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LANCHESTER PARISH COUNCIL

Notes from the Ordinary Meeting held on 10th October 2017

Minutes

Ordinary Meeting 12th September, Planning Meeting 19th September, Finance Meeting 27th September - approved.

Lanchester Flood Alleviation Scheme

Durham County Council Officer attended the meeting to present information on the proposed flood alleviation scheme for Lanchester.

The scheme comprises a number of elements:

- Work to re-line the culvert on Front Street at Woodham Court.
- To insert large gully grids in three locations: 1 Up Newbiggen Lane at the edge of the village 2 Newbiggen Lane near the Social Club 3 Front Street at the bottom of the grass bank near the fish and chip shop.
- Create a slight hump in the road in front of Woodham Court.
- Rebuild and redirect one gully on Front Street.

Members were informed that modelling has been undertaken to ascertain the effectiveness of the proposed works and consultation on these proposals in September had received positive feedback. Part of the scheme would be implemented as soon as possible with the more major works being undertaken in the New Year. Following concern of business operation, the County Council confirmed that they would work with the contractor to reduce the impact on businesses and residents as much as possible.

Lanchester Parking Scheme

Durham County Council Officer attended the meeting to discuss the recent parking scheme in the village. The scheme had included marking parking bays, inclusion of a disabled parking bay and introduction of time limited parking on part of Front Street.

There had been 32 visits from enforcement in the last 3 months. No tickets or warnings were issued. The parking restrictions seem to be being complied with. Enforcement takes place through clocking vehicle details on hand held devices. When enforcement teams attend they will address all parking infringements not just those connected with the recent scheme. Councillors considered that there were still issues with parking in the village. The County Council is to request for targeted enforcement in the village.

Police Report - The Police report was read out. 2 x burglaries to properties where car keys have been taken and cars stolen.

Antisocial behaviour continues to be a concern in relation to drug activity on the waterside behind Front Street.

The site of Maiden Law Hospital has come to Police attention due to alarm call outs in derelict buildings. This site is now under demolition.

Rural crime continues to be a trend - incidents of metal gates being stolen from farmers' fields have been reported.

Community Speedwatch continues to be deployed in the areas of Cadger Bank, Ford Road, Durham Road and Maiden Law.

General Data Protection Regulations training session - Agreed that the Clerk and Councillor M Gray attend the training session.

Area Action Partnership

Members were informed that the Area Action Partnership is working alongside the Alzheimer's Society, other Area Action Partnerships as well as the County Durham Housing Forum to put in post a 2 year full time Dementia Friendly Communities Officer to work with villages and services to make them dementia friendly. It was agreed that the Parish Council expresses interest to be involved in the project.

Members considered fly tipping hot spots in the Parish and identified an area up Newbiggen Lane, Ragpath Lane north of Ragpath Heath and Hurbuck Cottages as areas needing attention. It was agreed that these areas are reported to the County Council for attention.

Neighbourhood Plan

The minutes of the meeting were approved. Mike Wardle provided Members with an update. The edge of settlement housing policy has been agreed. Work continues

on producing the remaining policies for the plan. A small group is working on the design guidance document and on the mapping requirements for the plan. A half day workshop has been arranged for 1st November to progress policy development and ensure consistency of approach.

Ford Road - request for a mirror to assist exiting from Smallhope Drive

Members were informed that information has been received from the County Council stating that they have not provided traffic mirrors for many years. It was agreed that further information is sought from the County Council.

Hurbuck Cottages - Bus Shelter and Fencing

Members considered information received from the County Council informing the Parish Council that due to the poor condition of the bus shelter and as it is no longer on a bus route they intend to remove the shelter and reinstate the area with verge. If the Parish Council wish the bus shelter to be retained at Hurbuck Cottages we could pay for the maintenance works estimated to be £2,000 - £3,000. It was agreed that the County Council is informed that the Parish Council agrees with the removal of the bus shelter. It was agreed that prices and designs for fencing are sought.

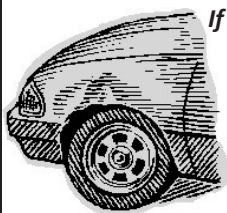

The next Ordinary meeting of the Council to be held on Tuesday 14th November 2017 at Lynwood House at 7.15 pm.

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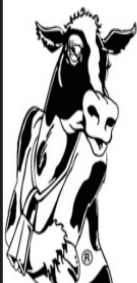
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POLICE REPORT

This month our priority is Antisocial Behaviour. Over the past month information has come to light that some issues of youth related nuisance are being experienced in the vicinity of Croft Court, specifically unknown youths throwing eggs at elderly residents' windows and youths congregating on Kitswell Road causing a general nuisance. Local officers will be monitoring this area and any youths identified will be dealt with accordingly.

The main crimes over the September/October period have been burglaries. Two incidents have been reported to Police whereby high valued cars have been stolen overnight. Unknown persons have gained entry to residential properties to remove vehicle keys and make off in the stolen vehicle. Both vehicles connected to these crimes have been located and are currently undergoing forensic examination. Those involved in 2 in 1 burglaries are looking for cars to steal where keys are easily obtained enabling them to sell the vehicle on quickly and without suspicion. Please therefore be

vigilant where you keep your car keys, the harder to find the better, therefore no leaving them on the kitchen bench, in the back of the door with house keys, or on key holders in clear sight.

The week beginning 10th October we also received a report of a house burglary in the village where approximately £1000 worth of jewellery was stolen and a further report of three outhouses broken into and tools removed. Clearly we have some undesirable individuals in our village at the moment.

Can I please ask everyone to remain vigilant and if something looks suspicious the likelihood it is, so report it to Police via 101 with full descriptions of the persons and vehicles involved.

Local officers will be attending the Christmas Light Switch On event on Saturday 25th November from 5.30pm. 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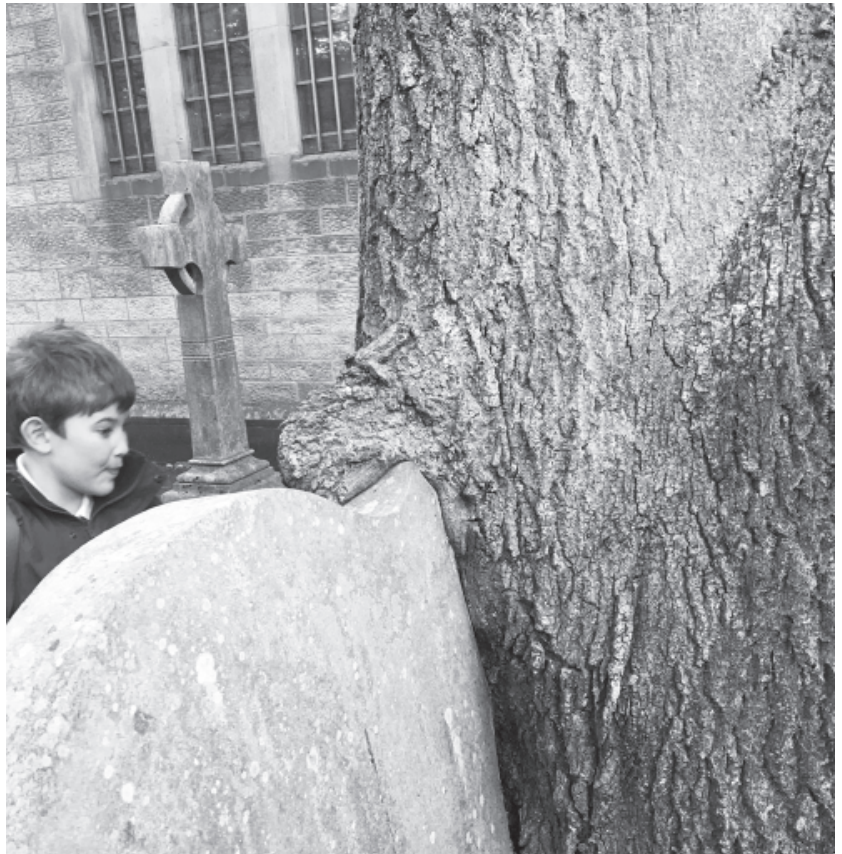

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PROJECT POPPIES 'LEST WE FORGET'

The most recent Poppy workshop on Saturday 23rd September saw another amazing turnout of around 50 people making and painting poppies, including several new faces which was excellent. Over 180 were made and 150 painted which now brings the grand total of made poppies to 1715 and completed 1218. The remaining 497 are in various forms of the painting process.

St Bede's school have made around 200 so far and will at least double that figure by September 2018 but these will not be counted into the figure until they are completed. Two visits are planned to the All Saints' Primary School in November for all the children to make poppies and with the next workshop due on 4th November at Croft View Halls from 2-4 pm it promises to be a very busy and productive month.

We have orders for over 50 special poppies with Dog Tags and the money received for these is going to buy more clay. The Dog Tag on these poppies will carry the name of a loved one and will become a lasting memory of both the loved one and the Poppy project. They cost £10 and we are happy to talk with anyone who would like one.

The next workshops are planned for Saturday 4th November 2017 and Saturday 13th January 2018. Both are at Croft View Halls from 2-4 pm. There is still time to be involved, just pop along to one of these workshops. You will be made very welcome. 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NIGHTMARES IN NORFOLK

Nobody can resist a play based on a ghost story, especially if a railway is involved. This proved to be the case on 7th October when there was a full house in the Community Centre for North Country Theatre's presentation of a double bill of supernatural plays. The first was an adaptation of Charles Dickens' 'The Signalman', an eerie story about a troubled railway employee who sees apparitions which precede accidents and deaths on his stretch of line. At the end, he is himself killed by a train, but the circumstances are enigmatic and we are left to draw our own conclusions. The adaptation was largely

faithful to the original story and the two actors, Nobby Dimon and Mark Cronfield did a fine job of portraying the emotional states of the characters as well as building the tension of the story to its dramatic and thought provoking conclusion. The second play was an adaptation of 'Oh Whistle and I'll Come To You', a classic ghost story by the master of the genre, M R James. This story has been claimed to be the scariest ever written, but this adaptation by Nobby Dimon was intended as a spoof and was not at all faithful to the original! Again, the only two actors were Nobby, playing the central character and Mark, who

played all the others. The presentation was particularly memorable for Mark's frequent character and costume changes, which lightened the spooky undercurrent of the story.

As always with NCT, the inventive scenery design and changes are a major part of the experience and were well used in 'Oh Whistle', where a bedstead formed the central part of every scene, serving as a railway carriage, a swamp, a church, sand dunes and, oh yes, a bed!

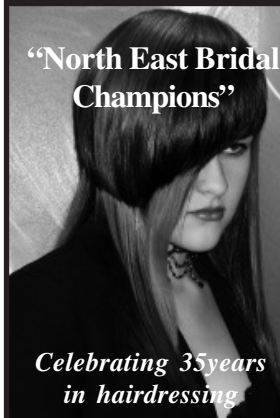
This double bill was quite a marathon for two actors, yet they delivered a seamless performance with very fine acting. Most enjoyable.

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FLAMENCO AT ST BEDE'S

Staff at St Bede's School brought a taste of European culture to Lanchester on Tuesday, September 26th. Despite Brexit the language department at St Bede's was keen for pupils to get a taste of what Europe has to offer. After all, learning French and Spanish is going to be much more enjoyable if the students have an idea of the culture of these countries. Which is why Year 7 students were given flamenco dancing lessons. Head of Languages Katherine Conway said students used to go on school trips to cities

such as Barcelona and Paris, but recent terrorist attacks have meant parents are now reluctant to sanction such visits. "If we cannot take the pupils to Europe we thought we ought to bring a taste of Europe to St Bede's. Hence the flamenco lessons for Year 7. We have tried to incorporate European elements in other subjects we teach here. "For example, in music lessons the pupils have been learning about Italian musical phrases, in history they have been learning Latin phrases. And the

children have sampled French and German cooking," added Miss Conway. Language teacher Paul Pine added: "Staff have been dressing up as European characters to give the school day a continental flavour. "Living in the North East we are a lot further from mainland Europe than schools in the south of the country, but we believe European culture has an awful lot to offer despite the Brexit vote and we hope the students will come to realise this too." Friday October 6th was an important day for Year One children at All Saints' Catholic School. Not only did they and their families

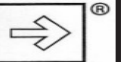
bake and provide some delicious sweet treats, the pupils also worked hard cooking soup from the Eco Club's produce. The

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LANCHESTER LOCAL HISTORY SOCIETY

'Sanctuary in the Cathedral'

How often do we take our local history and heritage for granted? Perhaps, even overlooking those fabulous places and heritage assets that are quite literally on our doorstep - and failing to explore and discover all about them?

This month's opportunity for members provided a fascinating insight into one of our outstanding local gems - Durham Cathedral, and in particular its role for those 'seeking sanctuary' in centuries gone by.

Delivered by our very own Arthur Dodds, Arthur captured our full attention with a presentation packed with descriptions of the sanctuary seekers, their identities, origins, status and crimes together with a comparison of the numbers of Durham and Yorkshire fugitives. From 1464 to 1524, a period of 60 years, a total of 247 persons sought

sanctuary at Durham, about 4 per year.

We learned that principles of justice and compassion had been around from early Greek and Roman times. Durham's famous sanctuary knocker - the original now kept safely within the Cathedral with a replica in position, began its use in the year 1100 when it was provided by Bishop Flambard. Its practical function ended in 1623 with the ban on church sanctuary (despite popular belief still held today).

Sanctuary was generally opposed by the local populace and often by the sovereign. Authority was gradually wrestled from the church by the Tudor monarchs who opposed the exercised authority of the church known as the 'Benefit of Clergy' (church court). Fugitives could shelter at Durham for 37 days (Hexham 40 days and Beverley 30 days) and had

3 choices - surrender, escape or abjuration. After that he/she had to come to an agreement with their accusers/enemies or surrender to the coroner and agree to leave the country never to return (abjuration of the realm). Those choosing the latter

were dressed in white robes, forced to walk speedily to the nearest coastal port (Hartlepool in Durham's case) whilst carrying a white cross. The letter 'A' was branded on their left thumb. So, the next time you are visiting the Cathedral,

look up at its famous 'knocker', pause for a moment, reflect and imagine all about the many souls that will have indeed used that knocker to seek sanctuary at the Cathedral. History, indeed!

THURSDAY CLUB

On September 21st Ken Hutchinson came along to give us a talk and slideshow entitled 'Seaton Delaval Hall - the Good, the Bad and the Beauty'. This was a tale of the entertaining life led by the somewhat eccentric Delaval inmates. They were a fun loving,

outrageous family who became notorious for playing pranks and practical jokes on their guests while also indulging in many inter-marital affairs with other great families. We were given a glimpse into the lives of Admiral George Delaval, Sir Francis Blake

Delaval and Lady Susan Hussey Delaval.

It was then back to more mundane activities as we rounded off the evening with tea/coffee and biscuits and finalised arrangements for our forthcoming coffee morning and outings in November.

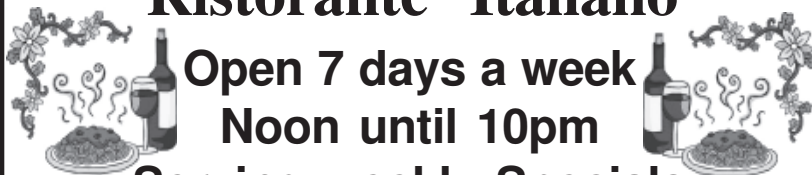

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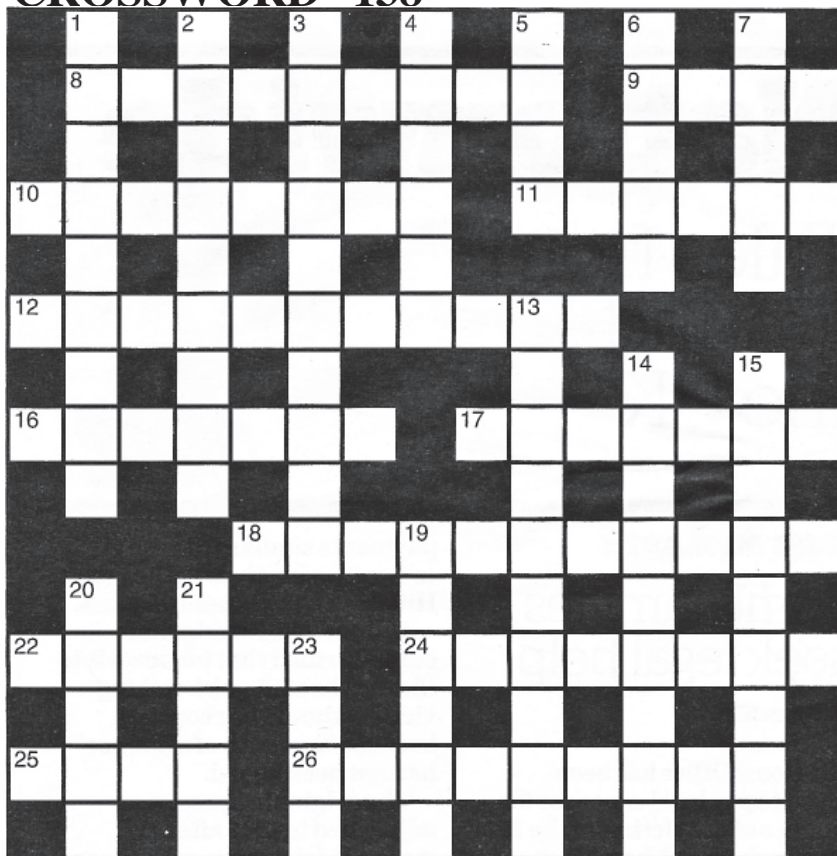

that tell-tale nudging of his 3lb breaking-strain line as it went taut. Realising that he had hooked a BIG fish, he had to be careful as merely pulling would

surely snap off any run he played and heavy quarry! By slowly tired the fish, playing the fish into the eventually managing to get part of it into his rapid current to tire it out and letting the reel small landing net.

The wild brown trout was 21" in length and a weight to behold! The fish was weighed and verified at a club member's house and was thought to be the heaviest fish of the season; a position that leads to the member being awarded free membership the following year and his/her name on a cup!

Imagine Jonathan's frustration when it turned out that his large fish had been pushed into second place by a rogue non-native Rainbow Trout that someone had caught a week earlier in his favourite pool.
