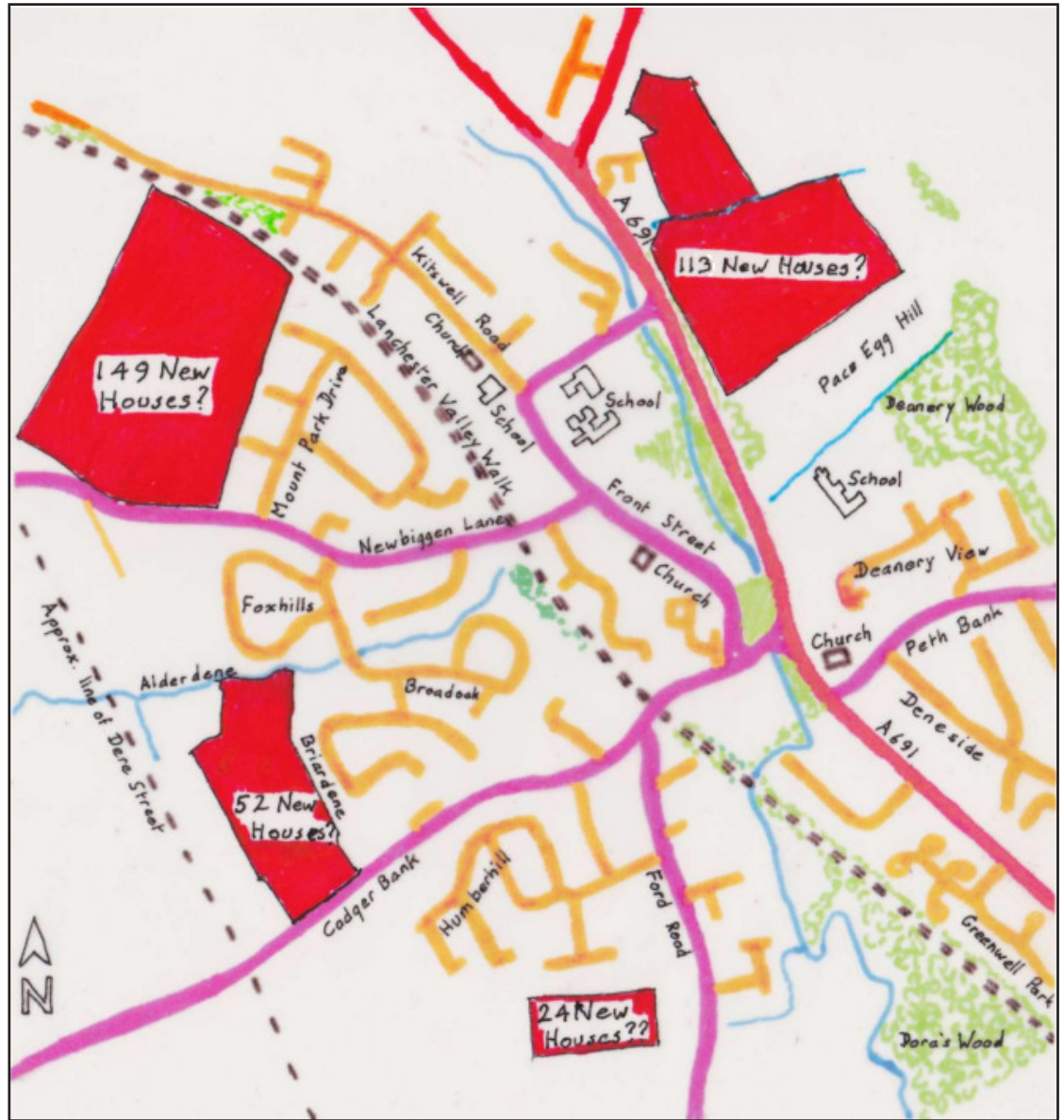

LANCHESTER UNDER SIEGE FROM DEVELOPERS

Developer interest in Lanchester is at an all time high with prospective housing sites in all parts of the village. At Newbiggen Lane, Story Homes have lodged an appeal against the refusal of planning permission for 149 houses; at Cadger Bank, Barratt's have a current planning application for 52 houses; at Pace Egg Hill, in the fields alongside the by-pass, Esh Developments have expressed an interest in building around 113 houses and on Ford Lane behind The Paddock, there is a another small site of interest. The map shows the four sites. This adds up to nearly 350 houses, which is equivalent to the last 25 years of housing in the village.

The Lanchester Partnership and the Campaign to Protect Rural Lanchester are currently opposing the application by Story Homes for 149 houses at Newbiggen Lane as it goes to appeal and opposing the application by Barratt's for 52 houses at Cadger Bank. They want to ensure that new development does not harm the rural setting or overwhelm the village community.

They say: "Right now we want you to let Durham County Council have your views on the Cadger Bank site for 52 houses. Did you know

that the application is on the boundary of the Roman Fort Scheduled Ancient Monument Area and that the Fort is the only example of a complete Roman Fort in County Durham? Do we want to be the generation of Lanchester residents that allows housing development right next door? We must act and act now or the

floodgates will open to developers."

Please let Durham County Council know your views. You can email dmnorth@durham.gov.uk or write to Planning Development (North), Room G73-82, County Hall, Durham, DH1 5UL. The application reference is DM/15/03222/FPA.

With regard to the planning appeal for 149 houses at Newbiggen Lane, discussions will take place with County Hall to determine how the village can be represented. The planning file will be sent to the Planning Inspector and he will be aware of the volume of objections, so the Campaign urges not to write again until

more is known about the process.

The Lanchester Partnership and the Campaign to Protect Rural Lanchester will keep villagers up to date with all these development matters and continue to object to proposals that they believe would harm the character and setting of the village.

REMEMBRANCE SUNDAY

It is always a very poignant occasion when people from our lovely village gather on the Green beside the war memorial, to remember and honour the men and women from Lanchester who died in the two world wars and Stuart Laing, a young man from our village who died in the more recent Falklands War in 1982. A number of the village organisations, including many of our young people, were present and delegates from them proudly and solemnly laid wreaths. The silence and reverence which accompanied the reading out of the names of the dead and the laying of the wreaths is always very special. These men and women died so that we could be free to live our lives as we wish, but with this freedom comes a responsibility of respect, for the well being of our fellow men. At the present time, in the light of all the atrocities and callous, cruel acts of behaviour, this is more than ever needed. We each need to value our freedom and be very appreciative of the peaceful, caring community in which we live.

Two hymns were sung accompanied by Lanchester Brass Band and conducted by James Draper. His father Mark Draper played the Last Post on his cornet. The service was led by Reverend Rupert Kalus, Canon Bob Spence and David Hughes in the absence of Reverend Stuart Earl, and the choir from the Parish Church were in attendance as is their custom. The National Anthem brought the service to a close. There was much to reflect upon as the villagers made their way home or to their several churches for their own Remembrance Sunday Services, where the prayer would be 'Let there be peace on earth and let it begin with me!' LEST WE FORGET

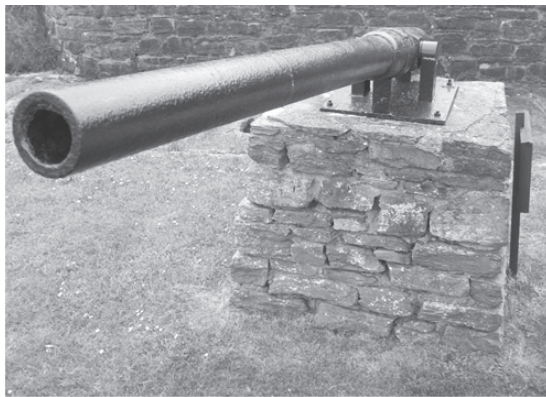
During the ceremony when the memorial plaque was moved from the old Council Offices Lanchester to the Community Centre on 11th April 2015, I met a lady who told me that one of the names listed was killed serving on HMS Narborough during WWI. This led me to research the subject further and I have managed to find out the following information.

On the night of 12th January 1918, two Royal Naval destroyers HMS Opal and HMS Narborough were escorting the light cruiser HMS Boadicea on patrol against minelayers. There

came such a severe blizzard of snow and high winds that the destroyers were ordered to return to base at Scapa Flow, then, due to a navigational error caused by the prevailing weather conditions, the ships hit the cliffs at Hesta Rock just to the north of Windwick Bay, South Ronaldsay. There was only one survivor, Able Seaman Sissons of the Opal who survived by clinging to a cliff edge for 36 hours prior to rescue. The remaining 188 men died that night killed by the impact, drowned or died of exposure. A few weeks after the disaster there was a torpedo explosion that

blew the main gun of the Opal into the hillside above the cliffs. The gun is now in Lyness Museum after being rescued and restored.

The name of the local seaman killed was Robert Bullerwell Farbridge, son of Mary Ann Farbridge, 20 Langley Terrace, Burnhope Colliery. He is listed on the Burnhope Memorial on the first plaque but note the ship is listed in error as the Marlborough instead of the Narborough.

Beside being listed on the Lanchester plaque and Burnhope Memorial,

Robert Farbridge is mentioned on a memorial in Portsmouth. There are 18 named graves in Lyness Cemetery (Hoy Island) from the Opal and Narborough and 35 unnamed graves related to the incident.

Robert's father was also called Robert Farbridge and is recorded in the 1911 census as living in Ford Road Lanchester - does anybody remember the family?

Thought this may help to keep the name alive of somebody who gave his life serving his country all those years ago and

hopefully become more than just a name we read out every November.

Notes from the Meeting held on Tuesday 10th November 2015

Minutes

Ordinary Meeting on 13th October 2015 - approved.
Neighbourhood Warden Report - September - discussed and received.

Correspondence

1. Letter - Swinburne, Snowball & Jackson - It was agreed that a letter of thanks and best wishes is sent to the solicitor who dealt with the Parish Council business on her retirement.
 2. Durham County Council - National Tree Week Campaign - It was agreed that an application for a tree grant is made to plant trees at Kitswell Park bike track.
 3. Clerk & Councils Direct - November Issue - received.

4. Farming Matters - Issue 2 - received.
 5. Campaign to Protect Rural England - Autumn Newsletter - received.
 6. Durham County Council - MOT tests and winter vehicle checks - information to be displayed on the notice board.

Area Action Partnership and Parish Councils Committee

The minutes of the Parish Council's Committee meeting were received. Members discussed the information received on attendances at the summer activities and raised concerns about the sports sessions and the drastic drop off in attendance. It was agreed

that information is sought on the content of the sports sessions before a contribution towards future similar schemes is considered.

Neighbourhood Plan

The minutes of the last meeting were approved. Mike Wardle provided Members with an update. The second topic based questionnaire is almost finalised and will be distributed at the end of January. Approval was given for expenditure of £2000 for the production, distribution and analysis of the questionnaire.

The Conservation Area Appraisal, led by the County Council is progressing. Four practical site surveys have taken place supported by volunteers. The County Council will write the document and the community will be consulted on the draft document in the New Year. The North of England Civic Trust will support the working group to produce a Heritage Audit of the Parish. Work will commence shortly with the bulk of the work being undertaken early in 2016.

Parish Council Office - lease agreement

It was agreed that a 10 year lease is pursued with a break clause and that the proposed rent amount

is discussed further with Derwentside Homes along with information on what the service charge represents.

Trees - Kitswell Park

1. It was agreed that permission is given for the pruning of a tree at a resident's expense.
 2. Members agreed that permission is given to the cricket club to plant trees around the edge of the field. However trees and seats must not be located between the football and cricket field or create a problem for the grass cutter.

Concerns from Residents

1. Members considered correspondence and a petition received from residents around Hollinside concerned about the speed of traffic. It was agreed that these concerns are passed to the Police and Durham County Highways along with a letter of support from the Parish Council.
 2. Members discussed the regular parking in front of the war memorial and options to prevent unsuitable parking. The County Councillors were supportive of attempts to address this problem. It was agreed that a letter is sent to the County Council asking that they install bollards in this area.

3. It was agreed that the problem of water lying at the pedestrian crossing on Durham Road by the Village Green during heavy rain be reported to the County Council.

4. Members discussed the previously planted area in front of the cemetery on Kitswell Road which is now overgrown with weeds. It was agreed that a letter is sent to the County Council requesting that they tidy up this area.

Newsletter - the quarterly newsletter was approved for distribution.

Financial report - discussed and approved.
Accounts for Payment - approved.

Questions from Members

- Information only - Mike Wardle informed Members of a meeting he had recently attended regarding the proposed North East Combined Authority.

It was agreed that this item is placed on the agenda of the next meeting and a letter is sent to Simon Henig at Durham County Council asking if he would be able to attend a meeting in the New Year to which the public would be invited.

The next Ordinary meeting of the Council will be held on Tuesday 8th December 2015 at 7.15pm at Lynwood House.

LANCHESTER NEIGHBOURHOOD PLAN

Work continues on the preparation of a Neighbourhood Plan for Lanchester. In January residents were asked to comment on likes, dislikes, issues and concerns in the Parish. Analysis of the results was undertaken and a second more detailed questionnaire has now been prepared under the guidance of a consultant. It is intended to distribute this second questionnaire in January. Copies will be provided to households and the questionnaire will be available on-line too. Please look out for this questionnaire and take the

opportunity to have your say.

Work has also been done on a Conservation Area Appraisal. The County Council has led on this project supported by volunteers from Lanchester. Many thanks to all the volunteers who were involved. The County Council is now preparing the document which the community will be consulted on in the New Year.

The North of England Civic Trust has been appointed to support the group in preparing a Heritage Audit for the Parish. Work will

commence shortly and volunteers are needed to undertake some of the survey work. If you would like to be involved please contact Sally on 01207 520146.

Both the Conservation Area Appraisal and the Heritage Audit will become supplementary documents to the Neighbourhood Plan and will provide evidence to support the policies it contains.

POLICE REPORT

This month our main areas of concern have been antisocial behaviour and drug activity behind The Green School and bogus callers operating in the village. It has become apparent that local youths are congregating in the evening behind The Green School causing a general nuisance to nearby residents, smoking cannabis and causing damage to the school. Officers are now patrolling the area and stop-searching persons congregating in the grounds. A 15 year old male from Lanchester was found in possession of cannabis and was later interviewed by officers.

We have also seen a few reports of bogus callers

operating in the village including young males from Middlesbrough selling household items, rogue traders offered to complete roof repairs and gardening. The males from Middlesbrough were stopped, details obtained and asked to leave the village. Please be vigilant with door to door sellers and make sure under no circumstances you let them into your property without checking identification. If in doubt please ring 101 and provide a detailed description of the persons involved.

Nights are getting darker therefore we are carrying out Operation Winter night patrols to identify any properties left in darkness

which are the main target for criminals. Residents are being given crime prevention advice and light timers to reduce the risk of becoming victims of crime. If you know anyone in your area you have particular concerns about, you can refer them to our Safer Homes Scheme (with their consent); they will be visited by local officers who will complete a crime prevention survey and issue security devices where needed. Please email saferhomes@ddfire.gov.uk. The date of our next and final PACT meeting for 2015 is Tuesday 1st December at Burnhope Primary School from 6.30 pm. Everyone is welcome.

A MESSAGE FROM THE HOUSE ...

We will all have watched with horror at the recent terrorist atrocity unfolding in Paris. This kind of slaughter of innocent people having a meal with friends, attending a pop concert and just going about their business is the stuff of nightmares but it is something we cannot hide away from. If we don't go out, if we avoid the city centres then the terrorists have won. Everything we are, our whole culture, our freedom and democracy has been hard won over many generations and through countless struggles and we are at our best when we are defiant in the face of fear. It makes us British, it makes what we are. In Parliament I have had my first outing as a Shadow Education Minister in responding to a debate on 'fair funding for schools'. Fair funding is in the eyes of the beholder and whilst we would all agree with the principal of fairness in how we fund schools I know that County Durham schools are near the top when it comes to

receiving levels of funding and any re-distribution will result in 'winners' and 'losers' with Durham schools losing out. I therefore responded by saying that funding needs to be fair but any equalisation needs to be through the introduction of new funding and not equalised 'down' with schools in constituencies like ours losing out. Not easy for the government to achieve in an austerity based economy.

Locally you may have heard of the major gas incident in Delves Lane that began on Thursday 12th and at its height left 750 homes without gas. The homes most severely affected were without gas for almost a week. I am told it occurred because a water pipe ruptured sending water, rubble and stones flowing into the gas pipes. Every gas pipe had to be pumped out and cleaned and every boiler checked before reconnection could take place. This has been a massive undertaking where local knowledge

has been invaluable in identifying vulnerable people and making sure

no-one was forgotten. It was amazing to see the way that everyone came

DEALING WITH BULLIES - AN IMPORTANT LIFE SKILL

National Anti-Bullying week runs from Monday 16th November and the students of All Saints' Catholic Primary School are involved in various activities which investigate this very complex issue. Bullying is not a problem with the pupils, but they must be aware of the complex nature of this subject and how it can affect them and people around them. Deputy Head Teacher Mrs Conlin introduced the topic with an assembly for the whole school, in which questions were asked

about the nature of bullying. The parable of the Good Samaritan was studied and students were reminded of the 'Golden Rule' in which we should treat everyone as we ourselves would like to be treated.

We hear a lot about cyber bullying today and Years 4 and 5 were made aware of the problem by Mr Freeman of St Bede's Catholic School and 6th Form College. He described how this kind of bullying over a distance can be so hurtful. One third of children in Primary and

Secondary schools have been affected. There is no 'face to face' contact, so it is easier to tease others. The subject of cyber safety was also introduced and pupils were reminded to be very careful about any information they share with internet contacts and the measures they should take if they are threatened, or if they feel uncomfortable with people they meet online.

RECIPE OF THE MONTH

Chocolate Bread and Butter Pudding

This is a traditional and favourite dessert, given a twist to make it an extra special Christmas treat. It's easy, but very good and even better when prepared two days in advance. Best served in small portions, because it's very rich. Serves 6
9 slices, each 5 mm thick, good quality white bread, 1 day old, taken from a large loaf
5 oz (150 g) dark continental chocolate with 75% cocoa solids
15 fl oz (425 ml) whipping cream
4 tablespoons dark rum
4 oz (110 g) caster sugar
3 oz (75 g) butter
A good pinch cinnamon
3 eggs
To serve: Double cream
You also need a shallow ovenproof dish 7 x 9 inches (18 x 23 cm) base and 2 inches (5 cm) deep, lightly buttered

1) Remove the crusts from the bread, to give you approximately 9x4 inch (10 cm) squares. Cut each slice into 4 triangles. Place the chocolate, whipping cream, rum, sugar, butter and cinnamon in a bowl set over a saucepan of barely simmering water. Be careful not to let the bowl touch the water. Wait until the butter and chocolate have melted and sugar has completely dissolved. Remove from the heat and stir well to mix all the ingredients.
2) In a separate bowl, whisk the eggs and pour the chocolate mixture over them and whisk again thoroughly to blend them together.
3) Spoon about half an inch (1 cm) layer of the chocolate mixture into the base of the dish and arrange half the bread triangles over the

chocolate in overlapping rows. Pour half the remaining chocolate mixture all over the bread as evenly as possible and arrange the rest of the triangles over that, finishing off with a layer of chocolate. Use a fork to gently press down the bread so that it gets covered evenly with the liquid as it cools.
4) Cover the dish with clingfilm and stand it at room temperature for 2 hours and then transfer it to the fridge for a minimum of 24 (preferably 48) hours before cooking. Then pre-heat the oven to gas mark 4, 350 degrees F (180 C). Remove the clingfilm and bake on a high shelf for 30-35 minutes. The top will be crunchy and the inside lovely and soft. Leave it to stand for 10 minutes before serving with well chilled double cream, poured over.

WILLOW BURN IS SPECIAL

Josie Fenwick is a regular at Willow Burn Hospice - and she knows what that means. She stays for respite care every 12 weeks to give her daughter, Katrina, a break. She is totally dependent on her daughter, the staff at Willow Burn, her medication, oxygen bottle and wheelchair. But despite suffering from a debilitating respiratory disease for more than 10 years, Josie's story is not one of sadness. She has found friendship,

understanding and a purpose at Willow Burn. "I can't do sponsored walks or runs but I wanted to do something. I couldn't think of anything so I shaved off my hair and raised nearly £1000," said Josie. "I felt over the moon. I felt I'd made a difference." To raise money in the run up to Christmas Josie makes wreaths, cards and gift boxes using the dexterity she developed working on factory assembly lines. Her aim is to do all she can to maintain

Willow Burn's current service. She gives £50 at the end of each stay. But it was not always like this. "When I first came here I cried because I thought I was coming here to die. Then I cried when I left because I wanted to come back. Now when I go home I start to write the date I'm in next," said Josie, who is 63 and a widow who lives in Catchgate near Stanley. "It's the people who work here. They're out of this world. They're special."

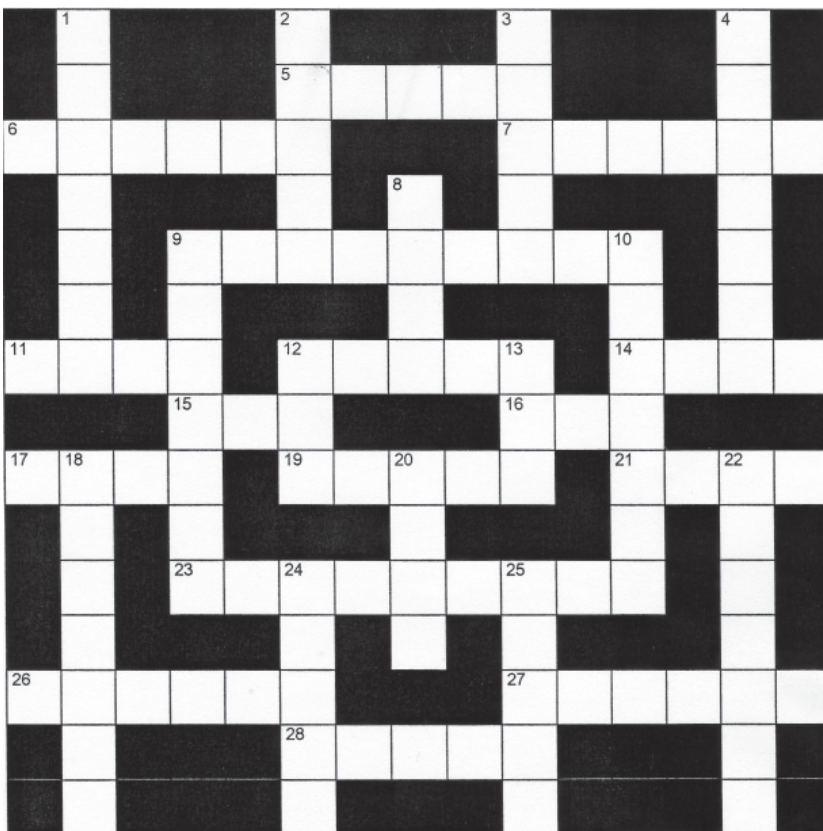
