On Saturday 12th February, Durham and Cleveland Lawn Tennis Association held their annual awards ceremony at Sunderland Tennis Centre. The awards profile volunteers and professionals alike, and celebrate their work or contribution to local county tennis.

This year, the Lifetime Achievement award went to Dennis Laycock, aka "Tennis Dennis", for his work at Lanchester Lawn Tennis Club. Dennis has been involved with the club in various capacities since 1990 and is currently Secretary (27 years), groundsman (full-time since 2006) and Level 2 coach. He has forged links with the local schools and businesses and initiated coaching programmes for health groups (Breast Cancer Rehabilitation) and new player/member sessions. He was instrumental in encouraging young players to obtain coaching qualifications and thereby enabling them to take the sport forward. In 2009, through Dennis's hard work, the club gained the Clubmark accreditation, the first all grass court club in the country to do so. Dennis also found time to travel, support and referee the club junior tennis teams at Middlesbrough. He is well known in tennis circles for his passion for the grass courts in Lanchester and was even featured in the Groundsman Magazine...fame at last! This enthusiasm even went as far as promoting the club on his gardening business van to be seen around the county. This award recognises Dennis's commitment and enjoyment for the sport of tennis which he loves. Despite the recent pandemic, the club continues to grow and provides a safe and healthy environment in which to enjoy tennis. County Councillor Ossie Johnson, who retired at the last election, has been awarded Honorary Alderman status by Durham County Council.

Ossie has dedicated most of his life to local politics. He spent nearly three decades as a member of Derwentside District Council and was Chairman in the year 2000. When Durham became a Unitary Authority, he was elected as a County Councillor for the Lanchester Division and continued to be the chosen Councillor for the last 10 years, ending his service as Vice Chairman of the Council in 2019.

Following his retirement, prior to the 2021 election, the title of Honorary Alderman was conferred at a special meeting of the Council and unanimously passed by all Councillors. This award was in recognition of services rendered to Durham County Council and Derwentside District Council. Ossie continues to support his local community as a member of Lanchester Parish Council.

In November 2020, Tony Cleary was awarded an MBE for services to International Trade and Export in the Queen's Birthday Honours 2020. However, due to Covid restrictions he was unable to officially collect his award until November 2021. He was joined at Windsor Castle by his family who are Lanchester residents and who named their business after the village.

Tony and Veronica Cleary established Lanchester Wine Cellars in 1980 to import and wholesale wines across the UK.

Over the last 40 years, the business has grown exponentially, diversifying across different areas of expertise within the UK wine and gifting sectors and their supporting industries. The Lanchester group now employs over 550 people with a combined income of £110.5 million for the financial year ending 30th June 2021.

"We are a diverse group of businesses spanning different sectors and various customer bases. This was a strategic development plan to ensure that, as a group, we remain strong with each business supporting the others as needed", Tony explains.

Raised in Durham, Tony started his liquor career at Whitbread's Brewery in nearby Castle Eden where he sold beer and spirits. He then joined Domecq Sherry and later United Rum Merchants as district sales manager. Seven years later, at age 27, Tony, spotting the potential in wine, left United Rum and established Lanchester Wine Cellars. With just $\mathfrak{L}4,000$ of Tony's savings and a further $\mathfrak{L}1,000$ investment from friends, the business was established. Veronica and Tony's living room on Meadow Way became the company office with stock stored at a nearby rented warehouse.

The business initially sold wine to local off licences and restaurants and continues to do so to this day.

Over the years the company expanded its salesforce and they outgrew both the Cleary's house and subsequent office space in Lanchester, both above the betting shop and above the library.

In 2000 Lanchester Wines bought the former Ransome and Marles site at the Greencroft Estate in nearby Stanley, providing the company with land for office space and warehousing. Over the years, the Lanchester group has developed the Estate, and continues to invest in it adding infrastructure, buildings and renewable energy generation facilities

Veronica and Tony believe the profits from the business should be reinvested within the business, which remains 100% owned by the Cleary family. The couple's three children – Alexandra, Ben and Caroline – all work within the business.





Cadger Bank proposed development

Objectors to plans to build 46 homes off Cadger Bank in Lanchester have been boosted by archaeological experts.

Durham County Council's Archaeological
Department said such a development
would cause "significant harm"
to the nearby Roman fort.

At a previous appeal against a similar development a planning inspector highlighted the 'remote' nature of the fort, and how it is important that it remains distinct from Lanchester as a separate settlement, with the fort effectively commanding the high ground.

The department made their submission to the county council which is to decide on the application.

More than 60 objections to the development had been received by the authority, including many from Lanchester residents, by mid-February. The deadline for objecting is the end of February, although planners would still accept views submitted after that time.

A very similar planning application was withdrawn by the developers in January 2021.

Local objectors point to the unsuitability of access roads and the pressure on local

facilities such as schools and medical centres, as well as an intrusion into open countryside, as valid reasons for rejecting the application. It is also not within the areas designated in the County Durham Plan, or the Lanchester Neighbourhood Plan.

90 years young definitely applies to Betty! Always full of fun and with a ready smile, Betty enjoys every aspect of life.


Whether she is looking after the chickens in her garden or gliding along the dance floor, Betty shows the same enthusiasm and love of what she is doing.

Lanchester Local History Society Potential

Do you recognise this street?

You could find out about a former resident from the 1890s by reading The Lost Sister: Susan Clifford (1888-1938)

Lanchester Local History Society was contacted by John Clifford during Lockdown in 2020 and were able to help with some points for his article about Susan. She was a cousin of the author's great grandfather. Susan was born near Derby and should have grown up there with her siblings and cousins, but she did not. Her mother died after giving birth to her. Susan's father already had four children, and entrusted her to close friends who had none of their own, coal miner John Varley and his wife, Harriet. At some time in the 1890s, the Varleys moved with Susan 150 miles north to County Durham. They lived on Hamsteels Common for about 10 years. Many families had been attracted to the Durham

coalfield where mine owners offered free but poor-quality housing. Hard living and working environments created the conditions for excessive drinking, gambling and violence. Expansion of social facilities and new Methodist churches were successful to some degree in exerting a wholesome influence.


Poppy display




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
Remembering

James Starling (Jim) Owens

In Consett during the 1940s most young men chose to start their working lives in the steel making industry at Consett Iron Company or in the coal industry at one of the local mines, but Jim Owens, encouraged by his parents and local priest, decided to take up a career in the health service. Jim, aged 14, began working at Shotley Bridge General Hospital in 1944 as a Junior Clerk and would continue his career in finance and administration there and at other local hospitals for many years, only interrupted by his national service with the RAF in 1948 - 1950 where he was posted to Egypt. Jim married Mary in 1950 at Consett St Patrick's church and continued to work at Shotley Hospital. Through study and hard work, he attained the position of Deputy Hospital Secretary before leaving in 1975 to take up a post of Hospital Secretary at Earls House Hospital in Durham, responsible for the commissioning of the new hospital being built there.

It was at this time Jim, Mary and family moved to Malton and were soon welcomed into the Lanchester village community. Mary and Jim were active members of All Saints Catholic church and made strong and lasting relationships with the people and clergy of the parish. Jim was also on the board of Governors for All Saints and St Bede's schools and was a Non-executive Director on the Derwentside Primary Care Trust. Jim worked in the Durham and Chester-le-Street hospitals until he retired in 1992.

He found it difficult to settle without being employed and applied for and obtained the position of Parish Clerk to Lanchester Parish Council where, in this role, he became a familiar figure around the village and at Council meetings and was proud to have been involved in the introduction of the Christmas lights and tree and the Easter crosses to the village green. Jim carried on this work until 2008 when he finally retired. As he put it himself, "1944 to 2008, not bad was it?" Unfortunately, both he and Mary suffered sight loss and with Jim not being able to drive any longer, they moved from Malton to Lanchester in 2010. Mary sadly passed away in 2012 and Jim remained in Brook View and often commented on the care and assistance he received from his friends in the village when walking to church each morning which he did without fail until the

Covid 19 lockdown arrived. Jim died peacefully on December 16th 2021 aged 92. Jim will be remembered for his smart appearance, his wit and charm, loyalty to friends and dedication to his family and for being the gentleman that he was.

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Good day to Village Voice readers

As you will know by now, my name is Poppy, I am a black Patterdale Terrier with more than a tinge of grey, and I like to share with you the walks I take my humans on in and around Lanchester.

This one involves a walk up Newbiggen Lane and back down Cadger Bank.

We start at the Station House on the railway path and walk past it in the direction of Newbiggin Lane.

But before we get there we turn left over a footbridge over a stream and into Brook View, then Broadoak Drive. We walk along Broadoak Drive past a patch of grass next to another stream – or probably the same one – where I have a sniff before we carry on joining Newbiggen Lane at the junction with Broadoak.

We continue up Newbiggen Lane, sometimes diverting along Ridgeway if the doggy bin is required. Then we continue with fields on our right and allotments and Margery Flatts on our left. I walk on my lead on the right-hand side of the road, facing any oncoming traffic,

although unless it is near school time traffic tends to be light. There are lots of intriguing smells in the verges. When we get to the barn conversions at Newbiggen we turn left along Yeckhouse Lane towards Lanchester Dairy. I often stop at one house and put my head through to see if the white dog is in the garden. He and I sometimes have a chat.

On the way to the dairy there is a hen coop on the right, so I am kept firmly on the lead. In fact, I am on my lead most of the time on this walk. We pass through the dairy, past houses on the left which also have dogs to sometimes meet and greet. There are some frightening looking large shaggy creatures called Highland Cattle in a field on the right. If they come towards the fence, I keep my distance since they have fearsome looking horns.

When we get to the junction with the main road back into Lanchester we are about a mile from home.

We walk along the grass verge before crossing the road at the lay-by near the Roman fort and down Cadger Bank along the footpath.

The walk takes about an hour and 20 minutes and benefits not just me but the humans too.

Our last outing in January was the start of the new year and it always seems a good time to make a visit to the Pavilion and celebrate the Chinese New Year - 2022 being the year of the Tiger - let's hope it turns out to be a good one.

Normally the visit begins in the hospitality area where you are treated to a large pile of prawn crackers, drinks are ordered and menu choices made - a pleasant interlude, but not this time. Covid has done away with all that and we were taken straight to our table. We decided to go with the set lunch menu as we have always done.

It has gone up - like most other things – and is now £19.95 per person. Service there is very efficient, the staff always welcoming and obliging. It wasn't long before we were enjoying our first course of chicken and sweetcorn soup or Peking hot and sour soup served with prawn crackers. Appetisers of salt and pepper chicken wings, salt and pepper spare ribs, Peking spare ribs, crispy wontons and curry triangles were very much enjoyed.

Our main course was made up of fried pork in oyster sauce, chicken in orange sauce, sweet and sour chicken, chicken with pineapple and ginger, chicken in lemon sauce, and beef with green peppers and black bean sauce. We were a little disappointed that the sizzling hot plate dishes were not included, they were greatly missed.

Our meal was rounded off with tea or coffee, the coffee is absolutely delicious, and the waitresses are quickly round with top ups.

All in all a most delightful lunch which we thoroughly enjoyed and we will most certainly be back. Next time we visit, it could be that we decide to choose a meal from the main menu - which has some amazing sounding dishes on offer.

Police Report - received

Correspondence

Lanchester Partnership – a request to use the Village Green for the annual litter pick on 19 March was approved. Information on a meeting organised by the Partnership on 'Contemplating Going Electric' was received.

Northern Saints Trails - Councillors considered the information received from the County Council which included the proposed location point for an interpretation board on the Lanchester Valley Walk.

Memorial Seat - Councillors considered a request for a memorial bench on the Village Green. Further communication is to be undertaken with the resident.

The Clerk Magazine and Clerk & Councils Direct magazine - received

Durham County Councillors – An update was received on several issues including

drainage problems on Kitswell Road, parking outside schools, planning applications, damage to trees and Durham Road pavement.

The Parish Council discussed the effect of recent storms on the trees. It was agreed that the County Council are asked to attend a future meeting to discuss tree management.

Queen's Platinum Jubilee - Councillors discussed the Queen's Platinum Jubilee weekend which will take place between 2 – 5 June 2022. The Parish Council with Burnhope Parish Council are organising the Beacon event which will take place on 2 June in the evening at Burnhope Picnic Area. Thursday 10th February was a landmark day in the life of Lanchester E.P. School. This was the first day of 2022 when we had no staff absences due to Covid-19 – quite a remarkable achievement. Is this a sign of better things to come? We certainly hope so as we are eagerly anticipating the longer days, lighter mornings, and warmer weather. However, we are also hoping for more normality in our lives again.

March is certainly going to be a lot more normal in terms of travel and visitors to our school. On Sunday 6th March we have 6 staff and 16 children travelling to Dubai to learn more about their culture and religion. The school received £36k in funding from the Turing Scheme to fund this project. Originally, we applied to go to India, but Covid prevented this from occurring. However, we were able to change the destination country as long as we still achieved the aims and objectives of the visit. So we are visiting Hartland International School, a mosque, the cultural centre, Expo and also enjoying some sightseeing, the beach and the water park! It should be an amazing experience for all involved, especially for those children who are flying for the very first time!

The following week we will welcome 17 teachers from Latvia, Portugal, Turkey, and Greece. They will spend time in our school learning about how we use music to prevent bullying and we also intend to show them our wonderful area. We are holding a ceilidh for families too – this will be the first time we have welcomed parents into the school building for

exactly 2 years! You may see us showing them around our wonderful village and experiencing some traditional fish and chips.

Then, on 21st March we have a group of 4 children heading off to Denmark with 4 staff as part of our Learning Outdoors Erasmus+ Project. They will visit a school in the north of the country near Aarhus and work with pupils from Denmark, Sweden, Poland, and Spain during their time there. Another fabulous opportunity!

The week after this, we have Year 3 children heading off to Birdoswald Roman Fort overnight and Year 4 are going to Seahouses Hostel. They will all relish this special time away with their peers.

Finally, during the last week of this half term, we will welcome European teachers and students from the Learning Outdoors Project to our school. They will enjoy participating in a Lanchester Trail, Beach School at Seaham, and a visit to Beamish Museum – all chosen to encourage them to learn more effectively when they are outdoors.

Police Report

Hello, just an update on what has been going on in Lanchester. Firstly, we have had a couple of incidents of graffiti reported from the Parish Council. If there are any more incidents can this be reported via 101 so we can start to create a log of this which will help us once we identify a suspect.

Secondly, I have received a few emails relating to parking and speeding issues in and around the schools. We have recently received some new speed watch equipment so once training has been completed, we will be out in the areas that have been highlighted. Consett NPT will be continuing to carry out patrols around schools during morning drop-offs and afternoon pick-ups. We will be linking in with other agencies where possible to try and work together. We are still encouraging people to be considerate with where they park vehicles and strongly encourage walking to and from school, where possible, to help ease congestion and reduce the risk for children and all those around the schools. Finally, we have had a number of incidents in the Consett area as a whole, regarding off-road bikes, quad bikes and e-scooters. These should not be used on the public road and paths and should only be used on private land with the landowner's permission. If caught being used on public land these could be seized.

Online Safety at All Saints'

It has been a busy week for the eCadets (online safety group) in All Saints'. Before we begin telling you what we have been up to, we should introduce ourselves properly. We are Felix, Joshua, May, Will and Abbey. We are pupils in Years Five and Six and we are passionate about teaching our friends about how to stay safe online. On Tuesday, it was Safer Internet Day. Each year, we give an assembly to the whole school around a theme of online safety. This year, we looked at how children should and could show respect whilst gaming. We know games can be fun but we have to stay safe when playing them. The main messages were: including people when they want to be included, being kind and supportive, thinking about how your words and actions make not putting pressure on someone and respecting their boundaries, listening to other people, and understanding that another person may not have the same interests or likes as you...and that's OK! We took this opportunity to play a game with the whole school, asking people to identify if messages that had been sent in a gaming chat were respectful or disrespectful.

We thought it would be a good idea to write a questionnaire for pupils. We spent a long time speaking to children at break times, hearing their thoughts and opinions about their own internet usage. We wanted to hear about their experiences online – whether they only speak to people

that they know in real life online, if they knew what to do if they stumbled across something that made them uncomfortable or sad online, whether they thought that they learned enough about online safety in school and if they ever played on games that have a higher recommended age limit than their own age! The answers we received were really useful and will help us to design useful presentations or messages in the future. Luckily, everyone we spoke to knew that if something had upset them they needed to speak to a trusted adult, block and report.

This week, Mrs. Stephenson held some workshops for parents related to online safety. We also thought that it would be sensible to ask families about how they use the internet at home. For the second time this week, we developed a questionnaire and sent it out to be completed. The parents of our friends have a few days to give us some information about how their family use the internet at home. We will then look at the responses and begin to think about how we can work with the school again. It has been a really busy week for us (because we have had to attend all of our lessons still) but it has been worthwhile because we have to keep learning and reminding ourselves about how to keep ourselves and others safe online.

Genome Centre

We guess that many of Lanchester's residents have no idea what goes on in Park House. So, the Village Voice set off to find out.

It has been many things in recent memory: a police station, parish council offices, GP practice and a charity's offices. But the current owners would like to know more. We'll come to that later, but what does it do now? It has been home to the Durham Genome Centre since 2014 when the directors, Neil Sullivan and Louise Allcroft, moved the business from Sunderland. Its work all revolves around DNA - deoxyribonucleic acid. There is DNA in the nucleus of every cell. It carries genetic information and has all the instructions that a living organism needs to grow, reproduce, and function. The key thing is that DNA is unique to an individual or animal. (End of science lesson!). Their mission has been to make complex science understandable, and available to all.

Many residents will have taken advantage of PCR testing for Covid-19 at the centre when needed as evidence to travel etc. – but it does much more. For example: Paternity testing, used to establish parentage. Testing animal DNA. There are lots of fascinating examples here which we will cover in later editions, but some highlights:

- Studying the otters in the River Browney by analysing their poo to determine family groups, their territory and how far they travel.
- Analysing bird eggs, for example peregrines', to determine the sex of the chicks.
- · Study of bats
- The RAF send birds that have been involved in a bird strike to determine the breed of the bird so that they can tailor their bird scaring at their airfields.

But they are also interested in the history of Park House. They think it was built around 1880, but there appears to be no record of its early history. There was a safe in the building when they took it over – without a key!

So, they had a locksmith open it and found a treasure trove of historical documents, just waiting for someone to analyse. There was also a 16mm film – looks like it was for a film society. There were also some ancient black and white slides of scenes around the area – we've reproduced one here and intend to reproduce more over the months, in case anybody recognises the scene or people in the photographs. And finally, for now, in the reception area is a board containing brass plaques which were found in the building. These relate to previous activities which either took place in the building or were headquartered there (we assume).
