



A MESSAGE FROM THE HOUSE.

Happy New Year.

As I headed back to Parliament I reflected on a number of notable events that happened at the end of last year or during the holidays - the tuition fees debate, the Oldham and Saddleworth by-election and receiving a polling card for our own byelection to Lanchester Parish Council.

I had been notified that although 50 MPs had put in to speak in the tuition fees debate I would be called. I sat in the Chamber throughout the debate, in which many impassioned speeches were made, but did go outside once and was shocked by what I saw. We knew, in the chamber, that there was unrest and violence outside and had received texts telling us that Parliament was 'shutdown' with no way in and no way out, but I was unprepared for what I saw. It was dark, the air was full of acrid smoke and odour, I could see fires and flares going off. The noise was awful, the sound of

barking and helicopters overhead. I could see lines and lines of police in riot gear. I found the experience frightening, more so because we have not seen this kind of violence on our streets for such a long time. The vote when it came was very close and so extremely disappointing for me. I campaigned against tuition fees long before coming into Parliament but what is happening now, with students being asked to pay up to £9,000 a year in tuition fees is, in my view, both economically and morally short-sighted and just plain wrong! To add insult to injury when I was finally able to leave Parliament, between two lines of riot police, there were protestors screaming 'Tory scum' at me. Ispenttime in Oldham and

PARISH COUNCIL MEETING 15TH DECEMBER 2010

Cllr Johnson welcomed range of additional take-up of services. Lanchester. Mr Tindale two representatives of Trinity Medical Properties Limited who have proposed the surrender of the Parish Council's lease in part of land adjacent to Park House Surgery with a view to extending the building. Cllr Mike Wardle gave Members a report regarding the proposal for the redevelopment of the Lynwood House site. The Lynwood Companywill be the parent body and lease space to the partner organisations. Proposals for the site include:

(i) A medical centre to incorporate the existing Park House Surgery GP practice but to provide sufficient additional space for a wide range of additional treatments;

(ii) The medical centre to incorporate the existing Lanchester pharmacy which would provide a

wellbeing clinics which it cannot provide at the present time due to space constraints by sharing consulting rooms with the surgery;

(iii) Shared space and offices available to local community groups;

(iv) Creation of 20 bed nursing unit for adults and older adults with long term mental health problems, together with an 8 bed nursing unit for women giving a total of 28 beds:

(v) Creation of 29 twobedroom sheltered apartments for the elderly by Derwentside Homes. The centre will meet the health and social care needs of residents of Lanchester and the surrounding area. At the centre will be a Bistro which will also operate as the reception area and which will be the focus for health promotion and

Cllr Wardle believes that a decision with Durham County Council will be made in the near future. However, the rep of the Trinity Medical Properties pointed out that the application for a grant, available for either project, must be made by the end of March and he would appreciate a decision on the surrender of the lease as soon as possible. He also pointed out that Park House Surgery would have to repay a large sum of money to Trinity if they were to vacate that building. It was agreed that a decision would be deferred for a little longer or until the decision of the County Council is known. Time Bank. Budgets 2010/2011 and 2011/2012. These reports, prepared by the Lead Officer were given to Members for discussion, It was agreed that at least one year's expenditure ought to be held in reserve. Members are reluctant to increase the precept but this year the Parish Council may not receive the usual £6,000 from the County Council and there will be the expense of the forthcoming Parish Council election. Cllr Burton also pointed out that Central Government may, in the future, prohibit an increase in precepts. decision Α was postponed until the January meeting.

Questions from Members. Cllr Mrs Gray asked what could be done about the state of the pavements due to the amount of snow and ice. It was suggested that the Head Teacher of the schools contact the County Council and that the incumbents of the three churches contact Action Line.

Cllr Mrs Gray also stated that St Cuthbert Care NE has appointed а Community Development Worker to look at facilities to be used by the socially needy.

The problem of Bede College students parking in the nearby estate was discussed and it was decided that this matter would be taken to the School Governors on behalf of the Parish.

PARISH COUNCIL MEETING 11TH JANUARY 2011

Police Report: Burglary 2, Lanchester is still under Maureen Bennett, IND Anti-social behaviour 4, Theft 1, Criminal Damage 2.

PACT (Police and Communities Together) meetings: 23rd February, 23rd March, 27th April, 25th May and 22nd June, all at 7.15 pm for one hour at Lanchester Community Centre. Police will no longer attend Parish Council Meetings but will attend PACT meetings with other agencies and give their report at PACT. Members agreed that this is disappointing as they believe that the Police can learn far more by attending the Parish Council meetings.

Correspondence: Members had previously received letters from Durham County Council in relation to a consultation on North Road, Durham and also with regard to the Green Belt of the City in relation to site assessment. One of the 6 sites under consideration is at Sniperley and Members that this would impinge on the nature reserve in that area, would leave an extremely narrow green belt strip and would seriously affect traffic flow. The Lead Officer is to send a response to County Council.

LINK. The latest newsletter and information was given to Members. Cllr Burton informed Members that present funding will cease in April and it will be another year before the next funding starts so he is hoping that the County Council will provide funding in the meantime.

Area Action Partnership and Parish Council Committee: priorities were Road Safety continuing but as observation not action. Old People were the top priority and the AAP is looking at ways to assist. The Gateway project for scrutiny. The Young People's Group is looking at ways to put in money and more progress has been made during the past 12 months.

Precept: Members considered the report which had been prepared by the Lead Officer and after lengthy discussion it was reluctantly agreed that it should be increased by 2.5%. Although some Members felt that residents might find an increase difficult to meet in these hard times, the withdrawal of the usual £6,000 grant from the Council, the possibility that an increase may be banned in the future plus rising costs generally and inflation forced Members to make this decision. Fortunately the County Council has agreed to make a one-off payment this year of \pounds 3,000 towards the cost of the election.

PARISH COUNCIL PLANNINGMEETING 21st DECEMBER 2010 **Planning Applications.** Members considered the following:-Application to vary Condition 3 of Planning Permission to enable part of garage, stable and storage building to be used as a residential annex with external alterations at Woodlea Manor, Browney Bank, Lanchester.

It was resolved that members object to the application as a detached residential development in the open countryside. If approval was to be given, a condition be made that it can only be used as an annex to the main dwelling and not as a separate residential dwelling.

Erection of a new-build 4 bedroom detached dwelling with integral garage on vacant plot within residential estate on land to the north west of 12 Ashdown Grove.

Members of the public spoke and raised concerns and objections to the application, similar to those raised at the meeting on 12th October.

RESOLVED. That Members object to this development for the following reasons:

this is a significant **Decisions** (i) enlargement of the previous, now expired planning application which Members feel they are unable to support;

the proposed (ii) development is too large for the small plot, the scale of the proposed development being inappropriate to the size of the plot;

(iii) although the aboricultural report states that no trees are to be removed, this does not concur with the plans and Members would object to any trees being removed; there is concern (iv) over distorted pruning of the trees to enable the development to take place and would request that the County Council produce a separate aboricultural assessment;

the design of the (v)dwelling is not sympathetic to surrounding dwellings;

Members refer to (vi) village the Design Statement part 19 4A.

Members were informed that there had been a revised plan submitted for this application which they considered to be much more sympathetic in design and size. It was recognized that the plan was much closer to the original design from Shepherd Homes and felt that the revised plans addressed many of the concerns regarding size, trees, design etc that the previous designs had raised.

RESOLVED that Members support the application subject to building materials being consistent with those of surrounding dwellings and the County Council undertake an aboricultural assessment to ascertain that no trees will be removed and that the trees will not be affected by type development.

Demolition of current hospice building and erection of a new 6 bed hospice with associated offices, day care facilities and wellbeing spa with associated landscaping (resubmission) at Maiden Law Hospital, Lanchester Road, Maiden Law.

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
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Precious Moments caught forever

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Gardening in February

This month is probably not the best in the garden but, looking on the bright side, it only has 28 days and is the darkest hour before the dawn. The snow and ice has probably kept you, like me, inside but our gardens have suffered. Now is the time to catch up and enjoy some much needed fresh air.

Borders

Snowdrops, for me, are the harbingers of spring and you can rely on them to welcome the new season no matter what the weather. Once flowering is over it is time to divide any congested clumps. Snowdrops, planted when their leaves are still green, establish more successfully than dry, dormant ones. Also, in February, continue to refirm any plants in your borders that have been lifted by frost. In mild, wet weather, check for slugs


and pick off any that you find on vulnerable plants. In my borders begonias provide me with a beautiful show all summer and February is a good time to plant their tubers in pots keeping them just moist until the first shoots begin to show.

Vegetables

February is a good time to cover part of your plot with polythene or cloches to warm the soil for early sowings. You can sow several crops this month. Vegetables that can be sown in pots in a greenhouse or on a windowsill to transplant later include onions, leeks, celery, cauliflowers and Brussels Sprouts. For many of these it can be useful to sow them in 'roottrainers' to encourage good root before growth transplanting. You can also sow tomatoes indoors at 60-70F for raising in a cool greenhouse but care must be taken not to let them go 'leggy' in the spring. Additionally chilli and sweet peppers can be sown and raised in this manner.


General Tasks

If you have not already done so, general tasks that you might consider for this month include: ordering seeds and summer bulbs by mailorder; giving your flower pots and seed trays a good wash; cleaning algae and moss from paths and drives; sending petrol mowers for their annual service; sprinkling gritty compost over lawns; and ordering seedlings and young plants for pots and bedding displays. If you can't get outside you can tidy your shed and don't forget to clean and oil your tools if you haven't already done so.

RECIPE OF THE MONTH

Venison (or Beef) Casserole

Serves 4 Ingredients carrots. 2 roughly chopped ¹/₄ of a turnip, roughly chopped 1 onion, roughly chopped 2 celery sticks, roughly chopped oil and butter for frying 1 garlic clove, crushed into large chunks 2 tbsp plain flour, seasoned with salt and pepper

1 tbsp redcurrant jelly 225ml dry red wine (Rioja is good)

225ml beef stock sprig of thyme bay leaf Method

1. Heat oven to 180C/fan160C/gas 4. Fry the vegetables in a little oil and butter in a heavybased casserole for 4-5 mins until golden. Tip in the garlic and fry for a $\frac{1}{2}$ kg venison or beef, cut further min, then set aside. Put the meat into a 2 plastic bag with seasoned flour and shake to coat. Add a little more oil and

butter to the pan, then fry the meat over high heat, stirring now and then,

until well browned. Don't crowd the pan - cook in batches if necessary. Set aside with the vegetables. 3 Add the redcurrant jelly and wine to the pan, and bring to the boil, scraping up all the bits that have stuck to the bottom. Pour in the stock, then add the thyme, bay leaf, meat and vegetables. Season if you like and bring to the boil. Cover and transfer to the oven for 1¹/₂ hours or until tender. Remove from the oven and check for seasoning.





KALA PATTAR AND BACK, FOR WILLOW BURN

ambition in November 2010 when I trekked through the Himalayas in Nepal to Kala Pattar, a ridge looking across to Mount Everest and down onto Everest Base Camp. I travelled to Kathmandu, and then into Lukla airport recognised as being the most dangerous airport to fly into due to flights having to skirt the edge of mountains before dropping onto the short runway which has a 60 metre slope.

The trek team, made up of eleven trekkers, a head sherpa, or Sirdar, three other sherpas and nine porters, followed the route of the Dudh Khosi River through pine forests for a day before starting the climb up to Namche Bazaar, at 11,300 feet it is the largest village on the route to Base Camp.

I fulfilled a long held Onourfirst acclimatisation play involving an old day we climbed up to the Everest Hotel and enjoyed our first spectacular views of Everest from its terrace. We staved in 'tea houses' along the route with bedrooms that I describe as 'plywood bed boxes': each box only holding two small single beds and a kit bag. The beds were wooden frames covered by a very thin mattress. I was really warm in my sleeping bag even though I woke most mornings to rub ice off the windows to enjoy the fantastic mountain scenery.

A very memorable day was spent at the Mani Rimdu festival at Thyangboche monastery watching the monks dressed in ceremonial robes and masked dancers celebrate. Everyone, especially the old women and young children, let out roars of laughter during a comedy

sherpa and someone acting as a fool.

The highlight of the trek was climbing to the top of Kala Pattar which, at 5545 metres - 18,200 feet, looks down onto Base Camp. The views across to Everest and the rest of the mountain range are spectacular, and we were fortunate to be blessed with clear blue skies on every morning and through most days. The climb was exhausting and I was one of only half of the group that made it to the top. I lost 10% of my bodyweight whilst I was away.

Our return route took us high over the Cho La pass across a glacier and into another valley, then onto Gokyo. The weather changed and we descended past the Gokyo lakes in falling snow, but it all added to the wonderful experience. We had a taste

of village life in Khumjung where we visited a very old monastery and a school founded by Sir Edmund Hillary. I watched a local farmer ploughing his field with a wooden plough pulled by a yak, his two daughters following him picking up the few potatoes that were raised to the surface.

As well as fulfilling an ambition, I did the trek to raise funds for Willow Burn Hospice.
