LANCHESTER LIONS CEASE TO ROAR

After 46 years of service to the village, it is with regret that as from the end of June this year, we will cease to remain members of Lions International and therefore Lanchester Lions will not continue as a village club. The decision has been taken due to ageing and falling membership; in spite of all efforts we have

had no success in recruiting replacements. Therefore reduced numbers make it increasingly difficult to operate and carry out the traditional functions such as the Carnival, Bonfire and Senior Citizens' Christmas Party. It is regrettable, but after much discussion at a recent club meeting, the remaining

members decided that due to notification of further reductions in membership numbers being indicated, we have no alternative but to close as a village organisation. We would like to think that over the past 46 years, we have made a valuable contribution both locally and internationally. Lanchester Lions members

would therefore like to thank the villagers of Lanchester and surrounding areas for their help and support during this period in raising funds for a wide variety of good and deserving causes. The one remaining function to be carried out by the Lions Club is the FA Cup draw, which will take place in May at Lanchester

Dear Village Voice

The library tradition in Lanchester dates back to the establishing of a library centre in the Primitive Methodist church hall in 1927. This was followed by a part-time library service, run in the Community Centre and open two afternoons and evenings a week in 1955. Many Lanchester residents will remember Lilian Downs who worked there until the full-time library was officially opened on 12th March 1975.

It had proved difficult to find a suitable site for a new library building,

so when the Magistrates Court and Police Station was vacated in 1973, the building was bought because the ground floor was considered suitable for conversion into a library.

Site and Buildings cost £25,000 and a Building conversion cost £188 48. The total book stock was 16,600 volumes!

When the library was opened in 1975 it was staffed by Joan Robinson, Monica Murfin and Lilian Downs. Monica, of course, stayed on until her retirement in December 2012 and has proved to be the very essence of what a community librarian should be.

Over the years computers have been added to the service and Monica has always been there to offer help and guidance.

Older members of the community have had the benefit of her care and consideration too, so every age group has been catered for.

Monica has truly put her heart and soul into the library service in Lanchester and she will be sorely missed.

We all wish her the very Best Wishes for a long and happy retirement.

Notes from the Ordinary Meeting 8th January 2013

Minutes

Ordinary meeting held on 11th December 2012 - approved.

Planning Committee Meeting held on 11th December 2012 - approved

Police Report - the next police report will be distributed at the end of January and cover a two month period. It was agreed to ask the new PCSO Lisa Jackson to a future Council meeting.

Green School - Helen Johnson the Manager of the alternative KS4 education provision at the Green School attended and gave members an update and thanked the community for making the school welcome. There was a slight issue around access to the school by the public which it was hoped would be resolved by repairs to a

fence. The school is seeking community representation to its Board and posters in the village and an article in the Village Voice will provide more information on this.

Correspondence

(1) Lanchester Lions - annual firework display Members were informed that the Lanchester Lions would no longer be organising the annual fireworks display and that Lanchester Cricket Club were considering taking this event over.
(2) LINK Newsletter - received.

Area Action Partnership & Parish Councils Committee - Members received an update.

Maintenance Progress Report - Members considered the report which outlined the maintenance work undertaken over the last 3 months. Members

thanked David Maddox for all his work.

Financial report - discussed and received.

Precept 2013/14 Report Members considered the implications of the removal of the £6000 payment and the £1645 double taxation payment previously paid annually by Durham County Council. In addition members discussed the impact of the new Local Council Tax Support Scheme to be administered by the County Council and the predicted affect on the reduction in the council tax base.

It was agreed that the precept be set at £50,624.00 for 2013/14.

Accounts for Payment - approved.

The next Ordinary meeting of the Council will be held on Tuesday 12th February 2013 at 7.15pm.

A MESSAGE FROM THE HOUSE ...

Happy New Year! I hope that 2013 proves to be a healthy, wealthy and drier year than 2012.

2012 was the wettest summer on records and we certainly felt that with flooding in the village in June and October. I have met with the Association of British Insurers on the general issues of flood insurance and have been able to raise individual concerns on behalf of those who are still out of their homes or on behalf of older or more vulnerable constituents. If your insurance company has still not paid out or if you are having problems with flood insurance please get in touch and I will do what I can to help.

On a more positive note, Derwentside Homes have now confirmed that they have applied for planning permission to build a complex of luxury two bedroom flats and amenities for older people on the former Lynwood House site. I understand that there are still some issues to be ironed-out, ensuring that access arrangements do not negatively impact on neighbours, but once those issues are

addressed this looks like a first-class development of apartments, some for rent and some to buy, with medical and social facilities on site. Derwentside Homes have a good track record when it comes to this kind of supported living provision for older people and anyone who wants to see the quality of provision that the new Lynwood is aiming for should visit Magdalene House, Medomsley or The Haven, Leadgate. I think we have all been concerned at the state of the former Lynwood House and I know that Lanchester Parish Council has been working with community organisations to try and establish supported living arrangements on this site for some time, so I am pleased that this is finally moving towards a conclusion.

The ambiance and fellowship in the beautiful historic parish church was absolutely terrific. Gardening in February

February is a dormant month in some parts of the garden so the jobs for the month are all about preparation and pruning plants whilst they are dormant.

In the Flower Borders

February is a good time to prune summer-flowering Clematis, overwintered Fuchsia, Jasmine and other winter flowering shrubs such as Mahonia and Viburnum. The large flowered Clematis such as Nelly Moser should be pruned in Spring before they start shooting by removing any dead or damaged stems and reducing the remaining growth back to a set of strong healthy buds.

New flowering stems will be produced from the previous year's growth. Prune Fuchsia back to one or two buds on each shoot. Prune winter Jasmine after flowering by cutting back previous year's growth to 5cm from old wood and this will encourage new growth for next year's flowers. Prune Mahonia after the flowers have finished by cutting back the flowered stems. Trim winter flowering heathers as the blooms fade which will stop the plants getting too leggy. To keep winter flowering Pansies and Violas flowering into spring remove dead heads and cut back to stop them also becoming leggy. Lift

and divide snowdrops whilst they are still green if you want to increase your stock.

In the Vegetable Plot

Start chitting early potatoes by standing them on end in a module tray or egg box on a window sill or other bright, frost-free place. Start sowing vegetable seeds such as leeks, onions and celeriac under cover.

General

Other jobs in the garden include trimming deciduous hedges before the birds start nesting, washing empty pots by scrubbing in hot water, and, as the weather is still cold, hanging fat balls out for the birds and keeping their feeders topped up.

SIAS (STATUTORY INSPECTION OF ANGLICAN SCHOOLS) AT LANCHESTER EP PRIMARY





RECIPE OF THE MONTH

Vegetable Soup

- 2 Carrots
 - 1 Parsnip
 - Small Turnip
 - 1 large Onion
 - 2 large Celery sticks
 - 1 Leek
 - 25g/1 oz Butter
 - 900 ml/1 1/2 Pints Water
 - 1 Vegetable or Chicken Stock Cube
 - Salt and Pepper
1. Cut the carrots, parsnip and turnip into small pieces. Chop the

- onion, leek and celery sticks.
2. Melt the butter in a saucepan, add the vegetables and cover the pan.
3. Fry very gently without browning for a few minutes shaking the pan frequently.
4. Pour in water, add stock cube and bring to the boil. Lower the heat and simmer gently

- until the vegetables are soft.
5. Remove from heat, pour into liquidiser and blend until smooth.
6. Return to saucepan and add more liquid (if necessary) for the required consistency.
7. Reheat to serve (can be frozen to use when required). Season with salt and pepper as appropriate.
