

#### Sniperley Park and Ride expansion work has begun

Many Lanchester residents use the Sniperley Park and Ride car park to get into Durham. Work has begun on the £2 million expansion of the transport hub with the extension made possible by a successful application to the government's Transforming Cities Fund.

The project will see capacity at the site increase to almost 600 spaces. Planning permission is in place for the expansion which, on completion, will see an additional 262 spaces created. This will include increased provision of standard, disabled, electric charging and motorhome bays.

Vegetation clearance and sewer works have already been carried out and construction has begun. The work is expected to last approximately six months, with a park and ride service continuing to be available throughout.

From April, Sniperley and Belmont Park and Ride sites will be in operation on Sundays. Buses will



serve the sites between 7am and 7pm, seven days a week. This will include bank holidays except Christmas Day, Boxing Day and New Year's Day.

One of Lanchester's best known businesses closed this month. Witbank Garage in Hallgarth Buildings shut its doors on Friday, May 24 after 32 years in the village.

Proprietor Dave Donnelly said the decision was taken "with a heavy heart". Dave brought mechanic Malcolm Wilks with him when he set up his own business in Lanchester after leaving a garage in Spennymoor in July 1992. He explained: "Malcolm has had to run the garage single-handedly for the past few months and it wasn't fair on him. But I didn't want to close until he found another niche." Malcolm starts work in June at North Road Garage in Catchgate.

Dave has battled ill health for the past few years and decided it is now time for him to retire.

He said: "I just wanted to thank all our customers over the years through the Village Voice. It is with a heavy heart that we are closing but it has been inevitable. It has been a privilege to work in Lanchester over the past 32 years but I think we can leave with our heads held high."

#### **Community Speed Watch**

There is an ongoing issue with the speed of vehicles travelling through Lanchester. Areas such as Cadger Bank, Durham Road and Howden Bank have been targeted by our Community Speed Watch volunteers and those caught have been dealt with accordingly.

Community Speed Watch is run by volunteers who have been given suitable training to use speed calculating devices to collect valuable data and issue warning letters, fines and potentially court action. We understand that people are concerned about the speed of traffic in their communities and, as the police, we try to control this as best as we can with limited resources.



The police can advise the council on areas where we believe there is a problem with speeding, but we do not get the final say in traffic calming measures

One way people can help us to tackle the issue is by volunteering to be a Community Speed Watch volunteer. You will receive training and may have access to the Community Speed Watch van (if you have a driving licence of course!). Volunteers are subject to level 2 vetting due to the nature of the information you would have access to. There are no set hours for volunteers, so you can do as many hours as you like and target areas you believe to be a problem.

#### **Lanchester Medical Centre: One Year on...**

A year has gone by since Dr Davidson retired and Dr Kalra became lead GP at our local surgery. So how have we been doing? The best way to answer that question is to ask our patients. Every appointment triggers a Friends and Family Test (FFT), sent to our patients in order to get their opinion of their experience of the practice, our staff and their consultation.

**Increasing quality of service-** FFT is an important, anonymous feedback tool that supports the fundamental principle of the surgery, that people who attend should have the opportunity to provide feedback on their experience. Listening to our patients' views and experiences helps us to identify what is working well and what can be improved.



As the FFT is anonymous, the Practice Manager would appreciate the details of patients who report poor or very poor experiences. This is so poor experiences can be investigated, learned from, and improved.

**Increasing ways of making appointments-** appointments can be booked online, however these do tend to be used very quickly. We have introduced pre-bookable appointments and are currently working on getting the balance right between pre-bookable appointments and those required for that day.

E- Consult is an additional way to speak to or ask questions from a health professional for non-urgent issues and is available on our website. This online system prompts you to provide information that describes your current medical condition or request. E-Consults are reviewed daily and patients will be given appointments as medically necessary. You will be informed within 48 hours what the next steps are for your query. For on the day appointments, please contact the surgery via telephone or attend in person at 8 am to book.

**Improved telephone service-** we are shortly having a new telephone system installed which, amongst superior analytics, will offer a queuing and call back facility for patients.

**More surgery information-** are you aware that the surgery has an active website and Facebook page that are diligently kept up to up to date?

prescribed and over the counter medications

Following a pharmacy consultation, if you require a prescription the normal National Health Service (NHS) prescription charges will apply. If you belong to a group of people entitled to free prescriptions, you will be offered a private prescription which incurs a charge, alternatively you can contact the surgery.

Please remember to treat our reception staff as you would like to be treated. Reception staff cannot give patients what they do not have available. They can, however, ask the GP on call who will advise accordingly.

### **Lanchester Medical Centre: Patient Participation Group**

#### Patient Participation Group Awareness Week 3rd - 9th June 2024

We would like to use this week to remind the community about the benefits of such a group and how you can join us.

What does a Patient Participation Group do? PPGs can play a number of roles, including:

- Advising the practice on the patient perspective
- · Organising health promotion events
- · Communicating with the wider patient body
- Running volunteer services and support groups to meet local needs
- · Carrying out research into the views of those who use the practice (and their carers)
- · Influencing the practice and the wider NHS to improve commissioning

PPGs are about implementing real, positive change in their communities. Patients have long valued the relationship with their GP and general practice. However, the dynamics of this relationship have changed over recent years – patients today rightly want more say in their own healthcare, are better informed and expect to be treated as whole people, not just as a condition or ailment.

PPGs have an increasingly important role to play in helping to give patients a say in the way services are delivered to best meet their needs, and the needs of the local community.

PPGs can help GPs to develop an equal partnership with their patients. They can help them to communicate accurately and honestly about key health matters. They can also help to reduce costs and improve services by identifying changes that the practice may not have considered, allowing resources to be used more efficiently. Additionally, they can develop mutually supportive networks for patients and the practice, outside of individual appointments.



# **Wildlife Notes**

#### Watch out for water

Take time to look for insects that specialise in water courses and ponds. Damsels and dragons are flying now; the Large Red Damselfly is first to emerge in spring, it is actually tiny, but the name implies ambition! Different species emerge at different times. Mayflies will be flying from May to September. These insect larvae spend all their time in our fresh water before developing into the adult insects. Have you noticed the Grey Wagtails catching insects near Malton and feeding them to their fledged chicks along the River Browney? There are otters using our water courses locally too.

Dog walkers beware a cooling doggy dip can mean death to dragons and damsels et al:

The 'spot-on' treatments you may use to deter ticks and fleas is an insecticide and highly toxic to our native invertebrates whose larvae live in freshwater. The chemicals act as neurotoxins, even a tiny concentration is so potent that it harms our river life. One flea treatment of a medium-sized dog can contain enough pesticide to kill 60 million bees. In rivers research shows that neonicotinoids polluting water sharply reduces insect numbers and consequently causes a drop in the number of birds and other animals further up the food chain.

If you allow a treated dog into water before the product has been absorbed, the treatment will wash off, reducing its effectiveness to protect your dog. 48 hours is suggested on the product information. Even bathing your dog can wash the toxic chemicals into rivers via the drainage/sewage system, as can washing your dog beds too soon after treatment.

It's best to avoid a blanket year-round use of flea/tick treatments. Other more naturally based products can be used to reduce the risk of unwanted visitors. Search online for choices.

#### **Work Experience in software development – read on!**

Embarrassingly, the Village Voice website is very basic.

Doubly embarrassingly for me, it's my responsibility. Triply embarrassingly, web development is a large part of my job.

How are we in this position? Simply, I don't have the time to bring it up to the standard it deserves.

There are two reasons I don't have the time. The first is having a baby. But the second is that I'm seriously busy at work at a tech company. And that will go for most of the people with the skills to do this properly. But not if they're just starting out. So, I thought well I'm at a busy tech company and I have a website I'm responsible for that's falling apart – let's try to make lemons out of lemonade.

The tech company I work at is called elementsuite – I'm one of five or six of us who were there at the beginning, six or seven years ago. Since then, we've been on a rapid growth trajectory and already look after the HR for many hundreds of thousands in the UK, including some small companies you may have heard of like McDonald's, Travelodge, and so on.

There's much further to go though to dominate the world and we continue to expand at roughly 30% per annum. So, we need talent. Constantly. And here's the lemonade:

If you're an ambitious sixth former, college student, autodidact or someone with a similar background who is eager to kick-start their career in software development and wants to make a tangible impact in our community, this could be the ideal opportunity for you. (If you're none of those things but you know one of the above then please do let them know).

I'm asking you to take on a full upgrade of the Village Voice site, including at a minimum installation of a Content Management System and importation of the entire archive into the same, but ideally a full CI/CD pipeline as well. I have some ideas on how that can be done and will be around to give you technical assistance, but I've no intention of being prescriptive here – it's for you to get it done however you consider best. In exchange for your work in bringing the website up to date – and conditional on you doing a decent job, I've twisted some arms and am pleased to offer a three weekend, two-week work experience opportunity with us at elementsuite down in Watford (if you don't know where that is – and I couldn't blame you – it's within the M25 and 20 mins on the train from Central London. The overground and London buses go there. It's London basically).

elementsuite will cover all travel and accommodation expenses, making it convenient for you to explore London during your days off and be culturally enriched!

We walked diagonally downhill until we came back onto Durham Road across another stile next to High Burnhopeside Farm.

After walking along the footpath for a few yards we crossed the road and walked down the side road to Malton picnic area. We walked along the river – where I enjoyed a cooling off paddle – and then back to Lanchester along the railway path.

The male Human perked up as we approached the village when the walkers announced plans for a thirst-quenching break in the King's Head. And as dogs are allowed in too, I wasn't going to complain.

The walk took just over 90 minutes and I would encourage anyone – humans and their canine companions – to join in the others.

### **Greencroft Forest Meeting**

Around 40 villagers attended a meeting to learn more about the proposed Greencroft Forest – and few seemed to be in favour.

The meeting in Lanchester Community Centre on the afternoon of Thursday, May 16 was organised by the village Partnership and chaired by its chairman, Henry Edwards.

Concerns voiced by residents included the effect of reduced wind speed on three turbines at Greencroft; the danger of increased pollen harming the health of Lanchester residents; and the destruction of the local landscape in favour of "a commercial development."

Two members from the Forestry Commission and Samuel Roberts from land agents Pryor and Rickett Silviculture were in attendance, but the proposed forest park is opposed by the Partnership, Lanchester Parish Council and the Campaign to Protect Rural Lanchester (CPRE). Parish councillor David Smith argued that the Greencroft Estate at present is attractive, with "an open aspect, highly valued and used by walking groups." He said the forestry commission's proposal was to replace the landscape with a "commercial development, a monocultural plantation which will not increase biodiversity." The meeting was told the proposed plantation would be Sitka spruce trees. Cllr Smith urged residents to make their opposition known to Durham County Council and their local MP, Richard Holden.

Veronica Cleary, owner of Lanchester Wines which is based at Greencroft and runs three wind turbines there, said she was "very concerned about the impact of the trees on reducing wind energy on the three turbines." Lanchester resident Brian Naylor warned about the impact of pollen on locals' health, saying: "In Japan they are moving forests away from the cities." Local conservationist Noel Jackson added: "You cannot have people making money and trying to fob us off that it is to our benefit." There are also proposals to build holiday lodges on the site and the Partnership plans to hold another meeting to canvass views on that issue. The developers, True North Real Asset Partners (True North), insists its aim is to develop "a high quality and sustainable tourism development". They say: "The Proposed Development will protect the existing character of the wider area, delivering a landscape-led scheme with biodiversity enhancements, whilst preserving and offering conservation and public access to the historically significant Greencroft Estate."



# Notes from the Ordinary Meeting held in Lynwood House on Tuesday 9th April 2024 at 7.00pm

Minutes - Ordinary Meeting 12th March - approved.

#### **Police Reports**

Members were updated on the recent PACT report for March.

Officers continue to see use of illegal off-road bikes being ridden around the roads, woodland and paths in Lanchester and Burnhope. They are working hard to come up with a solution to the issue but are still keen for residents to provide any information they have in relation to the bikes. Residents are encouraged to report these bikes via 101 or using the 101 live chat on the Durham Constabulary website.

Police will be testing a new solution to the issues of parking in the Burnhope and Lanchester areas. Those caught repeatedly parking on double yellow lines (without a disability badge), parking on keep clears, parking on dropped kerbs and causing an obstruction to resident's drive/pedestrians will receive a Community Protection Warning – This can't be appealed and will stay with the person for 12 months. If they are caught again, they will receive a Community Protection Notice. If they re-offend within the next 12 months, they will be issued with a fine or subject to court proceedings.

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
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### From your County Councillors

In a rural area like Lanchester village and the surrounding parish, buses are not only a useful amenity, but a vital lifeline.

Since joining the Council in 2021, Mike and I have built up a positive, but honest, working relationship with Go North East (GNE) buses that provide key services throughout the area. It has therefore been useful to pass on feedback relating to a series of issues about services, from things like late running, to cancelled services, as well as questions about the bus app and services at smaller hamlets in the ward like Hurbuck Cottages and Holmside.

When we joined the Council, things were clearly much more difficult, as the Covid pandemic was only starting to ease off. At the height of Covid, usage fell by around 90%, and people's work and shopping habits took a long time to change back. Estimates vary, but Government data indicates use of buses outside London is still about 20-25% lower on weekdays, than at the beginning of 2020.

Commercial bus services have therefore felt pressure. Whilst GNE and their competitors run a series of routes for profit, they also run services that are supported by local subsidy, because local and national government recognises that transport provides social and economic value above and beyond helping people get around for work, school, medical visits, and recreation. It has therefore been welcome that the Government has provided assistance, giving money through the Bus Recovery Grant and the Bus Service Improvement Plan in the last few years.

Whilst Mike and I work closely with the Council's transport team on ensuring subsidy is used for key routes, we also work to ensure that operators like GNE get the basics right.

In the year we were elected we had the opportunity to visit their Hownsgill depot in Consett, and we took along Mike Gladstone, a well-respected resident who led on transport matters for the Lanchester Partnership. When our MP Richard Holden served as buses minister, he led a valuable public meeting at Consett Steel Club where Derwentside residents fed in information about services.

I was able to refresh our relationship with Ben Maxfield, Business Director, at GNE's Gateshead depot on March 27th this year. We talked about a range of familiar topics and moving on from last autumn's bus strikes and what they are doing to improve maintenance. Whilst the outlook is looking more positive after a difficult few years, I promised that I would welcome feedback.

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
