Consett Based Youth Project needs new trustees

Most people agree that the loss of youth workers and youth clubs has been a disaster for young people across Britain. New pressures that face young people through the growth of technology and social media are driving an epidemic of mental ill-health in the young, and savage cuts to publicly funded youth work have only worsened their position.

You may be surprised, therefore, that one local charity that for forty years has been successfully raising funds to provide youth work to some of our most deprived local young people is threatened by a very different challenge: the challenge of finding local people willing to help steer the project over the coming decade.

Derwentside Detached Project, which started life as the Consett Churches Detached Youth Project in the wake of the steelworks' closure, has been guided by a largely unchanged team of trustees for the last 15 years. The challenge is that some of the trustees were pensioners when they started and are now no longer able to provide the drive and energy needed to progress the project. That is why they seek new trustees with a passion to help young people, and a willingness to give some of their time and energy for the benefit of the next generation.

From the House



My first month as North Durham's new MP has passed in a whirlwind of activity. The atmosphere in the Commons has been influenced by the very large numbers of us who are new members, we are one of the largest new intakes ever. I'd like to thank both returning MPs and the parliamentary staff for the kindness they have shown in helping us all navigate our way round the procedures and processes of Westminster, and indeed to physically navigate our way

round a maze of a building.

Nowadays MPs receive a very comprehensive induction, with training on everything from how to ask a question in the chamber to how to set up your constituency office. Unfortunately, one month in, none of us has been allocated a physical office in the Commons yet!

I am fortunate in that I have been able to rapidly re-hire very experienced staff who had worked for my predecessor Kevan Jones, and re-open the constituency office, so we are now working our way through the best part of one thousand casework and policy enquiry emails that have already arrived. In Westminster, I've already made my Maiden Speech, which by convention praises your predecessor and the constituency, but which I also used to highlight some of the local policy issues I want to tackle. [Editor: you will need to scroll down to 9:21pm.] You can also see written questions I have started to table, primarily on local issues, here: https:// members.parliament.uk/member/5112/writtenquestions The business of the House has been dominated by the King's Speech, which set out the Government's heavy legislative programme, but we have also moved on to start debating some of the bills in it already, for instance public ownership of rail. There have also been very serious moments such as the Chancellor's statement on the state of public spending we have inherited and the Home Secretary's statement on the horrific murders in Southport, which happened just as the House rose for summer recess. I have been appalled by the violent disorder we have seen across the country, which I am sure will be debated as soon as Parliament returns.

In the constituency I have had a busy programme of activity including visits to schools and voluntary organisations, attending local events, and meeting constituents to discuss their personal casework and issues affecting them locally. The speaker for the evening was Steve Palmer from Three Valley Honey who told us how he started keeping bees 14 years ago. The hives are made up of several layers, including the Floor with a mesh to collect mites and the Brood Box where the Queen Bee lives and is looked after by Drone bees. The Worker bees that collect the pollen have a 6 week lifespan. Each hive holds between 40 to 60 thousand bees and produces between 20 to 25 pounds of honey. Samples of honey were available for members to taste, and the evening finished with refreshments and a chat with friends.

Dear Village Voice

Comment on the report of the hustings in Lanchester on 29 June 2024.

I thank the participants and organisers of the hustings, which I attended.

In the interests of fairness and as a Lanchester resident, I am moved to comment on what I regard as a cheap jibe by one of the candidates, regarding why Mr Akehurst did not attend. To say that Labour's failure to attend was a show of contempt was grossly unfair.

Looking further into the reason for non-attendance — as reported in the Northern Echo, Durham Police said that about 40 people (pro-Palestinian protesters) turned up at his campaign launch in Pelton, and a scuffle broke out. It is important to bring attention to the intimidation and danger that many candidates faced in the election. This is unacceptable. (My motivation to write perhaps partly derives from being a Labour member, but I hope I would do this for others in the interests of fairness.)

Incidentally, Mr Akehurst's support for Israel is in line with the new and the previous Governments' positions of seeking a two-state solution to the Israeli-Palestinian conflict.

I ask the people of Lanchester to be measured in their judgement after listening to what Mr Akehurst says and does over time, being swift to listen and slow to judge not vice-versa.

The 1851 census has 13188 inhabitants in Durham and 226 in Durham Jail. He explained the legal system of the time and how many of the incumbents were debtors. Sadly, the census did not include reasons for being in jail however with research into local newspaper archives and order books and prison records David was able to bring some of the prisoners to life.






Report from the August Meeting




There has been quite a lot happening since our last News Bulletin.

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
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Wildlife Notes

Incomers

Did you used to see Water Voles on our local rivers? American Mink, an invasive non-native species is known to decimate water vole populations as well as being a problem for fish and ground nesting birds. Their small size and semiaquatic lifestyle allow them to fill a niche in our food chain that

none of our native species have evolved alongside. Water voles are completely defenseless against them.

Late summer is 'dispersal season' for young mink, exploring to find their own territory. During their first few weeks leaving the den they'll stick to a fairly small range, but later they wander searching for new territories. A female born this year will establish a breeding territory next spring and while feeding young can cause extinction to an entire water vole population.

Keep an eye out for them:

A Mink's body is around 35cm with a 18cm tail, smaller than an otter but larger than a stoat. They can range in colour, but most mink in the North East will be dark brown. They have a long body and narrow furry tail. They have a white spot on

their chins and often a patch on their underbellies too. Their faces are more triangular and pointed than otters.

Mink scat/poo can be found along watercourses, on rocks, logs and open ground. It has a pungent, unpleasant odour; is long and thin and has a pointed and curled tip. It is usually

black, and you may be able to see fur, feathers, bones and fish scales in it.

They have five-toed paw prints ranging in size between a 20p to 50p piece, males are larger. They often have claw marks present which often join up with the toe pads to form a teardrop shape. Thanks to Durham Wildlife Trust (DWT) for this month's article, edited by your usual contributor. Please contact DWT if you see evidence of Mink.

Orchard Moth Event

Lanchester Community Orchard held a 'Moth' event on the morning of the 20th July. Terry Coult, a local Naturalist, set up a specialist trap the previous evening to see how many different species we had on site. Thankfully rain held off and a warm still night ensured that the moths were active.

Members and families gathered to witness Terry disassemble the trap and identify the moths in the trap. In total, 31 species were positively identified and released back into the orchard. Some of the moths listed have fascinating names such as: The Snout, Smokey Wainscot, True Lover's Knot, and many more!

It was a lovely session, and it was very exciting to see so many beautiful moths that we would not usually get the chance to see!

Lanchester Environment GroupWhere have all the insects gone?

I remember a time when I was young, and my father would have to scrub the car windscreen to remove the large numbers of squashed and splattered insects. Not many years ago my lavender plants were positively noisy with the hum of bees and the buddleia plants were adorned with peacock butterflies. Not so now. I'm sure you too will have noticed.

It's difficult to find the exact reason for this demise in wildlife but I suggest there are several. A warming planet has messed with our seasons and disrupted the normal life cycles of many insects. The human race has poisoned many with insecticides in our gardens, parks and farms. We have become too tidy in our management of verges, green spaces and gardens, (something hinted at in the June issue of the Village Voice by our excellent wildlife correspondent) and so destroyed the habitat needed for insects to thrive. And of course, there is the pollution of our air from burning too much fossil fuel, and of our rivers with chemical run off and sewerage. I guess it's not surprising that these invertebrates are having a bad time. Sadly, for us and the rest of nature they play a critical role in the food chain of many species and are hugely important in pollinating many of our food crops.

So, what can we do in our parish to tackle this demise of invertebrates and provide a range of habitats? Perhaps our verges could be cut less often, or our grassy squares that are scattered through the village could be planted with bird friendly shrubs or some blossom trees? Could the Green along the bypass support wildflowers or some more clumps of trees? Are there roadside verges that would benefit from planted hedgerows? The village flower beds are always very colourful but do these bedding plants provide the best habitat for pollinators?

What do you think? Should we carry on as we are, or should we try to bring about some changes? Do you have thoughts about a patch of mown grass by your house? Do you wish to see some changes, and might you be keen to help bring them about? If you do, please contact the environment group: contact@lanchesterpartnership.org.uk.





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From our councillor - Planning and Durham County Council

The topic I spend most time on as a ward County Councillor is planning. Planning has always been a hot topic in and around the village; in large part it is a symptom of its success as a desirable place where people want to live, run businesses and build.

My main role in the planning process is to represent local residents and feed in ideas relating to proposed developments to Durham County Council which is our "Local Planning Authority". Alongside this, I act as Vice Chairman for what is called the Central and East Durham Planning Committee, which considers applications in the City of Durham and East Coastal region. In terms of the first role, I always try to share concerns about how applications that have been proposed locally can be improved - and sometimes why they should be stopped or reconsidered in a fundamentally new way. I can also help the way applications are considered, as whilst the vast majority of applications are considered by officers, I can "call in" controversial applications for a review by the area "North" Committee that covers the northern part of Durham, including Lanchester, when necessary. But this role is also informed by my experience in the latter role looking at applications covering the City of Durham and East, because local input only ever forms part of the planning process.

Whilst local Council officers and committees make decisions on what can be built, they also work within a tight framework which

covers all of the UK – the National Planning Policy Framework and also local plans, which authority areas are required to develop (such as the Durham Plan, which will run from 2020-2035). As many readers will know, Lanchester also adopted a local plan, in consultation with the County Council, back in 2021. Even if a decision is made locally on an application, it can be overturned by the Government Inspector if it judges the decision to have been outside of policy.

This all creates some complexity, but the intersection of local perspective on the existing environment and infrastructure, with national requirements for key projects, like housing, energy and transport can inevitably create friction. Our approach to planning is generally referred to as discretionary, in contrast to countries like Germany which have a more top-down zonal approach.

Planning is back in the headlines again, as the new Government is keen to promote reforms to housing supply especially in the South East. There is no easy answer to where we should build and how much, but it is likely to always be contentious. Applications can be improved – and whether you have concerns about Greencroft Forest Lodges, the proposed local Solar Farms or the Oakwood Planning application, turned down for now – let me know your thoughts. Clean Earth Energy

Members of Clean Earth Energy attended the meeting to provide us with information on the planning application DM/24/01272/FPA. They presented us with the facts and answered all Councillors' questions.

Police Reports

Members were updated on the recent PACT report for June. The police were called when the SPAR in Lanchester reported a shoplift of various goods from the store. Officers attended to collect CCTV after the individuals could not be located from descriptions. The crime is still being investigated with positive identification of two males still outstanding.

A member of the public made off without payment at the Jet garage in Lanchester. In this circumstance, the incident was not malicious, and the driver simply forgot to pay. This is being dealt with via a civil route.

Officers attended Lanchester Social Club after police received a call about an altercation outside the premises. When officers arrived, no suspects were identified to be in the area. After speaking to bar staff, the suspects were identified, and CCTV enquiries were made. With the help of witnesses and CCTV, the investigation is ongoing.

PCSO's 30136 Milner and 8740 Hart have been moving drivers along who are illegally parked on Kitswell Road, Front Street and The Mill. PCSO Milner is still working with the council and various other partner agencies to try and ease the issue in Lanchester. Engagement with local schools and residents has been positive.

Correspondence

Letter – Virgin Media – Councillors raised some concerns with the recent works that have been carried out by Virgin Media. One being the yellow box at the end of Ford Road, this was a temporary box and has now been replaced with a taller, grey box which matches others in the Village.

Signage

As Lanchester is in a conservation area Parish Councillors recommend that all business owners work with the guidance and approval from Durham County Council regarding all signage.

Solar Planet Project

Councillors were given an update on the project.

Kitswell Park Play Area

The matting under the swings has worn away. Councillors approved new matting could be obtained and installed. Access from Valley Grove/Woodlands to Lanchester Valley Walk

Durham County Council have approved works to improve the entrance from The Woodlands/Valley Grove to Lanchester Valley Walk. This will hopefully be carried out in the near future. DCC Planning SPD Consultations

Councillors were updated on the responses the Parish Council have sent regarding some of the consultations. Councillors were also advised to respond individually to consultations where appropriate.

Tree Surveys

Members agreed to carrying out any tree works when we have a new survey completed.

Flooding improvements

Councillors had a number of suggestions to put to Durham County Council on the maintenance of the Village. The Clerk to contact Durham County Council with these suggestions.


