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Lanchester Open Gardens

Saturday 23rd July was Lanchester Open Gardens in aid of Willow Burn Hospice. This was my first time attending the event so I enlisted the company of my sister to join me in what proved to be a gardener's delight!

Early morning blue skies and sunshine promised a glorious day ahead...which was to be the case with the exception of a sudden downpour just after 10am, the story of our summer so far! We started our viewings at the Old Hall, Hollinside, a house dating back to c.1650, and what a spectacular garden this is, a formal knot garden with a central fountain at the front of the house, with stunning views across the Browney Valley. Not only were the gardens beautiful but the architecture of the house and outbuildings, both the interior and exterior, were fascinating, with so many features to marvel at. This was clearly a popular garden with lots of visitors taking their time to chat to the owners, or sit on one of the inviting garden seats in the sunshine, or visit the exhibition by the Dere Street Stitchers, who displayed a beautiful selection of creative stitchery, (located in the Goose Barn). To enhance the whole experience was the charming fairground organ owned by Stuart Wright that played magically at the entrance of the gardens...and this was only our first stop!

Our next stop was Newfield Hall, a 200-year-old walled garden with formal knot box hedging, herbaceous borders containing a variety of plants, lily ponds with a bridge and fabulous views across the valley. We were met by the friendly hosts on arrival and given a helpful map identifying what to look out for... particularly the folly constructed as a project during lockdown! Adjacent to Newfield Hall is Chapel House with its meandering gardens and secluded seating areas to sit and admire the array of diverse flowers and plants.

Back in the village we headed to a garden on Burnside, here we experienced deep garden envy, the richness of the planting and the variety of flowers were a magnet for bees and butterflies, the veg patch was an abundance of home-grown fruit and veg.

The rustle of palm trees welcomed us at our next stop on Mount View, stepping into this garden in the English sunshine we were immediately transported to a more exotic location - is this really Lanchester?! The owners have nurtured this amazing display of well-established palm trees, thriving even during the most severe North East winters...what a delight!

A short walk up Newbiggin Lane and we arrived at the Community Orchard and Margery Flatts Allotments. We were met by enthusiastic allotment keepers, giving us an overview of the site including the location of the "nut walk". We wandered through the beautifully maintained plots, bordered by the apple orchard already laden with fruit.

Back in the village and a quiet stroll around Percy Place and the Garths, this lovely mid-Victorian row of brick stone houses reflects each owner's personality and pride in their individual outdoor space.

A short walk over to the allotments on Peth Bank, to once again be inspired, and admire the talents of local gardeners growing a wide variety of fruit, veg and flowers for the home.

This certainly was a day to remember, and one that I heartily recommend, and hopefully next year we will make it to Willow Burn Hospice for the cream tea refreshments that were on offer to all.

Thank you to the organisers, and dedicated gardeners of Lanchester. The event raised £1,100.



Wildlife notes

Barn Owls

Featuring some more outstanding photographs from local photographer lan Appleby.

They have lop-sided ears, their face is shaped to collect sound and their feathers aren't waterproof. Why?

To help them hunt successfully in low light. The heart-shaped face collects the tiniest sound, the lop-sided ear openings (just behind the eyes) pinpoint the exact direction of the noise. They 'sneak up' on Field Voles and other small mammals undetected in silent flight, due to their feathers being extremely soft. Soft feathers get soaked by rain, a problem for hunting in wet weather.

Their ghostly flight is most often seen at dawn and dust, across fields and edges of woodland: areas with long grass. Their long legs can reach prey in the grass. Their talons are not only for catching prey, one talon has a comb to groom the facial disc (small stiff feathers forming the 'heart-shape' surrounding the eyes and beak). The facial disc feathers can be finely adjusted to collect particular sounds and direct them to the ears, hence the carefully applied 'comb'! They have superpower eyesight too, but it's their hearing that permits food finding in total darkness.


They don't 'twit twoo' like Tawny owls, but screech.

Food goes down whole, the indigestible bits are coughed up as an owl pellet. You can dissect the pellets to identify what they've had for tea i.e. find skulls and bones as clues.

They have adapted to using barns to roost and nest. They also use hollow trees and crevices. They've lived alongside humans for thousands of years, eating 'vermin' to help out. They struggle with the loss of traditional barns and the clearance of older trees and woodland reducing their nest sites. You can boost Barn owls by finding a suitable site for a nest box, make sure you have permission and check out The Barn Owl Trust information. https://www.barnowltrust.org.uk/barn-owl-nestbox/barn-owl-nestboxes/

You have a chance of seeing them, especially as the nights draw in, near Malton Nature Reserve field up to Biggen Farm, also along the line towards Knitsley in the area near Low Meadows/ Kitswell Road.


We ventured a little further afield last time out - all the way to the Boatside Inn at Warden, 40 minutes away. Having said that, it is a most pleasant journey along the A68 towards Hexham, somewhat busier on the A69 which leads to the slip road down into Warden. The Boatside Inn itself and staff are warm, welcoming, and very efficient. We were soon seated, provided with menus, drinks on their way and once menu choices had been made, our meals arrived quickly. All good as we were feeling somewhat peckish after the longer journey.

We sampled for a starter smoked mackerel pate served with cucumber pickle and melba toast. Mains were chicken stroganoff cooked in a paprika, mustard and mushroom cream sauce served with steamed rice; Boatside homemade seafood pie with seasonal veg; mince and dumplings with mash and seasonal veg; confit of duck leg seasoned with five spices, garlic and ginger, served on braised red cabbage with sautéed potatoes and an oriental sauce. Desserts were a unanimous choice of the lemon roulade served with ice cream or cream - you were also given the option of being adventurous and going for custard!!

It was all beautifully presented - some in quirky slanty dishes - and it all tasted delicious.

A most enjoyable lunchtime was had by all, and we look forward to going again.

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Lanchester Wildlife Group's latest outing

Lanchester Wildlife Group - Malton Nature Reserve Field trip 16th July

We set out at midday; intrepid adventurers in pursuit of Dragons and Damsels. We were accompanied by Michael Coates, "County Recorder" for magnificent flying machines i.e. dragonflies. The County Recorder for a group of animals or plants keeps track of what species was found where in that 'county'. Michael is responsible for collecting details of where dragonfly species are found in the Vice County of Durham (includes Sunderland, Hartlepool etc). In past issues of VV, we've encouraged you to record animals or plants that you see and recognise online e.g. via irecord (https://irecord.org.



uk). Your recorded sightings then find their way to the County Recorder for the appropriate group of animals or plants. Aided by warm, sunny conditions we saw five species of dragonfly/damselfly at Malton including the impressive Southern Hawker. Dragonflies are larger than damselflies (dainty damsels). When at rest dragonflies hold their wings flat out from the sides of their bodies, damsels usually hold their wings folded above or near to their bodies. There is a gap between the eyes of damsels, dragons' eyes touch. Watch for them flying along the main path at Malton, hawking for small insects to eat. Hence the name 'Hawker'. They rest hanging from vegetation, sitting on branches along the paths and on vegetation next to and within the ponds. Look closely up and down the plant stems growing in the ponds. If you see two in tandem they are mating or laying eggs in the pond or on pond vegetation. He clasps the female at the back of the head with the end of his abdomen and she raises hers up to him, they form an upside-down heart shape together. 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
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Poppy's walks

Good day readers. My walk for this edition of the Village Voice is on public footpaths and rights of way but beware.

Often cattle graze on part of the route and my Humans always make sure we turn and go back rather than walk through a field of cows.

However, presuming the coast is clear I will describe the walk which is a very satisfactory exercise.

As you all should know by now, I am Poppy, a Patterdale terrier who enjoys sharing the walks I lead my Humans on with you dear readers.

This one starts on Station Road, and we follow the railway path past the Station House and along towards, and then across, Newbiggin Lane. We continue along the railway path past Lizard Cottage and carry on for a few hundred yards until we see a couple of public footpath signs - one on the right and one on the left of the railway path. We follow the left-hand sign across a stile and up a fairly steep incline across a field which is sometimes muddy. The views from halfway up the incline back across the valley and over towards Iveston are worth the exertion.

At the top of the hill we look out for cattle and if none are around we continue across another couple of fields and this route brings us out on Newbiggin Lane beside a farm and a few houses. This apparently is Newbiggin. From there we could turn left and head back into Lanchester, but I lead my Humans to the right and then left along a lane which the map says is Yeckhouse Lane. I call it the Dairy lane because it leads us to and through Lanchester Dairy.

There are usually one or two canine companions to chew the fat with in the houses surrounding the dairy. We continue along the green verge alongside the road where I often see highland cattle on the field to my right. I tend to give them a wide berth because they have fearsome looking horns!

Eventually we reach the junction leading onto the main road from Lanchester to Hollinside, Satley and beyond.

From there we turn left, and it is exactly one mile back into Lanchester. We need to walk on the verge for about half the distance then we come to a layby where we cross the road and join a footpath which takes us down Cadger Bank and

The walk takes approximately 90 minutes - the same time as a football match lasts – but this is much better exercise in my not so humble opinion.

Notes from the House Summer surgery tour

Last week I held part one of my popular annual Summer Surgery Tour, in which I visited towns and villages right across in North West Durham. This includes some of my favourite spots in Lanchester, Esh, Burnhope Quebec and Langley

Park. I have always said North West Durham is one of the most beautiful corners of the country and every year, this tour proves me right.

Over the course of the week, I met hundreds of constituents at over 30 stops, as well as surgery appointments and popping by local businesses. I discussed everything from individual cases to international geopolitics.

There was a huge range of people, places, and topics of conversation. However, the one thing it all had in common was how friendly, appreciative, and welcoming everyone was. Every year, it gives me a unique insight into life in North West Durham and appreciation for the area.

As well as being one of the most enjoyable parts of the job, doing things like this is one of the most important functions of being a Member of Parliament. The only way I am able to

represent the good people of North West Durham is by grasping the local issues that people care about. I will take so much of what was highlighted back with me to Westminster.

It is also important that, no matter how small and isolated the village or town, people feel their MP is there for them. I want to see every part of our area, but also for people to see me. This goes to the very heart of what is important about a democracy. MPs must be visible, familiar and accountable.

Willow Burn Hospice

At the June meeting of the group, representatives of Willow Burn Hospice were invited to tell the group about the hospice. Carol Hagri (Head of Clinical Services) and Rachel Todd (Head of Fundraising and Marketing) were guest speakers at the meeting, giving an in-depth and informative talk

This is the second article (the previous one was in the July edition) which summarises what was discussed at the meeting.

Introducing the Team

At Willow Burn we adopt a multi-disciplined approach, consisting of professionals drawn from different disciplines, working together to provide and evaluate all elements of care to meet individual patients' needs and wishes.

Director and lead- David Barker, supported by a small team of 5 (administration, finance, and fundraising) and a retail team of 4.

Doctors- experienced in hospice care visit on a Monday, Wednesday, and Friday, working alongside the patient's own GP they manage palliative and end-of-life symptoms.

Nurses- 24-hour care is provided by registered nurses experienced in palliative care.

Health Care Assistants- 24-hour care by trained and experienced assistants in palliative care. **Family Support Team-** consists of, Coordinator, Adult Counsellor, Children's Counsellor and qualified volunteer counsellors.

Catering Team- providing meals for patients and the Willows Café.

Housekeeping Team- a vital unseen presence that maintains hygiene standards.

Additional professional cover

Willow Burn is a nurse-led hospice which allows flexibility around timing of admissions. GP with Special Interest visits on Monday and Friday and a Consultant in Palliative Care on Wednesday. Patients' GPs continue to retain medical responsibility and are required to provide prescriptions.

Bereavement counselling

Our Family Support Team provides a range of services to anyone suffering from life limiting illness, their families, and carers.

Support is provided from diagnosis, pre-death, post-death and is ongoing throughout the bereavement process. Support is offered to in-patients and day-care patients within the Helen McArdle Wing, we also accept referrals from hospitals, GPs, and Macmillan Cancer Care. Our Family Support Coordinator assesses patient and family needs providing emotional, psychological, and spiritual support during in-patient stays, advice and information, signposting to other relevant services and practical assistance. She continues to provide support post bereavement to families who have experienced our services and may refer to in-house counselling six months post bereavement if required.

Situated beside Willow Burn is "The Willows", a beautiful community café that offers delicious home-cooked food and boasts of gorgeous views across Derwentside, the perfect setting to meet friends; sit inside or outside in the gardens. Onsite parking and payment is cash, chip and pin and contactless. Open Monday to Saturday 10am – 2.30pm Closed Bank Holidays






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



Jim's contributions to the club off the field were immense, a committee member, organising and running many social events, introducing new members and arranging highly successful cricket tours. Without doubt a stalwart of the club.

Gary Martin

Gary has supported the club for over 30 years. So keen to help people at the club, Gary always had time to chat to members and in many instances listen to their problems. A non-playing member, Gary was a great help with social events, making teas and generally kept things ticking along.

Brin Jones

Brin was a very active Club Secretary in the period 1990-2000. He improved much of the Club's administration so that it operated in a businesslike manner. Brin was an active supporter of Junior cricket, encouraging and supporting his son Mark with his cricket especially when the U 13 side travelled to Sherborne for the National Championships. Sue, his wife, actively supported Brin with his numerous tasks.

Ray Clish

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Cricket News

It doesn't need a genius to tell you there has been little cricket over the past month. It started with a top of the table clash with Sunderland at their place. Lanchester were put in and made 228-7 in a rain interrupted innings that saw the overs reduced. Ethan Connolly made 76 and Greg Patterson 49. Sunderland never attempted to chase down our score and settled for making sure they weren't bowled out to pick up points in a draw. The next three weeks were washed out. The period ended with a second defeat of the season, both at the hands of Tynedale and well beaten they were. The defeat left Lanchester in second place, six points behind Sunderland. In the completed game at the start of the period, the seconds were well beaten by Castle Eden who made 232-8 declared and Lanchester bowled out for 139. They did play Philadelphia the following week and it looked like a result might be possible until the rain came down again. Lanchester were out for 106 but had the opposition 55-5.

The seconds finished with a winning draw at Tynedale. Greg Halliday played beautifully for 90 and despite 4-23 from Ben Rayner, couldn't quite winkle Tynedale out.

Sundays have been better, and the thirds managed three games, winning two. They beat Shotley when the match was reduced in their innings and they won on run rate, Bailey Allison top scoring on 39. Then they bowled Seaham Park out for 101 and won by 10 wickets thanks to Bailey Allison with 63 and John McGilvray 28. The following week they plucked defeat from the jaws of victory after bowling Castle Eden out for 115, Jack Morris returning to take 3-6 and Marcus Thompson 2-6.
