

St Andrew's Day, 30th The first year we were at November 2016 will be a very special day for me; it was on St Andrew's Day 1956 that along with my late husband John we moved into No 1 Officials Terrace, Malton. My husband had been appointed Forester for the National Coal Board No 5

Malton was a very busy community at that time, the colliery was still working round the clock. The railway line which is now the popular Browney Valley Walk was still open; there was a tub line from the Colliery, a coke works and a brick works. There was a row of miners' cottages still occupied on what is now the Malton Nature Reserve and a primary school which the children from the Terrace all attended.

The proposed move is planned to take place during February/March 2017. The new Post Office, providing the process goes through, will be at the SPAR store premises at 4 Front Street, Lanchester.

The Post Office will change to a new style model which is part of a modernisation programme taking place throughout the country. The programme is underpinned Government investment and will see up to 8000 branches modernised additional investment in over 3000 community and outreach branches.

ALL SAINTS' WAR MEMORIAL 'LISTED'

To mark Armistice day, Historic England have announced the listing of 50 war memorials across the country - a pledge has been made to protect 2500 memorials by 2018 marking the centenary of WW1.

The War memorial outside All Saints' Roman Catholic Church in Lanchester has been singled out in the first batch of 50, due to being one of the first calvary memorials erected in the area and now enjoys Grade 2 listing status

granted by the Secretary of State as a building of special architectural or historic interest.

The aftermath of the first World War saw the biggest single wave of public commemoration ever with tens of thousands of memorials erected across the UK. This was the result of both the huge impact on communities of the loss of three quarters of a million British lives and also the policy of not repatriating the dead, which meant that the memorials provided the main focus of the grief felt at this great loss.

The memorial at the Lanchester Catholic Church commemorates the 12 men who died in WW1 and after WW2 a further 5 men were added who died in that conflict. The memorial is described as a 5m tall hooded Calvary in oak with a metal figure of the crucified Christ. The timber cross rises from a stony cairn. A polished stone plaque let into the front of the cairn carries the principal inscription and the cairn

itself is raised on a concrete block with the added polished stone plaque carrying the 5 added names from WW2. Next time you pass have a second look at the memorial and feel proud of both the named persons and the fact that Lanchester has been chosen to have its memorial listed by Historic England. 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FOOTPRINTS WALK

About 15 walkers, all members of the Unite Union, set off from Shotley Bridge Hospital early on Tuesday 25th October, on route to the University Hospital of North Durham. They stopped in Lanchester at midday for rest and lunch, dividing themselves up into small groups to visit various restaurants in the village.

The walk was a protest at NHS cuts. In this area it would seem that Shotley Bridge Hospital may close and houses will be

built. The University hospital is likely to lose its A & E Department which is a grave threat to all of us in this vicinity. Under the new sustainability plan NHS England has been divided into 44 'FootPrints' which must make cuts and close services in order to access Transformation Plans. Two or three of our local A & E Departments could close services, leaving James Cook Hospital in Middlesbrough as our nearest A & E

The idea of a walk was to emphasise the large distances between our hospitals. The proposed NHS cuts, assuming they happen, will make these distances much further, will threaten lives of those who need them in emergency, and inconvenience many who have to stay in a hospital or make a visit. A grant of £5000 was secured from 'Locality'. This money was used to engage a consultant to produce a 'Housing' topic paper. In addition the Parish Council appointed the North of England Civic Trust to produce a 'Historic Environment' topic paper. These two topic papers were produced during August and September and were presented to the working group October. The next stage is to produce policy statements for the plan.

It was agreed that £2000 is approved to engage a consultant to write the housing policy.

The final draft of the Heritage Audit is currently being checked. Twenty volunteers were involved surveying and recording which took over 6 months to complete. The completed Heritage Audit will be presented to the community.

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
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WILD GOOSE CHASE?

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

RECIPE OF THE MONTH

Durham Yule Cake

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LANCHESTER HISTORY SOCIETY 'Canny Work'

Bill Trenbirth. Information Assistant at Killhope Lead Mining Museum, gave fascinating and informative presentation covering Lead Mining in the North Pennines and its effects on the landscape and settlement patterns at our November meeting,

Bill has extensively researched and 'lives this history' explaining the process of lead mining and how it was organised, from removing the Galena ore by different methods, removing the rock from the Galena (dressing the bouse), smelting and transporting it by Dale ponies, each with 100 kilos at a time (!) to the industrial areas of Tyneside.

The heyday from 1760s to 1880s brought 3-4000 miners to this area. A Bill's talk encouraged us

an typical wage would be 15s (75p) a week compared to coal miners on £1-£1.10s. Agricultural workers at the time were on 10s(50p). Lead miners were also farmers/smallholders and worked flexibly within the demands of the seasons. The North Pennine area formed the most important lead producing area in the country managed by 3 companies: Beaumont Lead, London Lead Company and the Derwent Mining Company. WB Beaumont was the richest commoner in England living at Bretton Hall in Yorkshire with an income of £100.000 year! **Thomas** Sopwith, the Lead Manager of WB Lead earned£1000 per year and Allenheads Hall was built for him at a cost of £7000 plus £1500 for the garden.

to look more closely when visiting the North Pennine area and he recommended an accompanying book 'Lead Mining Landscapes of the North Area Pennines Outstanding Beauty' by Ian Forbes. Scars of lead mining can still be seen today - where hushing took place, where the spoil is heaped, the washing floors, the smelting flues and chimneys, and the Beaumont and Barrington Schools and the large Non Conformist Churches.

A visit to Killhope is in the diary, to learn more about this industry. The Graham Letters at Killhope would give you more social history and looking further at Mining Inspector Reports will give you a factual account of the conditions and successes of this lost industry.

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

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
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LADIES WHO LUNCH

OUT AND ABOUT-DURHAM CASTLE

Durham was founded in 1837, the Bishop of Durham gave the Castle to the University and it remains in their care today. The castle's Black Staircase is said to be haunted by the spirit of Isabella, the wife of William Van Mildert, who fell down the stairs breaking her neck. sad Another story involves Frederick John Copeman, who studied at the University in the early 19th century. He lived in the highest room at the top of the Black Staircase, called the 'Crow's Nest' by the students. As the time for his final exams approached, he became more and more nervous. He took the exams and waited anxiously for the results.

As today, degree results were pinned on the notice board outside

When the University of University Library on Palace Green and on the day of publication, Frederick Copeman hurried to see them. The results lists for each subject show students with first class degrees at the top and the other classes in order below. If a name does not appear on the list, it means a failure. Frederick could not find his name on the list and returned to his room in despair. After a time, he could bear his failure no longer and rushed from his room, ignoring everyone. He ran across Palace Green to the cathedral, climbed the steps to the top of the tower and threw himself off.

When the results were examined later, it was seen that the sheet pinned above his had accidentally covered up Frederick Copeman's name at the
