





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A NEW CIBORIUM FOR LANCHESTER PARISH CHURCH

On Monday 15th June at the Monday evening Eucharist service a special little ceremony took place. Canon Peter Waterhouse blessed a solid silver ciborium. The latter is a vessel, which holds the wafers for Holy Communion and so is used at every Eucharist or Holy Communion service.

There were 7 special ladies present to witness the ceremony together with other members of the congregation and these ladies make up our catering team who have worked very hard for our church in this capacity for many years. They are shown below.

The actual origin of the team dates back to a Miss Ruth Shotton who lived in the Garths. She asked for people in our church to help her to provide a special tea for the many people in Lanchester who had been so kind to her during an illness. Mrs. Peggy Atkinson and Mrs Sara Allison needed no persuading to help and soon gathered a group of ladies to help them. Miss Shotton gave a donation and that was the beginning of the fundraising side of the catering section of our church. They were involved in fundraising for the Chapter House, which was added to the church 20 years ago. The Flower Festival, a big fundraiser for the Chapter House, was held together by the Catering Team. Peggy Atkinson and her team worked tirelessly to provide refreshments for three days, which is a tremendous feat in itself. The work carries on today though the number in the

team has reduced over the years through illness and moving away, but the 'magnificent seven' were there on Monday to see the blessing of the ciborium which had been bought with the money they had raised by their catering over the years. They have in the past purchased china, cutlery, table cloths and even a new boiler which has proved invaluable in the kitchen. The ciborium of course is very special and it was in 2007 that they asked our vicar if there was something they could buy for the church. It has been engraved on the vessel that the catering team bought the ciborium which of course will now be used for many, many years to come. It will be part of the history of the church and is a symbol of the commitment of a group of people living out their Christian Faith and being 'Living Stones' of Lanchester Parish Church. (5) electrical appliances, 1 plug 1 socket unless using a trailing socket. Always check electric leads are in good condition and make sure correct fuses are used.

"FIRE KILLS", if a fire starts use your escape route then phone the fire service when you are out. Closing doors helps contain fire. Smoke alarms are very important, always check your batteries and that the alarms are sited in the right places. You can arrange a free Home Fire Safety Check and have smoke alarms fitted anytime of the year by phoning 0191 332 4222 or visiting www.ddfire.gov.uk. 


