- Held a very well attended seminar about the selecting the most appropriate type of electric vehicle
- Opened our wonderful Community Orchard on several occasions to local people and outsiders including asylum seekers
- Responded to planning applications which fundamentally affect the village
- Coordinated a successful funding application on behalf of Churches
 Together and the Community Centres in Lanchester Burnhope to set up six "Warm Spaces"
- Continued to support activities to promote knowledge about the Roman Fort

This was the first time most of us met and we came from all over the village riding our various machines ranging from Mary in her fully road-legal Class 3 scooter to Liane in her hard-core manual wheelchair with no power-assistance. Nigel's power chair broke down thankfully before we met so avoided becoming stranded!

Apart from the beautiful weather it was great to be with like-minded people who share the same problems and concerns about access in the village. We know that many buildings are old and wheelchairs won't fit - that's okay – but where a business has made "reasonable accommodation" for wheelchair users then we want to promote that business and shout "Yay" and say "Thank you".

After a trundle up and down Front Street, where there was much discussion about the lack of pedestrian dropped kerbs (they're virtually all for vehicles) and the difficulties camber and slopes present to different members of the group including the alley access to the Community Centre, we all then finished with a refreshing beverage and so our first big



"Yay" and "thank you" goes to the staff and management of the Kings Head who accommodated us magnificently.

Our next rally / ride / roll / wheel is Saturday 24th June on the green from 2 to 4pm where we hope you'll join us and maybe try the 'wheelchair experience' for yourself.

Wildlife notes

Roe Deer

The 'rare' Roe? Sightings are infrequent and more reason to admire lan Appleby's photos. "I know they are here, but I never see them", I hear locals comment. In the 18th century, they weren't here. Hunted since prehistoric times, they became extinct in England, Southern Scotland and Wales. They have spread back from Scotland and re-introductions in East Anglia and Dorset. Still exploited as game, acts of parliament impose closed seasons on hunting.

Roe are the only deer species found in our area. They moult from grey/brown winter coats to a tan colour, have a white/ cream rump patch (shape differs between males and females) and a distinctive black moustache stripe. Females usually have a tuft of hairs on their rear (not a tail). Males grow antlers from buds over winter, the velvet rubbed off for spring, dropped by December.

They are most active at dawn and dusk, but feed at any time of day. Occurring in woodlands (particularly woodland edges), arable land, heathland, even urban/garden settings. Unlike

Red Deer (our other 'native' species) they are solitary, forming small groups in winter. The fawns remain with the doe until the following breeding season. Females are more tolerant of siblings or young close to their range. During early spring into summer, you might hear a strange 'barking' sound from the woods, a male Roe proclaiming his territory. 'Barking' is also an 'alarm' call.

The rut is from mid-July through August. The female holds fertilised eggs in her uterus, undeveloped until January (delayed implantation). Fawns are born mid-May/June, up to three, dappled with white spots/stripes for camouflage whilst lying in vegetation.

Deer have no native predators, so population management can maintain a sustainable, healthy population and protect the surrounding environment from over browsing, particularly the understory of native woodland and commercial interests of farmers/foresters.

My Journey to Recovery From Cancer – a warning about the dangers of too long spent in the sun.

It was back in February this year that I noticed a strange lump on my right forearm, but only thought it would end up being a cyst. Following an ultrasound scan the week after Easter at Durham University Hospital, I was quite amazed to be referred to the Freeman Hospital in Newcastle for a biopsy, especially as the ultrasound result showed up inconclusive.

The following week I was shocked to receive a telephone call to be informed that early results showed signs of cancer.

Following this, I had an MRI Scan. The type of cancer I have been told I have got is a myxofibrosarcoma, which is a cancer that begins in the connective tissue, it tends to happen in the arms and legs. MFS, as it is known for short, starts as a growth of cells that can grow into healthy body tissue and might cause a lump under the skin that grows slowly but is not often painful. While I await the news of the CT scan to find out if the cancer has spread, at the same appointment to get the result, I will have a pre-operation assessment. I will then begin two stages to have the cancer removed.

Stage One: On Monday 5th June, I go to the RVI Hospital in Newcastle, I will either be put to sleep

or just have my arm numbed. I will have the operation to have the lump/cancer removed, and have to stay in overnight. My arm will have dressings put on it but the wound will be left open, this is so the doctors can determine they have been successful in removing all the cancer. It will remain like this for one to two weeks, during which time I will have to have my dressings changed every two days. Stage Two: After one to two weeks, I will then go for the second and final stage. This operation will be the one in which my arm is reconstructed by taking a bit of skin from another area of my body and putting it on my arm. After this, I will need to spend a week in hospital and also have rehabilitation.

As things stand, I have been told that I luckily don't require any chemotherapy or radiotherapy, pending the result of the CT scan.

Please everyone, be aware of the dangers of the very hot sun in the coming weeks and get, if possible, a factor 50 sun lotion. Lee Morris

Remembering

Obituary, Brenda Winifred Craddock 22 September 1938 to 19 April 2023

Brenda Craddock moved to Lanchester in 1972 with her husband Stephen and baby daughter Philippa, joined the year after by her second daughter Stephanie. For 51 years she has been active throughout the Lanchester community, particularly with the All Saints church family where she ran the Sunday School for 27 years, led the Church Wives Group for c.50 years, organised weekly church room lunches, was a member of the Parochial Church Council, a Lav minister and on the Deanery Synod.

In her professional life, she had a true vocation, initially as a primary school teacher after qualifying in 1957 with a distinction in Education Principles and Practice. She worked in two Newcastle schools before having children. She took on the extra challenge of a secondary school in 1978, eventually becoming Head of Religious Education at Tanfield Comprehensive until retirement in 1998 following treatment for a brain haemorrhage. During her school life she was much loved by teachers and pupils alike, particularly her choir 'The Christian Singers'. Despite her small stature and sunny demeanour, she was still able to square up to the most unruly teenagers to get them to behave.

Following retirement in 1998 she used her time to gain new skills and learn, including graduating with a degree in Religious Studies from Newcastle

University at the age of 62. Among other things, she learned to play the euphonium in the Lanchester Brass Band, took art and writing classes and wrote for the Village Voice.

She was born and raised in the High Heaton area of Newcastle and her strong connection to the area was clear in a series of novellas she wrote between 2016 and 2021 that included detailed accounts of the history of Newcastle. Proceeds of the sale of the books were donated to charity, adding to the tens of thousands she has raised over the years for The Children's Society as a local representative. Nearly £700 was also raised at her funeral.

Her 84 years of life were full of service to others, but many remember her most for her kind blue eyes, her infectious smile, her joy in life and her wonderful outfits. She was a stylish lady and spent countless hours in the shops of Newcastle and London pursuing her passion for fashion.

Brenda died at Willow Burn Hospice overlooking the village she loved. Brenda's death will be mourned by the hundreds of people whose lives she touched, not least her loving husband Stephen, her devoted daughters Philippa and Stephanie, and adoring grandchildren Annabel and Adam. Her funeral on 17 May was attended by close to 200 people, in person and by Zoom, and the Church Wives Group and Mothers Union performed a guard of honour for her at the entrance to the All Saints Church.



Changes proposed to the County Council Divisions

The Local Government Boundary Commission has been reviewing the local authority divisions in County Durham and these will affect the way in which Lanchester is represented within the Durham County Council.

The purpose of an electoral review is to examine and propose new electoral arrangements for a local authority. They propose how many councillors are needed, how many wards or electoral divisions there should be, where their boundaries are and what they should be called, and how many councillors should represent each ward or division.

When carrying out an electoral review the Commission has three main considerations: improving electoral equality by equalising the number of electors that each councillor represents, ensuring that the recommendations reflect community identity, providing arrangements that support effective and convenient local government. They try to strike the best balance between these three considerations when making their recommendations.

Currently the Lanchester Ward is represented by two County Councillors and the ward goes as far as Muggleswick and Waskerley in the west and Holmside in the east. Under the new proposals, the new Lanchester Ward will essentially constitute Lanchester and Burnhope parishes and Maiden Law will become part of the Consett North ward. The Lanchester ward will be represented by one councillor in the future.

Councillor Doug Oliver has commented "Mike (McGaun) and I are currently reviewing the proposals, but our biggest concern at the moment is the removal of Maiden Law from Lanchester ward and putting it into Consett North, which we don't feel is a natural fit."

It's a while since we've been, but last time out we made the journey to the middle of Ebchester Bank to visit the Derwent Walk Inn. The weather was amazing, as were the views from the windows

- it was all looking good!

The staff were most welcoming, and we were soon settled with what turned out to be a really good menu - very varied - we were quite literally spoilt for choice. There was a two-course traditional roast Sunday lunch, all week, a main menu, a light and low menu - all dishes coming in under 400 calories. There was a grill, jackets, sandwiches, and burgers. Quite a number of dishes could come as a half portion - ideal for smaller appetites.

The service was excellent, the plates really hot - we were soon sampling piping hot meals.

Starter was delicious homemade vegetable and lentil soup.

Mains were: braised lambs liver and onions with crispy bacon in a red wine gravy with mash and vegetables (a light and low option!); Thai Katsu chicken curry with coconut milk, chillies and garlic with rice and chips; chilli con carne served with rice, spiced potato wedges and sour cream; pan roasted pork loin steak in a creamy peppercorn sauce with crisp battered black pudding served with fresh veg and mash; mince and dumplings with potatoes and vegetables; tandoori chicken tikka masala curry infused with cream and mango chutney served with rice and chips and garlic naan bread.

Desserts were Belgian waffles with butterscotch sauce, cream and ice cream. and ice cream.

It's been quite a while since we've been out, and everyone has enjoyed every single thing that has been ordered. We were most impressed!

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
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
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Poppy's walks

Good day readers and for this edition I am going to tell you about a walk my female human learnt when she joined her walking group. They meet weekly but she won't take me along because she claims I am a Disruptive Influence,

whatever that means. She did, however, agree to lead both myself and my male human on the same route one Sunday afternoon recently.

As you will know by now, I am Poppy, a Patterdale terrier who enjoys sharing her walks with Village Voice readers. This one starts in the car park of Ushaw College, not far from Lanchester. And by the way, the rhododendrons in the grounds there are quite spectacular at this time of year. We walk to the end of the drive and turn right, on the road leading back to Esh Village.

There is a footpath alongside the main road but after a few hundred yards we turn left at a junction opposite some derelict farm buildings which leads us downhill. On this part of the walk, I am kept on my lead because there is no footpath. This road is known as Broadgate Road. After another 200 yards or so we see a public footpath sign on the right, which we follow.

There I can be let off my lead if there are no livestock about. We walk across about four fields with spectacular views of the Deerness Valley on the left. I am more interested in sniffing the ground than admiring the views of course. After a while we reach a farmstead which is known as Hagg House farm. We turn right there, following the footpath signs, and follow a footstep which takes us on quite a steep climb which brings us to another footpath on the edge of Esh Village. We turn right there, walk through another farm, Low Esh Farm, and continue to follow the footpath over fields until we get back to the road between Esh and Bearpark. We cross that and go along a road called College Road until we reach a junction, which we take to the right and leads us alongside a wall back to the main road again, but this time nearer to the main entrance to Ushaw College. From there it is a five minute walk back to the car. The walk is timed to last 90 minutes and is about three miles long.

It certainly did my appetite no harm for I was ravenous when I got back home and quickly wolfed down my dinner!

Notes from the House

Since being elected, reversing the decades of slow decline and movement away of healthcare services in North West Durham has been one of my biggest priorities. Shotley Bridge Community Hospital, just round the corner, in particular has been beset by rising

costs of maintenance and downgrading over decades. Just last month, following years of campaigning by community groups, the money needed for the construction of a brand-new, cutting-edge community hospital to replace Shotley Bridge was confirmed in full as part of the Conservative Government's £20bn Hospital Building Programme.

This money is a game-changer. When I was elected it was clear a downgrade to a zero-bed facility was on the table. Now with this unprecedented investment there will be a doubling of the current capacity to the new 16-bed hospital. Chemotherapy services will be dramatically increased, making Shotley Bridge the county's lead for chemotherapy. In addition to this, there will be a state-of-the-art diagnostic hub, with a brand-new mobile CT and MRI scanner that will encourage easy access to early diagnosis, saving lives across our area. The Urgent Treatment Centre at the new facility will not only

be maintained but expanded. Furthermore, there will be an improved provision of women's services, primary and community care facilities on top of a better family health service provision all round

Better still, County Durham and Darlington NHS Foundation Trust are to use local apprentices for good, high-skill, high-wage jobs for local people in the hospital. Moreover, local builders and suppliers will be used as far as practicable in the construction. This means the new facility will provide a massive uplift before, during and after completion, felt right across our area. Despite the clear need for this investment, Shotley Bridge had only been mentioned twice in the previous 20 years in Parliament. I was determined to change this. Since my election it's been talked about 24 times and had its own debate after I secured time for it; I've had more one-on-one meetings with ministers about it than I can remember.

Thank you to the Government for this vote of confidence in our community. More importantly though, thanks to everyone who campaigned over the years and those that backed this campaign. I look forward to "spades in the ground" within the next 12 months.

While it is fantastic to see hard work pay off, what I will enjoy more is seeing the huge impact this will undoubtedly make to Lanchester and the surrounding area, both in its construction phase and also upon completion.

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The HUB Consett: Former Public House in Consett Transformed into Thriving Community Space

Nicola Jane Little, founder of the Mint Business Club, envisioned a new purpose for an old hotel in Consett, County Durham. Now known as The HUB Consett, the building has undergone a remarkable transformation, offering a range of facilities including a shop, hot-desking, event space, and office spaces. In addition, it serves as a vibrant community hub for individuals with neurodiverse conditions. Since its opening, The HUB has become a welcome fixture within the local community. Regular patrons fondly reminisce about the building's past, sharing stories of their visits to the former pub. Several visitors have even discovered personal connections, with some families having owned and operated the establishment during the 1980s. Nostalgic photographs adorn the walls, capturing the building's rich history. The Commercial Hotel, as it was originally known, held a significant role in Consett's heritage from 1837 to 1960. Later, it underwent a name change to the Braes Hotel until its recent revitalisation. As the first building in Consett to offer running water, it served as accommodation for individuals connected to the Consett Steel Works.

Over the past 12 months, The HUB has undergone an extensive renovation, with an investment of $\mathfrak{L}50,000$. The project received support from Durham County Council, which granted funding for essential exterior upgrades, including new windows, render, paint, and guttering. Notably, a talented local artist has contributed a captivating mural on the shutter, depicting the building's appearance in the 1900s.

The establishment now serves both the community and the business sector, operating under the umbrella of MINT Business Club Ltd and its associated social enterprise, Celebrate Difference Ltd. The top floor, once a flat and office space, has been thoughtfully redesigned to house five offices, a training suite, a media room, a small private meeting room, and a well-appointed kitchen and bathroom. The HUB has fostered numerous partnerships with local businesses, which utilise the space on a weekly basis. Notable collaborators include Durham Enable, Durham Works, and Villa Real, a local special education needs school. In addition to providing valuable resources and opportunities, The HUB also welcomes the community for daily shopping experiences.

Exciting events are on the horizon for The HUB. Furthermore, enquiries for the upcoming Autumn and Christmas Markets are now open, promising a seasonal experience for all. Small traders and artists from Lanchester are very welcome to join the markets.

As the manager of The HUB, Donna Tunney spearheads the operation, ensuring a seamless and fulfilling experience for all visitors.

History's most notable power nappers include Albert Einstein, Thomas Edison, and Winston Churchill, so treat yourself to a power nap, you will be in good company!





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
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

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All Saints' Primary School Lanchester

We always want to keep families and friends up to date with the fantastic learning taking place across All Saints'. We have our Twitter (@AllSaintsRC) and have recently set up a Facebook Page (follow us and share our page by searching All Saints' Catholic Primary School, Lanchester) but at All Saints', we really love our weekly class blogs on our website because they give a detailed overview (including photographs) about what our children have been learning that week. From our most recent blog: Nursery: It's been lovely to swap puddle suits for sun hats and sun cream in Forest School this half term. The children have continued to enjoy 'The Very Lazy Ladybird' story this week. Following the story, the children used trowels to collect mud to mix their own mud paint then they used sticks to apply spots to their ladybird pictures.

Reception: Last week we explored our planet using Google Earth. This week, we have been learning how the Earth moves around the sun to create day and night. In pairs, the children took turns to demonstrate how the Earth not only orbits the sun, but spins as it does so, meaning when we are facing the sun it is daytime and when we spin away from the sun it is night time. Interestingly, it is not daytime for everyone in the world at the same time!

Year One: We have been focussing on saying sorry this week. We acted out different situations that involved a wrong choice. Some of us thought of wrong choices like stealing another child's toy and destroying it, breaking personal equipment, physical harm and calling each other names. We then thought of ways of how to say sorry and how to show that we are sorry, just like Zacchaeus did in the Bible story (Luke 19: 1 – 10). Year Two: In Computing this week, we have used our music knowledge to make digital music. We used Chrome Music Lab to explore pulse and rhythm using the rhythm app. We know the pulse was the heartbeat of the music!

Year Three: To conclude our Greek work in History, we learned about the origin of the Olympic games. We discovered that the games began around 2,700 years ago and that events included discus, long jump, running, wrestling and chariot racing. We also found out that many of these events had no rules and competitors could be quite brutal! After that, we held our own Olympic games (with rules!) on the field. Everyone showed some fantastic sporting skills, and I spotted some potential Olympic athletes: well done to our worthy winners Luka and Emily. Their prize was a wreath of leaves, just like it would have been 2,700 years ago!

Year Four: In R.E. this week we have been learning about Islam. We read how Muslims have many different names for God and that their holy book is called the Qur'an.

Year Five: We have begun the design process for our CO2 powered cars in D&T on paper, ready to use TinkerCam to design 3D vehicles. We tried to keep every aspect of our vehicle as streamlined as possible!

Year Six: This week, some Year Five and Six children took part in a cricket competition. They all showed excellent sportspersonship, encouraged each other and demonstrated their outstanding cricket skills. I am thrilled to share with you that we won the whole competition and are now through to the next round which takes place after half term. On Wednesday afternoon, Year Six went to Shotley Bridge Tennis Club to take part in a skills afternoon. It was great fun and everyone loved being outside in the sunshine!

'History is not was, it is.' I have spoken to our children on numerous occasions about how they are part of history in the making. Shotley were bowled out for 159, Gohery and Renton taking three wickets each, 2 for Taylor and Pasindu. Most recently Lanchester racked up 250-9 against Eppleton with 79 by Graham Brinton and 49 by Luke McCabe before bowling them out for 236, Pasindu again taking 4 wickets with 3 each for Taylor and Renton. The results have put the team in second spot at this early stage. There have been comfortable cup wins over Crook and GEMs. Against Crook, Greg Patterson scored an unbeaten 78 in quick time, then against GEMs Graham Brinton scored an unbelievable 100 not out off just 38 balls in chasing down 117. This was Graham's sixth century at Lanchester. The seconds have won their two most recent matches in exciting fashion. At Shotley they won it with two balls remaining and then it was a last wicket win over Eppleton. The thirds have won one and lost one in the league and beaten Newcastle in the cup. Against Newcastle, 15-year-old Toby Somersall with 65 and 16 year old John McGilvray with 50 put on an opening stand of 116.
