

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Remembrance Sunday

There was the usual Remembrance Service on the Green on November 12th. It was extremely well attended.

Following the opening prayers, the hymn "O God, our help in ages past" was sung by those attending accompanied by the Lanchester Band. This was followed by one of the verses of the poem "For the fallen" by Robert Laurence Binyon. "They shall grow not old, as we that are left grow old:

Age shall not weary them, nor the years condemn. At the going down of the sun and in the morning We will remember them."

Mark Draper then played the Last Post; flags were lowered, and an immaculate silence kept. Reveille was then played as the flags were raised again. A prayer was said and the names of those from the area who died in the wars were read out. Wreaths were then laid by representatives of the Lord Lieutenant/the courts, County Council and Richard Holden MP, Lanchester Independent Party, Veterans' Association, British Red Cross and the Royal Army Medical Corps, Parish Council, Lanchester Partnership, Scouts, Boys' Brigade, Thursday Club, Women's Institute, Churches Together, and the Mothers' Union. This was then followed by those who wished to lay wreaths or crosses.

After prayers, the national anthem was then sung, followed by a blessing.


'Chalk and Cheese'

On Monday 6th November, I was invited and honoured to speak to All Saints Primary school about Remembrance at assembly that morning. In the afternoon I made a poppy cross for the children to place their poppies into. The cross was put next to their own war memorial. During the week the children placed their crosses into the main cross. After the assembly I had to go to the Field of Remembrance at Saltwell Park and teach Remembrance to another 3 schools that day.

Once the crosses had been put into the box, they remained there until the 20th when they were removed and some of the nicest and clearest were put next to their own memorial.

The Field of Remembrance is open to all schools in the area. This year we had 7 schools, and they all had their own boxes into which to put their crosses. Hopefully more next year. There are only 6 Fields of Remembrance in the country, and we have the only one in the north of England. It opens to the public on the 1st Saturday in November and members of the public are more than welcome to add their tributes to the Field.

Lanchester History Society

The history society meeting in November was a talk from Richard Pears about David Stephenson (1757-1819) the Newcastle architect. He was a founder member of the Literary and Philosophical Society of Newcastle and an early member of The Society of Antiquaries. There is a marble plaque commemorating him in All Saints' Church, Newcastle upon Tyne, located at the Newcastle end of the Tyne bridge, where he is buried.

All Saints' Church is one of his more significant


works and was adapted from a scheme by James Gibbs for Saint Martin in the Fields in London. He was architect to Newcastle Corporation and laid out Mosley Street and Dean Street, the first streets to deviate from the mediaeval town plan. He went on to be appointed architect to the Duke of Northumberland designing the New Quay at North Shields and the Percy Tenantry Column in Alnwick.

All Saints has been through many changes during the 20th Century however it is now back in use as a Presbyterian Church with services - but open for self-guided tours at various times such as Heritage open days. It's well worth a visit.

Ladies who lunch

Our latest foray into the local food scene found us motoring up the back lanes onto the A68 and onwards to Corbridge. A lovely journey, greatly enhanced by the bright sunlight shining through the glorious autumnal foliage.

Once there, Corbridge itself can prove to be a little tricky for finding a parking place - but - it can be done with a little patience. We were heading for the Black Bull, which recently changed hands - would we still like it?

Well, it was very busy - good sign, the fires were burning away, staff were very pleasant and welcoming, menus looked interesting. There was the main one, a festive one - 2 courses for £24.99 or 3 courses for £28.99 and a light bites menu.

Choices were made and our food ordered. From the festive menu we opted for roasted cod loin wrapped in crispy prosciutto with sprouts, roast baby potatoes, broccoli and hollandaise sauce followed by Christmas pudding. This was pronounced to be the 'one of the nicest meals I've ever had'. From the light bites menu, it was wholetail scampi with chips, tartare sauce and peas and, from where I was sitting, it looked more like a main meal - a very substantial offering. From the main menu we sampled smothered chicken breast with melted smoked cheese, bacon and BBQ sauce served with onion rings, chips and rocket and cucumber salad; hand battered Atlantic cod served with tartare sauce, chips and a choice of peas or mushy peas; and pan-fried seabass and seared scallops on a bed of pea,

mint and courgette risotto.

Puddings were caramelised vanilla cheesecake; Bakewell tart; Christmas pudding and sticky toffee pudding.

An excellent meal in a comfy warm room, in good company - what more could you wish for?

Not a lot really- but we were in delightful Corbridge, and retail therapy abounds around every corner- what absolute bliss!

A most enjoyable afternoon.

Poppy's walks

Good day readers.

The walk I am going to tell you about for this edition is three miles long. How do I know that? All will be revealed in due course.

As you will know by now, I am Poppy, a Patterdale terrier at your service. I enjoy sharing with you readers the

walks on which I lead my humans.

The Lanchester walks all tend to start in the centre of the village, say the village green for the sake of argument. From there, for this walk, we proceed along Station Road and up Cadger Bank. But only halfway up the bank until we see a flight of steps on our right which we take. From there we go through a narrow passageway or ginnel - which we walk through and that brings us to the top of a road called Briardene.

We walk diagonally across a grassy area with lots of trees and at the end turn right before walking to another flight of stairs with a burn on the left. We walk down the stairs and then the footpath at the foot and that takes us onto Broadoak Drive. We turn left and walk to Newbiggin Lane, left again and then right along a path called Ridgeway. There are a couple of doggie bins on Ridgeway in case I have been caught short en route.

At the end of Ridgeway, we go down yet another flight of stairs

and turn left onto the railway path.

We follow that in the direction of Consett and I usually find some pals along the line with whom to have a sniff and a chat. We keep walking along the line until we come to a high point overlooking fields and a sign which says Lanchester Valley Walk, Lanchester one and a half miles. The human usually decides to turn around here, telling me how lucky I am to be taken on a three mile walk. From this I deduce that one and a half miles is the halfway point. We retrace our footsteps as far as Lizard Cottage where we branch off onto a farm track which runs parallel to the line, and eventually takes us onto Kitswell Road. From there we walk to the centre of the village - to the shops and I am going to let you into a secret.

I drag the human to the front of the butcher's and if I sit at the entrance looking beseeching - I am quite good at that - a nice lady called Wendy nearly always feeds me a morsel of sausage. Which is a more than satisfying way of rounding off a most satisfactory walk which takes us around 90 minutes.



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

Lanchester Bowling Club - Further Reflections - Angry Men

When most people think of lawn bowls, they imagine a genteel game played on a balmy afternoon by elderly people dressed in white clothing. This is an image reinforced by films and clips from the fifties and sixties although the comedy "Blackball" did try its hardest to dispel this myth.

To a certain degree, however, these cliches are true. After all, the majority of bowls players in our leagues are on the wrong side of sixty and I've even come across players in their nineties! That's not to say much younger players can't participate and, indeed when they do, they tend to excel. It's also still regarded as a genteel game - players shake hands at the beginning of a match and wish their opponents well (even if they don't really mean it!). They applaud good play, congratulate success and, win or lose, shake hands at the end. In most games there is good banter between the players, many of whom you've got to know well over the years. If tea is provided during or after the match, then this socialising is extended.

Thankfully the need for all whites, however, has now gone. Trousers (and even shorts) are grey in most leagues and Lanchester play in white casual shirts with blue and yellow collars and a badge showing All Saints church. If Mike, our chairman, had his way we'd play in even jazzier shirts emblazoned with Lanchester Lightning or some such alliterative name.

I used the phrase "most games" above, but politeness and laughter are not always the order of the day. A few years ago, when I was a novice bowler, I watched Lanchester in a cup final played on a very wet day in Dipton. On one of the rinks the opposition skip became increasingly irate with his own players as the game progressed, culminating in him shouting abuse at them because they struggled to do exactly as he asked them. As the air turned blue you could tangibly feel the resentment towards him growing.

Sometimes the abuse is aimed at the opposition. I was playing second in a triples match at Sherburn earlier in the season. Being second player, it was my job at the culmination of each end to consult with my opposite number as to who had won the end and by how many shots. At first, I counted two, but then noticed the wood I was standing beside also scored and

agreed that we'd in fact scored three. I duly shouted this down to our skip so he could mark the score card appropriately. We then proceeded to play the next end. As we changed over so the skips could bowl their woods, I noticed the opposition skip making a beeline towards me shouting angrily and gesticulating wildly. As his face turned puce he shouted that I was in the wrong and was going to "report me." Who to, he didn't say. Apparently, according to him, I'd declared two shots which he'd written on his scorecard so couldn't then declare three. Amazingly, I kept my temper. Even though the other four players, including the two on his team, insisted I'd only ever declared three he continued ranting and scowled at me on every end change. Needless to say, he didn't shake my hand at the end of the game.

Stuart Lee, one of Lanchester's committee, tells an equally bizarre tale. "One instance that springs to mind was in our game against Mainsforth when the opposition skip was so competitive, bearing in mind he was well into his eighties. We were leading 18-16 at the commencement of the final end and we had a wood about six inches from the jack when their skip decided to fire. [This is where a player bowls his wood with force, taking away the bias and hoping to scatter the head in their favour]. His wood careered down the rink missing everything, smacked the backboard and then ricocheted back onto the green, landing against the jack. I picked his wood up and placed it off the green as, by the rules, it was dead having left the top of the green. He literally ran down the green and vociferously argued that his wood should still count despite leaving the green. I now smile when I think of the game and how some people never lose their competitive edge and are prepared to bend the rules to gain an advantage."

Notice that it tends to be skips who lose it; the saying: "If your skip wants an opinion, he'll give it to you" certainly holds true. It's Christmas and there's still time to get the bowler in your life
