Wild Notes and Lanchester Wildlife Group Field trip

Peat, poo. fur and feeding stations

A joint venture with Weardale Wildlife Group took us into the Durham Dales within the North Pennine AONB (Area of Outstanding Natural Beauty) in early July. We were on the trail of water voles, Britain's fastest declining mammal, and also to take a look at the peatland restoration on the moors between St John's Chapel and Langdon Beck. Our grand finale was a meadow dripping with orchids including Lesser Butterfly and Fragrant, the latter certainly lives up to its name.

The voles are elusive, often hidden by vegetation or in their burrows in the bankside of streams. So we discover where they are by looking for their latrines (small piles of 'tic tac' shaped poo, often green, but it depend on their diet); these latrine sites are created along their territories. They also leave small piles of ready chopped vegetation as future feeding stations to return to munch; they chew off the stems of vegetation at 45 degrees and leave a small pile of stem 5–10cm long. They can be confused with rats, but rats have larger prominent ears with less fur around them. Voles have blunt non-pointed noses and tails with fur on them and have chestnut-brown fur compared to a rat's grey-brown. Naturally Native is a Wildlife Trusts project helping water voles, if you find signs

Be enticed to visit the Durham Dales this August for the heather in bloom and plenty of butterflies to record on the Big Butterfly count – it doesn't have to be your garden! Our next Wildlife Group trip is to the Hownsgill Viaduct area, a joint venture with Durham Wildlife Trust Botany group. In the hot sunny weather, a trip to a pond usually yields dragonflies and damselflies, vibrant competition for the

butterflies. Locally, Malton and Burnhope Pond Nature Reserves are usually sites to search, but not so good if the water level is very low.

Remember water for wildlife, particularly during the drought (last time I wrote that it rained!).

"Luke the Link" receives a commendation

On Monday 12th July, a group of supporters of the Village Link Bus gathered in the summer sunshine on the village green, waiting for the bus to arrive. At 1.30pm, spot on time, Luke Stone the driver, arrived with his precious cargo of regular customers. He's been doing this four times every working day for many years.

The occasion was the presentation of a special commendation to Luke for his services to public health during Covid. During Covid lockdowns, the number of passengers declined sharply. Luke took the initiative. He started to fit in errands for regular passengers, and others, in addition to his normal job of driving the bus on its usual route. These errands included buying groceries, collecting prescriptions, getting cash, etc. To date he has done about 1,300 of them. He has made a big difference to the lives of many, generally elderly, people.

County Councillor Doug Oliver presented Luke with a certificate on behalf of the County Council, and he was also presented with a special card from users of the bus. Regular passengers recounted innumerable stories of the difference Luke has made by enabling them to access the shops and services in the village centre. The link bus service has been in operation for over 20 years. It is operated by Stanley Travel on behalf of the Lanchester Partnership. The Lanchester Partnership pays ¾ of the cost and Durham County Council pays ¼. The event was also attended by Helen Pinkney from mid Durham Area Action Partnership (AAP) which has recently agreed a significant grant to the service and a representative sent by Richard Holden, our local MP.

The Lanchester Partnership is incredibly grateful to all the individuals and organisations who have made donations (however small) to the service, and we look forward to your continuing support in making this unique service viable in the years to come.

He is a firm believer in the power of prayer which has brought comfort and hope to many people, not only within the parish church, but also in the community of Lanchester, a village which he has come to love dearly.

The congregation wanted to show Stephen their appreciation for his ministry during the past year and a buffet lunch was

Fundraising for Alzheimer's and Ukraine

Hi, my name is Mia and I'm 12 years old (soon to be 13). I live in Lanchester and attended All Saints Primary before moving to Wolsingham Secondary School where I'm in year 8. My family has been brought up in Lanchester and my grandparents also live here. We sadly lost my Grandad (Joe Bennett) to Covid in February 2021. He was a proud member of the village community. Many of you may have known him over the years he lived here; he was a member of the Methodist Church, sang and played his guitar with the worship group, sang in the circuit choir and with the Male Voice choir, and spent many years playing bowls at the bowling club. He was an officer in the Boys' Brigade, a senior building control officer for Derwentside District Council before retiring, drew building plans, spent hours on his allotment and was very generous with his time and support.

Joe had 3 children: Alistair, Gillian (my mum) and Michael who all attended the E.P. and was proudly married to my Nanna, Joyce. He was diagnosed with Alzheimer's about ten years ago and sadly this stopped him doing lots of the things he loved, but it never stopped him remembering any of us or loving us. As we lost him during the pandemic, we were unable to celebrate his life and love in the way we would have liked. So, I set myself a challenge to raise some money to support the Alzheimer's Society in his memory. I am aiming to cover a total of 176km in the gym over a number of sessions to represent the 176,000 people diagnosed with Alzheimer's in County Durham.

I have also been very upset by the events in Ukraine and I gave up lots of my spare time to help sort and pack donations to send to Poland and Ukraine. I decided to try and raise some money to support orphans in Ukraine by raising money for "Under The Same Moon" using one of my favourite hobbies, swimming. Owing to my fundraising I have been honoured to be named Young Fundraiser by them. I aim to swim 2022 lengths of a 25m pool to represent the 2022 miles from my house to Mariupol before the 24th August, which is the launch night for this organisation. I will continue to support them after this challenge.

I have been amazed by the support I have received so far and would like to thank everyone who has supported me and donated to my fundraiser for these two causes. There have been some very generous donations from members of the village community, including members and players of Lanchester Cricket Club who are displaying a poster for me and have a tin on the bar to collect loose change, and some people who know our family. The ChXout® Team (part of the Genome Centre) recently had the pleasure of testing a Humboldt Penguin sample from Blair Drummond Safari Park to find out if little Cooper is a boy or a girl! The Humboldt Penguin (Spheniscus humboldti) is from South America living mostly off the coast of Peru. Populations are sadly thought to be in decline due to hunting, over-fishing and the worry of climate change.

The species is recorded as vulnerable on the IUCN Red List. How cute is Cooper?! Who is a girl!

Dozens of objections have already been made by local residents to a plan to build a solar farm at Maiden Law.

(We originally reported this in the May 2022 issue, which contains a site plan.)

Most of the objections come from residents of Burnhope, but also many from Lanchester, who claim the 215 acre site would be a blot on the horizon.

The application is for land east of Edge Lane, Maiden Law, close to, but not apparently encroaching upon, the Chapman's Well Nature Reserve.

The proposal is being led by lightsourcebp. It aims to produce nearly 52,000 megawatt hours of electricity per year, enough to supply the energy needs of nearly 14,000 households. But while the proposal is welcomed by some environmentalists, there have been some scathing criticisms

environmentalists, there have been some scathing criticisms in objections received by the planning authority, Durham County Council.

A typical response was: "I fully object given the amount of space and land this is going to cover on the doorstep of where I live. It is between residential areas and completely inappropriate."

North West Durham MP Richard Holden has been canvassing residents on their views.

He said: "Like many of my constituents, I back solar power in principle as a green form of energy that will help our efforts to reduce carbon emissions and contribute to our government's strong world-leading efforts to tackle global warming.

However, some residents have expressed concern about the scope of the application, and I encourage residents to share their feedback with me and local Councillors for Lanchester ward - which includes Burnhope and Maiden Law - Mike McGaun and Doug Oliver.

"A particular area of concern is visibility regarding the site, lightsourcebp have said that they will encourage feedback about wilding features and landscaping measures, and I encourage people let me know what measures might improve the current proposals - I look forward to hearing from you." **Neil McKay**


I attended Lanchester EP between 1962 and 1968 and remember the day well we moved from the Community Centre (old school) to the new school in the field opposite where I was born.

Notes from the House

There is no question that it has been a difficult few weeks for my party in Westminster, with the Prime Minister having now resigned. Whilst the leadership contest is in an early stage, as a local Member of Parliament, I will do my level best to ensure we pause and reflect on what has happened and choose

the best leader for our party, who in turn can best lead our country at this difficult time.

Locally, many people have been contacting me again in the last few weeks about the cost of petrol – this is a particular concern in a large rural constituency like our own. One group that I am particularly concerned about are district nurses who travel great distances across rural North West Durham providing care for local people. Currently the NHS provides 56p for the first 3,500 miles but only 20p thereafter. This used to be sufficient, but given recent petrol hikes, I have asked the Treasury and the Department for Health to focus on this in a debate in the House of Commons. Another local matter that has created some interest lately is the situation regarding the proposed solar array between Burnhope and Maiden Law – an area I know a large number of people from Lanchester like to walk. Whilst I have no role in planning matters as a Member of Parliament, I always

pass on concerns to Durham County Council who do. The application remains at an early stage, but I will discuss this with residents and the applicants in due course to ensure communication is clear and residents are informed. My thoughts this month have been dominated by the premature and tragic death of Father Dermott Donnelly parish priest of Stanley, Byermoor and Dipton. Only a few days before he was taken ill, it was my pleasure to meet with Father Donnelly at Emmaus Youth Village on the far side of Consett from Lanchester near Allensford. He was fresh from celebrating the 30th Anniversary of his Ordination and tales of the groups of young people who had travelled from near and far – literally from Lanchester to Las Vegas and the Philippines.

Without being of the Catholic faith it was easy to see how transformational Father Donnelly's work for young people had been. Father Donnelly was one of countless people I have met in North West Durham – of all faiths and none – who commit themselves selflessly to others and I have

frequently been humbled by this on visits to the constituency. My thoughts are with those who worked with and his brother Declan and family at this time.



Hello, a brief update from PCSO 8722 Andrew Tonge from Consett Neighbourhood Police and what has been happening recently. There has been an increase in thefts of motor vehicles, particularly Range Rovers/Land Rovers. Generally, these have been without keys, so I would offer advice to ensure vehicles are locked securely as well as using faraday bags/cages. These stop the signal from keys being transferred by other devices.

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


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Songs of Praise

Good day readers

As you will know by now my name is Poppy, I am a black Patterdale Terrier with more than a tinge of grey now, and I enjoy telling Village Voice readers about walks on which I lead my Humans.

This one starts from Witton Gilbert, on the road off Front Street which crosses the bypass and leads towards the church.

It is just five miles by car from

Lanchester to the lay-by on the lane towards the church. Starting from there we walk down some steps and a slope into a woodland which a burn runs through. We follow the footpath through the woods, past a sign telling us what sort of birds can be seen in the woods. At the end there is a yellow arrow which leads us under bushes and onto a path which we follow. Before long we can see the River Browney on our right.

The footpath can be tricky to navigate at times, especially if it is muddy underfoot. But it is worth negotiating the odd tricky bit to walk along a scenic route, with the river on

our right and fields on our left. I can always cool down by paddling in the river on warmer days.

After walking for maybe a mile from the start we come to a footbridge over the river. This is a fine place to stop for a breather – Humans – and a swim – dogs.

The remains of the Bearpark monastery can be seen from the bridge. But we walk away from those in the direction of the village of Bearpark along a farm track/unclassified road. Soon the Lanchester Valley Walk crosses the footpath. We can either cross over and carry on, skirting Bearpark past some barn conversions, and walking back down to the walk further along towards Langley Park, or else turn right along the Lanchester Valley Walk. Either way, after less than a mile there is a meeting of footpaths, from which we turn right and proceed towards a ford, and then another footbridge. We cross this and walk up a fairly steep bank which brings us back to Witton Gilbert church, from which it is a couple of hundred yards to the car.

The walk usually takes about an hour and fifteen minutes and is very refreshing as there is a plentiful supply of water along the route.

We chose to eat grilled prawns, mayo, house salad and skinny fries; salmon fishcakes with buttered spinach, chive cream and skinny fries; warm tart of spinach, kale, broccoli and chives with salad and skinny fries; toasted sourdough club sandwich with chicken, bacon, lettuce, tomatoes, truffle mayo and egg; Turkey "Swiss": roast turkey, dry cured bacon, Swiss cheese, honey and mustard dressing; and roast chicken breast with tomato, garlic, shaved Parmesan and French beans. Puddings were knickerbocker glory; plum and almond frangipane with cream; opera gateau - a French style almond and coffee cake. Or another option was coffee with 5 of their homemade truffles.

The food is excellent, every mouthful a delightful sensation! More choices to be made when we go back.

Here though, the joy doesn't end with the food - you get retail therapy as well. Down another side of the garden wall are shops: homeware, fashion, and gift shop, all equally well stocked. We did manage some new dresses! And then in another corner is the garden accessory shop and plants.

It really is a very pleasant, relaxing place to go to and at this time of year - an absolute joy!

Antibiotics Resistance Crisis

Antibiotics are used to treat bacterial infections. Millions of lives have been saved and our well-being radically improved since Alexander Fleming discovered penicillin. His discovery transformed our world, previously incurable illnesses became treatable and medical procedures could be performed safely. They are an essential part of modern medicine, keeping people safe from infection when they are at their most vulnerable. It's concerning that due to increasing antibiotic resistance we may see more cancer patients, mothers who've had caesareans and patients who've had other surgery facing life-threatening situations.

Antibiotic resistance This does not mean that our body is resistant to antibiotics, it means the bacteria or fungi causing the infection are resistant to antibiotics. The resistant bacteria continue to multiply and become antibiotic-resistant superbugs and are responsible for over a million deaths a year. Without urgent action, this number is projected to increase exponentially. New drugs are being developed but not at the same pace as resistant superbugs. Therefore, the National Health Service and health organisations across the world are trying to reduce the overuse and misuse of antibiotics.

What we can do

We need to slow down, minimise, and stop the development of other strains of resistant bacteria. This is not just an issue for hospitals, doctors, and nurses, each of us need to take steps to prevent the antibiotic resistance crisis.

Hospitals Measures have been taken in recent years to develop and improve hygiene policies and practices in hospitals. You've no doubt seen the sanitising gel dispensers everywhere! However, practices are not always followed, or enforced as rigorously as they need to be to prevent the spread of resistant bacteria.

Doctors Overprescribing is one of the biggest causes of antibiotic resistance. Doctors are trying to reduce antibiotics prescriptions but do come under considerable pressure from patients to prescribe them. Many infections will clear up without antibiotics for example, antibiotics are no longer routinely used to treat chest infections, sore throats, or ear infections.

Patients We members of the public should try to understand the difference between viral and bacterial infections, if an infection is caused by a virus, antibiotics will be ineffective. We should avoid taking unnecessary antibiotics and if we do need to take an antibiotic, always finish the course. As obvious as it may seem, not everyone observes good personal hygiene practices. The simple act of regularly washing hands can help prevent the spread of antibiotic resistance.

Drug-resistant bacteria can infect anyone, of any age in any country. They lead to longer hospital stays, higher medical costs, and more preventable deaths. We all need to play our part to reduce antibiotic resistance because we and our families will also share the long term, worldwide implications of antibiotic resistance.

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


