25th April marked the launch of the Burnhope Supper club, a collaboration between All Saints and St John's, Burnhope, St Nic's Durham, Feeding Families, Burnhope school and Burnhope Community centre, teaching families to cook. The first session involved making pasta with meatballs- and was evidently enjoyed by all who attended.

And finally- some sad news.

Brenda Craddock, who will be well known to readers of the Village Voice and who often reported on village events for the magazine, sadly died on 19th April. Brenda had a profound faith and was active in church- running the Sunday School, preaching, leading Church Wives, supporting the Childrens' Society, presiding over our Open House lunches, volunteering for Messy Church and serving at the altar. Wildlife notes

'30 Days Wild' - Annual Challenge

Sound inviting? Spend the 30 days of June going wild. It can be anything you fancy connected with nature. It isn't structured so no 'chore'. You can take part as much or as little as you like; it can be a tiny thing on a busy day, just a few seconds watching a bee or noticing a flower.

You are free to spend your Friday finding a finch, Saturday smelling flowers, Sunday growing a sunflower, Monday looking for the mallards at Malton (remember last year's duckling success?), Tuesday finding treasure on a nature trail, Wednesday checking a wild webcam, Thursday hugging three different types of tree you've got the idea!

It is organised by 'The Wildlife Trusts' and you can sign up to take part and receive a free pack via email or post:

https://www.wildlifetrusts.org/30dayswild.

Most suggested activities are aimed at families/kids, but us adults can make our own wild times too.

There are proven benefits to spending some 'wild' time; being more connected to nature is great for us humans. (Stop reading now to avoid the 'science part': University of Derby has analysed data collected from participants of '30 days Wild' over the past five years and evaluation of the responses suggest the positive effects are still felt two months after the challenge is over!).

Ladies who lunch

For our last outing we went to the Kings Lodge Durham - not too far away and a very easy journey. Part of the Innkeeper group, it has a light, airy, modern feel. They have a main menu and a light lunch one - so plenty of choice.

We opted to try for starters - a crispy duck salad. Mains were pan roasted fillet of halibut with grilled asparagus and a bearnaise sauce; pan seared rump of lamb with green beans, olives, cherry tomatoes and gratin potatoes; pan fried sea trout with gravadlax sauce, samphire and new potatoes; and grilled escalopes of chicken served with a lettuce heart salad in an avocado and buttermilk herb dressing.

Desserts were tropical meringue with coconut ice cream, pineapple, and passion fruit; rhubarb crumble with raspberry ripple custard; caramel chocolate sundae; soft warm chocolate brownie with salted caramel sauce and vanilla ice cream; and ice cream.

The restaurant wasn't very busy but service, although most pleasant, was very slow. Two meals were served cold and had to go back.

All in all, even though some of us had meals which were totally fine, plus the food itself being good - we were less than impressed! Not on

our 'return again' list I'm afraid.

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
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Poppy's walks

Good day readers. Today I am going to tell you about a walk I did with a walking group at Medomsley, just a short car drive from

As you will know by now, I am Poppy, a Patterdale Terrier who enjoys a good

deal of exercise and shares with you the walks I lead my humans on.

We started out at the village church in the centre of Medomsley, and walked along a footpath adjacent to the church which took us past a farmstead with some hissing geese which I tried to ignore with an attempt at dignity. The fact that they were on the other side of a fence helped. We carried on until the end of the path where we climbed a stile and crossed a road. This led us opposite a housing estate.

We walked through the estate along a road called The Dene. The Dene is a cul-de-sac but a footpath led us beyond it onto another path through fields. This brought us onto the B6309 road between Hassockfield and Ebchester. We

crossed the road and followed another signposted footpath – the good thing about this walk was that most of it was away from roads, although we did have to cross one or two – and we eventually joined the old railway line at a point between Shotley Bridge and Ebchester.

We walked towards and then beyond the old Ebchester station, passing the railway platform near the Derwent Walk Inn. A short way beyond on the railway path we left it down a flight of stairs. This was quite steep, and we crossed a stream where I enjoyed having a dip. From there we walked uphill through some woods before leaving them to go into a field. We walked on a fairly steep incline across three fields and one road before eventually getting back to Medomsley, arriving at a path alongside the junior school.

I passed a couple of docile looking horses en route but no other livestock to cause concern, either to them or to me. We walked back along the Front Street past the Royal Oak, where the male Human looked wistful and was heard regretting the fact it wasn't opening time yet.

The walk took us about an hour and 20 minutes and was quite steep at times, so not for the faint hearted. But anyone wanting to try just a portion of it would still enjoy some healthy exercise.

Easter vintage tractor rally in aid of Motor Neurone Disease Association

A vintage tractor rally set off from Moorside Farm, near Lanchester, on Easter Sunday. The rally was a special fundraising event organised by the Lanchester Vintage Tractor club in memory of one of their founder members, Ernie Hopps. 56 tractors participated in the rally which called at the Jolly Drovers in Leadgate as a halfway point. It raised $\mathfrak{L}1,150$ for Motor Neurone Disease (MND) Association – amazing for one event.

Ernie died in 2020 aged 76 after suffering with MND for about 18 months. Ernie grew up in Victoria Terrace, Lanchester and was always in mischief. He worked in the engine sheds at the Consett Iron Company and eventually advanced to the role of chargehand in the boiler houses. This was a highly skilled job as parts were not readily available for steam locomotives and diesels, so they had to make the parts from scratch. He then worked on the family farm in Medomsley until this was sold and he "retired". He then had a series of part-time jobs and worked on vintage tractors at Esp Green Farm where he was able to assist fellow club members with any welding and repair tasks that needed to be undertaken. He loved to chat to everybody who came up.

He was a keen rugby player and played for Consett in the late 60's and early 70's.

His brother David said "If you were in a pub, you always

knew he was there – you couldn't miss the laughter. He was a man of old school values, hardworking, with a great sense of humour, but didn't suffer fools!"

The rally started at Ernie's brother, David Hopps' farm and was led by a grey Ferguson tractor, driven by David, which was the last tractor Ernie had restored. David converted the throttle to left-handed so that it could be driven with one arm as Ernie lost the use of his arm before the project was completed.

The proceeds were presented to Dominic McDonough, Regional Fundraiser for the MND Association by David Hopps at the Lanchester Social Club on May 3rd.







All Saints' Primary School Lanchester

From our indoor classroom, we have two ways in which we can access our large outdoor classroom. A water area, sand pit area and small world space are available out there for the children. As well as a potions/mixing section, gross motor area, climbing, writing area, acting/singing stage, messy play and painting area, there are many opportunities to get creative. We are thrilled with our new purchase of balance bikes to add to our scooters and our most recent venture is to add a pulley to our digging pit - watch this space! This year, we have loved introducing Forest School for our children in Nursery and Reception Class and we have really enjoyed the initiative 'Squiggle While You Wiggle' for our emergent writers. The staff

in our Nursery and Reception class are second to none and work hard to ensure our youngest pupils are involved in all areas of school life from day one: class assemblies, liturgies, educational visits and visitors. All are welcome in our Nursery and Reception Class: for an individual visit, please do not hesitate to call or email and we would love to show you around!

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
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

Notes from the House

This Saturday in Westminster Abbey our new King and Queen will be crowned. This will be a moment of joy for so many after the sadness that followed the death of Her late Majesty, Queen Elizabeth, last year. I have been very fortunate to have been selected in a ballot as one of a small number of Members of Parliament who will be attending alongside Cabinet Ministers and former Prime Ministers. It is an honour and a privilege to represent the people of North West Durham at this historic occasion.

Coronations have been held at Westminster Abbey for almost 900 years, with William the Conqueror being the first documented Coronation there on Christmas Day 1066. This Saturday, King Charles will follow in his footsteps. While this will be the 40th Coronation at Westminster

Abbey, it is only the second to be televised and broadcast to the Commonwealth and the wider world.

While the objects used in each sovereign's coronation may have changed from time to time, the way the Coronation takes place here has remained nearly the same for almost a thousand years. With the eyes of the world watching, the Archbishop of Canterbury will crown the King with St Edward's Crown, which is made of solid gold and features over 400 gemstones. Royalty and foreign dignitaries will be present – the largest number ever - in a truly magical moment that many of us will remember for the rest of our lives.

The King will be presented as monarch to the people and will swear an oath to uphold the laws of the realm and of the Church. For me, this will be the most significant moment. A monarch crowned, but only King because it is the will of the people via our sovereign Parliament. The essence of constitutional monarchy – a figurehead who can advise and guide but not decide.

Bringing people together in unity to mark this historical occasion is what this Coronation is really about. So, while I am excited to go, I am also sad to be missing out on the celebrations on the day in Lanchester and the towns and villages across North West Durham.

One of the most remarkable things about our area is the strong community spirit that is palpable to any outsider. As well as being a historical moment unfolding, the Coronation weekend is a unique opportunity for people to get together and celebrate with friends, neighbours and loved ones. The street parties, barbecues, and village fetes, celebrating the Coronation really will be something special.

Hopefully the weather will hold up, but it is likely that it won't – just as it didn't at The Queen's in 1953. But I'm certain this won't dampen the spirits of all those involved in Westminster and taking part in their own way across the rest of the country.

How to take your medicines safely

At Lanchester Pharmacy, we want our patients to take their medicines safely and effectively. Here are some top tips on how you can do this:

Before you leave the pharmacy, double check the medication label to confirm your name and address.

We recommend making two lists of your medicines. One to keep in your wallet/purse and one to keep safely at home. Make sure you show this list to all health care providers, including dentists and physical therapists. On both lists please include:

- Names of all your medications, including vitamins and supplements or medicines bought over the counter
- · When and how often you take your medicines
- · Why it has been prescribed and by who
- How to take your medicine this information is on the label of your medicine

Unsure of any of the following, please come into the pharmacy and we can help discuss this with you:

- · How to know if your medicine is working?
- What side effects to look out for with your medicine?
- Is there anything I should avoid buying from the pharmacy to take with my medicine?
- · If I want to stop my medicine, is it safe to stop abruptly?
- · Is it safe for me to drive with my medicine?
- Is there anything I should avoid eating or drinking with this medicine?
- · If I forget to take my medicine, what should I do?
- · How should I store my medicine?

Always try to collect your prescription from the same pharmacy, so the pharmacist knows what medication is new, and if it is safe for you to take. If you are unable to use the same pharmacy each time, bring a list of your medicines in for the pharmacist to see.

Remember, take your medicine as prescribed, checking the instructions label on your medicine box. Always read the patient information leaflet for each medication – found inside the medicine box.

When flying, keep your medicine in your hand luggage. Make sure you have enough medication to last your trip. Always keep medicines out of direct sunlight and heat – both at home and when travelling.

A large dog terrorised a Lanchester street, injuring three people.

The dog, believed to be an Alsatian, has now been destroyed. According to eyewitness Paul Cook, from Pethside, Lanchester, the horrific incident took place at around 6pm on Friday, April 21. Mr Cook said the dog was being walked by its owner, who also lives in Pethside, when it turned on him. "It began attacking him and had him pinned to the ground. A woman neighbour tried to intervene to help, as did another man. I was stood with a plastic chair trying to get it off, but it wouldn't let go. By this time the whole street was out trying to help but the dog was uncontrollable. The lady who tried to help was also pinned to the ground and injured. She was in a terrible state. And another chap was bitten by it."

The dog was eventually brought under control and taken away by police. Paramedics were also called to treat the casualties and two were rushed to hospital by ambulance. Thankfully their injuries were not as serious as first feared.

Lanchester Neighbourhood Police officer Jonathan Rutherford confirmed: "We had an incident with a dangerous dog there on the 21st. Both street wardens and dog section assisted in gaining control of the dog which was taken away to Stray Aid and has now been destroyed.

"We did have two victims and they are making a recovery as far as I am aware, and the injuries luckily are not as bad as first thought.

"The owner has also been given a community protection notice and being given set conditions about keeping dogs and how they should be walked. "The incident was logged as an assault with injury and is due to be closed after investigations are complete."

But Mr Cook claims the authorities are not treating the incident as seriously as he believes it warrants.

"The same man has another dog which barks all the time, and which also looks vicious. People in the street are terrified to let their children or grandchildren out and it is hardly surprising."
