## 60 YEARS IN MALTON

St Andrew's Day, 30th November 2016 will be a very special day for me; it was on St Andrew's Day 1956 that along with my late husband John we moved into No 1 Officials Terrace, Malton. My husband had been appointed Forester for the National Coal Board No 5 area.

Malton was a very busy community at that time, the colliery was still working round the clock. The railway line which is now the popular Browney Valley Walk was still open; there was a tub line from the Colliery, a coke works and a brick works. There was a row of miners' cottages still occupied on what is now the Malton Nature Reserve and a primary school which the children from the Terrace all attended.

The first year we were at Malton we went to the school Christmas service, I remember the children all had candles in jam jars, it was like something from a Victorian Christmas. Remnants of the school playground can still be seen on the Nature Reserve.

There was a tennis court behind Officials Terrace, a bit run down but still usable, where we spent many happy summer evenings. We didn't need to go out to shop; Officials Terrace and the miners' cottages were served by a baker, a butcher, a greengrocer, a fish man and even a travelling ironmonger in their vans and the Co-op grocery van also visited weekly.

This was the start of many happy years shared with neighbours and friends both in Malton and Lanchester. I have been a member of Lanchester WI for around 58 years and enjoyed working in the Red Cross shop for over 25 years.

I would like to express my thanks to everyone for making the past sixty years so memorable. I do appreciate the kindness shown to me by all those good friends.

### PROPOSED RELOCATION OF LANCHESTER POST OFFICE

There is currently a public consultation period reference the above which ends on December 15th 2016, so there is still time for people who are interested to pick up the relevant form from the Post Office.

The proposed move is planned to take place during February/March 2017. The new Post Office, providing the process goes through, will be at the SPAR store premises at 4 Front Street, Lanchester.

The Post Office will change to a new style model which is part of a modernisation programme taking place throughout the country. The programme is underpinned by Government investment and will see up to 8000 branches modernised and additional investment in over 3000 community and outreach branches.

Opening hours for the proposed new branch would be from Monday

to Sunday from 08.00 hours - 21.00 hours. The new branch will offer almost the same services as the current branch. Travel insurance referral is not offered at the current branch but will be available at the new branch. On demand travel insurance is offered at the current branch but will not be offered at the new branch. The same situation applies to Passport Check and Send. This convenience will not be offered at the new branch but is available at the current branch.

# REMEMBRANCE SUNDAY 2016

The tall trees on the village green were very still, not even a leaf fluttered to the ground. Everyone gathered on the green was very still, as they stood beside the war memorial, while the wreaths of many organisations were laid upon it. Michael Gent, a colour sergeant in the Royal Marines and a former resident of Lanchester laid the first wreath and was followed by fifteen other representatives laying wreaths for their various organisations. These included the Lord Lieutenant of Durham, Lanchester Parish Council represented by councillor Ossie Johnson, the Jefferson family, Lanchester Partnership, Mothers' Union, Thursday Club, WI, Boys' Brigade, Guides, Brownies, British Legion and Help

the Heroes. The two minutes silence which followed allowed people to reflect and thank God for the self sacrifice of all these men and women in two World Wars and not forgetting Stuart Laing who lived in the village and died in the Falklands War in 1982. In the prayers, led by the clergy, the loved ones and their families who are still suffering from physical and mental effects as a result of war, were remembered too. Lanchester Brass Band played for the hymns and the Last Post was rendered very competently by Mark Draper, a stalwart of the band. As people left the green, some to their homes and others to their several churches for Sunday worship, the war memorial remained vibrant, robed in wreaths of red, a symbol from a

village who honours its dead.

Our village has so many people of whom to be proud, not only the departed but the living too. They are carrying on the spirit of all those who have died, to serve the community of Lanchester, selflessly and graciously, in the place where they live. Long may this continue!

# LAYING UP SERVICE FOR THE LANCHESTER STANDARD

On October 23rd, The Royal British Legion members representing Consett & District, Darlington Branch, and Northumberland, attended the 6.00 pm Evensong Service at All Saints' Parish Church, to Lay Up the Lanchester Standard. The Standard had been lost for a considerable number of years and was found in Darlington. It was subsequently transferred to Consett & District Branch for safe keeping, before it was decided to have a true resting place for this important historical Standard.

The Royal British Legion part of the service was emotional. It began with the Standard Bearer and three escorts marching towards the altar. Thereafter, it was similar to Remembrance Services established throughout the country, with a similar format and words being used, and the Last Post being played impeccably, with the Standard dipped as an act of homage. There followed the Exhortation by the President of Consett & District of the Royal Legion, The Response, The Silence and The Reveille (Standard return

to the carry) - all very moving. Finally, the President of Consett & District Branch stepped forward to the chancel steps, passed the standard to Reverend Rupert Kalus, and said: "I commit this sacred standard of the Lanchester Branch of The Royal British Legion to you, the vicar of the Parish of Lanchester & Burnhope, for safe keeping in this Holy church forevermore". Reverend Kalus responded with: "I accept the charge. May the souls of the departed rest in peace." The response from the congregation was: "And rise in Glory".

## ALL SAINTS' WAR MEMORIAL 'LISTED'

To mark Armistice day, Historic England have announced the listing of 50 war memorials across the country - a pledge has been made to protect 2500 memorials by 2018 marking the centenary of WW1.

The War memorial outside All Saints' Roman Catholic Church in Lanchester has been singled out in the first batch of 50, due to being one of the first calvary memorials erected in the area and now enjoys Grade 2 listing status

granted by the Secretary of State as a building of special architectural or historic interest.

The aftermath of the first World War saw the biggest single wave of public commemoration ever with tens of thousands of memorials erected across the UK. This was the result of both the huge impact on communities of the loss of three quarters of a million British lives and also the policy of not repatriating the dead, which meant that the memorials provided the main focus of the grief felt at this great loss.

The memorial at the Lanchester Catholic Church commemorates the 12 men who died in WW1 and after WW2 a further 5 men were added who died in that conflict. The memorial is described as a 5m tall hooded Calvary in oak with a metal figure of the crucified Christ. The timber cross rises from a stony cairn. A polished stone plaque let into the front of the cairn carries the principal inscription and the cairn

itself is raised on a concrete block with the added polished stone plaque carrying the 5 added names from WW2. Next time you pass have a second look at the memorial and feel proud of both the named persons and the fact that Lanchester has been chosen to have its memorial listed by Historic England. ## FOOTPRINTS WALK

About 15 walkers, all members of the Unite Union, set off from Shotley Bridge Hospital early on Tuesday 25th October, on route to the University Hospital of North Durham. They stopped in Lanchester at midday for rest and lunch, dividing themselves up into small groups to visit various restaurants in the village.

The walk was a protest at NHS cuts. In this area it would seem that Shotley Bridge Hospital may close and houses will be

built. The University hospital is likely to lose its A & E Department which is a grave threat to all of us in this vicinity.

Under the new sustainability plan NHS England has been divided into 44 'FootPrints' which must make cuts and close services in order to access Transformation Plans. Two or three of our local A & E Departments could close services, leaving James Cook Hospital in Middlesbrough as our nearest A & E Department.

The idea of a walk was to emphasise the large distances between our hospitals. The proposed NHS cuts, assuming they happen, will make these distances much further, will threaten lives of those who need them in emergency, and inconvenience many who have to stay in a hospital or make a visit. 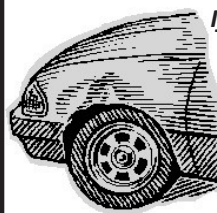

## Notes from the Ordinary Meeting held on Tuesday 8th November 2016

### Minutes

Ordinary Meeting 11th October, Planning Meeting 11th October - approved.

### Police Report - PCSO Lisa

Jackson attended the meeting and presented the police report.

Members were informed that it had been a fairly quiet month. The problem of young people congregating in Front Street has eased and the Police have been working with the school to address the problem. On 14th October the Police took the drugs dogs around a number of public houses. There were no issues on bonfire night.

The Police are undertaking 'Operation Snow Angels' again which involves identifying elderly and vulnerable people to offer support to them during the winter.

### Correspondence

'Locate' and 'Public Space Protection Order for Dog Control' posters to be displayed in the notice board.

Campaign to Protect Rural England - newsletter received.

Clerk & Councils Direct - newsletter received.

### Neighbourhood Plan

A grant of £5000 was secured from 'Locality'. This money was used to engage a consultant to produce a 'Housing' topic paper. In addition the Parish Council appointed the North of England Civic Trust to produce a 'Historic Environment' topic paper. These two topic papers were produced during August and September and were presented to the working group in October. The next stage is to produce policy statements for the plan.

There is also a need to produce topic papers for the other areas of the Neighbourhood Plan and members of the working group will be working on these in the coming months.

It was agreed that £2000 is approved to engage a consultant to write the housing policy.

The final draft of the Heritage Audit is currently being checked. The North of England Civic Trust has assisted volunteers in producing the audit which has involved surveying and recording over 200 heritage assets. Twenty volunteers were involved in the surveying and recording which took over 6 months to complete. The completed Heritage Audit will be presented to the community.

The publication of Durham County Councils Preferred Options County Plan is expected at the end of November.

### Christmas Light Switch On Event

Members were informed that the organisation of the event was progressing well. Mr Terry Deary (writer, actor and television presenter) has agreed to switch on the lights on Saturday 26th November (carols and refreshments from 5.30 pm, lights switched on at 6 pm).

It was agreed that the fencing around the tree, sound system for future events and solar Christmas trees for lampposts are discussed in the New Year.

### Height of Kerbs

Members were informed that correspondence had been received from the

County Council confirming that they could take no action to address the height of the kerbs at the crossing point between the King's Head and the Village Green.

### Diversity Statement

Members considered the Diversity statement approved by the County Durham Association of Local Councils at its recent AGM. It was agreed that Lanchester Parish Council adopt the diversity statement.

**Newsletter** - November 2016 - approved for distribution.

**Financial report** - discussed and approved.

**Accounts for Payment** - approved.

The next Ordinary meeting of the Council will be held on Tuesday 13th December 2016 at 7.15 pm at Lynwood House.

## POLICE REPORT

Our policing priority for the month of November is parking outside our schools in the village. This is an issue that occurs all year round across the whole of the United Kingdom and sadly, an issue that in many scenarios cannot be resolved. In Lanchester we are receiving complaints that parents are parking illegally on yellow and white road markings, obstructing junctions, obstructing footpaths and in some areas parking on private driveways. Local officers are now patrolling these key areas and taking necessary parking enforcement action to deter and prevent future issues. Can we please ask that if you drive to collect your children from any of our schools that you use the allocated parking facilities throughout the village. It is evident in our patrols that those collecting children are not parking and walking, despite numerous facilities being available. Parking is available at the rear of Front Street, the rear of Park House, King's Head Public House and the rear of The Green

School. All these locations are a short walk to our village schools, will reduce the risk of damage being caused to your vehicle, will prevent you receiving fines for parking and allow you to exit the village quicker as there is little or no congestion in these areas.

This month we have taken part in a passive drugs operation in some of our licensed premises across Consett and Stanley. During the operation The King's Head at Lanchester was visited and despite the pub being very busy we are happy to report that there was no sign of any drug activity. ## RECIPE OF THE MONTH

### Durham Yule Cake

An important part of Christmas is preparing and cooking delicious food. This is a traditional recipe for Christmas Eve.

#### INGREDIENTS

14 oz/400g strong white flour  
Pinch salt  
1 tsp allspice  
Half tsp dried yeast  
4 oz/100g each of butter, beaten to a cream, currants, sultanas, candied lemon peel  
4 oz/100g sugar  
1 egg white, beaten to a froth

#### METHOD

Sift together flour, salt, and allspice. Mix in yeast. Add 9 fl oz/250ml tepid

water. Mix and knead for 10 minutes. Cover and leave to rise in a warm place until doubled in size.

Knead in sugar, fruits and peel. Roll out to a square/oblong 1½ inch/4 cm thick and place on baking tin.

Using a well greased knife, slice halfway through the dough to make smaller 'tear and share' size rolls. Brush with egg white.

Bake at 200C, 400F or Gas Mark 6 for 20 minutes.

When cool, tear into individual rolls. These were traditionally served with cheese and ale.

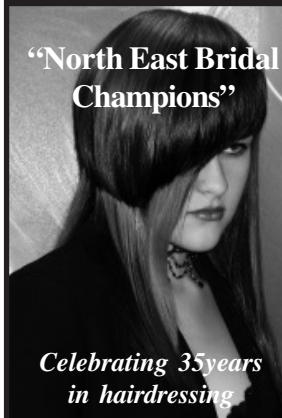

# LANCHESTER HISTORY SOCIETY

## 'Canny Work'

Bill Trenbirth, an Information Assistant at Killhope Lead Mining Museum, gave a fascinating and informative presentation covering Lead Mining in the North Pennines and its effects on the landscape and its settlement patterns at our November meeting. Bill has extensively researched and 'lives this history' explaining the process of lead mining and how it was organised, from removing the Galena ore by different methods, removing the rock from the Galena (dressing the bouse), smelting and transporting it by Dale ponies, each with 100 kilos at a time (!) to the industrial areas of Tyneside. The heyday from 1760s to 1880s brought 3-4000 miners to this area. A typical wage would be 15s (75p) a week compared to coal miners on £1-£1.10s. Agricultural workers at the time were on 10s (50p). Lead miners were also farmers/smallholders and worked flexibly within the demands of the seasons. The North Pennine area formed the most important lead producing area in the country managed by 3 companies: WB Beaumont Lead, London Lead Company and the Derwent Mining Company. WB Beaumont was the richest commoner in England living at Bretton Hall in Yorkshire with an income of £100,000 per year! Thomas Sopwith, the Lead Manager of WB Lead earned £1000 per year and Allenheads Hall was built for him at a cost of £7000 plus £1500 for the garden. Bill's talk encouraged us

to look more closely when visiting the North Pennine area and he recommended an accompanying book 'Lead Mining Landscapes of the North Pennines Area of Outstanding Beauty' by Ian Forbes. Scars of lead mining can still be seen today - where hushing took place, where the spoil is heaped, the washing floors, the smelting flues and chimneys, and the Beaumont and Barrington Schools and the large Non Conformist Churches. A visit to Killhope is in the diary, to learn more about this industry. The Graham Letters at Killhope would give you more social history and looking further at Mining Inspector Reports will give you a factual account of the conditions and successes of this lost industry.

# HAPPY BIRTHDAY, LANCHESTER WI!

President Marie Murphy welcomed members and 2 visitors to our meeting, reminding us that we were marking our 91st birthday. We look forward to our Birthday Outing to Castle Howard later this month. Marie gave details about several events and outings and urged everyone to read their County News to keep up to date with events Durham wide. Marie announced that we hope to introduce more groups to involve members, starting with a Theatre Group and Craft and Lunch groups. Lists were available to sign, so we can gauge the number of people who might be interested. Jane gave a report on the Autumn Meeting and notice was given about our Centenary lunch to be held next May. Competition winners were Jennifer and Janis and Lynne was a raffle winner, along with visitor Zella Clark. We welcomed Eric Hepplewhite who spoke to us about the village wide event 'Lest We Forget' which will mark the end of World War 1

in 2018 with 'Project Poppies'. Since the Great War, the poppy has been recognised as a symbol of sacrifice and loss, and it is aimed to make between 2,000-2,500 clay flowers, all of air dry clay, painted the same red colour, measuring about 5 inches in diameter and representing the lives lost during the Great War in our own area. The Boys' Brigade and several other local organisations are involved in the venture and local people are encouraged to join in, or to pay for a poppy, bearing a metal tag engraved with the name of a loved one connected with a conflict. Eric can be contacted on 521323 and will gladly give more details. A mock-up photo (on front page) shows how the poppies are envisaged around the Methodist Church. The evening ended with Maisie speaking about the ancient festival of Samhain which occurs at this time of the year. We heard some of the legends and folklore of the North East and the evening rounded off with tea, biscuits and chatter.

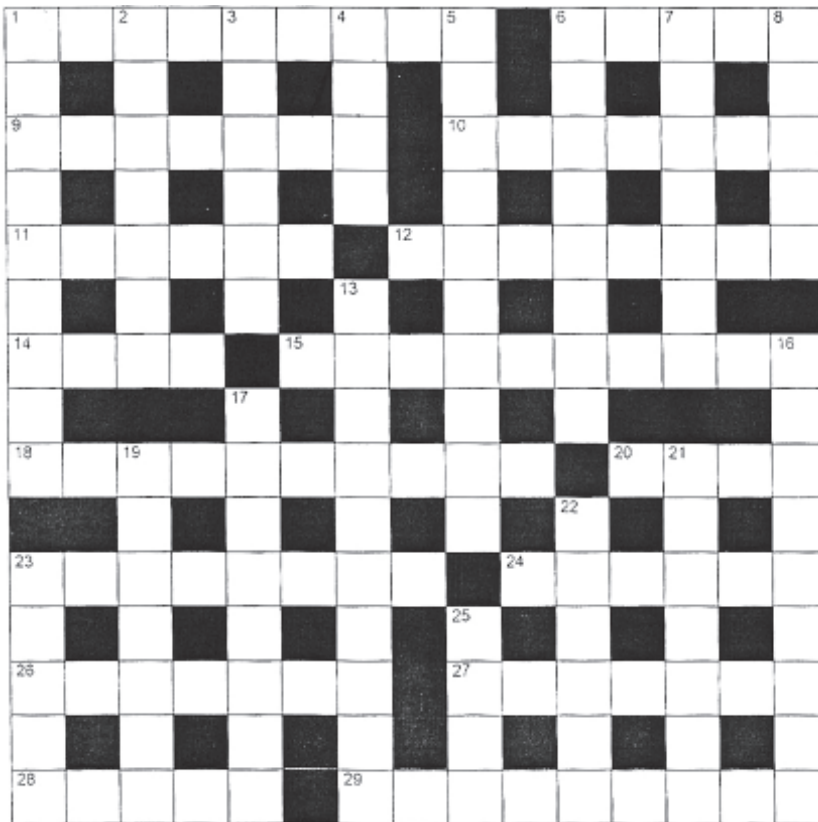

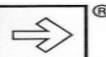

## OUT AND ABOUT - DURHAM CASTLE

When the University of Durham was founded in 1837, the Bishop of Durham gave the Castle to the University and it remains in their care today. The castle's Black Staircase is said to be haunted by the spirit of Isabella, the wife of William Van Mildert, who fell down the stairs breaking her neck. Another sad story involves Frederick John Copeman, who studied at the University in the early 19th century. He lived in the highest room at the top of the Black Staircase, called the 'Crow's Nest' by the students. As the time for his final exams approached, he became more and more nervous. He took the exams and waited anxiously for the results.

As today, degree results were pinned on the notice board outside the

University Library on Palace Green and on the day of publication, Frederick Copeman hurried to see them. The results lists for each subject show students with first class degrees at the top and the other classes in order below. If a name does not appear on the list, it means a failure. Frederick could not find his name on the list and returned to his room in despair. After a time, he could bear his failure no longer and rushed from his room, ignoring everyone. He ran across Palace Green to the cathedral, climbed the steps to the top of the tower and threw himself off.

When the results were examined later, it was seen that the sheet pinned above his had accidentally covered up Frederick Copeman's name at the
