ADGER BANK APPEA DISMISSED!

Trading to build 52 dwellings at the Cadger Bank site has been dismissed by the Planning Inspector, Susan Ashcroft. Her decision was published on 9th August, only three weeks after the Appeal hearing.

There can be no doubt that public concerns and expert submissions about damage to the Heritage Site contributed to the dismissal of the Appeal, demonstrating the importance of active

Also, issues raised in objections and at the hearing regarding traffic congestion, village thus dismissed the parking, dangerous site access and loss of countryside were fully considered by the Inspector despite them having been agreed 'common ground' between Appellant and County Council. RESIDENTS' VIEWS SOUGHT ON FLOOD SCHEME

Residents in Lanchester Front Street, Lanchester are being invited to give their feedback on plans for a flood reduction project.

Northumbrian Water, Durham County Council and the Environment Agency have been investigating the causes of flooding in the area. By working in partnership to share information, the agencies have a better understanding of the flooding which has affected Front Street, which will be addressed by Durham County Council and the Environment Agency.

The organisations are Northumbrian using Water's community vehicle, 'Flo', to invite residents to talk through their proposals, which will help reduce the risk of flooding in future.

Flo will be parked outside

on Tuesday September 12th between 11.00 am and 3.00 pm.

Residents will also be able to find out more about Northumbrian Water's Rainwise initiative, which allows the water company to work more closely with communities and its partners across the North East, to manage rainfall more sustainably.

Reducing the amount of surface water entering the sewer network can help flooding address challenges caused by climate change, population growth and increasing amounts of hard surfaces. Small-scale solutions that reduce the amount of rainwater going directly into the drains, such as using less water around the home, adding water butts to store rainwater and creating rain gardens the Country Gift Shop, to help slow the flow of



MIND THE CHICKENS

George Nairn entertained cortege of Suffragette the History Society with Emily Wilding Davison, as his journey on the A1 from Scotch Corner to the Scottish Borders illustrated by postcards. George Nairn, a collector and seller of postcards for over 20 years, showed us an extensive range of postcards which chronicled our social history. Millions of cards were sent every day costing 1p to buy and $\frac{1}{2}$ p to send, how things have changed. The development of the A1 was like travelling in time, from horse and carts, hackney carriages, trams and later cars. Bypasses have hugely altered villages and the countryside, bypassing major towns such as Chester le Street and Northumberland Street in Newcastle!

The group were fascinated by a card of a First Aid Dressing Station and Memorial Cottages at Chilton, and a line of 2500 WW1 soldiers near the now Lambton Worm Pub

her body was moved from King's Cross to Morpeth. Shops and signage were clearly identified on some cards including: the Lemonade delivery wagon in Croxdale, the RymerFord garage at Chester le Street selling a tractor for just £190, The Maypole Diary shop selling butter at 1s 2d a pound in Morpeth, and a pharmacist cart named R U Low at Birtley.

George has a picture of the tradition of Shrove Tuesday football at Chester le Street which has disappeared, unlike the Ashbourne (Derbyshire) event.

SEASONAL FLU

Pregnant women and carers can also be vaccinated. It is therefore advisable for these groups to be vaccinated against the flu. Please remember to inform the person giving the vaccination if you have an egg allergy, had a previous adverse reaction to a flu vaccination or if

you are feeling unwell. Lanchester Medical Centre will have the flu vaccine available from Monday 25th September 2017 and will run through to early 2018; however it is advisable to have your vaccination as soon as possible. This year (2017-18) the nasal vaccine is routinely being offered to all children aged two and three (on 31st August 2017) by their GP practice. Children in reception class, school years one, two, three and four will be offered the nasal vaccine under the school programme. The nasal vaccine should be available from mid October. Contact your local GP practice for further details.

THURSDAY CLUB

On 20th July we welcomed Andrew and Craig from Northumberland Cheese Company. Founded by Mark in the early 1980s. at Redesdale Sheep Dairy, he milked his first sheep in 1984 making yoghurt and Gouda type cheese. In 1986/7 a farm building was converted into a tea room and shop and by this time they were selling mainly hard cheese and had been on TV and in the press. The business grew and by 1996 was moved to Blagdon. Realising that people outside Northumberland didn't identify with the Rede Valley, they became Northumberland Cheese Company.

The cheeses are made to a Dutch Gouda recipe given to Mark by his friend in Amsterdam who still supplies Mark

with freeze dried nettles (UK nettles are too gritty) and herbs and spices are from a company in Byker. The milk is from Friesian and Jersey cows, goats and sheep. The curdling process takes 7 hours and is then separated into curds and whey. The size of the cut curds determines texture and flavour. The whey is drained and the waste used to help nourish the soil, making more nutritious grass. 1000 litres of milk leaves 900 litres of whey. The curds are moulded, some squeezed into a press overnight, others left to drain under their own weight. When ready they are bathed in a brine for 48/72 hours, being hand turned every day. Some cheese is sent to Yorkshire where it is traditionally smoked over natural

short of two key players. Shield Owen did extremely well with the bat having joined the 18s from Annfield Plain.



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
