The dance was arranged by the proprietors of Golden Valley takeaway in the village, and is now a regular feature.

And it proved a popular attraction to shoppers and pedestrians in the village on a Saturday afternoon - this year on February 17th.

The noisy procession passed through the attracting village, interested spectators as the Lion made its way along Front Street.

With reference to the letter by Greg Blakeman in the last issue regarding refusal of planning and lack of foresight for the future of the village, I would say that the refusal of planning is the complete opposite of what Mr Blakeman suggests. It actually shows great foresight by residents and planners to protect the village. The only benefits from the larger development applications over the last few years are financial benefits to the landowners and developers. They provide no sustainable long term benefits to the environment or employment in the village. There is a wide range of housing constantly on the market in Lanchester, including starter homes, so

the actual need of new builds on green sites is highly questionable other than for some people to make a quick buck. Mr Blakeman's assertion that "saying that the path is not wide enough is a pathetic excuse" is fundamentally wrong and shows a complete lack of understanding about the reasoning behind that decision. John was also responsible for marking out the car parking spaces in the Centre's car park and



It was a moving film depicting the life of a man who from childhood had



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### **PROJECT POPPIES Lest We Forget**

took place on Saturday 13th January when we were pleasantly surprised to see over 60 people taking part. 263 poppies were made and 278 painted which now brings the grand total of poppies made to 2753 and poppies completed 1792. The difference of 973 are in various forms of the painting process.

With the original target of 2,515 now surpassed we have set a new target of 4.000 and are extremely grateful to our two local County Councillors and the Mid Durham AAP who have donated money towards the project, as more poppies means increased costs.

We visited All Saints' Primary School in November where all the children made poppies achieving a magnificent total of 492.


Mission Week was also a wonderful opportunity to build stronger links with our parishes. Parishioners were invited Deputy Headteacher

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## PARKING AT THE EP SCHOOL

Double yellow lines may soon help to alleviate traffic delays in a familiar Lanchester congestion blackspot. The problems parking outside of Lanchester EP School and the resultant traffic congestion could hopefully be resolved soon following discussions between the County Council and police.

Durham County Council had received requests from the local councillors to look at parking restrictions close to the school to address the problems caused during school drop-off and pick up times. The road between Front Street and the A691 is generally double parked for its full length, from junction to junction, essentially reducing the road to a oneway flow of traffic.

There are two access gates on the school side of the road which were initially proposed to be covered with a parking restriction but the police objected, saying that if the top and bottom junction as well as these two accesses were covered with waiting restrictions, it would create a 'slalom effect' on that stretch of road, which would not improve the safety on this road.

It was then proposed to cover the existing white

keep clears with double yellow lines to prevent parking on the verges as well as the bend of the road, and from the A691 for approximately 30 metres to prevent vehicles turning into Lanchester from being

blocked by parked cars. It is anticipated that the double yellow lines and parking enforcement should prevent parking on the junctions and bends. Local residents have received letters from the County Council informing them of the proposals.

Parents are being encouraged to only transport their children to school by car when "absolutely necessary". *Neil McKay*

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#### LANCHESTER PARISH COUNCIL Notes from the Meeting held on 13th February 2018

#### Park House Play Area

Barrie Alderson from Durham County Council attended the meeting to provide information on the proposed improvement work to Park House Play Area. This will include: replacing the safety surfacing within the fenced play area, replacing the two old springers with three new springers and including a hopscotch game within the safety surface. The remaining play equipment is sound. **Barrie** informed Members that the scheme provided good value for money and would be completed before the summer.

It was agreed that the project be approved and that additional money be allocated to repaint the existing play equipment. Correspondence

Lanchester Cricket Club Beer Festival - Members received information from the club on the preparations for the Beer Festival to be held 25th -27th May 2018. The Parish Council supports a number of measures proposed to address people bringing their own alcohol to the event and underage drinking.

Limited - letter - It was agreed that a representative from Northumbria Water Limited is asked to attend a future meeting to discuss concerns of sewer capacity. **Area Action Partnership** and Parish Councils Committee

The AAP are considering a projecttoallocate£10,000to undertake environmental projects across the mid Durham area. The fund will be administered by the County Council, however the projects will be considered and agreed at Parish Council Committee meetings. Members were asked to report fly-tipping hotspots.

#### **Neighbourhood Plan**

The draft policies have been drawn up along with a draft outline of the Neighbourhood Plan document. A Planning Meetingwith members of the Working Group will be held soon to discuss fully the policy documents. Our planning consultant and Durham County Council are also reviewing the policies.

It was agreed that a small group of councillors consider the quantity, location and quality of the grit bins and report back.

6. Pedestrian crossing -Ford Road/Station Road-This can cause difficulty for pedestrians and cyclists because of the volume and speed of traffic at certain times of the day. The County Council have been contacted previously regarding this. Some works are planned, including a dropped kerb and improved signage. It was agreed that a letter is sent to the Highways Authority asking them to identify possible pedestrian safety options for this area.

#### **Grass Cutting Contract**

Press and public were excluded from this item. Members discussed and agreed a 3 year contract for 2018-2020.

#### GrassedArea-Lanchester Valley Railway Path between Station Road and Newbiggen Lane

It was agreed that a licence agreement be entered into with the County Council to cut the grass in this area for 2018.

Doctors, dentists and eye specialists give treatment free of charge. The 'city of the child' is located in the countryside and cares for those children whose parents cannot look after them. Abused women can find refuge in a convent and outreach programmes have also been set up, which also care for men. In India, the family was looked upon as the prime caring unit, but in modern times, many children have moved abroad, leaving parents with no support and it's realised that care is needed here also.



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## FASCINATING LOCAL HISTORY

Lanchester Local History Society says a big thank vou to Shirley Lamb for relating her experiences as a Matron at the Lanchester Home for 24 years between 1973-1997. The home was set up to meet the new legislation of the Mental Health Act 1959 to de-institutionalise mental health patients. Shirley and Dennis Lamb were appointed by Durham County Council in 1967 with contracts stating, 'working hours could not be envisaged', but staff had a half a day off a week, often working in split shifts.

They had previously worked in Derbyshire, Cheshire and Manchester and brought their expertise to Lanchester.

The Home used the three buildings previously used as Lee Hill Cottages, now Woodham Court. There was a Training Centre for 60 adults

### **RECIPE OF THE MONTH**

#### Lamb and Vegetable Moussaka

Today, so many foods which once seemed 'foreign' and alien are well known and widely enjoyed. This delicious dish has a fabulous aroma which is a clue that something good is cooking.

Serves 4, suitable for freezing and if you're not keen on aubergine, substitute another layer of sliced par-boiled potatoes instead. You need ...

Olive oil, 2 teaspoons Lean minced lamb, 500 g (1 lb 2 oz) Onion, 1, finely chopped

Garlic cloves, 2, crushed Lamb or vegetable stock cube, 1, dissolved in 150 ml, (1/4 pint) hot water Tomato purée, 2 tablespoons Mixed dried herbs,1

teaspoon Cornflour, 2 tablespoons, blended with a little cold water Courgette, 1, chopped Aubergine, 1, small, thinly sliced Potato, 1 large, par-boiled and sliced Greek-style natural yogurt, 200 g (7 oz) Egg, 1 Mature Cheddar cheese, 50g(2 oz), grated Salt and freshly ground black pepper **METHOD** 1) Preheat the oven to 190C/375F/Gas 5. 2) Heat the olive oil in a large saucepan. Add the minced lamb, a handful at a time, cooking over a high heat to seal and brown it. Add the onion and garlic

and cook, stirring often,

for about 5 minutes.

3) Stir in the stock, tomato purée, herbs and courgette. Bring to the boil, then reduce the heat and simmer for 10 minutes without a lid. Stir in the blended cornflour and cook gently for 2 minutes, until thickened.


4) Spoon half the mince mixture into a large ovenproof baking dish. Cover with the aubergine Spread slices. the remaining mixture over them, then arrange the sliced potato on top in an overlapping layer.

5) Beat together the yogurt and egg, then stir in most of the grated cheese. Season, then spread over the potatoes. Sprinkle with the remaining cheese, then bake for about 45 minutes until the topping is set and golden brown.
