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Politics CAN be civilised - at least in Lanchester

A hustings attended by six of the seven election candidates for North Durham - Labour was the notable absentee - was judged a success by all who attended. All the candidates were invited, and all accepted except Luke Akehurst, Labour. His team issued a statement:

"Luke will not attend tonight's hustings in Lanchester. Following previous public events his election team felt that it was unfair to attract any disruption to another community within the constituency. Luke will continue to speak to as many residents as possible as we approach polling day and can be contacted directly on: luke4northdurham@gmail.com"

The event - held in Lanchester Methodist Church and organised by Churches Together and friends - was packed with interested listeners. Those on the podium were Chris Bradburn (Workers Party of Great Britain), George Carter (Conservative), Tom Chittenden (Social Democrat Party), Andrew Husband (Reform UK), Craig Martin (Liberal Democrats), and Sunny Moon-Schott (Green Party). Chris Bradburn earned applause from the audience when he described Labour's failure to attend as "showing their contempt for you by not being here tonight."

The event was ably chaired by Lanchester resident Keith Brown. The Village Voice does not have the space to list all the questions and answers, but the panel was quizzed on a wide range of subjects including the proposed solar farm at Burnhope, business insurance against flooding, the environment, social care and its costs, immigration, public transport and childhood obesity.

There was a welcome absence of heckling, and each candidate was allowed to speak without interruption. *Neil McKay*

Police Update

The importance of CCTV

CCTV has become an essential tool in any investigation for the police. It allows us to have accurate time frames of incidents, identify suspects, figure out direction of travel, prove/disprove allegations or statements and a variety of other tasks. Recently, CCTV allowed Consett police to identify and locate the suspect responsible for flashing and intimidating numerous women around the Consett area. The CCTV in the area allowed police to have a clear facial picture of the suspect and narrow down an area where the suspect resides. Without CCTV, this investigation may have not been successful.

We would encourage residents to consider CCTV as an effective tool in crime prevention and home security. This can come in many forms, from video doorbells to multiple camera systems. These cameras can often act as a deterrent for people looking to commit crime. Many residents in Lanchester already have CCTV but we would urge more people to think about installing this invaluable tool. New MP for Lanchester

Labour's Luke Akehurst is the new MP for Lanchester, as no doubt everyone will know by now.

Mr Akehurst was elected by a majority of just under 6,000 over Reform's Andrew Husband. Lanchester has joined the North Durham constituency after our previous one - Durham North West - was swallowed up in re-organisation.

Mr Akehurst was parachuted into the constituency by the Labour party after his popular predecessor, Kevan Jones, decided to step down.

The voting turnout in North Durham was - like most of the country - low at 57 per cent. Meanwhile our previous MP Richard Holden, chairman of the Conservative Party, scraped home in his new constituency, Basildon and Billericay in Essex, by just 20 votes. *Neil McKay*

Letter from our new MP, Luke Akehurst

I'm delighted to be writing my first article as the new Member of Parliament for North Durham, following my election on 4 July.

The General Election marked a number of important changes. Lanchester and Burnhope are now part of the North Durham parliamentary constituency after the boundary changes and the country has a new Labour Government for the first time in 14 years.

The next couple of weeks will be very hectic for me as I have to sort out everything from getting an official parliamentary email address to establishing a constituency office and employing staff. My first advice surgery is scheduled for Saturday 7th September but please get in touch before that if you have urgent issues you need your MP's help with - until I have my parliamentary email you can reach me on luke4northdurham@gmail.com. An MP's job is necessarily a game of two halves, with part of each week when Parliament is sitting spent down in Westminster voting and speaking in debates and committees, and part spent here in North Durham meeting with local residents and organisations. I intend to be very visible and accessible to constituents through attendance at community events, advice surgeries, and door-to-door canvassing all year round.

The King's Speech will be on Wednesday 17 July and will set out the new Government's programme of legislation. I will be working to make sure the towns and villages of North Durham get the share we need of the investment and improvements to public services flowing from the "first steps" we set out in the Labour Manifesto.

As I set out in my acceptance speech, my predecessor Kevan Jones set the bar very high for what is expected of me as your Member of Parliament. I will work incredibly hard to ensure that North Durham gets the support and investment we desperately need, and I look forward to getting to know you in the weeks, months and years ahead.

see his first book published next month. Anticipation, a young adult thriller about artificial intelligence and social media, will be released on the 8th of August 2024.


Originally from rural Nottinghamshire, Neil, and wor lass from Gateshead, Louise, spent many years moving around and travelling for Neil's work in the software industry. After returning from a five-year stint in America with twin boys, they looked for somewhere to settle and raise a family, finally coming to rest in Lanchester in 2012. In 2014, tired of corporate life Neil decided to take a career break to try his hand at writing. Things began to happen after coming runner-up in a writing competition when the organisers contacted him and expressed interest in helping to develop his ideas further. It was a long road, but in 2022 Neil secured a publishing deal for his debut young adult novel, Anticipation, which will be released on August 8th, 2024.

The story follows 17-year-old Riya Sudame who inherits an artificial intelligence developed by her father that can predict a person's future based on their social media data. She, and a group of her father's exemployees, are tasked with safeguarding the AI from falling into the wrong hands – the ruthless hands of a social media giant looking to use the technology to exploit its users.

Having achieved the status of impoverished artist, Neil is now back at work to repair his bank balance and works from home for a software company. After spending most of his working life travelling, Neil has no plans to travel anywhere further than Hanley's Butcher, Lanchester Social Club, and the King's Head. Although not a North East native he feels he has found his home in Lanchester where his two boys have attended Lanchester EP and are now enjoying life at St. Bede's and as active members of the local community through Lanchester Boys' Brigade.

When not writing or working, any remaining time is usually spent with family, although he can sometimes be found wheezing up and down the Pennine hills on a bicycle, followed by a spot of coffee and cake or a good pub. Heritage 100 route launched in Lanchester!

A charity is looking to help fund the establishment of 100 walks spanning the region known as the Heritage 100. "These short walks will encourage people to explore the region and gain a wider awareness of its wonderful countryside, its history and heritage. Families will be able to walk together in new places and discover some of the treasures that exist 'on their doorstep'".

As part of this programme the Lanchester Walk has been launched with the Heritage 100 post being installed – it is situated just off the Newbiggin Car Park. You can find more information about the walk by downloading the app Komoot or looking on the Heritage 100 website. Keiron Young, founder of the walking programme, will be organising some walks of this route in the summer holidays.

The Lanchester Walk is quite straightforward beginning at the Newbiggin Lane entrance to the Lanchester Valley Railway Path, this walk forms a figure of 8 route. It initially follows the railway path before veering off to track the Smallhope Burn as it winds through Dora's Wood. The route then continues along the path until it ventures through the Malton Nature Reserve, circling around Biggen Farm before returning to the Lanchester Railway Path. The walk ends with a final detour from the path taking you through Lanchester Village. The length of the walk is just over 5 miles. (Details and maps on their website).

Don't Blight Burnhope

That was the stark message from hundreds of villagers including grandparents, children, and dogs - who gathered with placards for a protest against a proposed solar farm. The protest was held in a large open field beyond The Garage Bar and Grill in the village centre on Sunday, June 30. The proposed installation of a solar farm three times the size of the village itself, spearheaded by British Petroleum (BP), has sparked outrage among residents and environmental activists. Mother-of-three Jennifer Walls spoke for most when she said: "My children can play outside in the fields, like all the other village kids. We see all kinds of wildlife, deer, red kites, lapwings. We will lose all this natural outside space to industry."

Residents argue that the vast expanse of solar panels will disrupt the natural habitat of these creatures, putting their existence at risk. The tranquillity of Burnhope will be shattered by the industrial presence of the solar farm, forever altering the local ecosystem.

This is not the first time such a proposal has been brought to the table. In 2023, previous applications for a solar farm in Burnhope were deemed 'illegal' by the High Court following the objections raised by residents. Despite this setback, BP continues to push forward with their plans. But villagers have vowed to fight "tooth and nail" to stop it. *Neil McKay*

Sunscreen and Sun Safety

Did you know that sunburn increases your risk of skin cancer, and it does not just happen on holiday. You can burn in the UK, even when it's cloudy.

- Safety first by making sure that you:
- spend time in the shade between 11am and 3pm
 never stay in the sun long enough to burn
- cover up with suitable clothing and sunglasses
- take extra care with children
- use at least factor 30 sunscreen

What factor sunscreen (SPF) should I use?

- a SPF of at least 30 to protect against UVB
- at least 4-star UVA protection, (indicated by a circle around "UVA")
- check its expiry date
- If you have allergies check with the pharmacist as to what sunscreen to use.

Sun Safe Guidelines: adults should aim to apply around 6 to 8 teaspoons of sunscreen to cover their entire body, applying to all exposed skin including your face, neck and ears. A wide-brimmed hat is recommended, especially for those with thinning or no hair. If you plan to be out in the sun long enough to risk burning, sunscreen needs to be applied twice, 30 minutes before you go out.

Reapply your sunscreen every two hours, even if the lotion says "water resistant", as drying yourself, sweating and the sun itself dries the lotion.

How to deal with sunburn: sponge sore skin with cool water, then apply soothing after sun cream or spray, like aloe vera. Your normal analgesic will ease the pain by helping to reduce inflammation caused by sunburn. Stay out of the sun until all signs of redness have gone. Seek medical help if you feel unwell or the skin swells badly or blisters.

Children aged under 6 months should be kept out of direct strong sunlight.

From March to October in the UK, children should:

- cover up with suitable clothing
- spend time in the shade, particularly from 11am to 3pm



Wildlife Notes

Incomers

Little owls, rabbits and hares - this may surprise some of you as they've been around for centuries; they are, however, all nonnative species to the UK. Humans helped them to reach Lanchester and surrounds (AKA introduction). They've been seen along Newbiggen Lane.

Research from bone findings suggests that Romans initially treated hare (and chickens) as gods but developed a taste for the meat. Rabbit remains also date back to Roman times, though for a while it was thought the Normans introduced them. They were a valuable source of meat kept captive within enclosed warrens, clearly some escaped. The Little Owl's colonisation was both by escape from private collections (London in 1758, Devon 1808 and Cumbria 1811) and documented releases. In 1843 a pair arrived at Walton Park from Rome because Charles Waterton hoped they would control his garden pests as they predate invertebrates and small mammals. In 1874-80 a release of 40 in Kent led to breeding success in 1879. More introductions and rapid breeding meant they eventually reached Scotland in 1958. Some naturalists suggest they were 'reintroduced' due to fossil records findings. Most now see them as a 'naturalised introduced' bird that has filled a natural niche and become accepted UK-biodiversity, as are the hare and rabbit.

They utilise a range of open habitat: rural villages, parkland, farmland, orchards and quarries. They hunt in daylight and night and enjoy sunbathing, check out old quarry faces, also their preferred perches: fence posts, poles, branches, and chimneys. They usually pair for life, they're ready to breed at one year,

nesting in small holes in trees or disused rabbit burrows. They lay 2-5 eggs that fledge during June/July.

They eat small mammals, earthworms, beetles, spiders, moths, and birds. They have been removed from some offshore islands due to concerns about threats to seabird populations. https://www. littleowlproject.uk Listen to their call via RSPB: https://www.rspb. org.uk/birds-and-wildlife/ little-owl

Poppy's walks

Good day readers and this month's walk starts and finishes at Annfield Plain.

The Humans park in the park behind Tesco, but for all intents and purposes the walk starts from the Tesco store.

By now you will know that I am Poppy, a Patterdale terrier who enjoys sharing walks I lead my Humans on. This one came about because the female Human of my household is part of a walking group which meets at Annfield Plain every Tuesday morning at 10.30. She agreed to take myself and the male Human on its route one summer's evening last month. The walk lasts about three miles but takes in three villages in Annfield Plain, Catchgate and Greencroft.

We cross at Tesco and follow a cycle path alongside some bungalows. When this comes to a junction we turn left and go back towards Annfield Plain. We cross the main road with a club called The Demi a few yards to our left. On crossing the main road, we go diagonally right across grassland on a road called Hamsterley Gardens. This eventually brings us to Catchgate and we walk through another housing estate along Oak Terrace and Elm Terrace before heading left towards some allotments.

By this time we are suddenly out in the country and we follow a footpath up a fairly gentle incline with the allotments on our right and fields on our left. We cross a stile and go through a farmyard and end up above Annfield House, an imposing building known locally as Annie's House and apparently the first house built in Annfield Plain. By this time we have a panoramic view of the surrounding countryside on our left. We follow a footpath down to a main road which we cross before walking right along a footpath for a few yards then left into a cornfield. This is a public right of way so we were not trespassing. We cross two fields and turn left across a third until we reach a stile. This takes us onto a road called Loud View Terrace and is in Greencroft. We turn right and walk a few yards to a junction which is the main road from Stanley to Consett. We do not need to cross it, instead turning left and left again into some woods - again on a designated footpath.

The walk through the woods takes us back to Annfield Plain park, to the rear of Tesco, and is a very pleasant footpath with lots of scope for exploring the undergrowth. It took us around 90 minutes from start to finish and was a very enjoyable change of scenery for yours truly.


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
