A MESSAGE FROM THE HOUSE ...

Just when you think you have the hang of it ... I thought I was having a really good week in Parliament. I had been drawn out for Communities and Local Government questions and asked the Minister the underoccupancy or 'bedroom tax' in the Welfare Reform Bill, which proposes to cut housing benefit for families deemed to have spare space in their homes and will affect up to 25% of tenants in parts of North West Durham. Later in the week I got the opportunity to ask the Justice Secretary a question about justice for prison officers assaulted by prisoners serving life sentences where the Crown Prosecution Service (CPS) judge that as the prisoner is already on a life sentence it is not in the public interest to This is prosecute. something of real importance to many constituents given that

we have a lot of prison officers living and working in the area. Ithen found out that I had been pulled out of the draw for Business, Innovation and Skills questions on Thursday morning - on a roll I thought.

Thursday morning there I was in my place for my question, which was No 22 on the order paper so not likely to be called early, when right at the beginning of the session the Speaker called my name. He clearly thought I was 'standing' as I wanted to be called early when in fact I was not 'standing' but leaning forward to speak to Ian Wright, MP for Hartlepool who was sitting on the bench in front of me. Shocked at hearing my name called so early I jumped up and started to ask my question about the collapse in higher education applications but was ruled out of order as the question under discussion at that time was about red-tape

in business and my question must be linked to that. I thought I had lost my opportunity but later the Speaker took pity on me and invited me to ask my question on the back of another member's question about tuition fees. Lessons learnt today do not fidget so much in the chamber.

We all feel a bit abashed when we do something that makes us feel a bit foolish in front of the class, the office or the Chamber even when in reality no-one else really notices or cares but I cheered up no end a bit later when a Tory MP called for a debate on cheese!

> Lanchester Partnership. It was agreed that the Partnership be allowed to use the village green for the annual litter pick, to be held on 24th March, from 10.30 am to 1 pm.

> The findings from the consultation which took place last year on the Railway Paths Master Plan will be launched alongside the Litter Pick. Water running down Cadger Bank. A letter was received from the County Council saying that the blockage causing this had been cleared and a camera survey would take place to see if the cause was tree root. Cllr Johnson said that the cameras were returning next month to survey other areas.

> Proposed changes to **Traffic** Regulation Orders. These changes the system of streamlining notification were considered.

> **Durham County Council** Library **Strategy Document.** Changes in hours of opening of the County's libraries were given in this document. Lanchester opening hours will be reduced by only one hour to 20 hours per week, which means that THE LIBRARY WILL NOT CLOSE.



The astronaut has taken part in four space walks totalling more than 27 hours in the hostile environment outside the space craft as well as being involved in the installation of major components of the International Space Station - which is as big as an American football

Chris Saunders, head of science at St Bede's School, said: "Ron's visit makes science feel

more real to the children. They watch some science fiction programmes television but this is about reality. Hopefully they'll think 'I can do that' rather than simply be an observer."

Rob Burleigh, 17, who is studying physics, chemistry and maths A Levels at St Bede's, said: "He was really very inspirational and some of the pictures he showed were amazing. It just shows you what you can achieve. It's taken what we learn in the classroom from textbooks and given it real life perspective."
