The eagle-eyed amongst us will have noticed the arrival of a new bench on the green next to the bus stop. It has been placed in memory of Henry Dancer, a Lanchester lad who lost his life to cancer aged 12 and whose Mum, Jane Nattrass, set up Henry Dancer Days, a charity which supports children with cancer. The bench was donated by Peter and Rosemarie Dancer, Henry's grandparents.

A wonderful coincidence was that it arrived the day before what would have been Henry's 25th birthday and during the 10th anniversary year of Henry Dancer Days.

Since its inception, Henry's charity has been extremely busy: Over 17,000 children have enjoyed storytelling sessions in paediatric oncology wards throughout the UK. Professional storytellers put smiles on very poorly faces.


Over 5,000 people have been helped through hardship grants when living with primary bone cancer.

The charity is now active in 34 UK hospitals but ensures that the North East receives double the number of storytelling sessions and a unique pottery project (where children create masterpieces which are fired and returned as mementoes). This is done to recognise the support of the local community and its northern roots.

Henry's memory lives on in the village through the annual Henry Dancer Award at Lanchester EP School. It is given to a Year 6 boy who shows Henry's

qualities of caring and consideration for others.

Jane would like to thank Lanchester Parish Council for their help in sourcing and erecting the bench and, in particular, Sally Laverick for her support and help with the bench and to everyone in the village who has supported Henry Dancer Days.

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Dear Village Voice,

I write to raise awareness after I recently visited a friend within Lanchester. As a disabled person and a wheelchair user, I was shocked by the poor level of accessibility within the village and surrounding paths.

Almost every shop I tried to get into had a step. Whilst some provide a ramp on request, not all do or even provide a method for requesting assistance. Furthermore, many of the shops in question have the space at the front to add a small ramp but none have. I find it shocking that in 2023 neither the shops nor the parish council have addressed accessibility which is a flagrant disregard of the DDA (Disability Discrimination Act). I noted that to cross the road to or from the SPAR this can only be done by entering a car access zone putting myself at risk. Worse still if I were to cross from the hardware store side to the SPAR, I am likely to be hidden behind parked vehicles and road users would not be aware of me. Not having a clearly marked crossing area adds further risk, not just to disabled people but also to small children.

I also noted that many areas of the village have no, or few dropped kerbs. Many mobility scooters have a maximum clearance of 50mm. There were so many cars parked so far over the path (which is illegal), that I could not pass. In a few areas I could pass but still had to venture into the road to avoid the dog foul on the path! Heaven forbid I would want to venture out on bin day.

This may all seem trivial, but I can assure you that these issues impact not only the mental health of disabled people but cause a huge amount of stress when a person is just trying to go about daily activities that most people are able to take for granted.

Wildlife notes Otters

You will be lucky to see an otter, the chance increases as hours of darkness decrease into summertime.

If you would like to find out how to look for signs of otters along watercourses and help with an annual otter survey, see below.

A female is referred to as a bitch otter and male a dog. Otters lead solitary lives, if you see them together it's probably a bitch and cub/s. Ripples in the water? Keep watching. Watch for the very pointed tail tip as they dive under the surface, otter tails are wedge shaped and taper to a point. They differ from the non-native American mink in size, colour, and tail. Mink tails do not taper to a point and are a similar width along the length (beware the wet tail end which might look pointed). Mink are a more chocolate brown colour and usually have a white spot under their chin, they have more pointed faces and are smaller than otters (though they won't conveniently line up for comparison of size or pointiness!). Otters are territorial, a single territory can be 20 to 30 kilometres of river,





females have smaller areas and male territory may overlap with several females. A bitch may tolerate grown daughters or siblings when food is plentiful, but grown cubs are normally forced to move to find their own territory. Otters mark their territory by leaving poo, so even if you don't see one, you will know there is an otter using that river. They leave distinctive 5-toed paw prints.

Notes from the House

As both Member of Parliament for North West Durham and Minister for Roads and Local Transport, I know how important buses are to our everyday lives here in Lanchester. However, we all know bus services in our area have had a tough time recently as they try to recover after Covid.

Passenger numbers have struggled to reach pre-pandemic levels and operators have also

had difficulty getting the drivers they need. Having got the X5 into Durham myself, I know that reliability has unfortunately dipped as a result. Buses improve social inclusion, providing access to education, employment and healthcare to those who do not own or cannot use their own car. They are, therefore, invaluable in connecting people that would otherwise be isolated.

Since I've been appointed, I have been intent to make sure that they're as reliable, affordable and welcoming as possible. One way towards this is through the £2 bus fare I have introduced until March 31st to help people in these difficult times.

Despite nearly $\mathfrak L2$ billion input to the bus network to support services and keep many routes operating, the truth is that, without greater ridership, many routes will just not be viable in the long term. Ensuring people can get around for $\mathfrak L2$ makes the bus more accessible, more appealing to more people and encourages operators to continue running regular services. I want Lanchester's abundant talent to have access to reliable travel and maximise opportunities, with bus services getting better and better at an affordable price. The 'Get around for $\mathfrak L2$ ' scheme is one small step to achieving this.

The word bus comes from the Latin 'Omnibus', meaning 'for all'. I want to make our buses as useful and reliable to as many people as possible. I will continue to fight to improve our buses and transport infrastructure to ensure that we can reap the many rewards right here in Lanchester.






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
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Good day readers.

This time I am going to share with you a rather strenuous walk with quite a lot of climbing, but starting and finishing in the centre of Lanchester.

You will know by now that I am Poppy, a Patterdale terrier who writes of walks

in the area on which I lead my Humans. This particular walk starts, for the sake of argument, outside the Kings Head and follows the railway path towards Malton. We leave the path at Oakwood – next to a seat and a doggy bin - and walk along that road until we reach Durham Road, which we cross by a traffic island and walk along the pavement out of the village.

Soon after leaving the Lanchester boundary, we see a public footpath sign which we follow across a stile and diagonally across a field, climbing a fairly steep incline. This eventually brings us out at another stile onto a country track near some farmsteads called Manor House. There is a Private Road sign ahead of us then, but we can pause to look back at a scenic view over Lanchester before continuing on our way following arrows to the right of the Private Road sign. At this stage I am kept on my lead because we pass a field full of goats on our right and poultry on our left. The path leads us

between fenced enclosures and we follow the arrows until we reach yet another stile which we cross to enter a wood, where I can be let off my lead to explore.

We continue to follow the path through the wood, climbing all the time until we reach a junction where we can see the Burnhope television mast looking quite close up ahead. We follow arrows to the right and by this stage we have climbed as high as we will on the walk, which comes as some relief to the Humans. We follow the path to the right, again through woods with the mast above us on the left, until we come to another fork. This time we turn right between some standing stones and begin the descent which will eventually take us to Malton.

By following the footpath, we go between another pair of standing stones and walk through a wood until we see a stile on the right with arrows on it advising us to cross it. I have to be on my lead again because once over the stile we cross diagonally a field of sheep, downhill all the way until we come to yet another stile next to High Burnhopeside House. Crossing this stile takes us back onto the main Durham Road which we have to cross with care before following the road down to Malton picnic area. From there it is a straight walk back to Lanchester.

The walk, which was muddy in parts, took us just under two hours and was highly satisfying.

We all agreed it was a thoroughly delicious choice of food from the menu served by polite and courteous staff.



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Lanchester E.P. (Cont.) Primary School & Nursery

Last month, 16 children and 5 members of staff took part in the school trip of a lifetime to Rajkot in India. This opportunity was funded by The Turing Scheme. In this month's Village Voice, Year 5 children Oliver, Daisy and Kate share their experiences:

When I left, it felt weird because it was the first time I've ever been away from home. I wanted to jump off the minibus to hug my mam, but I pushed through and travelled to Newcastle Airport. The airport was massive and it took 1 hour to fly to London. Heathrow Airport in London was even bigger! That night, we flew overnight to Mumbai. Luckily I managed to sleep for a little bit on our 9 hour flight. When we arrived in Mumbai, we hopped onto another plane for the one hour flight to Rajkot. We were shattered when we arrived, but I noticed a big difference: there were cows roaming on the street because they are a sacred animal in India.

In India, we visited two schools: Sunshine School in Chotila and Panchshil School in Rajkot. At Sunshine School, we visited their classrooms and played some local games. I noticed that the teachers used chalkboards and stand on a stage to teach, while the children sit on the floor with a small desk and lots of books. At Panchshil School, we were treated to a fantastic show with lots of traditional singing and dancing. We all got mehndi patterns on our hands, which is a type of temporary tattoo. Fun fact: it costs a lot of money to buy land in India, so they build the schools high rather than wide!

When we weren't in school, we had the opportunity to visit some local palaces, where we met members of the local royal families. 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Lanchester Medical Centre Welcomes Dr Kalra

Daily the media reports strike action, unrest and exhausted staff from the very services we rely on, the National Health Service.

This is the difficult national health climate into which Dr Kalra commences his new role as sole partner at Lanchester Medical Centre.

BMA reports a significant decline in GP partners across the country.

Lanchester Medical Centre (LMC) is one of many GP practices experiencing significant and growing strain with declining GP numbers, rising demand, exhausted staff, and the knock-on effects this has for their patients. They have one GP partner and two salaried GPs, both of whom are on long-term sick leave. To alleviate this shortfall in clinical sessions, locum GPs are sought as cover. This is not ideal, as locum GPs dictate their terms of service, do not complete any administration, do not review any investigation results, and do not perform home visits. This in turn adds significantly to the workload of the permanent clinicians.

An empty waiting room is not an indication of activity.

Thankfully the days of a packed waiting room with long delays to be seen are a thing of the past; the appointment system has meant that the average time anyone spends in LMC is twenty minutes. The practice has two waiting areas, one upstairs and one downstairs.

Appointment system

Lack of GP appointments is a national problem that escalated during COVID-19. Surgeries began to triage appointments, offering telephone consultations with a clinician at an appointed time. The clinician then arranged a face-to-face appointment if necessary. LMC also used this system. The need for a telephone consultation has now been discontinued in many cases and replaced with an increased number of face-to-face appointments. To make an appointment, please contact the surgery on 01207 520877 at 8 am; your call will be triaged by our Reception Care Navigation Team and booked with the appropriate clinician either face-to-face or by telephone, at the patient's request.

Not happy, what to do

If have an issue that you are unhappy about, please contact the practice via telephone/email, or by asking at reception for a complaints form. Any concern the admin team cannot facilitate will be passed to Joanne, Practice Manager, who is friendly and approachable; if you do not tell her your issue, she cannot do anything about it.

Why not come along to the bi-monthly Patient Participation Group and hear first-hand what is happening. The next meeting is 1st March at 10:30 in LMC meeting room.

The future

Since February 2020 LMC have been at the forefront of the NHS's response to the

COVID-19 outbreak, delivering vaccines whilst maintaining non-COVID care for patients. There has also been the turmoil of the selling and buying of the practice and staff sickness. tThroughout it all, clinicians and support staff at LMC continue to strive to be a practice with a caring beating heart for the population it serves.

Lanchester Medical Centre: Patient Participation Group Stop Smoking and Vaping

At present the overall smoking prevalence in England is 14%, however this masks the prevalence in some areas where smoking is still seen as the normal thing to do. There are over 4,000 chemicals in cigarettes and cigarette smoke. Vaping products have become the most popular aid to help smokers attempting to stop smoking with many thousands of people in the UK having stopped with their help.

Although vaping is not completely risk free, it poses much less harm than smoking tobacco. According to Public Health England vaping is 95% safer than smoking. They work by allowing the user to inhale nicotine in a vapour rather than smoke. There are only 3 contents to vape fluid: propylene glycol or vegetable glycerine, nicotine and flavourings.

Nicotine is a very addictive substance and as such it is essential that vapes are only used by people who smoke and should not be sold to anyone under the age of 18 years. Recommendations are that no one should use a vape for longer than 1 year, and they should always comply with the Tobacco Products Directive. They should only be purchased from a reputable vendor.


Evidence has found that people who used vapes to help them to quit smoking with specialist support were twice as likely to stop smoking than those using other products such as nicotine replacement therapy to help them to stop.

Smokefree County Durham currently offer 12 week telephone/face to face support for anyone living, working or are registered with a County Durham GP practice.


