# Parking charges at the Kings Head

Motorists who park in the King's Head car park may now face a parking fine unless they go inside the premises to log in their registration number at a machine near the bar.

The move is aimed at preventing non- customers from leaving their cars on the premises for hours on end – or even overnight.

But motorists do have up to an hour's free parking, courtesy of the management.

Should they wish to leave their vehicle in the car park while they do a quick shop in the village they can do so without charge, so long as they are back and out of the car park within the hour.

The development has received a mixed reaction from locals, with many accepting that the car park is on private land, and the proprietors have every right to discourage indiscriminate parking.

# Nature Notes – from our Wildlife Correspondent

#### Born and bred local - Buzzards

I have just returned from Malton with the memory of four Buzzards soaring overhead, prompting the choice for this month's text. I was waiting there to meet the horse trailer bringing two Exmoor ponies for their annual graze on the Nature Reserve. Time spent watching the sky yielded 80+ Swallows flying and lining up on the phone lines. They are preparing for their departure to warmer climes, reminding me that summer will soon be a memory. It will be months before they migrate back from Africa to breed here again next year.

The Buzzards bred in nearby woods and successfully reared two flight apprentices, sampling the thermals with their parents. They've made a marked recovery since the mid-20th century, when they were poisoned due to agricultural chemicals getting into the food chain. Average lifespan is 12 years and breeding age is usually 3. Male's 'roller coaster' display attracts a mate, who lays 2-4 eggs, taking 34 days to hatch and another 50-ish before the young fledge.

Equipped with a sharp hooked beak and talons to match, it's perhaps surprising that they opt for a lazier approach to dining and search for carrion to eat. They do hunt small mammals, rabbits, and birds (up to the size of a wood pigeon). If food is scarce, they'll resort to earthworms, spending time foraging on the ground.

Listen for their eerie calls, almost a mewing 'kee-yaaa' cry. Easier to notice while the young still fly with the adults. The great photos of the buzzard were taken by our local photographer, lan Appleby.

Guide to surviving Winter (part one)

Migrate, that's my advice. Fatten up for hibernation is an option for some, perhaps grow a warmer coat. But where do all the invertebrates go? Some butterflies overwinter as adult butterflies, hiding in crevices, they usually have very dark underwings so they can hide camouflaged e.g. Peacock and Small Tortoiseshell. Many insects survive as eggs, larvae or pupae waiting out the winter until they can safely emerge as adults. Some moths tough it out still flying through winter. August and September was a good time to see large caterpillars ready to pupate. Two distinctive ones are the Elephant-hawk moth and the Puss moth. The former is aptly named as it looks like an elephant's trunk, but with scary eye-like marks to warn off would-be munchers. They fatten up on plants like Rosebay Willowherb. The pupae overwinter in fragile cocoons in leaf litter, or below the surface. The Puss moth caterpillar is even better equipped for defence, it waves its colourful head and twin tail points. If that isn't a sufficient deterrent, it squirts formic acid. They make a hard cocoon spun on a trunk or post, which includes wood chewed by the larva, which feeds on willows and Poplar tree species until large enough to pupate.

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# **Greencroft Forest Park Woodland creation public consultation.**

There is a proposal for the creation of woodland on the former Greencroft estate. We contacted the consultants for this proposal, Silviculture, and they have sent us this press release.

"Working alongside the Forestry Commission and the North East Community Forest we are looking to transform the former Greencroft Park Estate from mixed agricultural use to a forest park, similar to the size and scope of Chopwell. It will provide a whole host of benefits to both the local community and the wider UK economy.

The proposed scheme looks to create 400 ha of mixed productive conifer and broadleaf woodland that exceeds the requirements of the UK Forestry Standard. A range of surveys, including independent breeding bird, vegetation (NVC) and archaeology, have guided the design principles to envision a forest that complements the existing landscape. We are looking at opportunities to increase access for the local community, allowing them to experience the forest as it grows. We aim to use local labour skilled in forestry to deliver the project, keeping money in the local economy. As the forest grows, the productive species will provide sustainable timber for the construction sector, helping to reduce our reliance on imported wood. Furthermore, they will sequester carbon which will be stored in future buildings and furniture. By-products from harvesting of the trees may end up in local markets such as the new Sustainable Aviation Fuel plant planned on Teesside, or at the Egger plant in Hexham, helping to further support local employment. The scheme will be designed to connect priority habitats with native broadleaves helping to establish wildlife corridors across the landscape. The productive element of the project will also provide shelter for over wintering birds and support wider conservation efforts for Red Squirrel by creating suitable future habitat.

Woodland creation will also help mitigate flooding in Lanchester by decreasing surface water runoff into the Newhouse and Stockerley Burns. Broadleaf planting along these burns will further help mitigate flooding whilst also enhancing biodiversity along the watercourses.

We are consulting with local authorities and parish councils and are now inviting the residents in the local area to come along to our engagement events to meet us and talk over our plans and help us design a forest that works for the community. We will be at the Lanchester Community Centre on: Friday 13th of October 2pm to 7pm, Saturday 14th of October 10am to 2pm."

We'll report on how the consultation went and look forward to comments from our readers.

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
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#### Poppy's walks

Good day readers and this month's walk is not for the faint-hearted. It does contain a steep incline, but the views are worth it. At least that is what the Humans say, I am too busy sniffing the undergrowth to worry about the views.

As you will know by now, I

am Poppy, a Patterdale terrier who shares with Village Voice readers the walks I lead my Humans on.

Starting from the village centre, this one proceeds east along Durham Road, although you could always walk along the railway path and turn up at Malton towards Durham Road that way.

When we reach the outskirts of the village, we cross Durham Road and proceed along the footpath until a junction which says private road to the left, but it is ok to walk on it. When we get to the top, we come to a place called Manor House and we go behind the farmsteads and walk along a path marked with yellow arrows. This takes us between fields, one with goats on a field on our right.

We follow the arrows, climbing all the time, until we reach a stile which we cross to lead us into woods.

I am allowed off my lead in the woods and we continue to climb, so the Humans get all red-faced and breathless, but insist the exercise is doing them good! We are walking within sight of the TV mast now, but when we get to a point where footpaths meet at a sort of crossroads we turn left.

We are then walking in a place known as Black Wood. If we

We are then walking in a place known as Black Wood. If we continued along the well-marked path all the way we would get to the main Lanchester to Burnhope road, but after a spell we see another path to our left and take it downhill, all the while looking at a panoramic view of Lanchester.

We continue down the path until we can hear the traffic on Peth Bank. Instead of joining Peth Bank we turn left on another footpath, and this brings us into a field.

We cross this field and enter another one, a cornfield. From there we can see houses in front of us so we walk towards the houses along the edge of the cornfield. Suddenly we spot a cut which takes us into a housing estate at Deneside, next to a smart looking children's play area. We turn right along Deneside then through a ginnel which takes us onto Manor Grange and then back onto Durham Road.

We cross the road and walk through Valley Grove back onto the railway path, and from there back to the centre of the village. The walk takes about 90 minutes and parts are off the beaten track, but well worth the effort.



### **Notes from the House**

Recently, I have been out and about going to every town and village right across North West Durham as part of my Summer Surgery Tour. Over the course of two weeks, this involved over 50 stops speaking to constituents, community groups, business owners

and many more. Naturally, some of the highlights were the Lanchester stops, as well as the beautiful surrounding villages of Burnhope and Maiden Law.

In my job I get a unique insight into every nook and cranny of life in our towns and villages. What renews my drive is that, whilst I heard a range of weird and wonderful stories from people of every walk of life, everyone was so friendly, optimistic, and welcoming. It is obviously a cliché that northerners are open and welcoming, but for me it has more than just a grain of truth in it. I can certainly think of some Members of Parliament who could learn a thing or two! Going to every town and village in our area, you get a sense of the subtly different character, traditions, and way of life in each one. However, what they all have in common is the strong community spirit that is all-too-easily forgotten elsewhere

in the country. From the community sports clubs to art fairs to village meetings, you can almost feel it in the air. However, nowhere is this more apparent than at the smaller agricultural shows and county fairs where you can actually see the whole community pulling together.

It was particularly nice showing some of my Parliament team around our area. Whenever they come up, they are always gobsmacked by the amazing views we have right on our doorstep. North West Durham undoubtedly has some of the best and most dramatic landscapes in the UK. While I take it for granted because I live here, it is a real privilege to live surrounded by natural beauty every day. Weeks like this are a good time to take stock of how lucky we are.

Members of Parliament are elected to represent the people of their constituency. All too often MPs can get wrapped up in listening to what people who shout the loudest have got to say. Going around to every town and village, no matter how small, and understanding what people actually think is such an important part of the job. I will definitely take back what I've seen, heard and learnt to Westminster and look forward to many more visits over the months to come.

# **Henry Dancer Days wins Lottery!**

The National Lottery Community Fund has awarded local charity Henry Dancer Days £127,000 over the next 3 years to support their work with children with cancer. The funds are earmarked for storytelling projects in paediatric oncology wards throughout the UK in Newcastle, Leeds, Sheffield, Liverpool, Manchester and London.

Henry Dancer, who died at only 12 from Osteosarcoma, is remembered throughout the village, no more so than at Lanchester EP and St Bede's where he was a pupil. Henry's mum, Jane Nattrass, has devoted her life to helping other families in the same situation as they navigate the treatment and loss of a child. She says,

"The storytellers we employ are professional actors and workshop leaders who distract children and families from their treatment and often the boredom of frequent hospital stays. One young patient having bloods taken explained it well,

"I didn't notice the finger prick 'til after 'cos Carmel was making me laugh about poo!"

This illustrates the level of literature we use. Books like, "How Much Poo does an Elephant do?" and, "The Burp that Saved the World" when read well, then workshopped and played with, help children to forget what is going on for a moment and escape into their own imaginations, thinking of something else. Something funny.

Parents and carers benefit too, whether having time to call family and friends, have a shower, shed a few unseen tears, or simply enjoy seeing their child being a child (rather than "the patient") and having fun." The charity has now raised over £1,000,000 to help struggling families. The cost of having a child in treatment is over £730 per month (Cancer Research UK 2023) and Jane is now desperately fundraising to continue the Hardship Support scheme which Henry Dancer Days delivers throughout the UK. She explains.

"On founding Henry Dancer Days, I felt it important to put a smile on the face of a sick child and give a parent a sigh of relief. Our Hardship Support is key to this, and we still need to bring in the funds. When we began, parents would use our help to enjoy a day out or a treat. In 2023, we're paying for basic household bills and travel costs, which is so sad. We've given 742 grants and there are always more families in need."
