Thursday Club



From the House

I have thoroughly enjoyed my first three months as Member of Parliament for North Durham, balancing my time between the constituency and Westminster while I find my feet as an MP. The past few weeks have been dominated by conference season and I was delighted to attend the Labour Party Conference in Liverpool. It was an excellent opportunity to hear about the government's initiatives

and lend support to various campaigns, including reforms to the Mental Health Act and increasing protections for retail workers. As we move into autumn, I am eager to get back to the important work of advancing the legislation introduced during the King's Speech this summer.

Both my constituency and Westminster offices are now fully operational, and my dedicated team and I are addressing over 1,600 casework issues and enquiries. I recently held my first advice surgeries in Sacriston, Quaking Houses and Chester-Le-Street and am planning a date in Lanchester. It was great to connect with constituents and assist them with various concerns, ranging from antisocial behaviour to housing. If you need assistance or would like to meet with me, please feel free to email me at luke.akehurst.mp@parliament.uk.

In the Lanchester Ward, after listening to residents' concerns, I submitted a letter of objection to the planning application for a solar farm in Burnhope. I believe the size and scale of the project are not compatible with the village, and that its impact on the community and local wildlife would outweigh any potential benefits. I look forward to receiving a response to my objection and will update Village Voice readers in due course.

I have been enjoying campaigning across the constituency and have sessions planned in Lanchester, Stanley, and Sacriston in October. I have also spent time visiting key local employers such as Lanchester Wines and Beamish Museum, as well as representatives from the Fire and Rescue Service and Durham County Council. I look forward to working collaboratively with them to improve the lives of people across North Durham.

It was off to somewhere different for our lunch in October - taking ourselves back in time, or so it seemed, as we arrived in the mediaeval village of Blanchland - such a picture postcard perfect spot!

We were destined for the White Monk Tea Rooms - a delightful eatery in a converted old school. It has a mezzanine floor, and our table was up there, affording us glorious views out over the whole of Blanchland.

Having said that, we were there for lunch, so after carefully surveying the glorious array of cakes as we passed, we were soon scrutinising the menu. As well as cakes, there were lots of light bites, sandwiches and more substantial fare on offer.

We opted for tomato, garden veg and lentil soup; bacon and blue cheese quiche with a salad garnish, coleslaw, warm baby roasted potatoes and white monk chutney; home baked ham and egg with a seasonal salad, egg mayonnaise, coleslaw, tangy chutney and baby roasted potatoes accompanied by a homemade cheddar cheese scone; roasted cauliflower and cheese pie topped with fresh spring onions and roasted red onion, potatoes, chunks of red Leicester with shavings of Parmesan and white cheddar; bacon stottie sandwich; tuna and sweetcorn mayonnaise jacket potatoes with salad and homemade coleslaw.

And then, we all indulged in CAKE! triple chocolate; lemon drizzle; dark chocolate and almond with hidden dark cherries; oaty flapjack - the portion size would have fed the 5000; coffee and walnut; and lime and coconut.

Everything was delicious and we thoroughly enjoyed it all.

The tea rooms are delightful, the staff welcoming, and lan the curly haired owner - makes the whole
experience wonderful!

Once outside into the village there's retail therapy - Jasper Crewe, a superb gift shop full of lovely handmade articles you know you just want to take home.

We had a very nice afternoon - and we shall be looking to repeat the experience - soon!

Poppy's walks

Good day readers and my walk this month begins from the car park at Ushaw College, just a short drive from Lanchester. There are several potential routes to follow from the college which is well worth a visit in itself - both the buildings and the

gardens - for those who have not yet been. As you will know now, I am Poppy, a Patterdale terrier who describes the walks I lead my humans on for Village Voice readers.

After leaving the car park we walk down the drive back to the main gate then turn left along the path adjacent to the road which leads to Bearpark. Before long we see a public footpath sign and follow that to our left, through a gate and diagonally across a large field with the college now on our left. At the end of the field, we pass through an open gate and turn right along a farm track. This leads us through some woods - known on the map as Park Wood - and I enjoy exploring the undergrowth there.

We emerge from the woods onto a footpath which leads us alongside a field and to the right, eventually bringing us back through a narrow passageway onto the Bearpark road again, but this time practically in Bearpark. We turn left towards Bearpark then left again when we come to some Aged Miners cottages. This leads us along a road called Hill Top Road which we follow until we see a footpath to our left. We then join the footpath which takes us behind some modern houses on our right, with fields on our left. We carry on along the footpath past a park with a cricket

ground on our left.

When the path ends, we turn left and follow signs to Lodge Farm, a narrow road which is marked Private but which remains a public right of way as a footpath. We approach Lodge Farm, which is in fact a series of modern barn conversions which look very grand. We pass a sign on our left warning us not to feed the horses, which I had no intention of doing. Although a sign to our right says Pedestrians we ignore that on this occasion and proceed straight on to a gate which leads us onto a field and takes us away from Lodge Farm again.

We follow the footpath to our left with panoramic views of the Browney Valley on our right. After a good 20 minutes we find a gap on the hedge marked by two posts to our left, next to an abandoned farm trailer.

By going left through the gap, we see signs marking the Saints Trail. We cross three fields and come to a farm track. We cross the track and then a stile directly opposite which takes us into a field full of tall willow trees. We continue along the trodden path in front of us until we come to a clearing. Then we turn left and see a house in front of us. We walk past the side of the house and find ourselves back into the Ushaw College grounds. From there it is time for me to have a quick run around the field to the side of the college - it was used by the student priests as a sports field - then back to the car. The walk took about one hour forty-five minutes and did include a couple of stiles and some uneven terrain. But I would thoroughly recommend it.

Lodge development seeks planning approval

Durham County Council has received a planning application for the lodges development on Greencroft estate.

According to the application the proposal will "provide up to 140 lodges alongside a Hub with a food offering and spa; maintain the historic assets; enhance public access through the Estate and to the surrounding new afforestation proposal; retain landscape features and woodland; improve the surface run-off and flooding in the area; and enhance the biodiversity through comprehensive and quality design."

The access to the lodge development will be from Durham Road and the exit via Tower Road. A "recreational" access link to Howden Bank will be incorporated to allow pedestrian and other non-vehicular traffic to access the village and Maiden Law.

It is claimed that the development will provide "much needed quality lodge visitor accommodation which the tourism management organisation, Visit County Durham, identifies as missing in the current market offering, to encourage greater levels of overnight visitors to the County."

There will be a central 'Hub' - adjacent to the site of the former Greencroft Hall - with lodge zones located within new and existing areas of woodland. A range of facilities and services including a spa, fitness suite, ancillary food and retail offering are incorporated. The leisure facilities will be accessible for visitors and locals.

There were local consultations as a result of which the developers have made a number of amendments to the initial plan.

The Icehouse and Dovecot are no longer being

proposed for a wine or whisky venue. They will be made good and safe but not have a specific use.

The lodges within the existing woodland have been rearranged in response to ecology information to avoid areas of higher value wildlife and tree groups.


A bridleway loop has now been incorporated into the proposal A reduction of lodges from 150 to 140.


Further work has been produced to ensure the proposal reduces the volume of surface water draining from the Site.

Spa facilities moved from listed Greencroft Park House to proposed hub building.

Access to the Site has been refined and includes permanent bus stops on Durham Road to provide a larger recreational loop for guests and locals.

A phasing plan for both landscaping and built form has been produced to minimise visual impact. The planning documents associated with the application are very comprehensive and this article is of necessity a very brief summary. The deadline for comments may have passed by the time you read this article. The reference of the application is DM/24/02481/OUT if you wish to look at and comment on the Durham County Council planning portal.

Wildlife Notes

As Autumn draws in and the leaves begin to change, if you know what to look out for, you can see the wildlife around us changing too.

Take a walk along the railway line, and if you sit awhile on one of the benches near a Hawthorn or Rowan tree with their red berries, you can see Redwing and Fieldfares. They are members of the thrush family and have travelled all the way from Scandinavia to spend the autumn and winter in the milder climate of the UK.

It's not just Fieldfares and Redwings that are arriving to our shores though. Another autumn migrant that you could spot around Lanchester is Brambling. These are tricky to spot and look a lot like the closely related Chaffinch that they can often be found feeding with, but have no white wing markings, a completely grey head and a white rump. They can be found in gardens, hedgerows and woodlands. Like all wildlife though, they can struggle for lack of food, due to changing farming techniques and fewer trees and wild corners in domestic gardens.

We can all help and play our part though. Spend some time looking out for and enjoying these birds. Share your experience with others. We won't look after nature if we don't know it's there. Plant native trees, such as Hawthorns, if you have can. Small trees that can be maintained as a shrub or hedge and are suitable for small gardens. If you are a local farmer wondering what you could do to help, you could contact Trees for Lanchester (lanchestertrees@gmail.com) and ask about creating field boundaries with trees or a larger tree planting project. And remember to leave food out for the birds!

The end of October we are changing the carpet in Meeting Room 3 to a hard surface, which will work much better for the cafe too.


What's New:


He retired to St Joseph care home (Little Sisters of the poor) where he continued to celebrate morning mass until he was taken into hospital.

Notes from the Ordinary Meeting held in Lynwood House on Tuesday 10th September 2024 at 7.00pm

Minutes – Annual Meeting, Ordinary Meeting 9th July – approved

Police Reports

Members were updated on the recent PACT report for July/ August.

Officers responded to a report from a concerned member of the public about the manner of driving from a vehicle in front of them on the A691. Officers stopped the vehicle and performed a roadside alcohol and drugs test. The driver passed both tests and was given suitable words of advice about their manner of driving.

Respiratory Syncytial Virus - Vaccine

Respiratory Syncytial Virus (RSV) is an infectious disease of the airways and lungs. The virus thrives in Britain's temperate climate of cool, wet winters and warm wet summers. Cases of RSV generally start around October and last 4 to 5 months, peaking in December.



There is no specific treatment for RSV and most infections will get better themselves, however each year thousands of older adults need hospitalisation, some developing pneumonia.

RSV is common in young children and babies who can develop inflammation of the small airways in the lung (bronchiolitis), making it hard for them to breathe and feed.

Symptoms - similar to a cold

- · cough and sore throat
- · sneezing and runny or blocked nose
- · wheezy or short of breath
- · babies difficulty in feeding

RSV can spread through coughs and sneezes, and it is very difficult to avoid spreading the infection within the family.

Vaccination programme

Adults 75 years old on or after the 1st September 2024 - will be offered a single dose of RSV vaccine. This age group is at risk of serious complications from RSV. You can still get the vaccine up to the day before you turn 80. For the first year of the programme, the vaccine will also be offered to those who are already aged 75 to 79 years on the 1st September as part of a catch up programme.

Pregnant ladies – will be offered the vaccine around the time of their 28 week antenatal appointment, this helps build a good level of antibodies to pass on to the baby before birth, giving the baby the best protection. Every pregnancy requires a vaccination. Whooping cough and flu vaccine can be given at the same time.

How is it given and what are the side effects? It is a single injection in your upper arm. Side effects are usually mild and include headache, muscle ache, soreness, redness and swelling at the injection site.

From our councillor

The floods that hit Lanchester early on Sunday 29th October 2023 shocked everyone in the village – and it has been a key priority of mine, as local County Councillor, to make sure that shock and alarm has been recognised by key figures at Durham County Council (DCC).

Of course, for many people in the village, it was far worse than that - as over twenty shops and homes were directly hit, particularly on Front Street, Church View and The Square. Whilst almost everyone was disrupted as the pharmacy, SPAR shop and numerous other well-loved and vital shops were flooded, the damage for specific residents was both enduring and traumatic, with items high in material and sentimental value lost to dirty water damage.

Whilst the shock was real and profound, there was also a terrible sense of familiarity, given Lanchester's flood of 2012 and further back in 1967 – both well within both the living memory of people, or the collective memory of those (like myself) who were not there for either who had seen the photographic record. We have always been conscious of our vulnerability at the bottom of the river valley as water washes down Alderdene Burn and the River Browney ultimately runs its way across the Wear watershed. Though the village has a history of village flood damage, there was great concern that the village flood drains were not cleaned often enough. Since the floods occurred (and indeed before), I have pushed for ever great vigilance on this, and I have also sought to improve communication between the Council and the emergency services so floods can be responded to swiftly. However, as DCC's officers have rightly said of October's floods, autumn will remain a challenging time, as leaf fall is significant, meaning drains are more vulnerable to being blocked. Even before the floods, it has been particularly useful to work closely with the Parish Council - especially Eric Hepplewhite,

who leads on its flood work – to ensure the village can be as ready as it can be to prepare and respond if a flood comes again. A few weeks after the flood, Eric and fellow Parish Councillor Paul Jackson and I toured key spots in the village and pointed them out to the Drainage Manager at DCC so we can focus on long-term improvements being made to the village's infrastructure.

A key choke point during last year's flood was the culvert linked to Alderdene Burn which blocked up – and it is positive the culvert entrance has been expanded. Meanwhile, DCC officers are working with Wear Rivers Trust and key landowners to assess the water flow across the fields above the village and I welcome this.

Such projects are inevitably long-term and will have gradual results, but it is vital we take action now to consider how the environment is changing gradually and steadily. Whilst I am not a scientist and claim no knowledge of the future, it is also clear that a warmer planet and atmosphere means the air can hold more moisture meaning sudden rainfall in the future is possible, so we must not take anything for granted, even if we don't face flood threats for a long while to come. I have acknowledged to the Council that preventative measures aren't cheap - but they're usually less expensive than flood damage. To that end, I will continue to share ideas and views from residents on this - in the centre of the village but also at other key sites including along the streets near the A691. Finally, Parish Councillors and all residents will have the opportunity to listen to the County Council's flood lead who will give an update to the Parish Council at their November meeting at

Lynwood House and I will be there, too.
