United we stand

News of the death of Queen Elizabeth on Thursday September 8th shocked our nation and set in motion a tremendous outpouring of love from the people of our country. Our late Queen was exemplary for her seventy years of selfless duty and dedication to our country. It was very moving to see the thousands (millions even) of people who filed past her coffin in Westminster Hall.

She had an indomitable spirit which could not be surpassed and devoted herself to our nation and Commonwealth countries. She was a family person who showed them the same love and devotion and was a constant source of support for them. She certainly fulfilled all the promises and vows she made at her coronation, and she

always made it clear that her Christian faith was what sustained her throughout her life. She practised that faith in her daily life and in the governing of this country and the Commonwealth and often spoke of the trust and faith she had in God our Father. She was of course the Head of the Church of England and because of this every Church of England church in this country had to have a Commemorative Service for our late Queen Elizabeth II. Reverend Lesley Sutherland, who is the priest in charge of All Saints Parish Church, arranged such a service on Thursday September 15th to which members of all three of our village churches were invited. Reverend Lesley was assisted by Reverend Stephen Martin, assistant curate, and Reverend Abbey Hughes who is currently on the staff of the church. There was a good sized congregation, all with a common bond of wanting to express their profound gratitude and admiration for the wonderful way Queen Elizabeth has governed our country and



served us all with such warmth and integrity for an incredible 70 years. During the service we heard readings from the Bible and the Queen's Christmas Broadcasts in 1981 and 1993. Some words by the poet Philip Larkin were also read.

'In times when nothing stood But worsened or grew strange There was one constant good She did not change'

Four hymns were sung, two were very familiar namely 'The Lord's my Shepherd' and 'Be still for the presence of the Lord'. The other two hymns have been written especially with the Queen in mind and were sung to familiar tunes. The words were absolutely apt for the occasion.

It was a very dignified service and the solemnity and pathos of the occasion touched everyone's heart. As the congregation left church, they felt comforted and more accepting of the death of a beloved Queen. The service ended with the singing of the national anthem for our new King Charles III. A new era has already begun but that of our late Queen will never be forgotten.

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2nd Book Sale for DEC Ukraine 27-8-22

On Saturday August 27th the pews in All Saints Parish Church were all full, not with people I hasten to add, but with a wonderful selection of books. This was the second book sale held in the church for Disasters Emergency Committee (DEC) Ukraine Appeal, the first having taken place on April 9th when thousands of books were on sale and a grand total of £1,552 was raised. There were still hundreds of books left however and it was decided to hold another sale at the end of August. This was duly organised by the church fundraising team with Margaret Walters at the helm and once again it proved a big success with a final total of £937. All the remaining books at the end of the sale were collected by the North East Air Ambulance charity. The second sale was a little different in that Lanchester Art Group contributed some beautiful paintings to sell. In addition to these, in the chancel of the church there was a special display of paintings by Viktoria Ryasnyanskaya. She is a Ukrainian artist who is currently living in Sacriston with her young son, having left the Ukraine when the Russian invasion began. Her paintings were also a joy to behold and at her suggestion an acceptable price for their purchase would be between £50 and £100. All the proceeds from the sale of her work will go to DEC Ukraine. It was such a special thing to have a Ukrainian person actually involved with this fundraising event.

Also adding to the convivial atmosphere were 'Kiddars Luck' a talented trio of folk musicians who in their words play 'canny songs' and 'bonny

tunes'. Their latest CD is named 'Where the Red Kites Fly'. They were certainly very talented and their background of feet tapping music contributed to the success of the occasion.

Another feature of the sale was an exquisite print of the 'Celebration of the Magna Carta' painted by the super talented Judith Hurst.

She had kindly donated it for the raffle, and this single raffle prize proved to be a big success, contributing greatly to the amount of money raised. Thank you, Judith.


Deliverer needed for the Village Voice

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York Christmas shopping Trip

Our group belonged to the 'International Association of Lions Clubs' which is a non-political organisation founded in 1916 in Chicago by William Perry Woods. In 1917 a businessman, Melvin Jones, believing that businesses should reach out and address the betterment of their communities, formally took over as secretary of the clubs and 'Lions Clubs International' was born. Promoting good citizenship and service to communities was high on its list of priorities, and this was most certainly true of our own Lanchester Lions Club, and they were very well respected. They were a real power force for good in the village and took every opportunity to promote the community spirit in Lanchester. It was very sad when they had to disband.

Elderly people particularly benefited at Christmas when the Lions put on a Christmas dinner for them with entertainment. Nothing was too much trouble for the Lions whose international motto was 'We Serve' and if they heard of anyone in need of any kind, they would be the first people to help. We now have The Lanchester Partnership of course and Churches Together who do sterling work in our community. We are so fortunate that over many years there have been such selfless people working for our good. Our Lanchester Lion's Wives always organised a Christmas Shopping trip to York which was very popular and when the Lions Club ceased to exist, many people missed those trips.

The bus was always full, and the sense of camaraderie was unsurpassed. Happy memories! I was one of the people who missed it and so in 2016 I decided to try and revive it. I soon had a long list of names and for four years a full bus set off each year to do some Christmas shopping in York. Wildlife Notes

As autumn develops you'll be asked to "check below your bonfire for hedgehogs". If you are planning a bonfire, why not make two piles of sticks and leaves? One to help hoggies to hibernate and the other for you to enjoy on bonfire night? Don't be too tidy in your garden, leave some leaves! Make a pile in a quiet corner outside somewhere, a pile of sticks or logs is good too.

We've had a summer of record temperatures and drought conditions. Wildlife will have struggled;

hedgehogs will have found it difficult to find food and have to travel to find water. You can help them fatten up in readiness for hibernation by putting dog or cat food down for them (if using dried food you must supply water!). www. hedgehogstreet.org is a useful site and has suggestions on creating a cat proof hog feeding station.

Fewer British mammals hibernate than you may think. Some animals rely on 'torpor', others have to tough it out. In the UK only hedgehogs, dormice and bats hibernate. 'Torpor' isn't becoming a winter couch slouch, but a state of reduced physical and mental activity. If you are cold blooded (like our reptiles and amphibians) you need to find a spot you won't freeze and can safely become dormant. More about all this next month

Meanwhile, we all hope for a warm winter, with lower bills. The warmth we crave hinders our hibernators! They rely on the chill to prevent them breaking their hibernation and then not being able to find enough food or cope with a cold snap.

As you drive through the darkening nights with your dazzling headlights, watch out. Enjoy the traditions of Halloween and



Police Report

Hello, an update from PCSO 8722 Andrew Tonge from Consett Neighbourhood Police on what has been happening recently in and around Lanchester.

There has been an increasing number of anti-social behaviour reports, which has then escalated to harassment and



assaults. We would urge people to be reporting these types of incidents, no matter how small you may feel it is, as it could assist other ongoing investigations. We have already identified a number of individuals we believe are involved and are currently dealing with these incidents.

With the schools starting back up recently, police presence will be increased at the schools within the village. However, we would appreciate the support of parents/carers who are doing the school run to be considerate with where they park and the manner in which they drive. The area is busy, and a reduced speed would help ensure the safety of everyone in the area. Regarding parking, please keep double yellow line and keep clear zones free of vehicles and avoid blocking driveways. We would encourage people to park further away from schools and walk a short distance, car share, or attend school clubs before and after. This helps ease congestion. As you will know by now, I am Poppy, a black Patterdale Terrier with more than a tinge of grey, who enjoys sharing with you walks I lead my Humans on.

Today's venture begins at Annfield Plain, from the park behind the Tesco store. It is a hidden gem, the park I mean, not Tesco. Unseen from the main road, many Lanchester residents may not have visited Annfield Plain Park. If not, they are missing a treat.

Parking is free adjacent to it and dogs are allowed to roam free. There are signs warning of penalties if Humans don't pick up our litter, but there are ample doggy bins so there are no excuses for the Humans, whose behaviour can sometimes give us dogs a bad name.

After passing between tennis courts and a bowling green we come to information boards which tells us that the park was

Autumn COVID-19: Stay well, double your defences: get both vaccines. It could save your life.

COVID-19 has not gone away, and cases continue to rise, with over 17,000 people hospitalized in July this year. On average flu kills 8000 people in England each year. This autumn a joint vaccine of COVID-19 and flu will be offered to you. These vaccines provide strong protection against serious illness, hospitalization, and death. There is evidence that being vaccinated makes it less likely that you will pass the virus on to others, which means your decision to get the vaccine also protects those around you.

Forecast Winter Season 2022-23

The next peak of COVID-19 is anticipated late November 2022 with a subsequent peak in March 2023. This is likely to coincide with the increasing prevalence of flu. Therefore, there is a need to vaccinate people against both diseases as soon as possible. Whether contracting COVID-19 or flu, the impact of either or both presents a significant health risk for all of us, as well as system pressure for GPs, hospitals, and ambulance services.

Co-administration of COVID-19 and Flu Vaccine

The message from research shows that giving both vaccines together is safe, convenient, and effective. There are no safety concerns.

The Vaccine

In response to the continual evolving of the virus, SARS-CoV-2, an updated version of the vaccine made by Moderna that targets two coronavirus variants has been approved for an adult booster after it has been found to meet the UK regulator's standards of safety, quality, and effectiveness. **Vaccine fatigue** is understandable; we have all attended for booster after booster, but successful delivery of the autumn campaign is fundamental to supporting NHS and adult social care resilience and protecting us all in the coming months.

Post Vaccination

After getting vaccinated, we will still need to remain COVID-19 aware by maintaining social distance, if required wearing a good fitting face mask, avoid poorly ventilated places, and as always wash/ disinfect your hands regularly.

Remember to stay at home if you are unwell and take a test. It will only be by us working together, and by playing our part to ensure that we are double vaccinated, will deaths be prevented. Each death is one death too many.

We look forward to seeing what the academic year of 2022 - 2023 brings!



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
