The Queen's Platinum Jubilee Beacon Event

On Thursday 2 June Lanchester Parish Council and Burnhope Parish Council organised a beacon lighting at Burnhope picnic area as part of the Queen's Platinum Jubilee celebrations.

Several hundred people attended to listen to the music and watch the beacon.

Over 2000 beacons were lit throughout the United Kingdom, Channel Islands, Isle of Man and UK Overseas Territories.

The Parish Councils were proud to be part of this momentous celebration, marking this unique milestone in history.

The event commenced at 9.30pm with a short speech from Councillor Derek Coates, the Chair of Burnhope Parish Council and Councillor Keith Harrison, the Chair of Lanchester Parish Council which included some words sent by the Lord Lieutenant. Mrs Sue Snowdon.

Piper John Stafford from the 102 Bn REME Pipes and Drums played 'Diu Regnare' a unique tune specially written for the occasion. This was followed by cornet player Mark Draper from Lanchester Brass Band who played a specially written bugle call entitled 'Majesty'.

As the beacon was lit at 9.45pm, Lanchester Choral Society sang 'Song for the Commonwealth' which had been written for the occasion.

LANCHESTER CHORAL SOCIETY - 50 YEARS NOT OUT!

An interview by Keith Brown, of the Village Voice editorial team, with David Hughes celebrating his 50 years as the conductor.

K. So David the choir is 50 years old this year?

D. Yes, I formed the choir with John Ord and Stan Hunter in September 1972, and we gave our first concert in the Anglican church in December. We plan to perform the same music i.e. the Christmas Music from Handel's Messiah and Vivaldi's Gloria as a celebration of those 50 years later this year. Then it will be carols.

K. Where did you get your interest in conducting?

D. I have always sung in choirs and when I was at Annfield Plain Grammar Technical School, Bill Gray, Head of Music, and I formed a competition choir, which I conducted. This was very successful across the North East. So, I suppose it grew from there.

K. What do you put the choir's longevity down to?

D. That's easy – a hardworking loyal membership, supportive assistants and a series of first-rate accompanists.

K. You haven't always just sung choir music have you?

D. That's right. We give 2 concerts each year and for 25 years one was always a fully staged light operetta - usually Gilbert and Sullivan, Offenbach, or Johann Strauss. We first performed in St Bede's main hall and then moved to the lecture theatre which with its raked seating and stage was a great venue. We had very skilful set designers and painters. Then with age creeping on we changed to semi-staged presentations in the Methodist Church using, for example, music by George Gershwin, Cole Porter, Andrew Lloyd Webber, or songs from the shows and Hollywood.

K. Has membership changed greatly over the years?

D. That's interesting. We still have one or two original members and several who, if not founder members, are very close to it. Members have come and gone over the years – family circumstances change, people move away, some drop out for a while and then return. We are very flexible! We have a mixture of ages, and our aim is to provide an opportunity for folk in the village, and surrounding area, to come, enjoy singing together and have a sociable time on a Friday evening.

K. Presumably though anyone interested has to be a good singer?

D. Not at all. We don't have auditions as such. I might have to decide which line any new member would best be suited to. All that's necessary is to be able to sing (even in the bath). We have strong singers in all lines so less experienced people can get plenty of support, and you certainly don't have to be able to read music!

K. So being a village-based society is clearly important to you?

D. It certainly is. We support the village whenever we can. We used to participate in the procession at the Lions' Carnival, we sing at the switching on of the Christmas lights on the village green and pre-Covid sang carols every year at the Garden Centre. Recently we put on a Jubilee concert, sang at the village picnic, and Songs of Praise. For many years we have joined with the Male Voice Choir in the Celebration of Christmas concert.

K. I guess new members are always welcome?

D. Absolutely! Just come along to Croft View any Friday 7.15 pm or ring me on 01207 520427 for further information.

Jubilee Celebrations in West Drive



Hall, a coal owner. This is a fascinating and early photo of cricket teams in the area. **Provided by John and Rosy Gall**








Wildlife notes

The Mallard ducks

Latest on Mrs Mallard at Malton – she's raised 9 out of 10, no longer snack-sized for Heron and other predators, what a clever mum. Beatrix Potter described Jemima Puddle duck as 'a very stupid duck', clearly our Malton Mallard is not! Statistical snore moment: the odds are against this; one study says that of all the Mallard eggs laid (in the study area) an average 1 out of 4 may not hatch. Only 22% of ducklings may survive to fledge, so for each clutch hatched sometimes only 1.2 ducklings make it.

There are at least 3 Mallard families around Waters Meet and Malton, one with 7 remaining young, one with 3, and of course Mrs Mallard with 9. Mallards dabble with a varied diet of plant material and seeds including acorns. They eat insects, tadpoles, even small fish, they are omnivorous. Feeding bread is ok, but it tends to swell, filling them up which can mean they don't get the vitamins and minerals from a more varied diet. Uneaten bread building up in the water can lead to poor water quality in ponds.



Butterfly bonanza

Why don't you buzz around your garden in practice for the Big Butterfly Count from Friday 15th July to Sunday 7th August. You can also pick a favourite spot along 'the Line' filled with wildflowers and do your butterfly count there.

"I have cycled over 600 miles, rowed over 1,000 miles, walked over 1,000 miles, performed 17,500 reps in the gym and spent hours in the kayak and on the water. My family have also supported, and joined in with, some of my training, and I have truly appreciated their support. I have put everything into this challenge: blood, sweat and not too many tears! I am ready."

Amongst our twelve visitors there were just 2 familiar faces, the rest were new refugees who came keen to lend us a hand with jobs at the orchard. They assisted with mending the shed roof, barrowing, weeding, weaving the willow arch and also had the opportunity to engage in some craft work. Some even ventured forth to visit the resident bee colonies! But the day was far more than completing those useful tasks. It was a day to meet people from across the world, a day of sharing stories, eating together and a chance to share the pleasures of being outside in nature. When we next meet in late August or September I wonder how many familiar faces we will see or will the journey to seek asylum in the UK have taken these young men and women on a journey to a place they have no wish to go?

Under the Same Moon – fundraising for Ukraine

The group which was fundraising for Ukraine is busy going for registered charity status. This makes everything we are doing totally transparent and means any financial support we give must be voted on and agreed.

We have four trustees and are now known by the name our charity will be registered under which is "Under the same Moon". The reason behind this is the lady who started the Ukrainian support is Joanna Soulsby who is the owner of Moon Jewellery in Durham. She is also our chairperson and trustee. We also have Helen Dennison, who also agreed to be a trustee and deputy secretary, Mary Jo Bunting and me.

We made over £800 at a car boot sale and over £140 selling books this month. We helped support two young Ukrainian boys in Burnhope who wanted a trampoline to help get rid of excess energy and hopefully help stop them fixating on other things they may have seen.

On the 11th June a book sale was held outside Mary Jo's home, assisted by her middle son Logan who attends St Bede's School (yr7). Together they ran a stall from 10am until 2pm and raised £115 towards our orphanage toy fund.

Coming up we have a tapas night, to be held on the 29th of July at a cost of £15 per person (adults only). This will include five courses of tapas and live entertainment at Lanchester Social Club. Tickets will be available from myself, Mary Jo and Helen. We are planning our launch night, which we will be able to share details of next month once we have it completely sorted, but please keep the 24th of August free which is also Ukraine Independence Day.

We have lots of sponsored events being held.

At the moment we have two GoFundMe pages running as Joanna is actually going into Ukraine as part of the convoy. Unfortunately, until Joanna is back, we can't tell you where she is actually going, as it is very a very dangerous situation she is putting herself in. What I can say is we are supporting an orphanage with 160 children, some of whom are orphans, but we have some whom don't know their status as they don't know if their parents have been killed in the war.

The first is to help our chairperson Mrs Joanna Soulsby who is going into Ukraine to deliver aid personally with a charity convoy over there. The funds are to buy much needed food and medical items to be taken in directly to areas of extreme need via Joanna and this team we are working closely with. https://gofund.me/31b19d98

The next GoFundMe page on our Facebook profile has only just been launched. It is specifically for an orphanage Joanna will be visiting with aid. We received some pictures showing us the condition these children are living in - obviously lots are orphaned already but there are also many children in their care who are awaiting news as parents left them to go and fight. As a group of mothers ourselves one of the most startling aspects of the pictures was the sheer lack of toys. So, we are raising funds to buy these children toys, books, and craft materials, hopefully allowing them the opportunity to actually be children. 'Under The Same Moon' is a non-profit organisation currently in the process of obtaining Registered Charity Status. It has been established for public benefit through the provision of aid to communities within Ukraine and to refugees in the UK.

Hailing from as far back as the end of King Charles 1's reign in 1642, parliamentary convention dictates that our British monarch is forbidden from entering the sovereign House of Commons. Until this day, supposedly, no monarch has ever entered the Commons.

Healeyfield Parish Council let me loose with a blowtorch and a cherry picker to light the Jubilee beacon. Hundreds of people turned out and it was great to see the whole community coming together and having a great time celebrating Platinum Jubilee. The fireworks were simply spectacular.

On Saturday of the Jubilee I ended my time at the service at Durham Cathedral in glorious sunshine, alongside representatives from across historic County Durham. Finally, it was great to meet so many people at Lanchester's Big Jubilee Picnic the following afternoon; it was terrific to see so many people enjoying themselves and celebrating our Queen together.


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Willow Burn Hospice

Steven White, from Lanchester, has been selected as a Batonbearer for the Birmingham 2022 Queen's Baton Relay having been nominated for taking on an inspiring world solo cycle challenge in 2019 and for his fund raising contributions in support of 'Mind'. He will carry the Baton across a section of the North East, yet to be disclosed, on the 14th July 2022 as it continues its epic journey around England.

Eric Hepplewhite who has been responsible for many village activities, including the famous poppies, has also been nominated as a Batonbearer. He said: "I am honoured to be carrying the Queen's baton for this event. It was a wonderful surprise to be nominated but to receive confirmation that I was chosen was an unbelievable moment."

The Birmingham 2022 Queen's Baton Relay arrived in England on 2 June coinciding with the Platinum Jubilee weekend. It marks the return of the Queen's Baton to England since it departed from Buckingham Palace on 7 October 2021 and embarked on a global tour of the nations and territories of the Commonwealth.

As one of the traditions of the Commonwealth Games, the Birmingham 2022 Queen's Baton Relay visits communities in all 72 nations and territories before the games begin. The epic journey ends with a tour of the host country, which concludes at the Opening Ceremony of the Birmingham 2022 Commonwealth Games on 28 July 2022.



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Humanitarian help in Poland

On 25th May a group of 7 volunteers headed off to Wrocław, Poland to provide humanitarian help to Ukrainian refugees. Such was the passion to go that all 7 paid their own way in flights, accommodation and living expenses while there.

We went as a group that had only met due to a shared desire to help with the appeal led by Kathryn Rooney at St Mary's church, Blackhill. The appeal started in February with the intention of sending a truck filled with much needed aid. This quickly snowballed, and with a regular group of volunteers and some generous donations by the people of County Durham (including Lanchester) it soon became 14 trucks that made their way to different destinations in Poland. This aid was then transported into Ukraine, many of the journeys undertaken by Mariusz Biziewski, who has been supporting the appeal since its start. Mariusz lives in the UK, previously serving in the Polish army as bomb disposal expert. He now takes on the unenviable task of bomb disposal and land mine clearance in Ukraine. Fast forward 13 weeks and we were in Poland, ready to help and keen to see how we continue moving forward. We had organised to help out at a refugee hub in Wrocław, this was run by a man called Yarak whose passion and commitment to helping others was truly heart warming. Yarak already ran a charity called The

to helping others was truly heart warming. Yarak already ran a charity called The Foundation, but when war broke out, he extended his aid to help the refugees. By the time we arrived the refugees had thankfully been placed in local housing. They attend on a daily basis to access clothing, food and other essentials. Seeing people's desperation to find items they needed was really very humbling for us all and it certainly made us realise how very lucky we were not to be in this situation. While there we helped with the enormous task of emptying items from a warehouse to be then placed in the area where people go to collect. We were privileged to be able to spend some time talking with some of the refugees and also gave out small gifts of art supplies and teddies to some of the children. These were received with so much gratitude and also thanks to the people for the support given.

Along with the support we had sent via the 14 trucks, we also entered Poland with four large cases holding approximately 1500 items of underwear as we had been informed this was much needed. We were not sure what customs would have made of this had they opened our cases. In the weeks prior to going, we had been working hard fundraising and had a total of £4000 which was spent on food items in Poland. Yarak's excitement receiving this could not be underestimated!

Now that we are home, we are reflecting on what we learned as a group and how we keep supporting as it is clear it is still very much needed. Following a meeting with the other volunteers who were unable to come to Poland, we will be posting as to how we move forward.

We are collecting again...all the usual food toiletries etc, clothing only good quality and needs to be summer. St Mary's is usually open on Wednesday but check out the Facebook page for up to date information.

When is hay fever season in the UK?

Unfortunately for sufferers of hay fever, also known as allergic rhinitis, the season can start in late March and continue through until September depending on what pollen affects you. Tree pollen occurs first, typically from late March to mid-May. Grass pollen has two peaks, lasts from mid-May until July, and weed pollen covers the end of June to September. When the weather is warm, humid and windy the pollen count is at its highest. The Met Office issues a five-day pollen forecast; more than 50 pollen grains per cubic metre is classed as high.

Hay fever signs and symptoms can include:

Runny nose, nasal congestion, and postnasal drip Watery, itchy, red eyes (allergic conjunctivitis) Sneezing and coughing

Itchy nose, roof of mouth or throat.

Swollen, blue-coloured skin under the eyes (allergic shiners) Fatique

How do I know if I have hay fever, a cold or coronavirus?

Hay fever lasts for as long as you are exposed to the allergens, typically several weeks. Colds usually last just three to seven days. The main symptoms of hay fever are sneezing, a runny nose and

itchy eyes. The most typical symptoms of a coronavirus infection are a cough and fever. A high temperature (fever) is not a symptom of hay fever, but it is a key sign of COVID-19. If you're feeling hot or have chills or shivers alongside hay fever-type symptoms like a runny nose and cough, you should self-isolate and get a COVID test.


Treatment - although there is no cure for hay fever you can do things to ease your symptoms. Avoid pollen areas; if you have been outside shower and change your clothes. Wear wraparound sunglasses, and put Vaseline around your nose to trap pollen. You can buy pollen filters for your vacuum and car air vents. Antihistamine tablets are the most common hay fever treatment and can be bought at the chemist and in supermarkets. Use them when you experience symptoms or, if you know which type of pollen you're allergic to, you can take them during your hay fever season to stop symptoms before they happen.

Honey - A natural remedy for hay fever? Many people swear that a teaspoon of local honey each day desensitises you to pollen and helps alleviate hay fever symptoms. Sadly, there is no scientific evidence to support this. In fact, bees don't pollinate grass and trees, and the pollen in honey is the heavy, flower-based pollen that doesn't cause hay fever.

Hay fever is an individual's response to an allergen, what is effective for one person may not be effective for another; use what works for you and helps you enjoy the spring and summer seasons.

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



from what has been a challenging couple of years. Three essentials to developing mental wellbeing are getting outdoors, reflection and a sense of belonging.

Over the past fortnight, Year Six had the opportunity to undertake some geographical enquiry as part of their week-long residential and enjoy getting out into nature and engaging with the world around them. Year Five spent some time being invigorated by the North Sea as they enjoyed water sport activities... Years Six and Four are

looking forward to this too! Children in Year Four spent a productive day at the Centre for Life in Newcastle after exploring the city and investigating the city walls. Our Year Three pupils had an adventure day focusing on teamwork (the hardest part of which was pitching their tents!). The pupils in Years Two and Three will have the opportunity to take part in a range of adventurous and traditional scouting activities in the coming weeks. Health and fitness always get the blood-pumping so not to be outdone, our Year One and Reception classes are soon to be taking part in a gymnastics workshop whilst our Reception pupils have already been developing their competitive spirit within their football coaching.

Senior Cricket
