





OVERWHELMED BY INDUSTRY

Richard Pears gave the History Society a very interesting talk and tour around some of the country houses of the North East. Some sadly are no longer standing. He briefly discussed how the English Reformation changed the landowners from the Bishop of Durham to those favoured by the King with their families.

Many old country houses developed previous buildings, which were then developed to show the wealth and success of their owners. Houses were built in A number of these idyllic settings away from the populace. Features such as hahas extended

unbroken views into the open countryside of their estates.

In the North, some houses were developed from fortified manor houses such Hollinside Manor on Whickham Fell and Ravensworth Castle. Notable architects employed to follow the fashions of the time included, for example, John Nash - Ravensworth Castle, James Paine -Axwell House Derwenthaugh, James Gibbs - Gateshead Park House.

houses are no longer in existence due to road, railway and industrial encroachment. Areas that were once villages have been consumed by the city of Newcastle and Gateshead. In Twentieth Century, a number of these estates were converted into schools, colleges, hospitals, museums and hotels. Looking closer still, houses have been demolished, turned into apartments or tourist accommodation.

Richard's research into the country houses of the area is very extensive. He suggested we looked at old Ordnance Survey maps of the 1850s which show a number of these in their houses 'countryside' away from the cities, compared to the developments of today.

It was a fascinating talk and the large audience were enthralled, readily appreciating Richard's depth of knowledge and well informed presentation.

RECIPE OF THE MONTH

Lamb Rogan Josh

This warming curry comes 4 cardamom pods from Kashmiri cuisine, brought to Kashmir by the Mughals, whose cooking was influenced by the Persians. It's also healthy eating, using low calorie cooking spray and sweetener.

TOSERVE4, YOUNEED 1 onion, peeled and chopped

3 garlic cloves, peeled and chopped

Low calorie cooking spray

1 tsp each of ground coriander, paprika, ground ginger and chilli powder

450 g lamb steaks, visible fat removed and cut into bite-sized pieces

400 g can chopped tomatoes

1 bay leaf

2 x 2.5 cm pieces of cinnamon stick

3 cloves 200 ml chicken stock 2 tsp sweetener A small handful fresh coriander, chopped Mangetout, to serve **METHOD**

1) Fry the onion and garlic in low calorie cooking spray until soft. Add all the powdered spices and fry for 1 minute (add a little water if it gets too dry).

2) Add the lamb, tomatoes, bay leaf, sticks, cinnamon cardamom pods, cloves, stock and sweetener and simmer for 30-35 minutes until reduced.

3) Remove the bay leaf and cinnamon sticks. Stir in the chopped coriander and serve immediately with freshly steamed mangetout.

SATLEY WI MARCH REPORT




