YOUR VIEWS ON NHS STROKE SERVICES

consultation on hyperacute stroke care for people in County Durham and Darlington was launched on 20th June and will run until 11th September 2011.

NHS County Durham and Darlington is proposing that hyperacute stroke services are consolidated on one site. At the moment, the service is provided at the University Hospital of North Durham and Darlington Memorial Hospital by County Durham and Darlington NHS Foundation Trust. which runs both hospitals during normal working hours. The two sites work on an alternating week rota to provide out of hours cover

Hyperacute services are one of the most critical components of stroke care that patients need when they are at their most seriously ill. National standards say to a stroke unit where there is access to specialist stroke consultants and where brain imaging and clotbusting drugs are readily available.

Doctors, nurse and managers in County Durham have analysed various care options and believe that providing hyperacute services over the two hospital sites is not sustainable for the future. Those of us who knew Peter well are very accustomed to his infectious wit and sense Together' a joke for any occasion


them. It is this sense of humour, together with his general, cordial disposition and his caring ministry, that has endeared Peter to many, many people.

To host such an event was an honour for the club, and a great boost in its Centenary Year.







Since then a great deal of work has been done to produce their second book about the legendary Roman Fort off Cadger Bank. 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A MESSAGE FROM THE HOUSE ...

Many of you have contacted me over the last few weeks regarding the disgraceful phone hacking scandal, the investigation by the Metropolitan police and the proposed BSkyB takeover. I am sure that like me many of you have struggled to comprehend the things that we are being told. What started out as reports of phone hacking by journalists of politicians and celebrities escalated to has unbelievable heights with allegations about listening into and deleting messages from the mobile phone of a murdered child, families of soldiers killed overseas serving this country and terrified messages left by families on the answer phones of victims of terrorism. A full judge led

inquiry into the phone hacking scandal will now Murdoch has withdrawn his bid for BSkyB. This is a victory for the decent people up and down the country who have been appalled by the revelations of the phone hacking scandal and the failure of those in charge at the time to take responsibility.

On another issue more closely related to our village, last week in Parliament MPs voted to get rid of the Agricultural Wages Board (AWB). I voted against. The AWB is a small body that was set up in 1948, costs the Government nothing and sets wages and conditions for 140,000 agricultural workers in England, around 3,360 of whom are employed in the North

East and 260 in North West Durham, including be carried out and Rupert those who work on the farms in and around Lanchester. Agricultural workers are amongst the lowest paid workers and the abolition of the AWB will lead to lower wages in the countryside, and a worse deal for farm workers. That is why I voted to keep the AWB and support a fair deal for those who work in the countryside, and will continue to campaign on this in the near future.



Maiden Law is third in the AAP's priority list based upon statistics provided by the Police and Highways Department of the

Council. Representatives from the Police, Highways and the AAP have worked closely with Greencroft Parish Council to form an initial working group with somne interested members of the public. The Highways Department has produced an initial design and it's now time to consult with residents in the Greencroft Parish area. The Parish Council is inviting residents in this parish area to join them on the recreational area opposite the Three Horse Shoes on **Sunday 7th August** between 11.00 am and 1.00 pm to look at the plans. The Parish Council Chairman, Colin Bell, said, "Speeding through Maiden Law is a major problem and this

project's aim is to define the entrances and exits to the village so that drivers are made aware they are entering a residential area. Gardening in August

August is a time that revolves around holidays: fine and warm weather and visits to the beach and countryside. After all the hard work of spring and early summer we can go on holiday without worrying so long as there is a helpful neighbour to water our vegetables and containers. If you are not going away you can offer to do this task for your neighbour.

Borders

If you have returned from holiday to find that your baskets and pots look dry, straggly and past their best, think about starting afresh with some autumn and winter plants like pansy, viola and primula. The important jobs for this month include: pruning summerflowering shrubs over 3 years old as they finish flowering; removing the faded flowers of annuals and late-flowering plants like dahlias to encourage further flowering; giving topiary plants like buxus a trim to keep them in shape; pinching out the growing tips of fuchsia to increase the number of shoots that can be used for cuttings; and, after cutting back the stems of perennials, giving them a liquid feed.

Vegetable Plot

August is a good time to harvest shallots and onions. Runner beans tend to be my easiest crop but remember to keep picking both these and courgettes and water them both every few days to keep them fruiting. Any outdoor tomatoes need to

be stopped by snipping off the tops once they have developed three or four trusses. This can be done by making a cut in the stem about two leaves above the uppermost truss. Potatoes of second cropping varieties like Carlingford or Charlotte, planted now in large pots or bags (which are still on sale in DIY stores) can be put in a cold greenhouse in October and provide a harvest for Christmas. 

The evening passed so quickly with pupils playing a variety of brass instruments performing pieces of music from Grade 2 to Grade 8 which they had to pass for their examinations.



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LIVING WATERWAYS

Lanchester EP School welcomed Michael Rogers, Durham Wildlife Trust, and Sue Charlton, Development Officer for the Parish Council into the school for their Creativity Week. The purpose was to raise awareness of local rivers and ponds and the wildlife in them. The funding was provided jointly by the aforementioned 'Trust' and the 'Parish'.

This was a whole school project so the teaching in the nature reserve on site had to be done in small year groups which took a week. Three ponds were created by digging holes in the ground and inserting firm plastic liners as the clay soil was unsuitable for natural ponds.

Excited children enjoyed wearing gardening

gloves, picking up spades and trowels and making sure the ponds were level. When finished the pond would be filled with aquatic plants and the wildlife would then form naturally over time. Many frogs had already been seen in the reserve as if waiting for the opportunity for a new home.

Children were involved in a question and answer session with Sue Charlton and Michael Rogers and seemed to have considerable knowledge. Questionnaires were given out at the end of the project to complete a survey of garden ponds and those in the vicinity of the homes of the Further children. information about this project appears below.

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
