

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Solicitors forced to close by the regulatory body

On 13th June 2023 the Solicitors Regulation Authority (SRA) decided that it needed to intervene in the practice of Mark Davies of Bennett Richmond solicitors who are based in Consett but also had an office in Lanchester. Many Lanchester residents would have used the practice over the years and their documents were stored there.

The SRA decided to intervene into the practice for the following reasons:

The panel is satisfied that it is necessary to intervene to protect the interests of clients (or former or potential clients) of Mr Davies, and;

The panel is satisfied there is reason to suspect dishonesty on the part of Mr Davies in connection with his practice at the firm.

This clearly was a shock to all their clients and social media was alive with comments! For those for whom the solicitors were acting on a current issue, this is very worrying. The estate agency business had already closed.

If the solicitors were holding your documents (wills, deeds, etc) on your behalf, these have been collected by the SRA archives team who can be contacted at iaf@sra.org.uk or 0204 525 0250 to arrange retrieval. They have warned that this may take some time due to the volume of documents.

If Bennett Richmond were acting on your behalf on a current matter, then you will need to instruct a new solicitor and request the ongoing files from intervention@gordonsllp.com.

Subsequent to the closure announcement a small convoy of vehicles arrived in Lanchester. They had apparently been told to clear the offices out. This was at 9pm on Friday 23rd June. A group of men loaded two small flatbed lorries at great speed with furniture, filing cabinets etc. A resident reported that the convoy, consisting of the two lorries, a van, two taxis and a large black BMW then shot away at high speed. Very intriguing! A further consequence of all this is that there is another empty shop in the village.


It is for children ranging from those about to go into reception all the way up to those about to enter year 7. It only costs £20 for the whole week and bursaries are available.

A Call Out to all Landowners in Lanchester Parish

The trees are grown from local seeds and are mostly oak and hawthorn, with a few dog rose, guelder rose, holly and horse chestnut as well. Wildlife notes

The Wren

Troglodytes, what a name! Possibly suited to a Disney Marvel character? Is it surprising that the name belongs to a tiny bird? Aptly a bird with a powerful voice. Listening to a Wren's loud song, its scientific name of Troglodytes seems to suit it, though in Latin it means 'cave dweller' and reflects the habit of hunting out yummy insects from holes/nooks and crevices in tree trunks.

The loud song of the male announcing his territory always contains a 'trill' sound within the song, the cascade of loud notes usually ends with a 'trill'. The RSPB's A to Z of birds website is helpful. https://www.rspb.org.uk/birds-and-wildlife/ wildlife-guides/bird-a-z/

The "Merlin" app by Cornell Lab is free and suggests birds your phone detects. Bird detection is often more about bird listening than watching!

Wrens are usually a skulking bird, low in the undergrowth and disappearing into bushes/brambles. However, in breeding season, the males seem to throw caution (and their voices) to the wind and sing in prominent spots to impress a Mrs, revealing themselves to us humans walking along the 'Line'. They often sit with their small tails cocked above their back. Mr Wren's efforts to impress don't end with his ample operatic performance. He woos by building up to 8 nests for her to choose just one! He lays the nest foundations of moss, leaves and grass in a domed, round structure in holes in trees/holes/ crevices or more obscure places like mailboxes, garden pots, even walking boots. She adds finishing touches, a lining of

feathers. They do this twice a year; each brood has up to 6 fledglings.

They live around 2 years. They usually defend their territories throughout the year but will form communal roosts to stave off cold e.g., 63 found roosting in a nest box and 100 in an attic. The wonderful Wren!

Lanchester Wildlife Group's latest outing

Thrislington National Nature Reserve was Lanchester Wildlife Group's latest foray into the wild, we were invited to join Weardale Wildlife Group's field trip on 25th June. Over recent years we've arranged a few joint field trips, we all benefit from a wider range of knowledge on different wildlife and learn from each other. Thrislington is renowned as a Magnesian Limestone grassland. It boasts a couple of specialist butterflies, in particular the Northern Brown Argus and the Brown Argus, which are difficult to tell apart in the North East where they share the same habitat, they are also tiny, which make the challenge more interesting! (a little smaller than the Common Blue you might have noticed on a wander through Malton Nature Reserve). You'll also see a lot of larger brown butterflies near Lanchester, worth closer inspection as the photos show, they are quite attractive too, the Meadow Brown and the Ringlet. The Fragrant orchids were just starting to

flower, they are as fun to sniff as to stare at, hence the apt name. Dark Red Helleborines were another exciting find, flowering earlier than expected. If you enjoy lots of different flowers and attractive insects then Thrislington is worth a visit, as is Bishop Middleham Quarry, a Durham Wildlife Trust reserve fairly close by.

This year the Orchard group decided to follow the advice of nature conservation groups and cut down on the mowing. We still kept paths cut and framed the large square by trimming the edge and mowing a small square at the centre. The longer grass soon became home to clover and buttercups, an ideal habitat for bees and other insects, which in turn encourages more birds.

The shop will become a Premier store. The family run business has been popular amongst both customers and staff over the years. Tony, 64, and Gillian, 61, are moving to Stillington, near Stockton-on-Tees to retire, but Gillian said: "We have family and friends here so we will be returning often no doubt. We will certainly miss the customers who have been lovely." Tony added: "I certainly will NOT miss getting up at 3.30 every morning. That was the time I had to get the papers ready before the shop opened at 6am. Lanchester News was open from 6am until 8pm most days but the opening hours will actually be extended under the new management until 10pm. The shop also housed the Post Office from 2006 until 2019 when it moved over the road to SPAR.


All of our leaders are DBS checked, have safeguarding and creating safer spaces training, have food hygiene certificates and are first aid trained.

Lanchester Partnership AGM

On July 1st the Partnership welcomed over 70 members and guests, including many new faces to the new Community Café and Warm Space at the Community Centre for a celebration brunch prior to the Lanchester Partnership AGM. The Community Café proved to be an excellent venue in which members and others could socialise informally prior to the meeting itself. We were joined by County Councillor Doug Oliver and Derek Snaith from the Mid Durham Area Action Partnership (AAP) – both the County Council and the AAP have been very helpful over the last two years in supporting a range of projects managed by the Partnership.

The Community Café started in November 2022 and was set up as one of five Warm Spaces across Lanchester and Burnhope – part of a local Partnership set up to provide a warm welcome for residents during the cold winter months. It is an excellent example of local partnership working – firstly a partnership between the Community Centre and the Community Interest Company run by Stuart Martin and his team of volunteers – and then with The Lanchester Partnership which was able to support by securing AAP funding for the Warm Spaces. Those attending were in complete agreement that this innovative development has long term potential to support social cohesion across the village.

After the excellent brunch, members moved into Hall 2, where Lanchester Partnership working groups had mounted excellent displays illustrating the activities that had taken place over the last twelve months. Each group gave a short talk explaining the challenges they had faced, and the very real achievements made on behalf of our village.

At the AGM we:

- · Welcomed a new Trustee (Helen McCree)
- Approved the accounts noting that finances were healthy in spite of the challenges presented by Covid and more recently the cost-of-living crisis
- Thanked all those who had donated to support our activities including the AAP and the County Council and businesses and individuals who had donated most generously to put Village Bus finances in a stable position
- · Approved our action plan for 2023-4, noting that 2024 will be the 25th anniversary of the Partnership
- Approved a special resolution formalising our role in providing relief to those in need through the coordination of voluntary activities to provide support

At the end of the meeting the Chair (on behalf of the Trustees) thanked all those who had supported the Partnership in any way. Over the coming year we'll be working hard to consult across the village on how we can further develop our activities, encourage participation and ensure that we remain a supportive and vibrant element in village life.

Finally, a lady in a very fine hat spontaneously thanked all those who over the years had worked through the Partnership to enrich the village. A nice thought to end on.


Thursday Club

Police Report

Hello, here is an update from PCSO 8725 Jonathan Rutherford on what has been happening recently in and around Lanchester.

This month, there has been an increase in road related jobs and Road Traffic Collisions (RTCs). Whilst thankfully

no one has been severely hurt and the majority have been accidents, there have been a few incidents involving drunk drivers.

On the 20th an RTC occurred when a drunk male crashed into the front garden of a resident and tried to make off. The suspect was detained and arrested for drunk driving after failing a roadside breath test. On the 23rd a male was arrested for drunk driving and possession of an offensive weapon. This resulted in a search of the suspect's address where further offensive items such as knuckle dusters were located. Alcohol and drugs both affect your ability to judge speed and distances accurately and slow down your reaction time. Anyone caught drink driving faces a minimum 12-18 month ban. However, deciding to drink and drive could cost you more than just your licence. Our message to drivers is simple. If you take the risk of driving whilst under the influence of alcohol or drugs, you could kill someone, and yourself.

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
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Poppy's walks

Good day readers. In this month's edition I am going to tell you about a welcome sight for us dogs in warm weather. As you will know, I am Poppy, a Patterdale terrier who enjoys sharing with readers the walks around Lanchester and district on which I lead my

Humans. This one takes in the cricket club off Kitswell Road, where the kind staff always leave out a doggy bowl filled with water. In the summer months it is particularly welcome, let me tell you!

Starting from Station Road we walk along the Lanchester Valley Railway Path past the Station House and then across Newbiggin Lane.

We continue to walk along the path, where the verges are particularly overgrown during the summer and where there are all sorts of smells to explore.

If we - I in other words - are feeling energetic we walk on past Lizard Cottage and continue in the direction of Hurbuck. We don't go that far, however.

After a while we come to a point along the railway path

where we see stiles on both our left and our right. We take the right hand stile and cross a field to a fence where we encounter two more stiles in quick succession. The Human pants across those while I slip underneath. We then reach yet another stile which takes us through some undergrowth and out at the other side which is Low Meadows.

We turn right and through a gate next to a cattle grid. We walk along a lane where we often have to stand to one side to let traffic past, before, eventually passing the cemetery on the left and onto Kitswell Road.

We turn left into the cricket club and walk alongside the field to the clubhouse where there is a cold drink of water for yours truly. If there is a cricket game on - a pointless exercise in my opinion - the male Human insists on stopping to watch. While doing so he quenches his own thirst with something stronger than water.

If I can eventually persuade him to leave we walk back towards the practice nets then through a narrow path which takes us onto Victoria Terrace, then right along Millfield back to Kitswell Road, and from there home.

The walk without the cricketing break takes just over an hour, but if there is a cricket match on it can take three times that amount of time!

We will walk to Knitsley farm shop for lunch, then on to finish at Lanchester Gallery coffee shop at about 3.30pm for tea. Notes from the House

It's happening. News finally came last week that the Boundary Commission confirmed their proposal to split North West Durham up into four separate constituencies, abolish the seat and displace me as your local MP.

While I knew it likely, given the previous iteration of the review, it was still deeply disappointing.

The towns and villages of North West Durham are my home. With the help of hardworking local Councillors, like Doug and Mike, I have campaigned relentlessly and successfully delivered for the people I have had the honour to represent. While it is an undeniably sad moment, it is a good opportunity to reflect on the achievements that have been made since you chose me to be your local Member of Parliament.

We have secured the new community hospital to replace Shotley Bridge, with tens of millions set to pour into a state-of-the-art facility around the corner from you. Across North West Durham there has been record investment in our local schools, but this has been felt particularly in Lanchester EP Primary, where I helped secure millions through the School Rebuilding Fund.

I signed off on £163 million for our region's buses, the highest of anywhere in the country. In addition to record jobs growth, falls in unemployment and in the benefits claimant count and more, there is a lot to be proud of.'

The link between constituents and local MP is one to be cherished, and it is not something I have taken for granted. While I've enjoyed leading changes to the law on landmark legislation, like banning so-called virginity testing, what I have enjoyed most is being out and about in North West Durham.

Through apprenticeships fairs down the road in Consett and Crook, public meetings where bus operators felt your fury, visiting schools, supporting local businesses, pensioners' fairs, constituent surgeries—I have been fortunate to see a unique cross-section of North West Durham.

Although it is sad news, it will not stop me working as hard as ever to deliver for you. You elected me to represent you until the next General Election, and no sooner will I stop. My popular summer surgery tour is upcoming, in which I will be in every town and village in North West Durham - including in Burnhope and Lanchester. Stay tuned to my Facebook page for the dates. It has been the privilege of my life to represent you. I will miss it dearly. But until the next general election I'm here for you 100%.

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Willow Burn Hospice

Lanchester Medical Group: Patient Participation Group - July 2023

At the June meeting of the group, representatives of Willow Burn Hospice were invited to tell the group about the hospice. Carol Hagri (Head of Clinical Services) and Rachel Todd (Head of Fundraising and Marketing) were guest speakers at the meeting, giving an in-depth and informative talk.

This article is the first of two which summarises what was discussed at the meeting. **History-** Willow Burn Hospice was founded by Irene Mortimer and Valerie Davison who identified a gap in provision in Derwentside for people living with life limiting conditions. **Today-** Local support for Willow Burn has continued through generous donations and the service has expanded to include in-patient care, Health and Wellbeing Centre, six-bedded hospice and a café. Here, patients and carers find peace and tranquillity when it is most needed; the hospice focuses on individual needs through the provision of high-quality care.

This year it will cost £1.4million to operate Willow Burn Hospice. It is a misconception that hospices are fully funded by the NHS, the hospice receives 44% of its funding from this source. For every £1 they spend, they need to raise 56p via community fundraising, retail, donations and grants.

Guest speakers- How would you describe Willow Burn Hospice? Willow Burn's role is to:

- treasure lives helping people living life limiting illness to live well though our day services and symptom management in the in-patient unit.
- to provide holistic support to achieve a good death.
- to support relatives and friends to live through and beyond bereavement through counselling and volunteer opportunities.

How many day patients? Role of day care?

Willow Burn Day Service supports 10-12 people to live well at home, focusing on wellbeing and condition management in friendly group sessions on Tuesday, Thursday, and Fridays.

We meet in the purpose-built Sir Tom Cowie Health and Wellbeing Centre, with designated treatments and therapy rooms, surrounded by beautiful gardens with views across Derwentside.

How many in-patient beds?

Within the Helen McArdle wing, we have six individual rooms for in-patient care. We manage symptoms and give emotional support through compassionate holistic care, towards and through end-of-life. Patients may be referred for symptom/ pain management to enable and support them to return home. All referrals are from a healthcare professional who is involved in their care, with an anticipated length of stay of approximately 15 days.

How are patients admitted?

Patients for in-patient care, day services or bereavement counselling must be referred to Willow Burn Hospice by a healthcare professional. This can be a hospital doctor or nurse, or a member of the community team such as a district nurse, GP, or Macmillan Nurse.

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
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
