#### 43 years of the The Great North Run

Like everyone taking part in the GNR this year, I was hoping we wouldn't have a repeat of the storms experienced last year, with high temperatures and torrential rain! No chance of that, on the morning of Sunday 8th September, runners were greeted by thick fog, and persistent drizzle! This did nothing to dampen the spirits of the runners, from everyone I spotted leaving Lanchester Village in their running gear at 7am, to the crowds gathering on the platform at Durham railway station to take the early train to Newcastle, all buoyed by the cheerful staff offering complimentary bananas and bottles of water! Arriving in Newcastle, I'd forgotten just how many people (runners and spectators) this event attracts, over 60,000 runners. So many of the runners are inspired by someone close to their heart, a worthy cause or a personal goal, all contributing to around £25million being raised for charity.

Getting to the start line is quite a challenge in itself, with thousands of people all headed in the same direction, but once on the Central Motorway waiting for the off (with the rain coming down pretty heavy now) the atmosphere is memorable. There was some concern from my fellow runners that the crowds may stay away because of the poor weather, but we shouldn't have doubted the famous Geordie resilience, hoards of spectators lined every section of the route with umbrellas to cheer on friends, loved ones, and complete strangers! For the entire route of 13.1 miles there were offers of drinks, jelly babies and ice pops all gratefully received by many, including me.

The sight of the sea as the runners hit the coast at South Shields is one of the most glorious moments, the last mile of the GNR along the seafront was 10 deep with spectators, cheering on the runners to get over that finish line, and we did it! Driven on by the amazing crowds, the camaraderie between the runners, and sheer individual determination. What an experience, and I for one will doing it all again next year, hope to see you there!

Some of the community may not know that the History Society is a member of County Durham Forum for History and Heritage. This group has the aim of providing a network for sharing. Set up in the early 2000's it ran a biennial history fair under the banner of "Yesterday belongs 2 you". This was a forum for member organisations to share any research or projects they were doing.

Sadly, this became a challenge as venues became expensive to hire and many local history groups stopped doing research and chose just to have their own series of talks. We all know what happened in 2020 which saw even these local events falter for many months.

The Forum set up a series of Zoom talks to bridge the gap and in the background the committee started reviewing their aims and

ways of achieving those aims. We have now embraced social media and gone public with a well-received Facebook Group. This provides a countywide "What's on" loosely linked to history, heritage, folklore and archaeology being undertaken locally. #### **Fundraising for pancreatic cancer research**

Saturday 13th July was a dry day, with the promise of sunshine in Lanchester but a few miles up the A1 as we crossed into Northumberland a few drops of rain fell and just got heavier and didn't stop. Not what I needed on the day I was going to walk 18 miles from Craster to Amble for Pancreatic Cancer UK (PCUK).

I was taking on this challenge in memory of Dawn Fairlamb-Chinnery who died last November of pancreatic cancer. This was an important day for me and something I had been working towards for a few months by doing the weekly wellbeing walks on a Monday plus other walks around the locality.

Dawn was well known in Lanchester, and we became friends when my partner and I moved to Victoria Terrace in August 2021. I only knew Dawn for 2 years but for whatever reason a friendship was created, and our time together will remain with me always. I chose to fundraise for PCUK to honour Dawn's memory and to support PCUK because if Dawn had received her diagnosis sooner, maybe, just maybe, she and her family and friends would not have had to travel the journey we have the last few months.

The walk was as part of the work that PCUK were doing to raise awareness of what pancreatic cancer is, to raise funds

for research and to allow the team to offer support to families of patients and those diagnosed with pancreatic cancer.

In doing the walk, by raising over £1300 (my initial goal was £250) for PCUK I hope I honoured her memory. I wore my PCUK t-shirt with pride and although no one could see it because it was such an awful weather day, I knew it was there. It's hanging up in my wardrobe ready for next year!

#### From the House



Parliament is back in session ahead of the party conference recess and I am once again travelling down to Westminster from North Durham. It has been an incredibly busy few weeks with both the Budget Responsibility Bill and the Passenger Railway Services Bill passing through all their Commons stages. These will now be considered in the House of Lords. The Great British Energy Bill has also passed its Second Reading in the Commons and will move to its Committee Stage.

I recently met with the Chief Fire Officer at the Co Durham & Darlington Fire and Rescue Service to discuss their work in keeping residents across the county safe.

I have also met with the Corporate Management Team and Cabinet at Durham County Council to discuss their budget planning and the state of the Council's finances as a result of austerity since 2010 and the cost pressures they are facing, particularly due to Adult Social Care and Children's Services. They clarified that the Council has lost over £270m from its budget since austerity began in 2010. I have coordinated a joint letter from Co Durham MPs to the Deputy Prime Minister Angela Rayner, seeking a meeting to discuss these issues further and ensure a fair deal for County Durham.

Along with other County Durham MPs, I have also met with North East Mayor Kim McGuiness to discuss her plans to improve bus services and public transport across the Region.

I am delighted that my Constituency Office is now up and running and that I have now responded to over 1,000 enquiries from constituents since the general election. I am advertising for a Caseworker to join my constituency team. ## Wildlife Notes Seldom seen, the Stoat

A black tip of a tail with something orange at the front whizzing across the road or path. Stoats rarely seem to stop. They're our second smallest mustelid. Weasels are smallest, they lack the black tip to their much shorter tail. Mustelids mostly look like they've been stretched, long bodies and relatively short legs, the badger being the less sleek exception.

They're powerful predators for their size, able to kill adult rabbits with a bite to the base of the skull; prey five times their size is fair game; adapted to climb and follow tunnels on their hunts. They can be a problem for ground nesting birds, particularly now that some species are threatened and occur in low density. Stoats are predated by raptors (bird of prey) and foxes which should be present to keep balance. They can live in most habitats within the UK, even moorland e.g. Waskerley/Weardale. Males and females live separately and are territorial. Out in the open they're vulnerable to raptors and foxes, so favour hedgerow/drystone walls/ditches and copses. They are so elusive that it's difficult to gauge population density. Removing linear features and the decline in hedgerows will negatively impact them as does fluctuating food sources of rabbits/voles etc.


They are able to change colour to almost completely white in colder weather for camouflage in snow. This fur 'ermine' is extra dense, and their pelts were prized in the past.

They mate during the summer, but the fertilised eggs are stored and not implanted until the following Spring (delayed implantation). Up to twelve kits can result! The female kits can become pregnant just weeks after birth, but don't give birth until mum is mature due to the delayed implantation.

Stoatally [will forgive the pun as their last article] good that some new 'Wild Notes' writers are venturing forth, so watch out in the next issue. It's been a pleasure waffling wildly each month. Stay in touch with your 'Wild'. Good luck with the future publication!

Now I'm leaving, perhaps I can be biased and say that I hope Lanchester doesn't get a large commercial Sitka Spruce plantation, or do I mean 'community forest', nearby.

## Ladies who lunch



### **Lanchester Medical Centre: Patient Participation Group**

#### **Earwax**

Earwax is a natural, waxy substance that moisturizes, cleans, and lubricates the ear canal. It protects the inside part of the ear from injury and infection by trapping dirt, pollen, and even bacteria.

Causes- a build-up of earwax can happen if you have:

- narrow or damaged ear canals
- · lots of hair in your ear canals
- · skin condition affecting your scalp or around your ear
- inflammation of your ear canal (otitis externa or "swimmer's ear")
- · anything that sits inside your ears, hearing aids, earbuds, earplugs
- excessive exposure to dust and pollens

#### **Symptoms**

- · hearing loss, muffled hearing
- · earache or a feeling that your ears are blocked, itchiness
- ringing or buzzing in your ears (tinnitus)
- vertigo (feeling dizzy and sick)

**Non-urgent advice from your surgery-** If symptoms continue, make an appointment to see a nurse. By looking inside your ear using an otoscope, she will be able to see if there is a build-up of wax, any inflammation or irritation and advise what to do.

Surgery treatment to remove wax- you will be asked to soften the wax by applying drops.

- · Lie on your side with the affected ear facing up.
- Put 2 to 3 drops of olive or almond oil in your ear do not use almond oil if you're allergic to almonds.
- Continue to lie on your side for 5 to 10 minutes after putting in the oil.
- Repeat 3 to 4 times a day, for 5 to 10 days.

Ear irrigation- Once the wax has softened, make a second nurses' appointment where the wax can be flushed out with water.

#### Important


Do not use any objects like cotton buds to remove earwax, this will push the wax further in making it worse. Do not use drops if you have a hole in your eardrum (perforated eardrum).




KoGs are back

#### Poppy's walks

Good day readers.

This month's walk takes place in Lanchester and can be as easy or as difficult as you like. While that sentence may sound gibberish, all will be revealed, I hope! As you will know by now, I am Poppy, a Patterdale

Terrier who enjoys sharing with you readers the walks I lead my humans on.

This one, like many of them, starts on the village green from where we proceed past the Kings Head and for a very short way along Durham Road. At the traffic island opposite the church, we cross then turn left along the path which leads us along the by-pass. We follow the path past the Jet garage and across the road via another island towards St Bede's School. We cross the main road at the island there and head back taking a right turn towards the village centre.

But at the next junction we turn right again along Kitswell Road. We proceed along Kitswell Road although I sometimes fancy a detour around the cricket field. In summer the male Human often leads me there and makes me sit to watch the strange ritual which comprises a cricket match while he enjoys a glass - or three - of beer. But on this occasion, there was no cricket being played so we carried on past the cemetery and then along a farm track after Kitswell Road petered out.

When we came to Lizard Farm we could have turned left and up onto the railway line, but I insisted we walk a little further. So, we ended up at a cattle grid with a gate to the right which we passed through. This is where I meant that the walk could be as easy or as difficult as required. Those who do not fancy crossing stiles could turn back there and head back towards Lanchester and when they reached Lizard Farm again, they could walk up the slip road back to the railway path. But I prefer to turn left just beyond the cattle grid and cross a stile.

From there I am kept on my lead across the first field because a sign says we dogs must be kept on lead due to the presence of horses. We cross another stile, another field and yet another stile and get onto the railway path. We then turn left to head back towards Lanchester, but after about ten minutes we reach a flight of stairs on our right where we branch off the railway path and up them onto Ridgeway. This is a footpath which leads us - with houses on the left and fields on the right - onto Newbiggin I ane.

We turn left onto Newbiggin Lane and down to the bottom. We turn left again then right past the EP school and back to the by-pass, this time on the other side of the main road. We walk along the footpath where carvings of animals abound - if it is warm I stop for a dip in the stream - and soon return to the village green.

The walk takes just over an hour and can be extended or shortened depending on inclination, time commitments and stamina.

\*Just a note as a reminder that a walking group still leaves for a 90 minute walk from the Village Green weekly on Mondays at 1pm. Well-behaved dogs are welcome although for some reason I am rarely invited.

#### From our councillor - Waste and Litter

Back in 2020, before I was a County Council member, and in the nervous gap between Covid lockdowns, I joined our then MP Richard Holden and a number of village volunteers litter-picking around Lanchester and it was then I learned a lot about the waste problem facing our otherwise delightful village, and the area surrounding it.

And it was disappointing to return to the same spot on Cadger

Bank for Lanchester Partnership's litter pick on March 9th this year, picking up multiple bags worth of plastic bottles, cartons, crisp packets, and the like.

It was interesting to reflect afterwards with Sonny Shepherd - who helped convene this spring's effort - about the presence of cheap convenience food and drink and the disposable wrapping that goes with it.

As a councillor, and a member of its Environment Scrutiny Committee, I often work with people from all parties on how we use a carrot and stick approach to make things better – (particularly Lib

Dem Cllr Mark Wilkes who is Cabinet Member with responsibility for the environment across Durham).

Of course, my preference is the "carrot" and as a councillor, I am keen for DCC to do more to expand recycling provision - like the Household Waste Facility at Annfield Plain for big items, or the bin I was able to get installed outside of the SPAR shop useful for small bits from the shops.


But there is no excuse for anyone littering. Given the existing presence of bins and the relatively small inconvenience of waiting to get home, rather than tossing it out of the car window, Drs Freud and Jung would struggle themselves to fully understand the motivation some people seem to have for littering. That is where a tougher approach is right, and I back Durham's Coalition Joint Administration, which I am part of, which has recently increased fines for littering from £100 to

£250 and doubled fly-tipping fines to £1,000. But for fines to work, they have to be believable, and it has been good for Cllr Mike McGaun and myself to get to know Malcolm and Richard, our local Neighbourhood Warden and Countryside Ranger, respectively, who both do valuable work around the village and nearby rivers and fields to keep the place keen. You can also email me on Douglas.oliver@durham.gov.uk if you have any comments about unsightly or illegal waste. Of course, a blended approach is right. It is useful for us all to consider what we consume, how we dispose of waste, what we pick up, and the Council needs to think about how we approach punishment for those

who don't think of others.

But I can conclude on a positive note, we should consider our glass half full: Lanchester and the area around is one of the most blindingly green and beautiful in the country, but we must never be complacent and work together to keep it that way.

Silviculture, the organisation behind the proposals to plant a commercial forest on land that is now agricultural, held the all-day event on Friday, August 30 in Lanchester Community Centre. Visitors were invited to scrutinise plans which will be submitted to Durham County Council.

Lanchester residents, the parish council and local

representatives will all be given the opportunity to comment on the plans which have already attracted considerable controversy.

Critics point out that the proposal is for a commercial forest and cast doubts on the extent of any environmental benefits from replacing agricultural land with trees. But other locals have welcomed the proposal.

#### Police Report - Parking During School Times

With the start of the new school year, I understand that some residents will be worried about the issue of parking outside the primary schools in Lanchester. Before the schools broke up for the summer holidays, I made attempts to help ease the issue. I was able to collect a substantial amount of data from emails sent to me, numerical data collected on patrol and also looked into other agencies' figures.

With this information, I was able to speak with members of Durham County Council's Road Safety Team and go through their suggestions and advice. I also met with the Traffic

Management Officer for Durham Constabulary, who was able to clear up misconceptions around police powers when it comes to parking issues. Durham Constabulary Neighbourhood officers are not able to issue a fixed penalty notice for parking on double yellow lines and keep clear areas and can only issue a fixed penalty notice for wilful obstruction.

We are working with the schools to educate pupils and parents around the issues of poor parking and how it can be very dangerous for pedestrians and also detrimental to the wellbeing of residents.

With collaboration from Durham County Council and Durham Constabulary, I have been able to have the white "KEEP CLEAR" lines around Millfield replaced with double yellow lines which if parked on, can result in a fine issued by the council's parking

service wardens. The works may be slow to progress as it has been added to the long list of projects the council already have in place.

The council have also recognised the need for more attendance by parking service wardens, who have more powers than police when it comes to parking offences and the issuing of fines. After my meeting with Durham Constabulary's Traffic Management Officer, an application has been submitted for the primary schools in Lanchester to be part of a new pilot scheme "Park Safe". This new scheme allows members of the public

> to submit images of illegal parking which would then result in the "offender" being issued a fine. This allows reports of poor parking to be addressed, even if there are no parking service wardens or police in the vicinity.

The application for the "Park Safe" scheme is not guaranteed for the schools in Lanchester, as it is currently in its pilot stages. So far, it has been rolled out to

three schools in County Durham, with great success. I understand that the issue will not be solved overnight, but with these additions, I hope that the problem may be reduced and morale in the village will be increased.
