JOHN GEDDES - FORMER LANCESTRIAN

John now 91 and partially sighted, is a very interesting man who has written a book about his boyhood memories of living in Lanchester. This can be found in the local library.

He requested an interview with the Village Voice as he thought that our readers may be interested in some historical information about the village and also to talk about a couple of things that were on his mind recently.

He was born at 8 Ford Street, on 27th July 1920. He went to the Parochial Church School in 1925 and was baptised by Rev L Heatherington at All Saints Parish Church. He moved to Snook Acres Farm, Witton Gilbert in November 1932, where he still lives happily today with his wife, Jean.

John's father worked at no trace of it has ever Burnhope Colliery until the general strike of 1926 when so many people were out of work. He decided to open the first Fish Shop in Lanchester in the same premises where it is today. The tenancy for the shop was secured from Mrs Brydson, a local property owner during that era. However there was a problem which has always remained in John's mind. There was difficuly in installing the new range. It transpired that the chimney was blocked by a crucifix, plus skull and crossbones!

The crucifix was later given to two sisters named Lynch who lived in Durham, on condition that it was passed on to Minsteracres. However, that never happened and

been found since. John has spent most of his life in farming, first in Lanchester at Manor House Farm which his father rented from Harry Nicholson, and then on to the aforementioned Snook Acres. During the war years John spent 6 years in the RAF Regiment as a Ground Gunner before returning to his former life. Although still happily residing at Witton Gilbert his heart firmly remains where he grew up and spent his boyhood years -Lanchester.





MAKING MONEY

Lanchester Partnership Green Group organised the Energy Fair which amongst other things showed residents the financial and the green benefits of having photovoltaic (PV) cells installed on their roofs. These cells generate electricity when the sun shines, and in the intervening 12 months at least 8 properties in Lanchester have had them fitted. On Thursday 6th October the Green Group organised a talk in the Social Club about them. Dave Smith, who had his installation completed in April this year, gave an excellent presentation on how the cells work and how much electricity the cells could produce. He explained how the electricity supply companies pay the house owner for the electricity generated. Dave also talked about how long it took to install the cells and the research he did before committing. Mike Gladstone briefly explained how quickly his PV installation had been Lanchester.

actual output seemed to be exactly in line with the predictions. Paul Shepherd then talked about the issues he had with fitting PV cells onto a slate roof and Richard Young explained how the supplier to the Social Club had installed cells on a flat roof.

Richard then opened the door to the room where the system is connected to the national grid to show the audience this part of the installation. Dave. Mike and Paul invited members of the audience to visit their homes to see their installations.

35 people attended the meeting and for those who had been thinking about installing PV cells it was really useful to hear at first hand other people's experiences. Given the interest it seems likely that over the next 12 months even more PV cells will be appearing in our village, all helping to reduce the carbon footprint of

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

Gardening in November

This month isn't exactly awash with colour. November is the time for fireworks in the gloom, an explosion of vermillion leaves and a multitude of The lovely herries coloured leaves of autumn have now fallen to the ground resulting in millions of them that need raking-up to make a beautiful soil-conditioner in a year or two's time.

Borders

Jobs for this month in your borders are those of tidying after summer and preparing for winter. So, finish cutting down late flowering perennials such as phlox to ground level and cover perennial plants with a mulch of compost or other organic material to

stop frost penetrating the soil. Check pots and bowls of bulbs being forced for Christmas ensuring that they don't dry out or become waterlogged and move them to a light, cool position when leaves reach about an inch in height. It is a good time to plant violas and wallflowers to provide some good winter colour. **Fruit and Vegetables**

Jobs in the vegetable plot for this month include cutting down autumnfruiting raspberries to ground height and continuing to harvest kale, cabbage, spinach and Jerusalem artichokes and the first of the Brussels sprouts. General

The final bounty of the

year lies in the form of fallen leaves. Don't just throw them away or burn them, but turn them into an excellent, rich soil conditioner. Collect them either by hand or by sucking them up or by mowing and shredding them. The easiest way to compost leaves is to leave them in the corner of the garden to rot down, but it's better to build a leaf bin out of four strong posts and chicken wire. For smaller quantities, chop up damp leaves, pack them firmly into old compost bags and fold over the top to retain moisture. The resultant leaf mould will be of benefit to most areas of the garden.

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
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


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




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A NIGHT AT THE OSCARS


