Following the success of planned Maypole dance died last year, and phase one of the improvements, which were completed in May last year, Lanchester Parish Council began work to further enhance the facilities on the village green, a very important part of the village and the community. The work began in February and was completed in April, with a celebration on the Green on Friday 27th at 1.30 pm. Parish Council Chairman Ossie Johnston conducted the ceremony and explained the work which had been carried out to those present, who included representatives from the three schools, the Churches and many Parish Councillors. A

The project has been funded by the Parish Council and a grant of £1,305 from Northern Gas Networks and £500 from Lanchester Wine Cellars Ltd. He also welcomed members of the family of Frank Kemp, a former, longstanding Parish Councillor, who

Wednesday 9th May was the state opening of Parliament by the Queen. This is the bit that many of us see on TV but it is amazing to see in person. It brings home centuries of history that have resulted in the elected representatives of the common people of this country, taking

precedence over the Monarch and the Lords. Members of the House of Commons, led by the Prime Minister and the Leader of the Opposition then follow Black Rod and the Commons Speaker to the Lords Chamber and stand behind the Bar of the House of Lords to listen to the Queen's Speech.

Just before all the action we MPs received an email from the Speaker telling us that the side doors to the voting lobbies would be locked to prevent honourable

members from slipping through the voting lobbies to queue jump in the procession. Honestly, some people just have no sense of decorum!

FIRE AT THE QUEEN'S HEAD

On Wednesday afternoon, 9th May, car drivers passing through Lanchester found their access to a large part of Front Street blocked. Police were directing traffic away from the area, buses had to be diverted temporarily and it was impossible to get the car park. at Pedestrians who were able to pass round the road-block found the Head Queen's surrounded by firemen with fire engines deployed and the road covered in water. As far as the Village Voice can find out the fire had started in the kitchen as a result of an electrical fault. Fortunately there were no casualties but the entire ground floor is seriously damaged, with smoke-blackened windows visible at the front, and the whole building is closed until



further notice. Bikers arriving for their weekend event found one of their favourite watering holes unavailable and the celebration to be held there unable to go ahead. Crinnion's were able to step in and save the situation but that does not disguise the fact that livelihoods have been lost and a prominent local landmark is unable to provide its usual facilities for the village.



Gardening in June

the garden not only as it is the month when the daylight hours are longest but it is the start of the time to see the fruits of your labours. As the risk of frost has now passed it is a busy time. Borders

June is the time to plant out summer bedding including petunias, begonias, impatiens, etc and hanging up baskets that you have prepared perhaps using some of these plants. You can start preparing for the season by sowing winter bedding such as pansy, viola and bellis in trays so that they will be ready for your winter containers and borders. Vegetable Plot

Plant out leeks sown in

June is a lovely month in the spring when they are pencil thick and plant out runner beans sown in May. Other tasks this month include planting out the tender crops like outdoor tomatoes, sweetcorn and courgettes; hoeing between rows to remove weed seedlings; and sowing winter brassicas such as cabbage and cauliflower. Mixed salad leaves can be sown thinly into a pot or window box filled with multi-purpose compost, a grow bag, or well raked soil in a shallow trench. Leaves should be ready in four weeks and can be harvested starting with the outer leaves when they are 4 to 6 inches long. You should avoid taking the centre tips so that the plants

keep growing. This sowing should be repeated each 2 or 3 weeks in the summer to provide a continuous summer crop.

General

Hanging baskets are a joy at this time of the year. However, they need carefully preparing and looking after as they can dry out quickly. Although water retaining crystals can help, they should be watered (early morning or evening is best and drench the basket as any excess will run out) daily in warm weather and twice perday when it's hot. Slow release fertiliser plugs work best to feed and remember to dead head as this helps to promote an increase in length of the flowering period.

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
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NEW SALON FOR JENI


