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Poppy Displays

Eric Hepplewhite was behind the initiative to produce poppies for display around the village. These were made from the bottom of plastic drink bottles. "We started collecting the empty bottles in December 2021 and ended up with 3,434 poppies."

They were displayed on: the parish church gates, the Methodist Church fences, the War Memorial, the All Saints' war memorial and on the grave of Stuart lan Laing who was killed in the Falklands Campaign.

A touching gesture was the decision to include poppies in the Ukraine national colours in the displays.

November meeting

We had an enlightening and interesting talk from George Nairn this month. He took us on a pictorial journey from the Tyne at Newcastle up the coast to the Tweed in Northumberland. The images, from old picture postcards, covered a range of dates or print runs since they became popular. He included much social history and snippets of the contents of the messages on the back. Everyone agreed that it's a fascinating way of looking back. The picture is from the talk and is the beach at Tynemouth in the early 1900s.

The next two meetings will be a social on Friday 2nd December and our usual show and tell on Friday January 6th.

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Winter and Festive traditions

The use of plants in winter festivals hails from before the Romans. Early pagans used evergreen branches to cheer up their homes.

The transition between Romans decorating fir trees and our modern 'Christmas tree' isn't clear. Estonia and Latvia argue over the first use of a tree in 1441 and 1510 respectively. Northern Europeans were probably hanging firs upside down as decorations more than a thousand years ago. European art and literature imply trees were paraded or decorated in the street in Germany and Latvia (1521 & 1584). In the same century, a German called Martin Luther was inspired by a star-lit night to place candles on a tree in his home. The idea was resisted by some people as they linked it with

In Britain, the Royal family were reputedly the first to decorate a tree at Christmas, whether it was George III & Charlotte in 1800, or Victoria and Albert in the 1840s is hazy.

Yule logs were not the yummy chocolate delight of today. In Scandinavia and parts of Northern Europe, 'Yule' is the name of the old Winter Solstice festivals. In pre-medieval times a Nordic tradition was to burn 'the Yule Log'. A carefully selected, ceremonial log (from a tree!) was placed with one end in the hearth and then slowly fed into the fire (not to be recommended in modern households, flame resistance isn't what it used to be!). Our use of holly dates to the Druids. Druid rituals used another festive favourite, mistletoe: enemies meeting under the plant had to put their differences aside until the next day. A Norse myth suggests that we kiss under the plant in memory of Baldur who was killed by a mistletoe spear. Baldur's mother, Frigga, had made all creatures and inanimate objects promise not to hurt her beloved son, but she forgot mistletoe! The berries are



ELIZABETH (BETTY) WHALEY

(FORMERLY OLIVER, NEE HOWDON)

Although christened Elizabeth, she was always known as Betty. Her association with Lanchester began when, as a 10-year-old she moved with her parents from rural Blackcallerton (where Newcastle Airport is now) to Hollinside Terrace, near Lanchester. For the next 80 years she lived there, residing at No. 2 until she married Ronnie Oliver and moved to No. 3. While her mother attended the Church of England, Betty was encouraged to join the young set at the Methodist Church by a neighbour and local preacher. Involvement in the church was a big part of her life. Many of us will remember her from the Sunday School (later the Junior Church), the youth club, the Wives and Friends, the refurbishment of Croft View, and so much more. Her involvement wasn't just in Lanchester, she was interested in circuit work and Women's Network, a national concern.

Betty had a zest for life, and she always felt that her life was enhanced by the people she met. She had a natural talent to be able to engage with all ages and especially enjoyed the company of young people. Her work with the youth club and the Sunday school was a great joy to her.

This natural talent and her respectful attitude to people stood her in good stead when, newly widowed, she went to work at the National Savings in Durham, which eventually led her to become a VAT officer for HMRC.

She enjoyed crafts and had a creative mind. She qualified to teach dressmaking and millinery, joined the creative writing group at the library and the local lacemaking making group.

Her marriage to Bob Whaley brought a chapter of travel, with trips to the Holy Land and Egypt. She embraced the experiences of differing cultures and countries, and enjoyed constructive debates with people, some of whom became lifelong friends

Betty is survived by her son, daughter, and their respective families. They hope you will join them in remembering her for her smile and wicked sense of humour.

As Rishi Sunak becomes our new Prime Minister, and I take on new responsibility as a Minister at the Department of Transport, I hoped I might be able to use this column for a more positive message. Last time I wrote we were communally mourning the death of the late great Queen Elizabeth II.

But I write today with really quite depressing

news about our beloved constituency. In its preliminary review, the Boundary Commission has decided to split up North West Durham in four ways. Although there are four more weeks before the final proposal is submitted, it is looking likely that such a change to our constituency will remain. (1) Weardale, Tow Law and Crook all merge into the new Bishop Auckland seat. (2) Willington, a part of Deerness, Esh, and Witton Gilbert are all pushed into the City of Durham seat. (3) The whole Lanchester Ward, which goes from Muggleswick to Castleside and Burnhope, goes into the North Durham seat with Stanley and Chester-le-Street. (4) Consett, Dipton and Burnopfield all go north into the Blaydon constituency.

This is obviously hugely sad news. It has been the honour of a lifetime to serve all of you guys in these beautiful North West Durham towns and villages. Nonetheless, PLEASE keep in mind, however, that I am your MP until the next general election. I will continue in my fight for you and keep pushing for the 16 beds at Shotley bridge, reopen historic railways, and getting more police officers on your streets.

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
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Good day readers

As you will know by now, my name is Poppy, I am a black Patterdale terrier with more than a tinge of grey, and I enjoy sharing the walks I lead my humans on with you.

At the time I did this walk it

was too early for festive decorations, but I bet if you try it now you will pass plenty on the way. We start from the centre of Lanchester – for the sake of argument, say in front of the Kings Head – and proceed along Station Road and up Cadger Bank. As most of you will know, this can be quite a strenuous uphill walk but my male Human cheats by allowing me to pull him up – or at least give a helping hand – as he holds onto my lead. We don't go to the very top of Cadger Bank, but instead turn right up a flight of stairs.

This leads us across a short road and onto a narrow passageway – or ginnel – which takes us onto the top of Briardene.

From there we turn left and walk over a grassy area with mature trees – I often encounter one or two pals there for a tail wag. We then walk right between houses and down a slight incline to the top of some stairs, which we walk down towards Broadoak Drive while there is a stream on the left which I try to explore if I am let off my lead.

From Broadoak Drive we turn left at the end and proceed along Newbiggen Lane, staying on the footpath on the right-hand side. When we come to a footpath on the right – known as Ridgeway – we turn along it. There are a couple of doggie bins along there which are useful if I am caught short

While there are houses on the right of Ridgeway there are fields on the left which are often full of sheep, so I am kept on my lead.

At the end of Ridgeway, we walk down some more steps then I insist on turning left to prolong the walk. We then walk along the Lanchester Valley railway path in the direction of Hurbuck, but on this occasion go only as far as Lizard Cottage which is on the left of the path.

Then we turn right down a track and onto a road which leads us back towards Kitswell Road, and then onto Lanchester village centre.

If we have time I often persuade – by pulling hard on my lead – the Human to divert onto the cricket field so I can run around there.

By the time we are back to the Kings Head the walk has taken around an hour, which is by no means one of my longest walks, but which is very welcome nonetheless.



The children brought in a huge range of vegetables to add to our soup, and we spent two wonderful days exploring the smells, tastes and textures of leeks, carrots, potatoes, green beans, pumpkin, broccoli, onions and cabbage not a stone in sight! Lanchester All Saints' School

There is always so much going on in All Saints', often what we call our 'hidden curriculum', which contributes to and strengthens our curriculum offer. As well as covering each subject (you can see a celebration of what each class has learned each week on the 'Blog' section of our website), there have been a whole host of other experiences that the children have enjoyed recently, developing teamwork, challenge and competitive spirit. Year Three undertook an adventure day, we have girls' football, boys' football, rugby and cross country teams representing our All Saints' as part of competitions, as well as Years Two, Three and Five participating in athletics events. Other opportunities where the children have to work as a team are our weekly samba drumming sessions for Years Three and Four and our weekly brass teaching in Year Five. We are proud to offer a variety of clubs each week, many of which also focus upon collaboration, teamwork and problem solving: judo, tennis, gardening, singing and fencing to name a few.

A further way in which we enhance our curriculum is through visitors into school and experiences outside of school. Years Three and Five learned a lot when visiting a local synagogue, Year Four enjoyed a day in Matfen Forest, our Early Years Foundation Stage children are due to enjoy visits by a sports coach, a 'hedgehog lady' and someone to help them become actors and actresses! Year Six have enhanced their World War One knowledge with a visit from a World War One Battlefield tour guide (and also a working member of The British Legion) and have enhanced their STEM learning with a visit from a scientist looking at the physics of buoyancy.

We cherish our class assemblies that are taking place again each half term. The most recent assemblies have been led by our infant classes -Remembrance by Year One and Firework Safety by Year Two which included a Makaton performance of 'Firework'. It is so wonderful to hear our children speak and sing to an audience as well as get a glimmer into their learning. In September, we learned about a range of European countries – thinking about their language, culture and traditions as part of the European Day of Languages. Over the following months, we have continued to learn about our local and global neighbours. To support our harvest celebrations, our annual donation to The People's Kitchen was made; the children love learning about the great work of the charity from Mr Baker. Our families have supported Children in Need via our annual dance-on-the-spot-athon and our school council have led the school in the importance of recognising and standing up to bullying and racism. In such a wonderful primary school like All Saints', learning takes place every moment of every day and is represented in a myriad of ways by our pupils and staff.




Lanchester Choral Society

New parking restrictions for Lanchester

Traffic bosses are set to clamp down on parking outside schools and in Lanchester village centre.


Proposed traffic measures submitted by Durham County Council and considered by Lanchester Parish Council at a meeting on November 8 included yellow lines in Church View, Front Street opposite the junction into Fenhall Park, and on roads outside St Bede's School.

These proposals have received mixed reactions from residents, some who fear traffic may move to park outside their homes away from the newly restricted areas. But pedestrians and motorists regularly complain about obstructions in the village centre and outside schools.

The plans, which are likely to be implemented sometime next year, include extending yellow lines in Church View to "address obstructive parking", double yellow lines on the A691 outside St Bede's and around the corner on Howden Bank and near the Jet garage, and double yellow lines opposite the entrance to Fenhall Park.

Local Durham county councillor for Lanchester, Doug Oliver, was contacted for his comments and views by the Village Voice. He said: "This is a matter we are following very closely as councillors and we had another discussion with the Parish Council last night about the work we are doing in terms of bringing focus on this issue from officers at County Hall, as well as enforcement action from the police and DCC's neighbourhood warden."




