LANCHESTER COMMUNITY CENTRE STILL GOING STRONG!

Lanchester Community Centre is celebrating 50 years of serving local people. The building startedits life as a Victorian village school and at a parish meeting in 1895, it was agreed that there should be 'The formation of a School Board for Lanchester'.

By the end of the 19th England century, possessed a national system of elementary education, as it became recognised that a modern, ambitious nation needed a well educated work force if it was to ensure its place among the world's greatest powers. School Managers, under the leadership of the Vicar and his wardens advertised for a school master at a salary of £100 per annum, with 'a good house, garden and coals.' It was decided that Catholic children, as well as those belonging to the Church of England should be accepted and some of the children from the Union Workhouse also attended.

Fascinating details of 19th century life emerge ... holidays were granted for the Queen's Jubilee and to celebrate the Relief of Mafeking. Great excitement came with the installation of running water, but problems of flooding quickly were noted.

For the past 50 years, the Community Centre has been at the heart of village life, and on Saturday 17th March, many of the organisations who are based there, and a number of the individuals who attend classes and groups, could showcase the topics which were important to them. Children gave demonstrations of their dances, while ladies of the Zumba class showed their skills. The Table Tennis Club, the Bridge Club, Sewing Bee, Thursday group, History group, Scottish dancers. Lacemaking, the Wildlife group, the WI - they were all represented and enjoyed contact with others who felt passionate

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
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



RECIPE OF THE MONTH

Rich Pork and Vegetable Ragout

The 'ragout' term describes a main-dish stew; it comes from the French 'ragouter' meaning 'to revive the taste' and is a method of slow cooking over a low heat. It first appeared in an 18th century English food book, with a recipe for a 'Ragoo' made from claret, and lamb's gravy testicles, and another made from pig's ears, mustard and lemon slices. This modern version is a very easy and tasty evening meal, rich with vegetables and produced in a slow cooker which can be prepared in the morning and is ready to

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
