MANOR GRANGE PLAY AREA

IT'S ALL

ABOUT PEOPLE

Many thanks to those residents who completed and returned their survey sheets regarding proposals to deliver an improved play facility at Manor Grange.

Lanchester Parish Council are considering a project to improve the play facilities at Manor Grange Play Area which would include providing a more accessible and improved play facility for children aged under 12.

In order to ascertain the demand for an improved play facility the Parish Council delivered a leaflet/survey sheet to houses in the area surrounding the current play area.

Atarecent Parish Council meeting, Councillors were presented with the results of the residents' survey undertaken in September/October on the Manor Grange and Deanery View estates. The survey aimed to ascertain demand for the proposed play area and asked for comments on the proposals.

Forty responses have been received with 5 responses expressing concerns or objections to the proposals. The majority of the responses were positive with many enthusiastic comments the project. Responses indicated over a hundred children who would use the play area from the 40 responses alone.

The Parish Council considered that the survey had generated a good response with a majority in favour of the project indicating that the play area would be well used. It is however mindful of the concerns raised.

The Parish Council agreed that the project should be developed further and funding for the project should be progressed.

WHY IS COLD WEATHER A PROBLEM?

When the temperature drops to below 8C, some people can be at increased risk of a stroke or heart attack, pneumonia and flu, falling and hypothermia. Plus the cold weather and lack of sunlight can make us feel depressed.

Very cold weather can affect anyone, but the most vulnerable are the very young, over 65s, having an existing longterm health condition, pregnant ladies and those on a low income who can't afford heating.

Beprepared

The MetOffice provides weather forecasts on radio, TV and on your phone, listen to these bulletins regularly. Make sure your

your regular medication plus cough and cold remedies.

If you're not very mobile, over 65, or have a health condition, heat your home to at least 18C (65F). Keep your bedroom at 18C keep the bedroom window closed during the day. You may prefer your living room to be slightly warmer. Draw your curtains at dusk and keep doors closed.

To reduce the risk of sudden infant death syndrome (SIDS), babies should sleep in rooms heated to between 16C and 20C.

For healthy and active folk, you can safely have your home cooler than 18C. Remember to have your heating system checked regularly by a qualified professional.

You may be able to claim financial and practical help with heating your

food cupboard is stocked home. Grants available and you have a supply of include the Winter Fuel Payment and the Cold Weather Payment.

Start to feel unwell? Don't wait until it becomes serious; seek advice from your pharmacist. Check on vulnerable neighbours and relatives to make sure all night if you can - and they are safe and well. If you're concerned that the person may be from suffering hypothermia, contact NHS 111.

Tips on keeping well in the cold:

- * Get the flu jab.
- * Wear layers of clothes.
- * Have at least one hot meal a day and regular hot drinks.
- * Keep your bed aired and warm; use an electric blanket.
- * Indoors try not to sit still for more than an hour - get up, stretch your legs.
- * Outdoors wear hat and wrap a scarf loosely around your mouth. Wear sturdy shoes/boots with good grips.

RECIPE OF THE MONTH

Winter Vegetable Soup

A creamy vegetable soup, economical, warming, and good for you!

Serves 6

You need:

Butter, 25g, (1 oz)

Leek, 1, trimmed and sliced

Onion, 1, chopped finely Courgette, 1, chopped Turnip, 225 g, (8 oz) diced Carrot, 1 large, diced Potato, 1, medium, diced

Vegetable stock cubes, 2 dissolved in 900ml hot water

Cornflour, 3 level tablespoons Milk, 600 ml (1 pint) Sweetcorn, 75 g (3 oz)

2-3 Single cream, tablespoons Salt and freshly ground

black pepper

Chopped fresh herbs **METHOD**

1) Melt the butter in a large saucepan and sauté the leek, onion and courgette over a medium heat for 3-4 minutes, until softened.

2) Add the turnip, carrot and potato. Cook, stirring often, for another 2-3 minutes.

3) Pour in the vegetable stock and increase the heat until just simmering. Cook gently, with the lid

on, for about 15-20 minutes, until vegetables are tender.

4) Blend the cornflour to a smooth paste with 3-4 tablespoons of milk. Add the remaining milk to the saucepan with the sweetcorn and single cream, then stir in the blended cornflour. Heat gently, stirring constantly until the soup thickens and just begins to boil. Cook for another 1-2 minutes over a very low heat.

5) Season to taste, then serve, garnished with chopped fresh herbs.
