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STOP PRESS – Greencroft Forest Park

As this month's edition was going to print, it was announced that the Greencroft Forest Park is going ahead with preparations over the summer. Tree planting will start in November.

This was after the Forestry Commission "screened the Greencroft woodland creation project under the Environmental Impact Assessment regulations. The Forestry Commission determined that it is unlikely to have a significant effect on the environment and therefore our consent under these regulations is not required. We took this decision on Tuesday 4th March 2025".

From our councillor:

As I have mentioned in previous columns for this magazine, as County Councillor one of my greatest privileges has been to support a number of important community groups located in and around the villages of Lanchester, Burnhope and Castleside. However, a particular organisation I have been proud to work with is Willow Burn Hospice, located just outside the village on the bank up toward Maiden Law. At the beginning of January, it was great to catch-up with their Chief Executive, David Barker and Carol Hagri, Head of Clinical Services, at the hospice which has served the area since 1989. Its mission is to "deliver hospice care of the highest standard to our patients and those important to them - now and in the future."

Death is always a challenging matter that is hard to confront – but that is perhaps all the more so in a world in which life has become healthier and longer, and premature end of life has become mercifully rarer. But all too often it does, and the culture of professionalism, tranquillity, and calm the hospice offers, underpinned by its outstanding staff and trustees, situated on the picturesque edge of Lanchester valley helps reduce the pain it causes.

The project that Cllr Mike McGaun and I have been able to fund in recent months is the installation of a series of chairs for the day centre at the hospice, which is going to be refurbished in the next few months. This will enable patients to recuperate and rest after treatment and when coping with their health condition, supporting people to live well with their illness.

That said, this only represents a small part of the overall funding of the hospice. Whilst the work the hospice does to help people is vital, its work is only partially funded by the taxpayer, with approximately half of its income sourced from the commitment of local volunteers and supporters to fundraising – such as sponsored events, legacies and charity shops (with a new one hopefully opening in Lanchester soon). The annual "Light Up a Life" event the Hospice organises each year in the run-up to Christmas is a key event, as local (and more distant) people come together to remember the people the hospice has supported since being set up by Irene Mortimer and Valerie Davison three and a half decades ago. The event shows not only

the importance of a peaceful end to life but also the way in which that experience frames our remembrance of those we can fondly only hold only in memory. Trees for Lanchester

Our group of tree planting volunteers have been busy again planting over 1200 tree saplings this winter. We planted in freezing fog and on gloriously warm bright days, whenever we could gather enough volunteers. Our star planter was young Max who should be commended for his hard work.

All our trees are native British trees mainly gifted from a sister group of an energy company called "I Dig Trees" but also many grown from seed at our tree nursery tended by our volunteers.

This year we have experimented with growing trees more densely on a site in the Browney valley. This method has been shown to encourage more rapid growth and capture more carbon. A dense thicket should develop after a few years which should become a home for birds and insects. We are looking forward to seeing how our "Tiny Forest" performs over the next few years.

If you'd like to join us for a few hours of planting, there are always plans afoot for further digging. But also, we are looking for new places to plant so if you're a landowner and have a space for some native trees do let us know. As well we're keen to expand our tree nursery and looking for hawthorn, hazel, oak, rowan, crab apple seedlings. Do let us know if you have any growing in your garden.

Harry grew up in Leadgate and always spoke fondly of his childhood, enjoying walks in Port Woods with his dog Rex, holidays in Blackpool, enjoying sports football, running, cricket. He trained as a mine surveyor before retraining as a maths teacher and working at Pelton Roseberry Comprehensive School

Education was important to him, and he loved helping others succeed, tutoring many young people through their GCSE and A Level maths. He also enjoyed his time leading music, was a Boys' Brigade man, working his way up the ranks to Captain at Leadgate Methodist Church. Harry married Jean in 1965, a proud husband, dad, grandad and great grandad.

Harry and Jean moved to the village in 1970 and brought their children, Graeme and Helen, up here. Harry was involved in many aspects of village life: a faithful member of Lanchester Methodist Church, where he served as treasurer for several years and played keyboard in the worship group until not long before he died. He played trombone in Lanchester Brass Band, led the Male Voice Choir, enjoyed being part of the art group and helped out as organist at All Saints' CofE Church for a season. Music was both a gift and a passion and he enjoyed many years directing the band for the Youth Connection theatre group. He encouraged young people in their music and loved to see them stepping up to play at church and in Youth Connection.

Harry had a great sense of humour, he was always ready with a joke, even when he was so very poorly in hospital he was heard to quip "I dread to think what I'll be like when I'm old"! He was fun to be around and never took himself too seriously. He will be remembered for supporting his beloved Rotherham United.

He was a keen gardener and enjoyed working on his garden and also spending time sitting in the garden. He would be heard saying "this is the life". Helen remembers eating peas from the pod and snowball turnips fresh from the ground. He enjoyed food - especially Ravello's potato skins! He cooked an amazing barbecue and loved to entertain. Harry was a people person, a connector. He loved chatting with people on any subject - sport, politics, music. He looked for connections with people, common ground - it was his superpower. He would engage people he met in conversation then remember for the next time he met them so he could easily converse with them again. He knew his own mind but was open to hearing the opinions of others, enjoying a debate and discussion.

The family have been inundated with sympathy cards speaking of his kindness, gentleness, positivity, enthusiasm. Saying that he was a man of integrity, a loving man with a big heart, a joy to know. All of this is true, and so much more. He was a good man who lived a great life. He loved God, loved people and loved life.

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Poppy's walks

Good day readers and this month's walk lasts exactly one hour, so is manageable for most of you I would imagine.

It starts at Coach Lane, Witton Gilbert, which is either a short car or bus ride away. The Human parks in a lay-by

close to the entrance to woods - just off the village Front Street and then we walk along Coach Lane towards the village church. At the church we turn right and go downhill along a rutted track which eventually runs alongside fields. At the foot of the track is a small footbridge over the River Browney. We cross the bridge and then turn right, continuing to walk alongside the river. Eventually we come to a steep incline which takes us onto the Lanchester Valley path. We turn right there and cross another bridge, a stone one this time, and walk in the direction of Langley Park.

We follow this path for ten to fifteen minutes, with the river way down below on our right. After a while we come to a crossing of paths near what used to be a railway station. The old station house still has the words Witton Gilbert on the side and there is also a very old sign visible which seems to warn against railway trespassers! I believe it is at least 60 years since there was a railway there but at the station house, we turn right, and this leads us onto Wallnook Lane where we turn right again.

We pass a house on our right called Centurion House which the male Human explains wistfully used to be a pub many years ago. We follow the lane across a stone bridge which is now open to pedestrians and cyclists only - this is called Wallnook Bridge - and continue walking until we get to the main road into Langley Park, where we turn right and reach the roundabout next to the filling station/car showroom.

We cross carefully at the crossing in front of the garage then walk along the footpath back towards Witton Gilbert. For about five minutes we are walking alongside the main road, so I am kept firmly on my lead, but then the path branches off through woods and we enter Witton Gilbert in front of a row of houses called Park View.

We continue to walk through the centre of the village before turning right into Coach Lane again and back to the car. There is still time for a quick wander into the woods which are particularly attractive at this time of year before we head back to Lanchester.

While segments of this walk have appeared in previous routes I have described to you, this is a new circular walk which I am delighted to share with you.

Plans for a solar farm at Burnhope have been refused following pleas from residents

The proposal for the site was voted down by Durham County Council's planning committee on March 5 with councillors supporting local concerns about the scale of the solar farm and loss of landscape.

But the refusal was not unanimous, with some committee members claiming the development was essential to achieving the county's net zero ambitions. The authority previously approved the solar farm in March 2023, but a judicial: review brought by Burnhope residents ruled the approval "unlawful". The applicant, Lightsource bp, resubmitted its application for the 92-hectare (227-acre) site last year and said it had improved landscaping to minimise

visual impacts. Up to 14 fields were set to be overlaid with panels, including areas near the Chapman's Well nature reserve.

The applicant is expected to appeal against the decision.



JW Fawcett's "Tales of Derwentdale" and the communities of Edmundbyers, Muggleswick, and down the Derwent valley featured significantly. The Giants Cor, Ben and Con lived in caves respectively in Corbridge, Benfieldside and Consett. These guys communicated by whistling and shared tools by throwing them the miles between caves. It's claimed that a miss shot by Con aiming for Cor hit the ground forming a hollow in the ground then called Howden this being near Con's cave which was at Howden's Gill!

Lanchester even got into the story with a plaque "in memory of John and George Maddison of Hole House near Alansford in this Parish". The Monument was erected by their only sister Eleanor, the wife of Thomas Greenwell of Broomshields in the Parish. A good session was

enjoyed by all.



Hours cut at the Consett Empire

Council bosses in Durham plan to cut the hours of Consett Empire in a bid, they say, to make the venue more viable. Critics point out that Durham County Council recently spent £470,000 on repairing the roof and say the 500 seater venue is "an asset not a problem."

The county council say some cinema performances are poorly attended and the rise in National Insurance also means cost-cutting measures are needed.

It is proposed to close the venue on Tuesdays and reduce the hours during other days.


The Empire currently shows a wide range of films - all modern releases - as well as hosting a wide variety of live performances, including a hugely successful panto.

Cabinet member Elizabeth Scott said: "We are doing the right thing to protect the long-term future of the theatre and ensure the council is not wasting taxpayers' money by opening on days when nobody visits."

But Labour county councillor Kevin Early argued that reducing opening hours would be a backward step, and more should be done by the authority to make the venue "more viable."

"It is an asset not a problem, it is a cracking little theatre," he said. **Neil McKay**




