Graham selected to be standard bearer for HM Queen Elizabeth's funeral

Graham Meek, from Lanchester, was in the Queen's Company of the Grenadier Guards for 22 years. He is a Royal British Legion standard bearer for Consett and District, Northumbria, and also the North East Region which includes Yorkshire. These positions are competitive, renewable every year.

Graham was selected by the British Legion as one of 72 standard bearers to perform an "act of homage" to the late Queen at the Cenotaph in Whitehall as the Queen's coffin passed from Westminster Abbey on its way to Windsor. The act of homage involves lowering the standard to the ground as the coffin comes past.

Graham had previously met the Queen when he was in service in 2002 at Buckingham Palace after a parade. He described the honour of representing the Royal British Legion as a great honour and very emotional experience, particularly as he had served in the Queen's Company. He is currently working at St Bede's School as a science technician and health and safety coordinator. In his spare time, he helps train other standard bearers. His next engagements are at Saltwell Park in the "Field of Remembrance" and later at the Royal Albert Hall at the Festival of Remembrance.

Wildlife Notes


Heading into hibernation? That's how some UK animals survive winter

Few UK mammals hibernate, only three in fact: hedgehogs, hazel dormice, and bats. Staying warm and finding food uses lots of energy. Food is scarce in cold months, some creatures can't find enough to replenish their energy resources e.g. bats use a lot of energy to fly and catch insects, which are in short supply. Hedgehogs and dormice fatten up in preparation, so they have energy to keep them hibernating. It is not the same as sleeping, as their heart rate and breathing slows down and their bodies cool.

If hibernators haven't found a suitable site, with minimal temperature fluctuations, they may have to break hibernation. For hedgehogs, if it gets too warm their fat reserves are used up more quickly and they may need to rouse to find food. Conversely, in a cold snap, their body functions may need to resume activity to avoid freezing. It is a dangerous time.


Cold-blooded animals need warmth to be active, they are unable to sustain their own temperatures. Amphibians - newts, toads and frogs - spend winters hibernating. Reptiles achieve brumation (similar to hibernation) until the sun is warm enough for them to be active. Snails hibernate too, slugs can only remain active over 5 degrees,

that's one reason hedgehogs need to hibernate, as their winter food selection is limited. Some adult butterflies hibernate over winter: Red Admirals use tree hollows or even your shed or garage; some species spend winter as eggs, caterpillars, or pupae.



they are protected from extreme temperatures e.g. under old logs, buried in decaying leaf litter or loose soil. If found they can't rouse quickly to escape, so may become a meal. Bats use caves, old mines and sometimes wall cavities.

Leslie (Les) Bolton, a long-standing Lanchester resident, passed away peacefully on 21st August 2022, at home with his family by his side.



Dear Village Voice,

I am writing to highlight the plight of women who are incarcerated at Derwentside IRC, formerly the notorious Medomsley Detention Centre aka Hassockfield. It is effectively a prison for women who have, for whatever reason, not yet established a right to remain in the UK. Many of them have already suffered gender-based violence such as rape, forced marriage, forced prostitution or FGM.

Adding detention without trial and without a time limit to that experience is a huge additional trauma and something that we in the locality need to be concerned about as it is happening on our

Recent projects arranged by the Home Office and the United Nations High Commissioner for Refugees show that detention is not necessary for asylum seekers who are supported, and dealt with in the community, and they suffer less trauma and mental ill health. It also costs significantly less than locking them up.

A leaflet giving more information has been distributed in the village, but if you missed out on this, I can make sure that you receive a copy. I am also happy to discuss with you ways in which you can help.



Good day readers

You will know by now my name is Poppy and I share walks I take my Humans on with you. When the Human took me to a medical centre at Dunston, so he could get his Covid jab, I must confess I was less than impressed. It is bad enough being taken to the vets for my own jab without having to sit in a car park while he puts on a brave face and goes inside for his.

But on the way back the picture

brightened considerably when we turned off the Whickham Highway at Lobley Hill into the car park for the Watergate Forest Park. It is only about ten miles from Lanchester and well worth a trip.

Once we parked up and walked into the park, we followed signs to Stanley on the Tanfield railway path. This would eventually lead to Sunniside from where the railway track still runs to Tanfield, Stanley. There are always lots of dogs in the park, as well as joggers and the occasional cyclist but there is enough room for manoeuvre without getting in anybody's way. Mind, we did pass a lake abundant with wildlife where I made sure to avert my gaze from a fierce looking swan standing on the water's edge. I certainly did not want to do anything to provoke it!

By following the Tanfield path we pass through woods and up a gradient. On the side of the path there is a steep gorge which is fun to run down. Eventually we come out of the woods briefly onto a main road where we have to press a button which changes to green to allow us to cross. This is at Watergate between Sunniside and Lobley Hill.

After crossing the road, the trees appear to form an arch cloaking the path as we continue to walk in the direction of Sunniside, remaining on the route of what was the Tanfield Railway.

We decided to turn back when we reached the part where the path crosses Pennyfine Road, simply because we had no choice but to retrace our footsteps – or paw steps – to the car

The return walk took us about an hour and 15 minutes, but we could have made it either longer or shorter, there are so many routes to choose.

Last month we decided to go up to 'The Badger' - a Vintage Inn at Ponteland. A good way to go either up the A1 or via the more scenic route; it's somewhere we have always enjoyed in the past.

This was the first visit since the pandemic and as with a lot of places they may have been having staffing difficulties. The welcome was as warm as ever, but the service was definitely on the relaxed side.

However, the menu was lovely and consisted of the weekly menus, chef's specials, and light bites. It didn't take us long to make our choices and, as no one was having a starter, we opted for mains. We had slow cooked pork belly with black pudding mash, crackling, baby spinach, green beans with a brandy and pink lady apple jus, scallops could be added, it was a chef's special and very tasty too; vegetable Penang curry - a mix of pak choi, squash, red onions and peppers in a creamy coconut Penang inspired curry sauce served with sticky jasmine rice; chicken and smoked pancetta pie in a creamy cheese and leek sauce, topped with puff pastry served with a spring onion mash, roasted carrots and green vegs; fish and chips with triple cooked chips, mushy peas and tartar sauce; seared fillets of sea bass with pea and smoked pancetta velouté, broccoli and a spring onion mash.

Our puddings were: banoffee pie, creme brûlée, pannacotta with fruit, blueberry and amoretto Eton mess and also a mini pudding with coffee.

All our meals were delicious and thoroughly enjoyed.

I'm quite sure we'll be off up to Ponteland again to visit the Badger sometime in the future.


Prayer Cards

New Family Forest School Club at Lanchester EP

Parents from Lanchester EP Primary have had an exciting opportunity to join their children in the forest for our new after school club! After two long years where parents have been unable to engage with many of the events in school, it has been wonderful to welcome them back into forest school this term.

Forest school offers a unique educational experience using the outdoor environment of the forest as a classroom. Forest school not only has many benefits for the mental health and wellbeing of children but is also shown to develop confidence, social skills, communication and language, motivation, physical skills and respect for the environment.

At Lanchester EP Primary School we have always seen the value of, and prioritised, outdoor learning, especially in the Early Years of Nursery and Reception. This year, as part of our Covid recovery curriculum, we wanted to expand our outdoor provision and so started a forest school club for

children in Year 1 and their families. Our aim was to provide a space for adults and children to work together, build relationships, learn new skills and have fun. So, for the last 5 weeks we have been meeting in 'The Wild' (no matter what the weather) to have Family Forest School Club.

So far, we have carried out a range of activities including cooking, forest crafts, den building, slack lining, tree climbing and making bird feeders. It has been wonderful to see the children interacting and exploring the forest and developing their interest and understanding of plants, animals and the environment. It has also been lovely to watch children developing their confidence and teamwork through completing tasks together.

Sessions usually finish with a cup of hot chocolate and a toasted marshmallow round the fire which is a highlight for everyone, no matter what their age!





Wednesday 28 September 2022 at 7.00pm

Minutes - Ordinary Meeting 27 July - approved

Police Report – PCSO Andrew Tonge attended the meeting and presented the Police report for August. PCSO Tonge was thanked for attending an informal meeting with Councillors in September. The meeting was useful with a number of local matters discussed.

Durham County Councillors – An update was received on issues including:

Warm Hubs project, improvements to steps to Oakwood from Durham Road, parking restrictions at schools, arranging PACT meetings with the Police, Consett swimming pool and resurfacing work at Ornsby Hill

Correspondence

Smaller Authorities Audit Appointments – 5 year appointing period for external auditor

Churches Together – permission was given to use the Village Green for a Commemoration Service, date to be confirmed Beamish Football Club – permission was given to use the football field at Kitswell Park for girls under 12 and under 15 football teams

Warm hubs - Reverend Lesley Sutherland attended the meeting to share information on the approach of Churches Together. The aim is to offer a warm community room on a rolling basis across the week with drinks, snacks, and a welcoming atmosphere. It is important that there is a coordinated approach. A funding package will need to be agreed.

Surface of Lanchester Valley Walk – it was agreed to ask the County Council how the Valley Walk is maintained and what material is used

Disabled parking bay on Front Street – It was agreed to ask the County Council to repaint the faded road markings Gate between Ashdown Grove and the bike track - Councillors discussed the gate at the bottom corner of Ashdown Grove which enters the football field and bike track. It was agreed that a site visit is undertaken to ascertain whether the gate is on Parish Council leased land.

Manor Grange Play Area - the launch event had taken place on 30 July at 11am. The well attended event included a short speech, cutting of the ribbon, photographs, and sweets for the children. A site meeting had been held with the play company and the County Council. Some reinstatement works were agreed which will be undertaken in October. The seat on the pavement in front of the play area will be replaced by the County Council. The remaining 20% payment for the works was authorised.

Lanchester Parish Council Notes from the Ordinary Meeting held in Lynwood House on

Tuesday 11 October 2022 at 7.00pm

Minutes – Ordinary Meeting and Planning Meeting 28 September – approved

Northumbrian Water Ltd – a representative from Northumbrian Water attended the meeting and provided an update on several issues. Councillors raised a number of matters for discussion. Durham County Councillors – An update was received on issues including:

Durham Road – ramp to replace steps into estate, parking restrictions at schools, Consett swimming pool, resurfacing work at Ornsby Hill and draft anti-social behaviour strategy

Correspondence

Durham County Council – Councillors were provided with information on the indicative tax base and Local Council Tax Reduction Scheme grant which will provide information for budget planning and precept setting.

Durham County Council – Road Traffic Order – Parking Restrictions - Councillors considered the order which would introduce additional parking restrictions around several key areas in the village. Councillors accepted the plans but acknowledged that this was a difficult situation which would require monitoring and enforcement.

Gate between Ashdown Grove and the bike track - A site visit has confirmed that the gate and portion of fence is on Parish Council leased land. The Parish Council agreed that the gate could remain but that it needed to remain unlocked and accessible.

Warm hubs –The Area Action Partnership (AAP) are holding a meeting on 12 October to discuss Warm Hubs across the Mid Durham AAP area. It is expected that the meeting may offer clarification and provide information on funding opportunities. The meeting will include attendance by representatives from community buildings interested in being involved. Some Lanchester Parish Councillors will attend the meeting. There will need to be a joined up approach from the community buildings to deliver a Warm Hub project in Lanchester. A meeting in Lanchester is planned. It was agreed that Councillors report back to a future Parish Council meeting.

Disabled access to the village shops - Councillors discussed the difficulties in crossing the roads and accessing shops in the village. It was agreed that the County Council are asked for advice on the matter

Jubilee Tree - Councillors agreed the price for a Jubilee Tree and official plaque. A funding application will be submitted to the Area Action Partnership.

Christmas Light Switch On Event - It was agreed to ask Councillor Ossie Johnson to switch on the lights.

Lanchester Solar Planet Walk - The notes from the working group meeting on 20 September were approved. Councillors considered and agreed a draft budget for the project. It was agreed that due to uncertainty on future prices the contingency element of the budget be increased. A project proposal form will be submitted to the Area Action Partnership for consideration of funding. In addition, a request to use S106 monies from the County Council will be progressed. A contribution from Lanchester Parish Council was agreed.

Lanchester in Bloom - Councillors considered the increased flower displays in the village organised by businesses in the village and the positive response of the community. Future provision, development, and funding to be discussed further by the Parish Council.

The Repair Shop

On Saturday October 1st a rather unusual event took place. It was advertised as 'The Repair Shop' and it was all about repairing, re-using, and recycling small electrical goods. This is an initiative of Durham County Council to encourage people to recycle electrical goods, with a view to making less waste, which in turn is so much better for the environment. We all have a responsibility for that.

The initiative was set up in 2020 but of course Covid and lockdown, like so many other things, greatly affected the project. It is now once again in full swing and two members of Durham County Council, Emily and Kieran, together with Mark, an electrician and PAT tester (all pictured below), arrived at the Chapter House of All Saints Parish Church ready for business on October 1st. Mark did an excellent job on the items brought. People had been asked to bring any small electrical items which needed repair. Enough people attended to make it worthwhile for the visitors and Mark was very enthusiastic about the items people brought. In most cases he was able to identify the problem and put it right. One or two larger items, such as hoovers and printers he could not put right immediately and so he took them away to be returned at a later date.

These 'Repair Shops' organised by Durham County Council are held as a way of highlighting the fact that electrical items can be recycled and sessions like this are being held in many different places and venues. Perhaps we have not realised how valuable recycling electricals can be, e.g., recycling one old toaster will create enough steel to make 25 new cans.

If you wish to know more about recycling electrical items look on the website of our local council to find out what you can recycle and where.

Some shops offer a 'take back' service allowing you to return your used electrical items for recycling when you buy new ones.

It was a very interesting morning and light refreshments were served for a donation to church funds.

Remembrance

It is 40 years this year since the Falklands Campaign and we will commemorate it with several displays around the village in early November, including one at the grave of Stewart Ian Laing, at Kitswell Road Cemetery. Stewart was the only person from Lanchester who died during the Falklands Campaign. Robert William Tonks is another of the Commonwealth War Graves at Kitswell Road Cemetery. Corporal Robert William Tonks was serving with the Royal Air Force Volunteer Reserve when he died in 1945. Robert was born in 1918 in Lanchester and was the son of Ralph Henry and Elizabeth. He had a half-brother and half-sister and two further brothers and one sister. In September 1939 the family were living at Victoria Terrace. Robert died at Hollywood Hall Sanatorium on April 3rd 1945. The inscription added to his headstone reads,

"He Made The Supreme Sacrifice".

All the brave soldiers, including these two, will be remembered as always at the Remembrance service on the Village Green on Sunday 13th November starting at 10.45am.
