The Wild side of Lanchester

Watch out for baby animals this month, you might see a robin, blue or great tit feeding fledglings, fresh out of the nest (top tip: robins don't start out with a red breast, the orange feathers grow later – see photo). Baby birds that are fed by their parents have bright, sometimes yellow, corners at the face-end of their beak. This is called a gape flange (snoring allowed whilst reading this), it makes it easier for the parents to notice the chicks with gaping beaks, begging for food. Keep an eye out along the River Browney for the mallard ducklings between Waters Meeting and Malton.

Water hasn't been falling from the sky lately in a drepphing way (I have I den't regret that

in a drenching way (I hope I don't regret that comment!). In the dry weather lots of creatures need water, so put a bowl or shallow tray of water out and keep it topped up. You might spot someone drinking or bathing in it.

Get in touch with your wilder side this June and take part in "30 Days Wild". You can sign up with "The Wildlife Trusts" to take part and get a free pack with wildflower seeds.

On May 12th, Mary Jo and her son, Johnathan held a music day at the Hancock pub in Newcastle in conjunction with Newcastle University Law School. Johnathan is studying law there. It was a great day with lots of talented musicians and singers. They raised £450. Massive thanks to everyone involved. They would like to thank Louise McCormack, the owner of Loop Lou Bows (on Facebook) who lives in Lanchester and has made the Ukraine pin badges for them to sell. Oksana and Vira, who are from Ukraine, came to help.

The next event is a car boot sale which will be held on Sunday 29th of May. They've had mountains of things donated and hope the weather is good to them. "We have been selling some of the goods separately as we believe we can make more money that way. We have joined forces with Joanne Soulsby, from Moon Jewellery, who was the person to start the whole operation off."

The good news today, Thursday the 19th of May, is that they have sent £1700 to Poland where a convoy of vans will be taking the food, bought from our donations, to the most vulnerable in Kharkiv in Ukraine. They got a fantastic exchange rate and the amount of food that will be bought is massive. They have a few things in the pipeline including a tapas night which they will be able to tell more about in the next edition. Please keep an eye on Moon jewellery's Facebook page as they are auctioning some very very beautiful items with every penny going to the fund. Joanne is working with people on the ground in Poland and Ukraine, so they are getting first hand information as to where food is needed urgently.

On Monday 9th May a large group of the Friends visited the Roman dam known as the Low Dam, close to Longedge Lane. The purpose of the visit was to re-examine the dam and aqueduct system leading to the fort. New members of the Friends were seeing it for the first time. Unfortunately, due to long grass and a lot of gorse, it was impossible to see the aqueduct leading away from the dam, but it was possible to make out the dam. A lot of time was spent on the remains of the dam wall trying to work out how the dam operated to provide water to the fort. Our grateful thanks go to the landowner, Mr Suddes, for allowing us access.

On Saturday 14th May a number of the Friends were involved in the "Ebchester Roman Explore Day", a day of displays and events doing just that! The Friends had their display on Longovicium whilst also having some Roman pottery from Vindomora (Ebchester). There was more pottery to see with Vindomora Solutions, together with information on various

excavations. A couple of laptops were also in evidence showing various photographs of Roman Ebchester and LIDAR aerial images. Eric Heatherington kindly led a group to St Ebba's church, pointing out the altars and stones in the porch and the stones outside in the structure of the church. This was followed by an interesting walk through ancient woodland, led by Bill Trow, exploring the possible river crossing of Dere Street over the River Derwent. Thanks to Richard Judd for arranging the day, hopefully the first of many.

Our next visit will be to the Lanchester church to examine the Roman remains and artefacts there. Village Cakes & Bakes Carrot Cake

Dear Village Voice readers,

Having recently been knocked out of the GBBO 2022 auditions in the 3rd round, due to my lack of meringue knowledge! I thought it would be fun to share my knowledge of baking...and eating cakes with you here, while I contemplate another application to the GBBO 2023, with new improved knowledge of meringues of course!

One of my favourite cakes to bake, which is so simple to make, and has never failed me yet is this carrot cake recipe inspired by the queen of cakes, Mary Berry. What I really love about this cake is the use of vegetable oil rather than butter, it gives the cake a really moist texture, and of course the delicious cream cheese is just the icing on the cake! One very important element of this cake is to use full fat cream cheese for the filling...not a low fat version...a mistake I have made in the past, the result being a very runny icing and filling, which doesn't look too good. This cake rises perfectly, it's a very generous cake, great for sharing, choose to decorate with walnut halves or like me, make teeny weeny carrots from coloured fondant icing (or you can buy them ready made in most supermarkets).

Prue and Paul would have loved this...happy baking!

For the cake

250 ml sunflower oil

4 large eggs, beaten

225 g soft brown sugar

200 g carrots, peeled and coarsely grated (I sometimes add a little more here to make it extra carroty)

300 g self-raising flour

2 tsp baking powder

1 tsp ground mixed spice

1 tsp ground ginger

75 g walnuts, shelled and chopped, plus 8 halves to decorate

For the icing

50 g butter (room temperature)

25 g icing sugar

250 g full-fat cream cheese (room temperature)...I use the supermarket's own budget brand which works just as well as the expensive stuff! 3 drops of vanilla extract

Step-by-step

Preheat the oven to 180°C/fan 160°C/350°F/gas mark 4. Grease two deep 20cm (8in) round sandwich tins and line the bases of the cake tins with baking parchment.

In a large bowl, combine all the ingredients for the cake mixture. Spoon the mixture evenly between the tins.

Put the cakes in the oven and bake for about 35 minutes, or until golden brown, risen, and shrinking away from the sides of the tins. Transfer to a wire rack to cool.

Make the icing: measure the butter, icing sugar, cream cheese, and vanilla extract into a bowl and whisk using a hand or electric whisk until smooth and thoroughly blended. Spread half the icing on one cake, sit the other cake on top, and spread the remaining icing on top to make a swirl pattern. Decorate the top of the cake with the halved walnuts.

Remembering



Colin Burrows 01/02/1930 - 08/04/2022

Colin was born in Nelson, Lancashire, and remained a proud Lancastrian all his life. He started work in the Employment Exchange in Burnley but was posted to Germany with the RAF during the Berlin airlift. Having got engaged to Jean (at the age of 18 prior to leaving for Germany), they married after the end of his national service in 1951. He continued to work for Employment Exchanges, in Scotland and the north of England, becoming manager at both Spennymoor and Bishop Auckland. From 1966, he, Jean and their two children lived in Foxhills Crescent, Lanchester, and they made many friends in the community. He was very involved in Lanchester Methodist Church, with the Sunday school, and also with the changes to the church in the early 90s.

He was also a long-standing member of Lanchester Operatic Society and enjoyed their performances. He joined the Advisory, Conciliation and Arbitration Service in the 70s, and worked there until his retirement in 1988. Even after retirement he continued to contribute, both as chairman of the local Age Concern, and also as a lay member for mental health reviews. He remained committed to trying to ensure that everyone got a fair chance of a good life.

He was a very loving, supportive husband to Jean for over 70 years of marriage, a great dad and granddad, and a loyal friend. He died peacefully in Greenways Court Care Home, only a few weeks after his 'trip of a lifetime', a helicopter ride piloted by his grandson. He was loved and respected by all who knew him, and he will be much missed.


The Commonwealth war grave of Stewart is in Lanchester, Kitswell Road

Notes from the House

To cap off a busy week in North West Durham, where I spent time touring the cultural scene in the run up to the City of Culture 2025 final with Arts minister Lord Parkinson, enjoying a sunny day at Consett RFC's Presentation Day, and conducting several important constituent surgeries – I was very

lucky to spend time with my mother, grandfather, and my little cousin Patrick (for whom it was his first visit to London), down in Westminster.

My grandfather, Patrick, and I attended the State Opening of Parliament, which serves to mark the formal start of the parliamentary year and sets out Her Majesty's Government's plans for the next year. It was a great occasion. Prince Charles, The Duchess of Cornwall and Prince William did a superb job as Counsellors of State in the Queen's absence. The Queen, I am sure, was sat at home with a big smile as her family performed her responsibilities with dignity. With 38 Government Bills in the Queen's Speech - it's going to be a busy year in Parliament.

Alongside other constitutional and conventional oddities, the Yeomen of the Guard (the men dressed in extravagant red costumes) searched the House of Lords and the underbelly of the palace for any Guy Fawkes copycats who would wish to repeat the events of 3rd November 1605, to ensure the safety of all. And have you ever wondered why Black Rod – who for the first time is a role held by a woman – loudly bangs on the door of the Commons with her stick? This is because, when she isn't maintaining order within the Lords Chamber, she acts as the Monarch's spokesman. When the door of the Commons is shut on her, this is a symbolic gesture that the Commons - and by extension the electorate - is independent from the sovereign. In other words, democracy is rightly an unalienable tenet of our British state. There is no divine right, but constitutional monarchy allowed by the will of the people.

After all of this, my mum, who has worked in a community hospital all through the pandemic, as well as caring for my grandma who has very advanced dementia, joined me for a slightly rainy, but nonetheless very special, Buckingham Palace garden party. The first time we've spent time one-onone since I was elected. Next week the House of Commons will continue with debates on the Queen's Speech and Parliament will get back into the swing of things! And I look forward to continuing my work in North West Durham, fighting my all for you and the rest of my constituents - especially to ease the burden of rising costs following Russia's



She writes modestly in her farewell note to customers: "I hope in a small way I have given service and satisfaction. Best wishes and a big thank you to all."


One resident and customer said "A very big thank you for cutting our hair for 47 years, and the chat.



Good day readers

For this edition of the Village Voice, I am going to share with you a walk I have been taken on not too far from Lanchester.

For those who haven't met me on my walks, my name is Poppy, I am a black Patterdale Terrier with a tinge of grey, and I enjoy sharing details of the walks I lead my Humans on. Smiddy Shaw reservoir is located just off the A68 from Castleside,

down a road called Healeyfield Lane.

It is nine miles from my home in Lanchester in the Human's car, where I sit in the front to give directions.

We alight in a gravel car park opposite a white building which is now a private house but used to be a pub called the Moorcock. I often notice my male Human staring wistfully in its direction when we get out of the car.

I am kept on my lead throughout the duration of this walk due to the presence of sheep, funny black faced creatures in this instance. Notices insist on this rule being obeyed. We walk along a path surrounded by heather, and it is noticeably colder and windier than Lanchester. There aren't

many trees about, but the moorland has a rather splendid feel to it and there are smells in abundance to explore. By following the path, we can see the outline of the reservoir, and walk below a grassy embankment for a hundred yards or so before finding some steps which lead us to the top of the embankment, where humans can see over the wall onto the reservoir. I can too if I jump onto the wall

We follow the contours of the reservoir and come to a cottage which overlooks it, and which has a small boat moored in front. Behind the cottage are pens containing fierce looking dogs which bark loudly.

I try to ignore them. We either walk through the courtyard in front of the dogs or take a detour behind them which leads to a footbridge across a stream.

Either way we get back onto the shore of the reservoir and continue to walk round it in a full circle.

The walk takes a little less than an hour and there are lots of streams to explore en route which of course feed into the reservoir.

Regrettably I have to be kept on my lead, but it is still an enjoyable walk which I would recommend unless it is too windy!

Our last outing was to the Seven Stars situated in Shincliffe village. It has been taken over, refurbished and has a fantastic new menu - the choices are endless. We were seated in an alcove just off the main restaurant - it had just a nice amount of room for one table - suited our needs perfectly. The waitress was very welcoming, extremely informative (her husband was one of the chefs) and we were soon ready to order our meal.

Instead of a main course, some of us had two starters - gives a lighter and possibly a more interesting option for lunch.

Starters were: crispy pork and bacon pudding served with chilli jam and pickled veg spaghetti; seared scallops served with parsnip purée, bacon jam and roasted pine nuts (if you like seafood, this is the place for you - 3 HUGE scallops served on a platter); grilled asparagus with cured grated egg yolk parmesan and herb oil; beetroot tartare served with prepared goats cheese and pea shoots; and pan fried chicken livers with bacon crisps, onion and apple brandy chutney. Mains were: Thai Penang curry with sticky rice and prawn crackers and rainbow trout served with crushed potatoes and asparagus velouté. Puddings were: chocolate orange torte with vanilla ice cream, pear tarte tatin with clotted cream ice cream (it looked amazing - but, the tart failed to rise to the occasion, which was a pity but the price was taken off the bill), creme brûlée with raspberries and cinnamon shortbread, and sticky toffee pudding with butterscotch and vanilla ice cream, and an ice cream selection.

Lovely coffee finished off a superb meal.

Our food was absolutely delicious with lots of new and varied options to try. We had had a really lovely afternoon until we came to pay the bill when we had a bit of controversy with the automated till over our account. I'm very pleased to say that golden oldies and old style mathematics won the day!!

Solar farm proposed at Burnhope

A new solar farm is being proposed at Burnhope. The map for the location of the farm is shown below and it will occupy 215 acres of land. The proposal is being led by lightsourcebp. It aims to produce nearly 52,000 megawatt hours of electricity per year – equivalent to the energy needs of nearly 14,000 households.

There was a consultation in Burnhope recently. The proposers state that they will screen the site from the road, allow for continued agricultural use and boost diversity.


Clearly such a proposal will arouse strong opinions, so we have asked Sonny Shepherd of the Lanchester Environment Group for her views to spark off the debate.

Proposed Burnhope Solar Farm provides a Ray of Hope

The current energy crisis resulting in rapidly rising energy costs is helping us all to focus on how and where our energy is sourced. There is no doubt in most people's mind that we need cheaper, cleaner and locally produced energy. Consequently, I welcome this proposed solar development near Chapman's Well.

The proposed site is largely screened by biodiversity - rich wood and scrubland which I believe will remain untouched. And the proposal is to create meadow grassland within the solar farm which can continue to be grazed by sheep, hence maintaining its agricultural use.

By providing for the energy needs of over 5% of County Durham households, this seems to be just the sort of project we need to help in combating both climate change and energy security. If we could link this with reducing our demands and some energy storage, we could of course make an even bigger difference.

Cervical screening can save lives

Cervical screening has changed over the past few years and is part of ongoing improvements to the programme. In England, Scotland, and Wales, Human Papilloma Virus (HPV) primary screening is the primary testing method used on samples collected at cervical screening. This is not a test for cancer but having cervical screening lowers your chances of getting cervical cancer.

Human papillomavirus (HPV) is a common virus that 8 in 10 people will get. Your immune system normally clears HPV by itself, and it usually goes away without causing any problems. High-risk HPV can cause the cells in your cervix to change. Over time these cells can develop into cervical cancer; over 99.7% of cervical cancers are caused by high-risk HPV.

All samples taken at cervical screening are tested for high-risk HPV and if this is not detected the risk of developing cervical cancer is extremely low. If high-risk HPV is detected that same sample will be tested for cell changes. If no cell changes are identified, you will be invited for a repeat test in 12 months to check if you have cleared the virus. If cell changes are identified, you will be referred for colposcopy examination to look at your cervix more closely and any abnormalities will be treated.

Cervical screening in England is currently offered for women and people with a cervix every 3 years from age 25 to 49 and every 5 years from age 50 to 64. The test is sensitive and accurate, meaning cell changes are detected early. Evidence shows it is safe for those who test negative for high risk HPV to be screened less often. Chances of getting cancer within 5 years are very small as it can take 10 -15 years for HPV to develop into cancer; the risk of this happening before your next screening test is very low. Changes to cervical screening intervals has already happened in other countries; Wales and Scotland have moved to 5 year testing for those who test negative for HPV on their previous test. England will follow in due course following implementation of the new Cervical Screening Management System.

Cervical screening saves lives; you should consider having screening regardless of your sexual orientation, sexual history, or whether you have had the HPV vaccination. The test only takes a few minutes. If you are anxious, you could ask someone you trust about their experience, speak with your nurse or doctor, or call the Jo's Trust helpline on 0808 802 8000 for more support.







Notes from the Ordinary Meeting held in Lynwood House on Tuesday 10 May 2022 at 7.15pm

Minutes – Ordinary Meeting 12 April – approved

Police Report – Received. Information on how the statistics compare to county and national statistics and targets to be requested alongside police attendance at a future meeting.

Correspondence

- Durham County Council Christmas Lights 2022
- Councillors agreed to accept the price of $\mathfrak{L}1,296$ for undertaking the annual work to the Christmas Lights on the Village Green
- Society of Local Council Clerks annual membership renewed at a cost of £215.00
- County Durham Association of Local Councils annual membership renewed at a cost of £574.37
- Damage to rights of way in Foxcover Woods Councillors considered information received from a resident regarding recent felling works in Foxcover Woods which has damaged and blocked rights of way. It was agreed that correspondence is sent to the County Council expressing concern about the works and asking that they investigate the matter
- Lanchester Allotments Association Minutes of the AGM received
- Jubilee Grant available from the County Councillors It was agreed that an application is made towards the cost of planting a jubilee tree in the autumn
- The Way of Light Interpretation Board It was agreed that a response is made asking why images of all three churches are not included, seeking clarification on ongoing maintenance and informing the County Council of damage to the route from the nearby river

Durham County Councillors – An update was received on several issues including:

traffic proposals around schools, meeting regarding road safety issues, meeting with Head of St Bedes School regarding additional parking options, Karbon Homes – delays in maintenance works to some properties, Burnhope Solar farm – consultation.

Councillors were informed of the progress on the City of Culture Bid. They were informed that the new County Hall will be sold. They were made aware of the increase in card fraud through the use of card readers that can access your card details.

Manor Grange Play Area - Councillors were informed that a pre-start meeting had taken place with representatives from the Parish Council, Durham County Council and HAGs UK play company. Work is due to start in the week commencing 23 May 2022, the police to be informed of the start date. An article will be placed in the Village Voice to inform the community of progress. It was agreed that the surface for the footpath will be bound gravel and that an additional seat be included in the scheme.

Queen's Platinum Jubilee Beacons Event - Councillors received an update on the event. Arrangements are in progress. Planning permission has been received to permanently locate the beacon at Burnhope picnic area. Information from the Safety Advisory Group and the licence for the event are still awaited. Councillors considered and approved a pack of event information which included: aerial map, site plan, day timetable, event timetable, risk assessment, volunteer information and poster

Lanchester Partnership – Jubilee Event - Councillors considered information received on the Lanchester Partnership Jubilee event planned for Sunday 5 June. It was agreed that a donation of £500 is made towards the event Traffic Concerns - Councillors discussed the ongoing traffic concerns around the EP Primary School. Councillors considered and supported the amended parking and waiting proposal from the County Council to address the current problems and asked that enforcement takes place once the scheme is implemented.

Unpleasant Odour in the Village - Residents have been in contact concerned about the unpleasant odour in the village. It was agreed that the situation is monitored

The requirement for planning permission can be complex particularly within the conservation area. Cricket News

Since that opening day victory, the first team had three defeats at the hands of Ashington, Castle Eden and Philadelphia. However, they did finish the reporting period with a close win at Blaydon, which keeps them in mid-table. Blaydon were bowled out for 132 with Kieron Taylor taking 4-38. They were slightly disappointed that their final wicket pair put on 40. It was a hard slog to pass the Blaydon total and Lanchester were indebted to a stubborn unbeaten 32 by Pasindu.

The seconds had more success as they lost only once to Burnmoor, having beaten Philadelphia, Eppleton and Blaydon. In the match against Philadelphia, Dan Scott took a career best 7-37. Eppleton were beaten by 9 wickets after Jack Slane and Cameron Metcalfe took 3 wickets each. In the win over Blaydon, Nav Ahmed, Ethan Connolly and Sam Reynolds scored fifties, while Dan Scott took 4 wickets in a fantastic fight back.

The third team have instilled fear into their opponents as the first two teams conceded. They eventually got a game against Seaham Park and won comfortably. Teenagers, Mae Deaville took a wicket with her first ball in senior cricket and Toby Somersall scored a maiden senior 50.

The fourth team, a combo with Burnhope, have won their two matches so far. They beat Kimblesworth in the opening game and then beat Consett by 5 runs chiefly thanks to an unbeaten 116 by 15-year-old Ethan Connolly.

Only one under 18 match has been played as two games have been conceded by opposition and that was an easy win over South Northumberland, meanwhile the under 15s have had handsome wins in the first two rounds of the Willis Elliott Cup, beating Blaydon and Greenside. Ryton await in the semi-final.

Girls' football opportunities

Football in the past has been dominated by male role models. Currently with the coverage of woman's football growing unbelievably the women's game is expanding faster than ever, proving the possession of this sport shouldn't be left to the boys.

Our club, Deerness Valley FC, based close to Durham, has been working hard to grow a girls' section. We have made huge strides in creating opportunities for girls to play this national sport. As an example, we teamed up with Durham Woman's FC as a sister club to give the younger players a chance to meet the experienced and successful ladies. Indeed, football is now officially the biggest female team sport in England. Last season over 147,000 female players competed in affiliated league and cup competitions – a figure which has risen from just 10,400 in 1993, when records started.

But there is still massive growth potential – 1.1 million girls play kick about football – with lots of barriers we are still eager to overcome.

Deerness Valley has started a Wildcats section to allow girls as young as 6 to come along to our development centre and try out football. We also have U10, U12, U14, U15 and U18 teams, welcoming new players with open arms, no matter the experience or level.

New Play Area for Lanchester

Following several years of work to secure leases and funding, work is due to start on the new play area at Manor Grange.
