

## Gardening in April

If you stand still on a calm April morning you can almost hear things growing. It is an exciting month in the garden with April showers bringing your dormant plants (and, unfortunately, weeds) into their new life. In the Borders

Jobs in your borders include dividing primroses after they have finished flowering and continuing to plant herbaceous perennials. If any of your perennials will need supporting this year, put the supports in now so that the plants grow up through them. Honeysuckle and Clematis will now be putting on growth and the new stems will need, and benefit from, tying in so that the plant grows along its supports. Prune Forsythia as soon as it has finished flowering as blooms appear on last year's growth. Deadhead daffodils and tulips as they finish flowering but leave the leaves intact to help feed the bulbs for next year's flowers. This month you can sow hardy annuals outside in pots. In the Vegetable Plot Plant your chitted

potatoes

positions outside or in potato grow bags or containers. Prepare vegetable seed beds by removing weeds and forking-in compost. Once this is done cover the beds with black plastic sheets to warm the soil and keep it dryer. Many crops can be sown directly into the ground this month including parsnips, cabbages and radish. If you started broad beans in rootrainers you can transplant them this month.

#### General

Other jobs include applying a high-nitrogen fertiliser to your lawn to provide it with a start-ofthe-year boost and now is a good time to apply lawn weed killers where moss and weeds are a problem. I find Lawn Sand a viable and relatively cheap answer where moss is a problem. Start mowing your lawn this month on a high setting to begin with and gradually lower towards the end of the month. You might also check your compost bin(s) to see if any of the material is ready and can be used on your beds and borders.

### LIFE AT MARGERY FLATTS ALLOTMENTS AND ORCHARD



The allotments at Margery Flatts

Margery Flatts allotments have developed well in 2012 despite the awful weather. Several plots produced an excellent crop particularly those that were well mulched or had slightly raised beds. Allotmenteers who put in the time were rewarded well for their efforts. Inevitably the wettest year in recent history caused a high water table and some water logging. Strawberries were scarce and largely unripe and several types of vegetables failed to fully Surprisingly ripen.

potatoes often did well and parsnips are still coming out of our ears! The plots and orchard are managed using organic means ... so methods of beating the pests are being developed such as barrier methods, careful selection of disease resistant varieties and using varieties of plants that put off pests as well as plants that attract beneficial insect species. The site now has facilities including a tool store, compost toilet, and a new shed that can provide shelter as well storage of site as

maintenance tools. The allotments are surrounded by a newly planted orchard which also extends into the centre of the site using an impressive 'espalier frame' put up by Freddie Emerson. The orchard is a Lanchester Partnership project and the site development works are being funded by a grant from the County Durham Community Foundation. The site will be awash with blossom and fruit in the coming years and should be a wonderful place for exercise outside, quiet contemplation and

Season, pop the steaks back into the pan, then cover and place in the oven for 2 hrs, stirring halfway through and adding a splash of water if needed. 


