially 'Queen Anne's Lace' and

## POLICE REPORT

At our PACT meeting held on Tuesday 2nd June, the residents decided to set no PACT priority for Lanchester. However, issues that local beat officers have been addressing recently include speeding, parking, antisocial behaviour and bogus officials.


Speeding continues to be a hot topic across the Durham Constabulary area and as such we have recently had speed surveys carried out on Howden Bank, Cadger Bank and Peth Bank. Once this data is received by Police, it will be fed back at the next PACT meeting. The data will include figures on the volume of speeding vehicles, peak times and what problem solving approaches can be put in place to reduce the speeders. In the meantime local officers and Police volunteers have deployed our laser speed guns and community speedwatch equipment on Durham Road throughout the last 4-6 weeks. As a result 38 drivers have received warning letters and one driver has received a Traffic Offence Report.

Over the last few weeks we have received information that several residents have received visitors at their doors selling items as part of a work experience scheme on behalf of

Middlesbrough Probation Service. Enquiries have been carried out which have confirmed that this scheme is bogus. Therefore can we please ask residents if these persons come to your address to sell items, please refuse and contact Police with a description and direction of travel. Police are actively patrolling affected areas to try and identify those involved and deter them from returning. Anyone with information please telephone PCSO Lisa Jackson on 101.

Good news stories this month include a male from Bishop Auckland has been sentenced to 4 years imprisonment for his involvement in rural crime in our area. As a result, rural crime has dramatically reduced. This month we've also seen two vehicles seized at the roadside, one from a male who was driving whilst disqualified and a second from a female who was found to be driving using only a provisional licence.



The place is spacious and we found ourselves a nice table by a window. The staff are very friendly and they have quite an extensive menu with plenty of options for most tastes.

We chose to sample Santorini chicken breast meat stuffed with feta, spinach, pine nuts and sun blazed tomatoes in a tomato and chorizo sauce served with baby boiled potatoes + seasonal veg, steak and kidney pie with shortcrust pastry served with chips + seasonal veg, sizzling Vietnamese chicken -

diced chicken breast dipped in egg white and stir-fried with spring onion, peppers, garlic + green chillies in a Teriyaki sauce with long grain rice, hot turkey roll with gravy + chips and posh seafood pie haddock. smoked cod. prawns, smoked salmon and gratinated scallops in a creamy leek, parsley and dill sauce topped with cheesy mash + seasonal veg. 2) Whip the cream until it 125 ml sweet white wine

strawberries, juices and 300 ml (half pint) double

Sponge fingers or ratafia biscuits

1) Place the rind and juice of the lemon together with the wine and brandy. Cover and leave to infuse for a few hours, or overnight.

2) Stir in the sugar until it dissolves.

3) Whip the cream in a large bowl using an electric mixer. When it starts to thicken, pour in the liquid, a little at a time, until it is all mixed in. The mixture should be very thick and soft - don't overwhip it.

4) Spoon into small glasses and chill for a few hours - it can be made a day ahead.

5) Decorate with the lemon zest and serve with Sponge fingers or ratafia biscuits.


