REPORT

This month we have been working with external partners to address the issues of parking and congestion outside of Lanchester EP School during peak drop off and collection times for pupils. Since the temporary traffic lights were installed we have been monitoring the traffic issues almost daily and have recently carried out a site visit with representatives from our Traffic Management Department. During our visits we have witnessed congestion but no road traffic offences being committed. Although the current situation is not ideal, the building work required at the school is essential. Can I therefore please ask parents/ guardians to take a few minutes extra when attending the school in order to source parking slightly away from the school premises, ie, Working Men's Club car park, Front Street, King's Head. By doing so congestion around the school will ease and allow you to carry on your journey a lot quicker and without delay.

Rural crime continues to be at the forefront of our policing, especially as the Lanchester ward covers the largest square PCSO 6780 Lisa Jackson

footage of rural area across the whole of Consett. Ouad bike thefts have been a concern over recent months however incidents have declined sufficiently of late. New information has come to light of unknown persons attending our rural communities at first light to dismantle and remove metal ring fences from fields which are used for cattle feed. As yet no reports of thefts have been made to Police but we are aware of at least 2 being stolen and one theft attempt from the Burnhope area. Can we please ask for people to remain vigilant in these areas and report anything suspicious via 101 (non-emergency number).

With the warmer weather slowly arriving we are beginning again to offer free bicycle security in the village. PCSO Lisa Jackson will be at All Saints' Primary School on Friday 19th May and Lanchester EP School on Wednesday 24th May from 10 am onwards. Whilst security marking the pupils' bicycles, if there are any members of public who would like their bicycles security marked please come along.



EP SCHOOL CHILDREN WIN RECOGNITION FROM TECH FIRM

Lanchester EP Primary School has been recognised by education technology firm Weduc for its commitment to Digital Leadership. In a special school assembly, Weduc Commercial Director Tim O'Keefe awarded a 42" Smart TV to the school's Digital Leaders for winning a Twitter competition at a recent major education technology show.

In January the school took a delegation of four of its pupils, designated as Digital Leaders, to the BETT education technology show in London. At the event, the young students gave presentations on a number of technologies and software products. They also met the Weduc team who were running a Twitter-based competition which involved uploading a 'selfie' to Twitter, using a specific hashtag, which they entered and won.

Since then the school has hosted 'Lanchester Live', a series of presentations showcasing how it uses technology in the classroom to other schools in the region.

Tim O'Keefe commented: "Lanchester EP is leading the way in terms of how it uses technology, not just in the classroom, but in the way it communicates with parents."

The Digital Leaders programme has attracted a great deal of attention, including from industry professionals. "We have invited pupils from all age

ranges to be Digital Leaders," said Headteacher Jane Davis. "Our youngest presenter at the BETT Show was just six years old, and she, like all of them, was amazing." Jane Davis added, "The school is grateful to Weduc. We have been slowly expanding our use of technology over the last few years. Fortunately our staff have embraced this strategy, and our ICT adviser Mr Bailey has been instrumental with his guidance and expertise. We intend to put this TV in the new reception area that currently is under construction, and we will be using it to display videos made by students as well as examples of their work."

LONELINESS IN A RURAL LOCATION

Lanchester and the surrounding villages are great places to live and

offer an abundance of activities for all age groups. In fact there is so much going on in all the community facilities it's difficult for anyone coming into the village to pick which to try first and that does depend on finding out about what's available. Sometimes the choice is made through family commitments or previous membership of a group; however there may be anxiety about fitting in. Being new can hold us back and it's that first step that tests our confidence. Think of the scenario, a move, hunting for somewhere to live, the feelings of packing up the old life, stresses from life events that pre-empted the move. This is unsettling and can feel as if life is ganging up on us. We hear a great deal about Loneliness and Aloneness, terms easily dismissed unless we make time to consider them. They are different but can be experienced together. Being alone is

something we may long for when we are in a crowded place, no longer enjoying ourselves, but at least having had the opportunity to be there. Some may just feel alone experiencing no pleasure, only loneliness. We all experience loneliness from time to time, there is no stigma, but it can become a problem.

Being concerned about being alone may help newcomers join in community events but, if they are feeling lonely, they may not have the energy to take that first step. A worse scenario; they make the effort, go to an event and nobody welcomes them. They are lonely and alone in the group struggling, which is not how we want newcomers to the village to feel.

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
