# LANCHESTER COMMUNITY ASSOCIATION NEWSLETTER

APRIL 2014

At the AGM in March I made a presentation to John Wilson who left as our Manager after making a tremendous contribution during the past 8 years. Alison Boyd has been appointed to replace John and she will perform this role as well as continuing to be an Exercise Assistant.

I was pleased to report that 2013 was a very good year; we made a profit of £6,000 of which £5,000 was transferred to our reserve funds for building work and new equipment. Following my appeal in January I am delighted to report that we received donations of over £1,000 from the public and from two of our Groups. I am overwhelmed by the generosity shown but, if you can, please keep the donations coming in as we are still facing difficult times because of the discontinuance of some services and competition

from other providers of rooms in Lanchester. Unless we can find new business our income will be reduced by £10,000 and I have had to make savings. I have restructured the staffing and finances, saving £5,000 per year. However, our anonymous lender of £38,000 has made an offer that could not be refused.

The outstanding loan is £25,500 and he proposed that if this was repaid in full, he would make a donation of £12,750 which would amount to £16,000 with gift aid. This offer was accepted and all debts have been repaid but there will be a net cost of £9,500 in 2014.

Grants have been received for the refurbishment of the two halls: £3,500 from County Durham Community Foundation, £2,500 from the Area Action

Partnership, £350 from Sunday Bridge and £700 from the community. Although this is still £2,000 short of the £9,000 target, it is intended to start work on the project in May of this year. Any group or individual who would like us to complete this project is welcome to make a donation, no matter how large or small. In the last four years we have been successful in obtaining grants totalling £32,000. We have succeeded because of the quality of the applications but also by demonstrating the level of support we receive from the people of Lanchester. The more Members and Friends we have helps us a great deal when making applications for grants, so please consider becoming one and you will be doing your bit for the community.

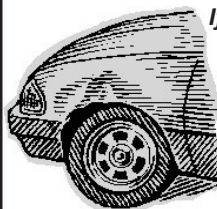

## POLICE REPORT

At the PACT meeting held on Tuesday 1st April the community decided to introduce speeding near Ornsby Hill as the PACT priority. Over the following month officers will be deploying our Community Speedwatch and Laser guns to identify any vehicles speeding in the location.

Local officers have been continuing to address issues of criminal damage and anti-social behaviour in the village. As a result of a no tolerance approach, reported incidents of anti-social behaviour have significantly reduced and two teenage males aged 13 and 15 have admitted to causing damage within the village.

In March local officers took part in Operation

Snowdrop following information that cocaine use was on the increase in some of our licensed premises including The Black Bull. On Saturday 8th March local officers, dog section and Deputy Chief Constable Banks took part in walk-throughs whereby customers and toilet areas were checked for evidence of drugs. During the visit no persons were found in possession of drugs however evidence of drug use was found in the men's toilets. Since then staff from The Black Bull have taken part in additional drug training and officers will look at conducting further walk-throughs in the near future.

A current issue ongoing within the village is

parking in the area of Peth Bank, Deneside and Durham Road due to the increase in parked vehicles because of the building work taking place. Local officers and Civil Enforcement Officers are actively monitoring the hotspot areas and issuing £30 obstruction fines where necessary. A site visit has also been conducted with Traffic Management Officers to offer further advice and assistance to help address these issues. If anyone would like any further information please feel free to come along to our next PACT meeting due to take place on Tuesday 6th May 2014 at 6.30 pm in Burnhope Primary School.

## SPRING IS HERE POLICE ADVICE

Now is the time to ensure sheds, allotments, garages and out-buildings are secure to protect your property. As the weather improves, criminals are aware that tools and other expensive items will be more frequently used and stored in sheds, garages and outbuildings.

### TOP TIPS:

- Ensure property is secure at all times.
- Lock and alarm your shed, outbuilding or garage. Look at the vulnerabilities of your shed ie, those with windows/weak hinges and ensure they are as secure as possible.
- Ensure all valuable items are property marked and serial numbers noted - this will assist

officers with the identification of items, allow us to recognise stolen items, make arrests, and return items to their rightful owner.

- Think about using gravel on driveways and in gardens. This is loud and is a deterrent to opportunists who don't wish to be heard.
- Consider access to your garden. Are side gates locked? Where do you store your waste bin? Could this be used to gain access over high fences?
- Install dusk till dawn security lighting which will illuminate your garden at all times should you hear a noise outside. Motion sensor lighting is often

activated frequently by numerous things including pets and often ignored.

Report suspicious activity to police at the time via our 101 non-emergency telephone number. If we don't know about it, we can't do anything!

Why not set up a Neighbourhood Watch scheme where you live, it can take up as much or as little time as you have to offer. Benefits include: regular updates regarding crime and your community. You may also be entitled to a reduction in your home insurance premium. We are looking for street co-ordinators where you live. # EP SCHOOL EASTER SERVICE

## From Tragedy to Triumph

This very moving Easter presentation is always very well done by the EP School. It took place on April 3rd in All Saints' Parish Church. The whole school from Nursery to Year 6 came to take part and so it was in a very well filled church for this annual presentation. Reverend Rupert Kalus welcomed the children and also all the many parents, family members, childminders and friends who had come to support the children.

This special Easter service opens with a stark wooden cross at the front of the church. Various items which are symbolic of the events of the week leading up to Easter (Holy Week) are brought forward by

the pupils and placed around the cross. Words of explanation and readings from the Bible are spoken by the pupils and appropriate songs are sung. The cross stands surrounded by the artefacts, which include a hammer and nails, a whip, a crown of thorns, 30 pieces of silver, and a cockerel, all signs of the cruelty and betrayal surrounding the death of Jesus on a cross. This is the tragedy part of the play and a reverend silence descends but as the artefacts are taken away from the cross the Triumph begins to emerge.

With some clever stage-managing on behalf of the staff each pupil is given a daffodil to place

on the cross. Reverend Kalus asked all the congregation to take part in making a very beautiful cross of daffodils (photo on front page). There was some very nice singing by the pupils, of

specially chosen Easter songs, as the daffodils were put in place. It was no longer a stark wooden cross but a beautiful symbol of Light, Beauty, Hope and Love.

'Jesus is Alive, He has risen from the dead' is

the joyful message Easter brings and with readings from the Bible, lovely songs, activity and reverence the EP School had conveyed this to us. It was an excellent presentation. Brenda Craddock

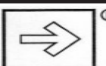

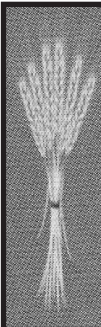

## A MESSAGE FROM THE HOUSE ...

I have been dealing with a huge variety of issues from the global to the very local that have an impact on us all and I wanted to give you just a brief flavour this month.

'Fracking' in the US is contributing to the collapse in the global price of coal. You might ask what that has to do with North West Durham but UK Coal has been forced into liquidation and the government has had to step in with a multi-million pound loan to wind up their existing operations.

Yet despite this it seems that UK Coal still has the resources to press ahead with an appeal against a public inquiry that Durham County Council (DCC) won last year against an application to opencast in the Pont Valley, one of the most beautiful and ancient woodlands in the region. The most recent public inquiry report (there have been 3 to date) said that open casting would result in the loss of this valley to a generation and yet DCC is having to face and fund yet another appeal.

Dealing with DCC is an essential part of my work as a MP and whilst I don't always agree with individual decisions of the County, in this case I cannot fault the way they have worked with local community organisations and yet despite their best efforts ultimately it may be that the energy policy of the US may have more influence than the justness of the cause.

I have also been working with the North East Ambulance Service (NEAS) where on a number of occasions

constituents have waited hours for an ambulance after dialling 999. We know that NEAS are stretched to the limit so whilst individual staff do a remarkable job and NEAS continue to hit more 'red' call-outs than almost any other ambulance provider, problems are escalating. There are more and more 999 calls for non-emergency (some not even medical) reasons and increased 'banking' (ambulances parked up outside hospital A&E

departments all over the region unable to deliver patients because of pressures on A&E). So again, public servants doing their very best but their ability to deliver adversely affected because of connections beyond their control.

We live in a connected world but increasingly pressures on public services, many beyond their control, are leading to systemic difficulties that we are all increasingly feeling.

## Gardening in May

Last month I suggested that April was an important and exciting month in the garden due to the amount of preparation needed. This, however, is continued into May which for me also involves containers: these include baskets and pots which not only provide such a grand gesture in your garden but provide achievable results from design to planting to reward in hours.

**In the Flower Borders**  
Harden off half hardy plants by leaving them outside in the day and bringing them back under cover at night for 7 to 10 days before planting outdoors. Also harden off dahlias for planting as soon as the risk of frost has passed. Trim back spreading plants

such as aubretia and allsrum after they have flowered to encourage new growth. Tie in climbing and rambling roses leaving horizontal stems to help produce more flowers and tie in sweet peas to encourage them to climb. Give your permanent pot plants a top dress of new compost and plant up pots and baskets with summer bedding like begonia and harden off before placing them in position next month.

**In the Vegetable Plot**  
May is the time to thin out direct sown vegetables such as spinach, carrot and lettuce seedlings and, when thinned, give the remainder a good watering. Plant out brassicas and leeks to their final position. Pinch out the growing tips of broad beans as soon as

the first beans appear at the bottom of the plant to prevent blackfly attack. Harden off outdoor tomatoes and courgettes at the end of the month before planting them out in June.

### General

I find rhubarb a very rewarding plant. This month you can harvest most varieties by picking only a third of the total amount of stems. May is a good month to plant the new autumn maturing variety, Livingstone, which does not become dormant in the summer. Rhubarb is a perennial plant which, when established, will benefit from some well rotted manure or compost every winter and will provide you with excellent crumble puddings for several years.

## RECIPE OF THE MONTH

### Summer Sausage Rolls

The recipe makes 20 rolls  
**Ingredients**

2 large skinless chicken breasts  
1 garlic clove, crushed  
3 rashers streaky bacon, thinly sliced  
4 sundried tomatoes, chopped  
handful of basil leaves, chopped  
375g pack ready rolled puff pastry  
flour for dusting  
1 egg yolk, beaten  
25g/1oz sesame seeds

#### Method

1. Whizz the chicken and garlic in a food processor until the chicken is minced. Tip in the bacon,

tomatoes and basil, and pulse for 5 secs to just mix through. Season well.

2. Roll out the pastry a little on a lightly floured surface and cut in half lengthways. Spread half the mixture along the middle of one pastry strip, then roll-up pinching the ends together to seal. Using a sharp knife, cut into 2.5cm long pieces. Repeat with the remaining pastry and mixture.

3. Heat oven to 200C/180C fan/gas 6. Place rolls on a large baking sheet. Brush with egg and sprinkle with the seeds. Bake for 20 mins until golden.

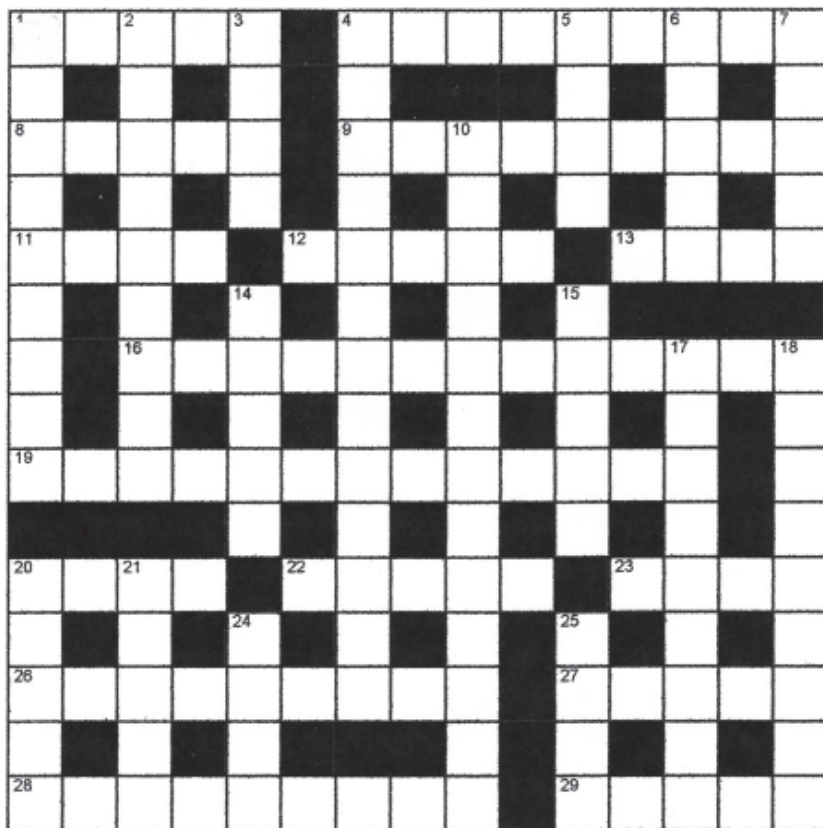
