Report from Lanchester Local History Society meeting Friday 5th April


Passersby may have mistaken our meeting for the Choral Society as Paul started his talk on Pensher Monument by getting the 20 plus audience singing along with the full unedited score of The Lambton Worm. He told us there are many theories as to why there is a copy of The Temple of Theseus on a hill in County Durham and then told us the story. The First Earl of Durham died in 1840, one of his 'titles' was Radical Jack but over his life he had endeared himself to the population of the county. Born in London, educated at Eton, military service in 10th Hussars and became an MP at 21. He was a Reformer and held several overseas appointments on behalf of his country.

Following his funeral, which was a huge celebration of his life, a committee was set up to raise funds to explore some way to remember him. By 1844 John and Benjamin Green Architects had been appointed to erect the monument on Pensher hill. Sketches of the plans were even published in the London Illustrated News and a dedication was held as the building was near completion. The end product is something we all know well.

Snippets of other items we heard. If a worm ever wrapped itself around a hill, it would be Worm Hill at Fatfield. The song that we started the talk singing is not a Wearside song, it was written for a pantomime in a theatre in Newcastle. The monument has been the subject of several April Fools scams over the years.

Dark Skies, Bright Future

I wonder how many people reading this article have spent time looking up on a clear night in Lanchester and enjoyed the view of the night sky, with planets in our solar system visible such as Jupiter and Mars, as well as the constellations of Orion and Ursa Major (the Plough), and star clusters such as the Pleiades (otherwise known as the Seven Sisters).

In lots of ways, we are lucky to be able to enjoy these views as we live in an area classed as level 5 by the Bortle scale (a measurement of light pollution in the night sky). For comparison, Kielder is classed as a level 3, and Newcastle is a level 9, where only the brightest objects, such as Jupiter, are visible. In other ways, we could also be doing a lot more to better preserve our dark skies. If you've ever seen the amazing images of the earth at night from the International Space Station you can see the amount of light emitted by human activity, mostly from street lights. Their glare is scattered by the earth's atmosphere creating sky glows over our heads

I've been inspired to write this piece by an article I read recently about dark sky communities (tinyurl.com/a425yra8), in particular, a story from Presteigne in Wales. With a population of 2,700, they became the first Dark Sky Community in Wales. Similar to many places across the country (including our village), the local authority replaced their orange tinted sodium lighting with LED lighting to reduce running costs. Whilst it did save money, the LED lights flooded the streets with bright white and blue rich colours with a colour temperature of 6500K harming local wildlife populations such as bats and impacting a local observatory from seeing the night sky as well as they had before. The community acted and refurbished 380 light columns with "warm-white" LED lights (colour temperature of 2200K). Half of them were turned off at midnight and the rest were dimmed by 50%. The results meant that not only were they able to preserve their glorious views of the night sky, they also reduced their annual carbon emission output by 4.5 tonnes. Living in Lanchester, you can very easily see the impact that light pollution can have on the night sky. Next time there is a clear night, look north and you will see very few stars, all being obstructed by the lights from Newcastle and the Greencroft industrial estate. Look south west and you will see thousands of stars due to the lack of light pollution over the North Pennines. The longer you stay outside the more you will see as your eyes adjust to the darkness.

Being a Dark Sky Community has far-reaching benefits, extending beyond the enjoyment of the natural beauty of the night sky. By adopting measures to reduce light pollution, we can protect our biodiversity and human health whilst reducing financial costs and contributions to greenhouse emissions. Whilst becoming a Dark Sky Community requires buy-in from the local authority, there are things that we can do as individuals to play our part in reducing light pollution without compromising safety or security, and in turn, save money:

Direct light downwards, minimising upward glare When you next replace outdoor lighting, consider using warmwhite LED bulbs Turn off unnecessary lights (evidence suggests cameras and alarms act as a greater deterrent to criminals than security lights - https://tinyurl.com/3muy3zvr)

As a keen amateur astrophotographer, there's huge potential for capturing the night sky from here in the village. Below are some of the photographs I've taken from my own back garden. My hope is that one day there is appetite for Lanchester to work towards being a Dark Sky Community. Ben Garside (Lanchester resident)

I'm pleased and relieved that everyone returned safely and unscathed, if somewhat weary.

It would appear that not only have we reached a situation in society where one must drink on-the- go these days ...no matter whether it's water, sports drinks or alcohol... but also for many to jettison their drinking vessels out of the car window. I do feel that the introduction of a deposit return scheme on cans and bottles might help to add value to waste items and encourage people to recycle more. Just as charging for plastic carrier bags has meant we now rarely see tattered plastic carriers hanging from spiky roadside bushes we might eventually see fewer bottles and cans in the ditches.

Can I end by thanking once again all those volunteers both the regulars and the newcomers who turned out on a damp cold day and a huge thank you to the Community Café who offered free breakfast buns to all pickers. What a lovely and tasty idea!! There are so many people in Lanchester who strive to make this a better place for all to live. Thank you.

Lanchester Medical Centre: Patient Participation Group Anxiety

Anxiety or fear, the difference- fear is the response to a perceived threat, while anxiety involves worry about a threat that has not yet or may never happen. If we are alone in a dark place late at night, it's a good thing to have a little anxiety or fear, as this encourages us to be on the lookout and aware of possible danger. Generalised causes of anxiety- having a long term painful illness or having a history of a stressful or traumatic experience can result in anxiety. A history of drug or alcohol misuse can lead to anxiety. It is believed an inherited gene from parents predisposes to anxiety. Over activity in the areas of the brain involving emotions and imbalance of brain chemicals which are involved in the control of regulation of mood, have all been identified as possible causes of anxiety. However, many people develop anxiety for no apparent reason. Things to help reduce anxiety- talking about your anxiety, sharing fears with a partner, friend, or family member can take away a lot of scariness. You could also try a Cognitive Behavioural Therapy approach. Be kind to your body with a healthy lifestyle, regular exercise, stop smoking, reduce your alcohol levels, and drink less caffeine. Seek out local self-help groups for anxiety.

Helpful tips in anxiety:

 It is impossible to think clearly in an anxiety state so take time out so you can physically calm down.

- · Concentrate on breathing slowly and regularly.
- Visualise a happy place a place where you feel safe and picture this in your mind.
- Try the three space 333 rule- name three things you can see, three things you can hear, move three different parts of your body.

Life is full of stresses- it is important to remember that our lives are not perfect. Bad days and setbacks will always happen. Do not allow yourself to withdraw from friends and family, we all need social interaction with others

It is normal- to experience anxiety at some point in life, sitting exams, a job interview, family worries. But some people find it hard to control these worries and symptoms become constant and can affect daily lives. It is at this point that you should contact your surgery to speak with a health professional. www.nhs.uk/every-mind-matters/mental-wellbeing-tips/top-tips-to-improve-your-mental-wellbeing

Police will be testing a new solution to the issues of parking in the Burnhope and Lanchester areas. Those caught repeatedly parking on double yellow lines (without a disability badge), parking on keep clears, parking on dropped kerbs and causing an obstruction to a resident's drive/pedestrians will receive a Community Protection Warning – this can't be appealed and will stay with the person for 12 months. If they are caught again, they will receive a Community Protection Notice. If they reoffend within the next 12 months, they will be issued with a fine or subject to court proceedings.

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Wildlife - Notes

Smile, it's a slug!

Is "Slug love" a step too far? Read on. You can encourage mollusc munchers into your garden space to help control your 'unwanted visitors' ("molluscs", I learned at school is a term for animals like snails and slugs. Munchers include hedgehogs, beetles and birds like the thrush).

Consider creating a wildlife sensitive garden: balancing the visual botanical with the biodiversity. Even a small space helps.

Here are a few reasons to tolerate the intolerable:

1) Some of our favourite critters, like our hoggies, rely on a slug/snail snack! They sometimes struggle to snuffle enough food and our gardens can provide a platter for their palette. Simply ensure they can gain access to your green space (a small hole in a fence helps), avoid using chemical treatments that can harm wildlife and, ideally, provide a source of water (most important during drought!).

2) "Slugs and Co." help improve your soil = happier plants. Not all slug species feed on your pride-and-joy. Instead, they feed on 'unwanted' morsels e.g. rotten vegetation, dung, even dead creatures, thereby recycling them back into your soil to nurture your garden.

3) Some slugs are 'territorial' warding off others. If 'you' move a slug a short distance it may come back and worse, they may take non-native (garden) plant seeds with them into the 'wild'.

Please have patience (with missing leaves, flowers, even plants absent before you get the 'wild' balance right). Cooperation and coexistence are the buzzwords for our bees, butterflies, and biodiversity.

Perhaps put your gardening hobby into perspective? Creatures that we share our space with may prefer 'less tidy'. Make even a small area you mow into a meadow and watch the wildflowers grow (p.s. if you just leave your lawn, it will possibly launch into a disappointing landscape, see links below for advice). If you grow plants that flower across as many months as possible, they will attract more invertebrates, plants like Buddleia, Lavender and Aubretia are magnets for butterflies and bees.

Poppy's walks

Good day readers and this month's walk takes place in Old Esh, about four miles from Lanchester. While it is possible for some to walk to Old Esh from Lanchester to begin our stroll, it is a steep hike. The Human and I took the car and parked it at the far end of

the village next to a carved owl and a litter bin. This was because a lot of cars had already parked near the school and the village pub, the Cross Keys.

As you will know by now, I am Poppy, a Patterdale terrier who enjoys sharing with readers the walks I lead my Humans on. This walk is notable for its views across both the Browney and Deerness valleys, although while the Humans tend to admire these views I find more interest in the surrounding undergrowth. After parking at the side of the road and getting out of the car we cross the road and proceed along a farm track on foot. This takes us to a farmyard called Low Esh farm. We pass a pretty cottage called Byre Cottage on the way to the farm. At the time of writing the daffodils were looking splendid, but by the time you read this they will probably have faded somewhat. From the farmyard we spot a stile – a sort of wooden step on the side of a wall – and cross that onto a path across fields.

This is known as a Saints Trail according to a sign on the side of a wall. We walk alongside a field without livestock on our right and with panoramic views of the Deerness Valley. But there are sheep on the field to our left across a fence, so I am kept on my lead. We

walk across two fields and come to another stile which we have to cross carefully, because it is adjacent to a fairly busy road. We could have gone straight on towards Ushaw College but instead we turn left and follow a path alongside the road. This takes us near to but not past the Board Inn. There is a part of the walk where we have to stay on the verge while the road turns a left-hand bend, but after 100 yards or so we come to a newly laid pavement to walk back in the direction of Old Esh. The Humans say the views of Langley Park to the right are spectacular - resembling a toy town with Diggerland in the far side looking like a child's Lego set - I heard the male Human rather poetically say. We could now just walk back to the car, but we pass another public footpath sign on our left, and I insist we follow it. I do this by tugging on my lead and refusing to budge in any other direction. We therefore cross another stile and get away from the road, going diagonally left across a field which is the one with the sheep in it. But of course, I am on my lead and am well behaved in any case. At the end of the field is another stile to take us across a fence which guides us back onto the footpath we had left earlier - the Saints Trail. We turn right and head back to Low Esh Farm, then right at the farmvard and back to the car next to the carved owl. The walk - with the detour I insisted on - took about an hour and ten minutes and is highly recommended by yours truly.

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

Notes from the Ordinary Meeting held in Lynwood House on Tuesday 12 March 2024 at 7.00pm

Minutes - Ordinary Meeting 13th February - approved.

Virgin Media network expansion - The Community Lead from Virgin Media attended the meeting to inform members of the works that will be taking place in Lanchester. Once the works are completed residents will be able to access Gigabit broadband, and other Virgin Media services. When rolling out the network to new areas, they use a hybrid approach of utilising existing infrastructure and installing their network through civil engineering. Although they always try to keep any disruption to a minimum, they realise that residents may raise concerns about the works in their area, so they want to make sure everyone is aware of what will be taking place. Residents should receive a letter before any works begin outside their property. They hope to only be working outside the same property for a couple of days and are hoping to complete all the work in the village by September 2024. The Clerk will be happy to provide contact details if any residents have further questions or queries.

Lanchester Wheelchair User Group - Members from Lanchester Wheelchair User Group attended the meeting to provide Councillors with a presentation describing their objectives as a group, the accessible and inaccessible areas around Lanchester and their three wishes for Lanchester to help with accessibility. These included dropped kerbs, especially around the King's Head. The steep slopes made smaller either side of the King's Head to village green crossing point. Consideration of an allocated crossing point across the village Front Street. The Councillors advised that the group contacts Durham County Councils inclusivity/access officer and we offer our support.

Police Reports - Members were updated on the recent meeting with PCSO Connar Milner. This included discussions about: Parking - They have recently visited Lanchester EP and All Saints school and any vehicles that were blocking pavements have been asked to move and explained the dangers of blocking pedestrian access.

Speeding – There has been an increased number of vehicles speeding in Lanchester. Speed cameras have been asked to target specific areas to try and promote sticking to the speed limit.

Dog fouling/fly tipping and littering - The neighbourhood warden has been made aware of some of the problem areas. The Clerk to organise the next meeting with PCSO Connar Milner.

Clerk & Councils Direct Magazine February - received.

Tanfield Lea Banner Group – approval of the loaning of the Lanchester Banner was given.

Karbon Homes - Lanchester Parish Council received a letter from Karbon Homes recommending action to be taken to reduce the amount of combustible material in the office space, by reviewing the items that are stored and where they are stored. The clerk to dispose of any paperwork that is no longer needed and to invest in some office cupboards.

Kitswell Park Play Area - Annual Inspection - Councillors were informed that the Annual Inspection for Kitswell Park Play Area had been completed. No major or high risk problems were raised, however a number of maintenance issues need to be undertaken. Identified works to be addressed in a future meeting.

Grants / Donations - The following donations were approved: £300 to the Parish Church Clock and £500 to Lanchester Partnership for the Village Bus.

Planning Application - Application for agricultural land improvements utilising imported soil materials at Spring Gardens Farm, Howden Bank Lanchester DM/21/02616/WAS (amended plans).

It was agreed that the objections raised about the original application still apply and that a further letter of objection is sent to the County Council and the Environment Agency.
